1. Opening Devotion: Pastor Mary Janz and Randy Sanders.

3. Pastor's Report

Pastor Mary thanked everyone for their generosity during a year with many challenges. She reported that the 2009 year ended in the black after year-end offerings and donations were totaled.

The English-speaking community may ask "Where are we going?" We need some reimagining; a different vision from our church 50 years ago. Pastor Mary gave thanks for what has happened; we're at a crossroads and we need some energy to deal with what's next.

Jhon Freddy addressed the group and encouraged all to work to communicate. He reminded the group that time, effort and willingness to change is needed.

Chris Lamberton presented a budget for the second half of 2010 for Emmaus. Proposed budget levels would remain the same as the January-June budget approved at the January 31, 2010 congregational meeting, plus dedicated funds from Latino ministry grants to provide a 3% salary increase for Emmaus staff.

A motion (Motion 6.01.10) was made and seconded to approve the budget as submitted. The motion passed on a voice vote.

3. Report of the Call Committee

The Call Committee (Randy Sanders, Chris Lamberton, Art Smith, Antelmo Hernando, Edilberto Martinez, Raul Luis Jr., Rosalinda Ortiz, Karen Alvarez, and Pastor Mary) reported that initial funding for the proposed three-year term call to Jhon Freddy Correa would come from a \$45,000 grant from the Bethania LACE endowment fund. Other support would come from the Greater Milwaukee Synod, area ELCA congregations, and from the national ELCA. The current operating budget will not fund this ministry, aside from providing the church building and parsonage.

Pastor Mary stated our most challenging work would be that of communication, relationship building, and becoming the wider community that God calls us to be. She acknowledged concerns among some long-time members and among the Latino worshiping community.

A motion (Motion 6.02.10) was made and seconded to extend a three-year term call to Jhon Freddy Correa to be Pastor at Emmaus Evangelical Lutheran Church. The motion passed on a voice vote.

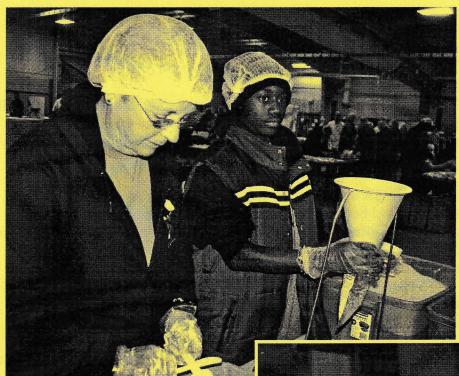

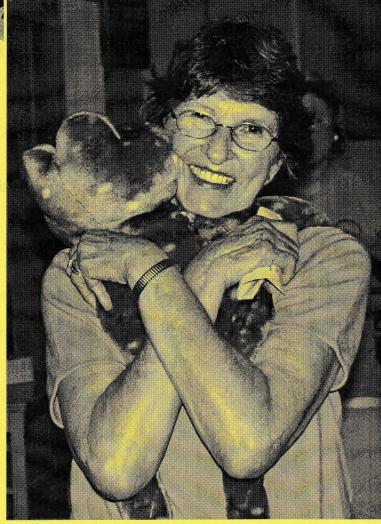
Preface: John 17:20-21 (CEV)

Pastor Jhon Freddy's Report by Rev. Jhon Freddy Correa

The question that has helped me to prepare this report is: what has been done in and through our Latino ministry in 2010?

It is clear, to me, that our worship services, liturgies, prayers, sermons, teaching opportunities, counseling, and programs (projects) in 2010 have always been based upon: building community, strengthening family (values), empowering people, commitment, social responsibility, sharing, compassion, forgiveness, stepping

up-looking ahead, having a prophetic vision and voice.
Therefore, I can say that these are some of the major outcomes.

The mantra for 2010 that has helped us to achieve these goals was "it will be done, because God wants it and God will do it- whether you like it or not."

Tangible things:

- Bring a community together:
 an average of 160 people
 weekly (low week 130- higher
 week 240). Data: average age of
 the Latino ministry 16 years old, maybe
 lower. Family base.
- Racine to live out our Lutheran theology.
- A food Co-op: Living in a city with one of the top two highest unemployment rates in the state of Wisconsin; the Latino/a community is not exempt from that issue. Therefore, with those (10) families who believe in a better tomorrow, we have started a food Co-op. The ministry will receive a percentage of the profit as well.
- School of music: It is not a mystery that many Latino/a children are among those who lack extra-curricular activities. This is due to a lack of

transportation and a lack of financial resources, as well as many other reasons. Some of the instruments that we are teaching here are Emmaus are: Violin, guitar, drums, saxophone and piano. Some of these teachers are volunteers and others are paid. Because it has not been easy to maintain/sustain these programs, and some of these programs might have to be canceled in 2011.



- Children / Mundo Maravilloso ("Marvelous World"): First, we need to acknowledge that we have a HUGE number of children in our church; every Sunday we can have 60 children at church. Mundo Maravilloso is like a Sunday School-done on Saturday — a group of children (ages 6-12) who come on a weekly basis to learn about Bible stories, songs, values, community, and church life; and, of course, to have fun too! We have had 40+ children in this group during this year. Also, there is the communion instruction that is offered for those who have not yet received communion.
- Sunday meals: This is more than a meal on Sunday. This has been a time and a place created by families for

families to sit down and share some time together. It is a time where not only the entire family eats together but can socialize with others and find ways of how to help each other out. An average of 90 people is fed every Sunday (low Sunday 70- & high Sunday 140 people). This program is subsidized by the same families. They cook, and give a free will offering.

- Improving the choir. This has consumed a lot of my time and energy. To be involved in the choir-music without any musical knowledge has been a very vulnerable place for me to be. I have had to be involved with the choir because there have not been funds to pay either a choir director or an accompanist player. And in order to have direction and quality in a group, there needs to be some one leading it. Thanks to the grace of God the choir is growing in number and in quality.
- Leadership: Thank God there are so many loving, caring and compassionate people who have decided to follow Jesus (what ever that means for each person) and are involve in many of the activities that we do in our community Emmaus and Racine. Of course, there has been a lot of leadership training done and there is still so much that will need to be done in 2011.
- Pan del cielo ("Manna from Heaven"): It is a food pantry program that seeks to serve some of the Latino/s families that are walking with us; teaching us their values and faith. So, we meet every Tuesday at Redeemer Lutheran Church - Racine (our great sponsor of this program). The director of this program is Pastor Chuck Ruehle. We serve 14-18 families weekly. This program is maintained mainly by Lutheran Church of the Redeemer and the Latino ministry at Emmaus. The idea of this program is: if families save

- some money weekly, it will relieve some stress and provide more time for family-quality-time activities.
- Energy, life and Youth: Young adults and high school-teens. Thank God we have an average of 25 youth and young adults participating in our youth programs. Topics that these groups deal with (NOT only talk about) are: Drugs (Marijuana), depression (hurting their bodies), alcohol, lack of vision towards the future, among others.

These are some of the main areas of work among the Latino Ministry.

I believe that one of the pressing issues that are part of Emmaus' life (Anglo & Latino ministries) either daily, weekly, or monthly is Culture: e.g.: taste of decorations, colors, expression of heritage in our religion and lives of faith (is there only ONE way?). Another key issue for me that the leadership at Emmaus must deal with is sustainability of the ministry. Who will fund this ministry? How do we fund the Latino ministry?

Although, I feel tired (it is a lot of work), I also feel sad: what saddens me is the of bad/negative energy among a number of the people of God. Again, there are great people too—and perhaps you are one of them. As a result, I don not have clarity about the future; I am very thankful to God and you who are part of this great experience. There are so many GREAT things that God is doing. I do not want to end on a note that negates those great things that are happening. At the same time, I believe it is imperative to be honest and transparent, being truth-tellers as we move toward the future.

Gracias God and you! for giving me the opportunity to grow together.

How do we share what Emmaus has to offer?

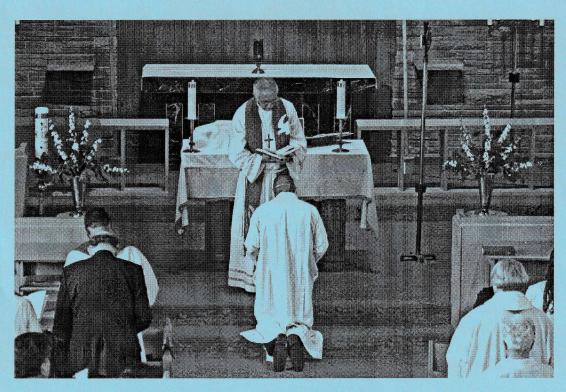
What do we need to grow? What are we looking for?

Member Care Report by Cathy Meyer

Member Care at Emmaus involves many people and many projects. Our goal is to connect with Emmaus members and others who may appreciate receiving the comfort of God's love through acts of kindness. Thanks go to all of you who are involved in this ministry.

Visitation is our direct contact with our members in need who have experienced a loss or sickness, or are homebound or living in assisted care facilities. Birthday cards are also sent to Emmaus seniors, and get well and thinking of you cards to those who are ill. The prayer chain is received by many members in order to include in their prayers those in need of healing or special

thoughts. The KIPI (Knit One, Purl One) group continues to share their knitted or crocheted prayer shawls and baptismal shawls with members. Blood pressure checks and health resources are provided by our Parish Nurse, Carol Eschmann.

Two new ways of providing member care have been added in 2010.

Transportation to church services is provided to anyone who is not comfortable driving in winter conditions. Also, meals have been organized and delivered to those who are temporarily unable to prepare food for their families.

We are always looking for new people to help with any of the member care

Parish Education Report by Nancy Smith

Emmaus' involvement with kids continues to be in the forefront as one of our missions to the community. Reaching out to offer a safe haven where kids come and experience hope through many different activities encompasses three different programs. Thank you for your involvement. Thank you for caring and sharing. You are

the "seeds of hope" that are being planted throughout the entire year:

Neighborhood Camp

Neighborhood Camp completed its tenth year of operation. For five weeks more than 60 kids came through the doors of the church to play and learn through the vehicles of music, games, art, computers, reading, science, hands-on projects, and field trips. The success of camp does not rely only on paid staff. Our members were actively involved in many aspects of the camp program. The number of meals (breakfast and lunch) prepared and served each day is mind-boggling. The kids were taught how to sew pillowcases and build birdhouses as

and science enrichment. The use of individual workbooks is encouraging the kids to work on their math, reading and vocabulary skills. Paid staff is supported by high school and adult volunteers whom offer one-on-one tutoring to students. EASY is encouraging the kids to raise their bar for learning.

The opportunity for keyboarding lessons was introduced in September. Eighteen students participated in the first session of half hour lessons on Monday evenings. They concluded their session by playing at the joint Christmas Pageant worship.

Wednesday Camp (Bible Study)

Each week from 5:00 -6:00 p.m., Fellowship Hall is abuzz with conversation and laughter as the kids along with adults (65-70 each week) enjoy a meal which is served by the Carol Yust family and friends. From 6:00 - 7:00 p.m. the kids divide into age-appropriate groups to learn stories about God and Jesus and how they work in our lives. The adults also meet for Bible Study. Areas of study this past year: the Visit of the Magi, the Baptism of Jesus, the Parables of Jesus, Women of the

Resurrection. and Joseph the Dreamer, and the Book of Ruth.

During Holy Week, the kids reenacted the Prayer Walk of the Passion. The kids dressed in costume and acted out the emotional days of Holy Week; the entrance into Jerusalem, the Upper Room, the agony of Christ in the Garden of Gethsemane, the trial, and the crucifixion. The evening culminated by a walk downstairs, along a candlelit hallway to enter a darkened tomb



well as design and create bottle cap art flowers and bugs. Thanks to you who came to help with food and to sew and to create the various wood working projects.

EASY - Emmaus After School for Youth

EASY meets on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday from 2:30-5:30. Enrollment has grown from sixteen to twenty-eight students. They are an enthusiastic and diverse group who really dig into the projects at hand whether it is homework help, educational games, computer time, art,

in which young and old spent some quiet time.

This fall, a class was begun for the middle school kids. That has been successful as they converse about issues they face in daily living and relating their life experiences to the Bible. An extracurricular activity was to gather on a Saturday for bowling. Several activities to highlight this fall: a trip to State Fair Park with two busloads of adults and kids. We spent 1½ hours packing food for the victims of flooding in Pakistan. The group packed 220,000 bags of a special blend of dried ingredients that will create a total of 660,000 meals.

Intergenerational event: The beginning of December brought together many folks who brought their drills to help create a bottle cap art nativity scene. Many hands and a lot of drilling kept all very busy. This nativity has adorned the church grounds for the Christmas season.

Children's Program: Star of Wonder was presented at a joint worship in December. The congregation was overflowing as 40 kids from preschool through middle school presented this upbeat musical about a constellation of six stars as they anxiously watch the biggest announcement unfold – the birth of Jesus.

The star of the show was indeed alive and kicking. Mateo had his first starring role as the newborn King.

Reaching Out to Our Neighbors Wadewitz Elementary School

Emmaus has been reaching out to Wadewitz for 10 years. Those who mentored students last year are continuing their relationship with the same kids. Some of those children have moved and the mentors have followed them to their respective schools or are working with their students at Emmaus.

Our K1P1 [Knit One, Purl One] group that meets weekly on Monday morning has created and gifted many sets of hats, mittens and scarves to the school. Each fall school supplies are collected and donated to the kids.

Emmaus Neighborhood Camp and EASY kids

Just before the start of school we invited kids who have a relationship with Emmaus to come for school supplies. More than 55 kids received a pack back that was filled with the items needed to begin the school year.

Social Concerns Report by Diane Melander

Reaching out to those in need is a vital ministry of Emmaus. Our Social Concerns Ministry does many things to achieve that goal thanks to the many generous donations of time, money and gifts from many members. Thank you all so much for your prayers, your gifts and your time. Because of your gifts, we've been able to help many through our projects.

Mt. Meru coffee is the delicious fair trade coffee we serve at church and sell during coffee hour. This past year we sold eleven (11) four-pound bags of coffee and ninety (90) twelve-ounce bags of coffee, which includes four Christmas gift bags. The churches from our synod, Greater Milwaukee, sell this coffee to directly benefit the Mt. Meru community in Tanzania. There is no middleman. The dollars from our sales, and the sales of all the churches in the project, are sent to the farmers who grow the coffee. Another portion of that money is used to purchase equipment for the farmers as well as help the farmers to grow more disease resistant

plants. Some of it is also used to improve the lives of the people of the Mt. Meru area.

The Emmaus Scrip Program is extremely successful. Scrip makes a wonderful gift for anyone; it's always the right size and color. It's convenient to

purchase scrip and use it for your own shopping trips. Please see Cathy Meyer's report for the details of our Scrip Program.

donated, packed and distributed many food baskets beginning in time for Thanksgiving and continuing through Christmas. Your generous food gifts helped to make a better holiday for many. Pastor Mary and Nancy both walked for the CROP Hunger walk in the fall. A number of members pledged money to support their walk. The CROP Hunger walk gives half of the money they raise to the food pantries in Racine. The other half of the money is used to stop hunger in the world. The Giving Tree program is one more opportunity to help others. This year, members of our congregation purchased gifts for the EASY children and one large family. Every other month, Emmaus members cook and bake for the Community Meal Program, as well as transport the food to St. Patrick's Church and help serve it. Thank you to all who donate in so many ways to help these programs.

The Knit One Purl One group continues to knit scarves, mittens, baptismal shawls, prayer shawls and caps for Servicemen and women. The baptismal shawls are given to babies at their baptism. Prayer shawls are given to comfort those in



need and the hats, scarves and mittens are donated to the children in the EASY (after school program). If you know of someone who could use comfort with a prayer shawl, speak to one of the pastors or one of the Knit One Purl One members.

Many of you have given unselfishly of your time and gifts to help us serve many children and families in these programs. Thank you for your dedication and love. Stewardship Report by Judy Yorgan

In 2010, there were 49 pledges totaling \$128,405 for an average of \$2,620.51 per pledge. Receipts totaled \$208,902 and pledges received (\$111,779) accounted for 56% of total receipts. People who pledge actually gave an average of \$43.86 per week. During 2010, the average weekly attendance was 301 which includes the Wednesday and Saturday evening and Sunday noon services.

Average giving per attendee per week including pledges was \$13.35.

As of January 21, 2011, 53 pledges totaling \$124,322 or \$2,374.46 per pledge have been recorded. The average pledge for 2011 is about \$46 less than the average for 2010.

- Sound system upgrades. We continue to upgrade our sound system by adding more wireless microphones. The improvement in sound was evident during the children's Christmas Pageant.

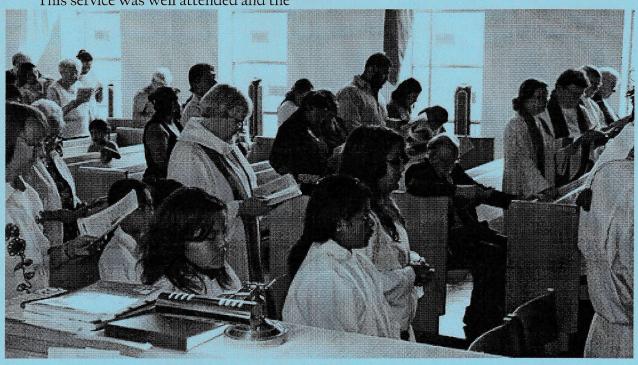

Youth Ministry Report by Sandy Strini

The Youth Group started meeting in February on Wednesday evenings with supper at 5:30-6:00, activity time from 6:00-7:00 and assisting with the worship service from 7:00-7:30 p.m. Participation in terms of numbers were 1 or 2 youth. Participation in terms of spirit and heart was priceless. Fundraising amounting to \$265.00 was raised for the ELCA Relief fund for Haiti and also for HALO in Racine by selling

Community coupon books for the Boston Store. The Youth Group's participation in the Boston Store Coupon Sale also netted another \$310.00 as a result in a "profit sharing" activity by selling books at the door one of the evenings. The check in the amount of \$310.00 was made out by the Boston Store to the ELCA Relief Fund.

A 30-hour famine lock-in was held March 19-20 at Lutheran Church of the Redeemer. Emmaus had 14 youth participate. All funds raised from this lockin were designated to a hunger cause. There were a total of 24 youth involved in the 30-Hour Famine lock-in. Sponsorship for fasting resulted in a combined effort of the youth from Redeemer and Emmaus with \$941.00 being raised for the project.

The Youth Group became the "Green Teens" for the summer. They planned to weed, plant, weed, harvest, and weed the Garden of Eden. The project began with the teens attempting to turn over the soil and eliminate the prolific weeds that had overgrown the space due to the inactivity of that piece of soil. The weeds were winning but were finally defeated with the hope of having a harvest of "alphabet" veggies (acorn squash to zucchini squash) which could be incorporated into the summer camp meals. Gardening occurred on Wednesday afternoons from 3:00 - 4:30 beginning June 16. Starting July 12 the "Green Teens gardened from 9-11 a.m. on Mondays. Children from camp helped do some of the planting and eating of fresh veggies.

Prior to the beginning of school a "Back to School" supply event occurred. The congregation responded tremendously with their generosity of bringing in and donating money for all of the required school supplies. Several of the youth helped shop for and organize the school supplies which were handed out to more than 60 children.

In the fall Brenda Trumbauer and Richard Benson began meeting with

middle school youth on Wednesday evenings and are developing an active youth "tween" group.

Another fundraising opportunity with the Boston Store Community Day coupon books in November helped the Wednesday night camp children and youth to pay for a bus and attend a food packing event at the Milwaukee Fair Grounds.

Northside Food Pantry November 1, 2009 – November 31, 2010

The Northside Food Pantry served 1,351 households this year. A total number of 4,087 people — 2,432 adults and 1655 children — were served. The Pantry averages 17 to 20 families per Pantry day. An increase in the number of members in individual families has been noted this year with some families ranging from 8 to 14 in one household. In the month of November 2010, the Pantry served 350 people. This requires the continued support of member congregations to keep our shelves stocked.

The congregation of Emmaus Lutheran donated 1514 pounds of food. The Pantry also received \$185.54 in monetary donations. Some additional cash donations were made but were used to purchase needed items and then recorded as food donations in the pounds noted above.

Our total amount of money received from other churches, organizations, and individuals was \$11,904.43. Roundy's again donated \$500 and 2872 pounds of food in 2010. The Pantry spent \$12,013.63.

UPDATE ON LATINO FUNDING AT EMMAUS - February 1, 2011

Since the time of Pastor Jhon Freddy Correa's call to Emmaus last July, conversations have taken place with leaders from the Greater Milwaukee Synod and the ELCA churchwide office in Chicago regarding the support of the Latino ministry at Emmaus. Meanwhile, the ministry has been funded through special gifts from the Bethania LACE fund, memorials, gifts from Atonement, Redeemeer, Mt. Pleasant, Holy Cross (Menominee Falls), and Lord of Life Lutheran Church (Kenosha). Additional gifts have come from the synod assembly special offering, Outreach for Hope, offerings of the Latino community, and other designated giving.

Separate financial records have been maintained, and there are three checking accounts connected with Latino Ministry: General Ministry fund, payroll fund and pastor's discretionary fund. Gifts to Latino Ministry have been deposited in one of these three checking accounts, depending upon the designation of the monies. Checks from the payroll fund are cut to Emmaus to cover all salary and benefit costs of Pastor Jhon Freddy and of Liliana (who serves as the bilingual administrative assistant for the ministry). The Latino general fund has made benevolence gifts to the Greater Milwaukee Synod totaling \$683.53. In addition, one month's mortgage payment of \$993 was made to Emmaus, \$500 in janitorial time is covered monthly, \$1,000 was given to Emmaus general fund from proceeds of the summer festival, and money has been contributed to cover some of the office expenses relating to the copy machine. Parsonage housing and utilities for Pastor Jhon Freddy and his family are provided by Emmaus.

At a January meeting in Chicago, Pastors Jhon Freddy and Mary met with Ruben Duran and Sandy Chrostowski regarding ELCA support of the Latino ministry at Emmaus. At that meeting it was decided that the ELCA will provide \$36,000 annual support of the ministry (decreasing to \$30,000 in 2012), with the support of the "new start" to begin Feb. 1, 2011, provided that:

- The ELCA is considered a primary supporter of Mission Developer, Jhon Freddy, also serving as his official sponsor for visa purposes
- Separate records and accounting are maintained for the Latino Ministry and the General Account of Emmaus Lutheran Church
- The Latino worshipping community receives education and training in both stewardship and leadership, growing their support annually to be part of a ministry that is sustainable in the long run. The national body of the ELCA will monitor the annual growth in this area, acknowledging that while this is a process that takes time, the sense of ownership must begin now
- The voices of both the English speaking community and the Latino community be heard during the Mission Exploration process, determining whether the forward direction should be "one church" or "two churches," and how that will best be reflected

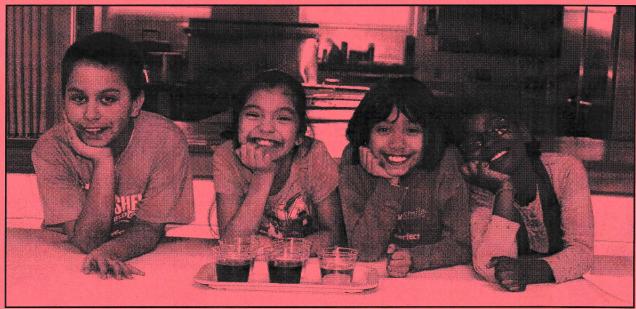
