PASTOR ROSSING'S 1992 ANNUAL REPORT

"Stir us, Lord!" That's the theme suggested for this year's annual reports by congregations of The Evangelical Lutheran Church in America.

Emmaus has been stirred in 1992. We have moved in a variety of ways to accomplish God's mission as defined in the congregation's mission statement: "to affirm, interpret and proclaim the Christian Faith through worship, education, witness, service and fellowship...."

A top concern of the congregation has been to reduce our indebtedness. Strides have been made in this effort. Persons still contributing to the Capital Fund Drive (designated for payments on principal) and those giving for the new program, Adopt-A-Sunday (to help with regular monthly mortgage payments), have made a big difference. These programs combined with special pledge-programs in the years preceding have enabled Emmaus to reduce the debt by \$318,000 since 1985, the year the new addition was completed. Our indebtedness has shrunk from \$563,000 to something less than \$245,000. This significant achievement raises hope that one day our indebtedness will be eliminated and we will have more dollars for our mission, both locally and beyond our community through the larger church.

In 1992 we were stirred to respond to a challenging stewardship program that was carried out with the insights garnered from the previous year's consultant program. Gregg Albright and his committee did another great job. Our thanks to them. Over \$160,000 in pledges for 1993 were made by members of Emmaus.

Staff changes cause a stir. It's a time to reflect on where we are and where we want to go. Norman Lanning, the Adult Choir director, for almost the last 13 years, resigned his position at the end of the year. I join with you in thanking Norm for his years of service in leading the choir and wishing him well in the years ahead. The search for a new director is underway.

Helping all staff members to sort things out - to provide feedback from the congregation and to listen to the concerns of staff members - has been our Personnel Committee, newly re-established last spring. This committee consists of six people: Chairman John French, Bev Johnson, Karen Christiansen, Marvin Gattie, Dennis Kreimer and Lyle Zuelke. Thanks to them for their attention and guidance.

Stirring us to action on behalf of our neighbor in need has been the Social Concerns Committee, chaired by Nancy Martinsen. They have done a great job to remind all of us of the ways we can help those less fortunate than ourselves - through the food pantry, community meals program, Lutheran World Relief, World Hunger Appeal, vital support for a local, single parent family and ministry to those who have lost a loved one or in some other stress.

Looking ahead, I hope Emmaus will pray with the rest of the ELCA, "Stir us, Lord!" and that we will throw ourselves after our prayers. An area that needs our attention is a focus on outreach that enables and encourages new people to join with us in our mission. A re-newed Deacons Committee will provide vital leadership here. Another area is growth in our benevolence. Here we join hands with other Lutherans to bring the gospel of God's love in Christ to people in hospitals, on campuses, in nursing homes, in foreign lands, in new mission churches at home and abroad, and in other ways and places as well. Our dollars and our prayers are both important in this effort. Finally, an area already beginning to be addressed in council discussion, is the use of the Evelyn Binder estate funds to upgrade our facilities, particularly in the kitchen, Fellowship Hall and sanctuary.

My thanks to Pastor Mary, Paul Berge (our secretary), Glenn Olson (our Senior Center director) - the staff who meet with me every week to address the needs of the congregation. I greatly appreciate their love for Christ's body, the church, and their conscientious efforts on behalf of the church's mission here. I thank all lay leaders, all of you members of Emmaus and my wife, Betty, for your dedication in this same mission.

With the Bishop of our Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, I pray for Emmaus: "May God continue to bless the work of (y)our congregation with vision and with a spirit of love. May the Spirit stir us to share God's love with all who need our ministry of witness and service."

PASTOR JANZ'S 1992 ANNUAL REPORT

To stir, to stir up. Is that really our prayer as we reflect upon this past year and as we look ahead to the year to come? The cover of this Annual Report and the theme of our Annual Meeting is "Stir us, Lord."

I don't know about you, but when I think about the word "stir," images of tempests and storms and riled up, muddied waters come to mind. I think of unrest, such as many of our cities and churches and families and lives are experiencing on a day-to-day basis.

But, the word "stir" can be more than unrest; it can be movement; it can be restlessness; it can be mixing things together in a new way. And, that restlessness and that movement can be very powerful and very positive indeed. I think of the New Testament letter to the Hebrews, beginning with verse 19 of chapter 10:

Therefore, my friends, since we have confidence to enter the sanctuary by the blood of Jesus ... let us approach with a true heart in full assurance of faith, with our hearts sprinkled clean from an evil conscience and our bodies washed with pure water. Let us hold fast to the confession of our hope without wavering, for he who has promised is faithful. And let us consider how to STIR UP ONE ANOTHER TO LOVE and good deeds, not neglecting to meet together, as is the habit of some, but encouraging one another...

During this past year, there has been a stirring up of the hearts and the minds and the imaginations of the people of Emmaus. First, I would like to thank each of you for your support and your encouragement and your participation as we have introduced some innovations in a number of our worship services, be that the more casual format for the Saturday evening summer services or the scores of red helium balloons on Reformation/Confirmation Sunday. God's spirit does stir among us as we worship together around Word and Sacrament!

This year, we have seen NEW life and NEW movement in a revitalized <u>Vacation Church School</u> program, in an overnight <u>Women's Retreat</u> held at the Siena Center, in the involvement of <u>seminarians-in-training</u> in many aspects of our church life, in the transfer of all of the church <u>membership records to our new computer system</u>, in the many hours of revision of the <u>Chicago Folk Service and Songbook</u> to be published in February of 1993, in serious <u>discussion regarding the priorities and needs of Emmaus</u> in order to determine how the generous bequest of the Evelyn Binder estate be most responsibly allocated. And that is but a glimpse of the movement and of God's spirit at work among us.

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE CONGREGATION Joe Nixa

As I complete my two-year term as president, I look back and find that they were very enjoyable.

Being president of the council, I chair our monthly council meetings, our annual congregational meeting, and any special congregational meetings that may be called. I make sure that our various committees are meeting regularly and accomplishing their goals. Honestly, being president is the easiest job on the council. Having two very fine pastors, excellent committee chairpersons, and many dedicated volunteers throughout the church, performing many functions, my position is that of an overseer. We are fortunate indeed to have this staff and volunteers at Emmaus.

The past year have presented Emmaus with some challenges—church attendance, member giving, and meeting our budget, to name a few. We were fortunate to be a beneficiary of the Binder estate, totaling about \$55,000, which helped us towards benevolences. The Adopt-a-Sunday program was started, which contributed towards our mortgage and therefore helped meet our budget. With the help of God and the congregation, Emmaus will continue to meet all our challenges in a positive way.

I would again like to thank the pastors, all committee chairpersons, and all volunteers for a fine year as I look forward to 1993.

STEWARDSHIP COMMITTEE Gregg Albright, Chairperson

Our stewardship campaign for 1992 has come to a close. 184 pledges, totaling \$160,000, have been received. WORSHIP AND MUSIC COMMITTEE Lee Woodward, Chairperson

Using the objectives recommended for 1992 as a guide, the Worship and Music Committee has accomplished the following:

- 1. 75% of our services used a traditional Liturgical or Service of the Word format.
- 2. 25% of our services were contemporary or innovative. The Chicago Folk Service has been used for both services on the third Sunday of the month.
- 3. The senior high youth assisted at a Sunday service in the spring and youth were involved in a candle lighting advent ceremony in December.
- 4. The committee met monthly to help plan services and special events. In addition, subcommittees of this group carried out the following functions: usher

responsibilities, altar guild responsibilities, choosing hymns for worship, scheduling choirs, and reviewing new folk hymns.

- 5. Occasionally, lay people have led the worship story in addition to the pastors.
- 6. Both primary and intermediate Sunday School groups have provided special music at worship services and have prepared a Christmas program. This encouraged parents and children to attend services together. Sermon notes were required of confirmation students. Worship bags continue to be restocked by the Senior Center for use by young children during the Sunday services. Children and Youth Choir attendance has increased. Acolytes are responsible for lighting the candles at services.
- 7. The completion of a hymn booklet for use with the folk service is still in progress.
- 8. Holy Communion was celebrated at both services on the first and third Sundays of each month as well as at special services such as Maundy Thursday, Thanksgiving, late Christmas Eve and New Year's Eve.
- 9. To encourage worship attendance, the committee added a Saturday evening service and got air conditioning for the Sunset Room, supported new practice and performance times for children and youth choirs, provided special decorations for Easter, Christmas and Reformation Day services, and helped plan the special events during the stewardship campaign, "Honor the Lord with All Your Gifts."

SOCIAL CONCERNS COMMITTEE Nancy Martinsen, Chairperson

Social Concerns Committee members are Julia Durand, Pastor Mary Janz, Beverly Johnson, Cathy Knuteson, Nancy Martinsen, Tim Van Berg, and Lyle Zielke. Committee meets monthly the fourth Monday at 6:30 p.m. to exchange information and to share ideas of ways Emmaus can help meet social needs in our community.

Emmaus hosted the Community Meal Program at St. Patrick's McCarthy Hall on the first Thursday evening of the months of February, April, June, August, October and December. A minimum of 27 people are involved each month to prepare food, to serve and to clean up. We thank each of you for your continued support of this program, and we appreciate the Junior and Senior High students for serving.

Food and other supplies have been very generously donated to the Northside Pantry throughout the year.

An appeal was made for quilts, blankets, men's and children's clothing for the Annual Lutheran World Relief Fall Clothing Drive. Donations, overall, were down and disappointing. This may have resulted because of the focus on our own WELCA Rummage Sale in early Fall. We are especially grateful to Esther Jensen for her generous contribution of 15 handmade quilts. We also thank the members who responded with a \$5.00 or more donation to help raise over \$400 for the Blanket Fund Drive for Lutheran World Relief. We are hoping for more on-going response in making or assembling School Kits, Sewing Kits, and Health Kits. These projects which help to support the work of LWR give hope to victims of disasters, poverty and disease overseas. Kit samples and instructions are available. These projects could be done individually or as a Circle effort.

The Christmas Giving Tree grew this year in spirit and generosity. Sixty children, an increase of 25 over last year, had their Christmas brightened through gifts purchased and beautifully wrapped by members of Emmaus. Donations of mittens, gloves, hats and scarves were yet another opportunity for Emmaus members to share in a meaningful way to children in need.

The Fourteenth Annual CROP Walk was held on Sunday, October 11. Thanks to Heidi Lamberton, Kylee Albright, Tim and Joanne Van Berg, Kathy Decker, Pastor Mary, Pat Le Roux, Fred Van Nice and Nancy Martinsen for representing Emmaus in completing the full ten kilometer walk. Thanks to many church members, whose cooperative efforts by sponsoring one or more walkers helped Emmaus raise \$1,274.50 for CROP.

The Committee also sponsored the following Adult Forum programs:

- Sister Brenda Walsh of Siena Center led a discussion on ways in which local human heeds could be met through "faith active in love."
- 2.) "Domestic Abuse" presentation by Colleen Carpenter of the Women's Resource Center.
- 3.) Cathy Knuteson presented a program on "How to Make Choices Towards a Healthy Lifestyle Behavior."
- 4.) "Understanding Adolescent Behavior" facilitated by Cathy Knuteson in cooperation with the Junior and Senior High students.
- 5.) Lady Jackson, Director of Independence House, spoke on the program established for the Department of Corrections for the purpose of treating ex-alcohol and drug offenders, who are on probation and parole, make the transition back to the community.

Many member remembered Rena Stewart and her children with clothing, household items, furniture, and gifts at Christmas. We thank you for your heartfelt response to them.

DEACONS COMMITTEE REPORT

- 1. The greeters' program has continued. Four-month schedules are being mailed to remind participants of the Sundays and services when they are on duty.
- 2. All of the shut-in members have been visited and have communed regularly (at least quarterly) and members on responsibility list (inactives) have been contacted.
- 3. Name Tag Sunday was done three times last year.
- 4. Offering envelopes not picked up at church were delivered to members.
- 5. Receptions for those joining and host families were held on New Member Sundays.
- 6. Requests for transportation to services or events were addressed.

CONGREGATIONAL LIFE COMMITTEE REPORT Barbara Toslek, Chairperson

The first event our committee planned and carried out was the Valentine Dinner in February. This was held at the Wind Point Inn. We had a bike ride to Cliffside Park and back to the church where we had a barbecue supper. This was in May. A men/boys supper and program around the train theme, "On the Right Track," was held in June. Several people attended the Brewer game in July.

In August, we had a "fare well" for Kevin and Noel Cookman between services before they left for work in China. In October, we attended the Raiders football game. In November, we had hors d'oeuvres at church before going to the play "Driving Miss Daisy" at the Racine Theatre Guild.

The year was capped with a caroling party in the neighborhood and hot chocolate and cookies at church in December.

Along with maintaining the status quo and keeping programs running, this committee made the following accomplishments in 1992:

- A new reward system for Sunday School attendance was implemented.
- Jody Svoboda and Karen Sedgwick organized a very successful and well attended Vacation Church School.
- A sub-committee was formed to address Adult Education needs at Emmaus. JoAnn Christensen, Kurt Handrich, Marilyn McGinnis, Glenn Olson, Pastor Lyle Rossing, Fred Van Nice, and Janice Windler spent the summer focused on this effort. MISSION STATEMENT

We thank God for our heritage of faith and for the faithfulness of our forebears that over the years have come to include people of many backgrounds. In response to the grace of God focused in Jesus Christ and poured out by the Holy Spirit, the mission of Emmaus is to carry forward our strong heritage. We are called to affirm, interpret and proclaim the Christian Faith through worship, education, witness, service and fellowship by utilizing effectively, as members of God's family, the many different gifts God gives us.

EMMAUS LUTHERAN CHURCH PLAN

- I. Statement of Purpose What we want to do:
 Emphasizing the main points of Mission90 in our
 Evangelical Lutheran Church in America by:
 - A. Seeing Jesus Living in Christ.
 - B. Growing in Jesus Living in the Congregation.
 - C. Serving Jesus Living in the World.
- II. How we will do it:

 By concentrating on the building blocks of congregational life and work, namely:
 - A. Worship, Bible study, daily prayer, reflection on our Lutheran heritage to see Jesus.
 - B. Witness, inviting and giving to grow in Jesus.
 - C. Caring for people and creation, building partnerships with others - to serve Jesus.
- III. When it will be done and who will do it:
 Start in January, 1993, with members who already affirm,
 interpret and proclaim Christ and then involve all.

Policy Plan

- I. What we want to do: Emphasize the ELCA's Mission 90 and Emmaus' 140th "Forward in Faith" theme so that we:
 - A. See Jesus as we live in Christ.
 - B. Grow in Jesus as we live in Emmaus congregation.
 - C. Serve Jesus as we live in our world.

Administration Plan

- II. How we will do it:
 - A. We will promote Mission90 and our "Stir Us Lord" thrust through worship:
 - That is interesting and helpful for our life with God, with Jesus and with one another.
 a. We will use lively and singable hymns.

II. A. b. We will use guitars, flutes, trumpets and other musical instruments besides the organ.

- c. We will utilize ideas of the Worship Committee for seasons of the church year, working in cooperation with the pastors, choirs and worship committee on theme, special music, art and other creative expressions.
- d. We will plan services with children in mind.
- e. We will plan services with the stranger and newcomer in mind.
- That is sacramental and celebrates with joy and thanksgiving what God gives us in Jesus.
 - a. We will remember our Baptism, especially when this sacrament is offered but also on those times of worship when the connection of baptism to our Christian faith and life is more vivid.
 - b. We will celebrate Holy Communion at least twice a month.
 - c. We will have sermons that show Jesus, sign and seal of God's grace, as the center of life.
- 3. That is Lutheran and connects us to the rest of the church, past and present.
 - a. We will make frequent use of the standard Lutheran liturgy.
 - b. We will have sermons that are based ordinarily on one of the assigned biblical texts.
 - c. We will include hymns from our rich heritage of Lutheran hymnody, as well as "new," contemporary hymns.
- B. We will emphasize Mission 90 and move "Forward in Faith" through education:
 - We will learn of God through the Word (Bible, sermon and incarnate in Jesus). We will promote daily Bible reading and Bible study.
 - 2. We will grow in our knowledge of God as we receive and share Jesus through learning and giving.
- C. We will carry out Mission90 through witness:
 - 1. Listening empathizing with:
 - a. Members of our immediate family.
 - b. Members of a small group in the congregation.
 - c. Those carrying burdens who share their need with us.
 - Telling relating the good news of God's love in Jesus "at the right time."
 - a. We will include story-telling in worship, Sunday School and Vacation Church School.
 - b. We will share God's Word with those who are searching for direction and meaning in life.
 - 3. Visiting extending our witness through individuals and groups.
 - a. We will visit the inactive and the unchurched with the invitation to participate in some

activity of the congregation.

- II. C. 3. b. At the right time we will invite them to worship that they might hear often of God's love for them.
 - 4. Managing caring for the gifts God has given us and using them in God's service.
 - a. Encouraging everyone to tithe, to give at least 10% of income.
 - b. Giving away at least 8% of our income as a congregation.
 - D. We will follow through on Mission90 through serving:
 - We will respond to crises with short-term help (e.g. Emmaus Emergency Fund, a visit by the pastor or referral to a helping agent or agency).
 - We will address contemporary problems (e.g. AIDS, hunger, mental illness, peace etc.) and contribute to solutions (e.g. through education, ELCA Hunger Relief, Bread for the World, et al. and encouraging members to participate in the political process).
 - 3. We will initiate partnerships with one congregation or ministry at home and one abroad.

Function Plan

- III. When the plan will be done and who will do it:
 - A. The year 1993.
 - B. Every member, with the pastors, committees and organizations (see below) responsible for overseeing and managing the plan.

WORSHIP AND MUSIC COMMITTEE

- 1.) 75% of our services will be traditional.
- 2.) 25% of our services will be innovative or contemporary.
- 3.) Two or three of our services will involve senior high and/or young adults in college in leading roles.
- 4.) The committee will work with the pastors on theme, special music, art and other creative expressions for seasons of the church year. In addition, other church members will be called on for planning special events.
- 5.) Story tellers, those with abilities in relating the Good News to children, will be enlisted.
- 6.) Parents will be encouraged to "bring their children to the services in God's house" (from parents' vow at child's baptism) and to involve their children in worship roles (e.g. acolytes, worship story, choirs).
- 7.) The committee will complete a hymn booklet for use with the folk service.
- 8.) Holy Communion will be celebrated at least twice a month.
- 9.) The committee will encourage all church members to attend regularly with the goal of increasing attendance by 2%.
- 10.) The committee will support plans to involve more members in the Children, Youth and Adult Choirs.

SOCIAL CONCERNS

- 1.) Continue involvement in Community Meal Program at St. Patrick's six months during the year.
- 2.) Collect food and supplies for the Northside Pantry.
- 3.) Support more generously and energetically the Annual Fall Lutheran World Relief Clothing Drive with our clothing and quilt donations, as well as involve more members in an on-going effort in making and assembling School Kits, Sewing Kits, and Health Kits.
- 4.) Involve the congregation in becoming sponsors and participants in the annual CROP Walk.
- 5.) Arrange for outside speakers and programs for the Adult Forum.
- 6.) Work cooperatively with the Deacons Committee in forming a

- 8.) Sponsor the AAL Program "NOW YOU'RE TALKING! Parents and Kids Talk Straight About Alcohol and Drugs." This is a 90-minute video and workshop presentation led by Darrell Reynolds of AAL and Joe Muniz of the Racine Police Department for the fourth through ninth graders and their parents.
- 9.) Host a Blood Drive in cooperation with the American Red Cross at the church.
- 10.) Continue our Christmas Gift Giving Tree, and donations of mittens, scarves and hats to children in need.
- 11.) Continue to offer prayers, support and encouragement to Rena Stewart and her children as they struggle to rebuild their lives.
- 12.) Encourage and invite members' ideas and ways in which Emmaus congregation can continue to grow in service to others, while serving our Lord.

DEACONS

- 1.) The greeters program will continue this year.
- 2.) Our committee will investigate a "New Growth Program" offered by the ELCA.
- 3.) Our committee will create an updated mission statement for the Deacons Committee.
- 4.) Our Visitors' Committee will continue to call on the home bound members quarterly.
- 5.) Our committee will consider the need for a regular transportation program.
- 6.) Emmaus will have at least three Friendship Sundays this year. Name tags will be available for everyone attending.
- 7.) Our committee will attend the ELCA fall "New Growth Program" should we choose to pursue this program.

CONGREGATIONAL LIFE

The mission of Congregational Life Committee is to promote fellowship through group activities and programs that includes adults of all ages, single or married, members and friends of Emmaus.

- 3.) Install outdoor ground lighting
- 4.) Replace garage door or bottom panel
- 5.) Replace glass on outdoor information sign
- 6.) Repair railing on parsonage's upper level.

Other potential projects dependent on Council's decision regarding the "Evelyn Binder Fund" may include:

- 1.) Remodeling of kitchen and Fellowship Hall
- 2.) Refinishing of pews with purchase of pew cushions

SENIOR CENTER

I. TO PROVIDE FOR CHRISTIAN FELLOWSHIP

- 1. All members will have access to Bible studies and Lenten services to the congregation by the pastors.
- 2. All members may receive Portals of Prayer in large print, upon their annual request.
- 3. All members will have an opportunity to share concerns for each other and their families.

II. TO MOTIVATE FOR A FULLER LIFE

- 1. All members will be offered library books from the Public Library and large print Readers' Digests shared by members.
- 2. All members will be motivated and encouraged to be more active mentally by various programs: travelogs, current issues, local issues, films, VCR, slides and speakers.
- 3. All members will be given access to monthly blood pressure readings.
- 4. All members will be given access to tapes of the sermons and other scriptural materials.

III. TO PROVIDE SERVICES TO OTHERS

- 1. One member and three or four others help to keep the Children's Worship Bags checked and useable.
- 2. Several people are available to assist in preparing mailings as needed by the church secretary.
- 3. Several have answered the call to share clothing to needy organizations.
- 4. All are given an opportunity to donate to the Sunshine Fund sponsored by the Center. This fund pays for cards and postage used to keep in touch with the inactive and/or sick members. We have had to stop sending flowers to people in the hospital; flowers and delivery were too costly.
- 5. The Center needs to do more P.R. to invite more new members.
- 6. Teens of the church and Seniors are being matched with snow-shoveling jobs. This project needs coordinating as to Who Will Do What. We suggest a list of WHO will help and that list be matched with the needy.

WOMEN OF THE E.L.C.A.

- 1.) Begin a quilting group.
- 2.) Get the Mission: Growth Committee functioning.
- 3.) Get more women involved in WELCA.
