- 2. Minutes of the Congregation Meeting held June 27, 2010 were approved as submitted (Motion 2:01.11)

3. Pastors' Reports

Mary expressed thanks to all those (named and unnamed in the annual report) who pray and spread light around Racine and beyond. She reminded the group that Jesus never said it would be easy, and that we will make it work with God leading us. Pastor Mary also said it is a pleasure to be our pastor.

Jhon Freddy thanked the congregation for our prayers, faithfulness, and support. He recognizes that it has not been easy for us to step out of our comfort zone and that we can all learn from each other.

4. President's Report

Chris thanked everyone for supporting him as interim council president.

5. Recognition of 2010 Church Council

Randy Sanders, Michele Kreimer, Marty Aiken, Judy Yorgan, Sandy Strini, and Celia Bagley are all stepping down from leadership on the council. Carolyn Wooster is stepping aside as treasurer, but will continue to serve on council in the role of Stewardship chair.

6. Election of 2011 Church Council

(Motion 2:02:11) A motion to accept the candidates for election to the council passed (Motion 2.03.11).

7. Actual 2010 Budget

Discussion included an explanation of the current deficit of approximately 20K and the steps taken to pay off the deficit. Emmaus has not paid \$6000 benevolence pledged to synod,

and has borrowed internally from designated funds. A motion to accept the actual budget passed (Motion **2.04.11**).

8. Proposed 2011 Budget

A motion to accept the proposed budget for six months was seconded. During discussion, Art Smith noted the difficulty of managing a deficit budget. He suggested that each member of the congregation contribute more to cover the deficit. Caren Lamberton worried that this action may cause current members to leave Emmaus. Other ideas were mentioned such as holding a fund raiser and selling the lots on Summit Avenue. Gregg Albright pointed out that the suggestions were short-term answers and that Emmaus needs new members to sustain itself long-term. Ron Jensen asked about a merger with another church. Carolyn Wooster encouraged us to do something different to draw new people to our church. Pastor Mary suggested that the Mexican Fiesta be revived and revamped as an annual fund raiser for the church as a whole and for the two ministries.

Art proposed an amendment to add \$9L to the general offering line item to reach a balanced 2011 budget. Gregg asked if the secretary position could be made part-time; Mary confirmed that it is already part-time and reminded us that the MET process will look at all staff positions. The proposal to amend the proposed budget passed (2.05.11). Jeff McCray suggested that the fellowship time which follows each Sunday service be used to brainstorm fund raising ideas. Brenda will field all ideas (6175@earthlink.net)

8. Unfinished Business

The MET members were introduced: Art Smith, Delia Orozco, Carolyn Wooster, Chris Lamberton, Liliana Moncada, Melissa Lemke, Cathy Knuteson, Dennis Eschmann. Carol Eschmann will serve on the city-wide team. Some members from Jhon Freddy's Latino congregation will also join the MET process, which will be under the direction of Chuck Brummond, Assistant to the Bishop.

9. New Business

Pastor Mary answered a question regarding notification of donors to designated funds in the event that money is borrowed from that fund for another purpose. If the loan is short-term, the donor is not notified.

10. Closing

A motion was passed to close the semi-annual meeting of the congregation. (Motion 2:07.11)

Emmaus Lutheran Church Congregational Meeting Minutes

Date: June 12, 2011 Time: 10:45 a.m. Emmaus Lutheran Church Sunset Room Place:

- 1. **Opening Devotion**: Pastor Mary Janz
- 2. The minutes of the Congregational Meeting held February 6, 2011 were approved as submitted (Motion 06.01.11).
- 3. Pastors' Reports: Mary expressed a desire to reduce her work status to three-quarter time because although she is not ready to retire, she does wish for more personal time. She tentatively plans to take off the 1st week of each month. Mary will schedule around meetings, etc. She will schedule a guest preacher 1/month and Jhon Freddy will be available for pastoral care.

Ihon Freddy pledged to "jump in 100% only if the Emmaus congregation commits to more than just getting together on Sundays and being nice". Jhon Freddy states that he is here to create change and impact the neighborhood and community.

A motion was made and seconded to allow Mary to go to ¥ time status. Discussion revealed that Emmaus has been underpaying Mary the amount required by Synod guidelines. After calculating ¥ of the correct salary for her experience, Emmaus will save \$820 per month. The motion passed (Motion 06.02.11).

4. Proposed Budget July-December 2011: President Chris Lamberton thanked treasurer Art Smith for providing the concise and readable budget. Art regrettably informed the congregation that "the bottom line is not as good as the format". He projects a deficit between income and expenses of \$25,821 by December. Art also reported that the church has borrowed \$8,900 from designated funds which need to be repaid. Therefore the total deficit will be \$34,721 in December.

Chris challenged us all to go out and let others know about us. Go find some members! A motion to accept the proposed budget as written was made and seconded. The following questions were raised during discussion.

Question: Can money that was initially gifted/designated for a certain purpose be used for another purpose? Answer: Money can be used for another purpose if the original designee reassigns the money.

Question: Are there any fundraisers being planned? Answers: (1) Jhon Freddy is hoping to make our church known to the community via a Health Fair/Street Soccer event to be held on church grounds. He has the backing of Mayor Dickert who has pledged some of the "Let's Move" federal grant money for this purpose. Since the event's profits will be generated by the Latino congregation, they will determine how the money will be spent. (Last year's festival raised \$4000 profit and \$1000 was shared with the Anglos.)

(2) There is an opportunity for teams of people to work the concession stand at several 2012 Brewers' games. We would get a cut of the proceeds.

(3) Bring-a-friend-to-Church-Day (not an immediate fundraiser but may generate more membership and therefore more monetary pledges).

Question: At what point do we admit that more giving and more members are longterm goals and that we cannot continue to operate our church at a \$25K deficit in the shortterm? No definitive answer.

Question: Can we rent our building? Answer: The building space is currently being used almost to capacity and grant money includes "rent" for activities such as EASY and Neighborhood Camp.

Question: What about combining churches with others in the same position? Answer: The ELCA Synod does not make decisions about combining churches as is the case with the Catholic Archdiocese. RAMS is studying the Lutheran ministry in all of Racine. Four churches currently have half-time pastors. The Bishop recently paid Pastor Mary a visit and stated he doesn't want Emmaus to fail. He may be looking for money to support our ministries.

Question: Do the Latinos pay any rent on a regular basis? Answer: "Rent" on a regular basis is not paid, but financial help is made periodically as well as gifts of labor and items such as a freezer, etc.

Question: Can we hold more outdoor services during the summer to call attention to ourselves? These services could be low-production events with a simple bring-your-ownchair theme. No definite answer.

Question: Can we go door-to-door as Deacons of Emmaus to drum up members? Answer: Yes but we need volunteers to coordinate, make brochures, and distribute.

Question: Will Mexican Fiesta be revived as suggested at suggested at the last Congregational meeting? Answer: We do not have the leadership to plan it.

Question: What happened to the idea boards generated during fellowship time? Answer: They are being studied as part of the MET process.

A vote was taken on the proposed July-December 2011 budget. The budget was approved by a majority of "ayes" with a few "nays" (Motion **06.03.11**).

- 5. Old Business: One-on-One interviews are still being conducted and surveys are being analyzed by the Mission Exploration Team.
- 6. New Business: Gregg Albright made a motion to consider and explore selling some of our assets, specifically our field property and/or the organ. The motion was seconded and approved (Motion 06.04.11).
- Closing: A motion to end the meeting was made at 12:10 p.m. The motion passed (Motion 06.05.11). The meeting ended with The Lord's Prayer and a proclamation by Pastor Mary to "Go in peace...and bring a friend!"

Covenant

Congregations of the Racine Mission Cluster of the ELCA

Preface: John 17:20-21 (CEV)

"I am not praying just for these followers. I am also praying for everyone else who will have faith because of what my followers will say about me. I want all of them to be one with each other, just as I am one with you and you are one with me. I also want them to be one with us. Then the people of this world will believe that you sent me..."

As member congregations of the ELCA in the greater Racine community we are called to be agents of grace in our community and beyond. We celebrate, recognize and value each congregation's history, ministry and gifts. We acknowledge a deep and profound connection to each other. We promise to seek to be the body of Christ in this place and time. In witness to our Lord Jesus Christ, we unite together in this ministry covenant . . .

1. To focus our corporate lives on the mission of Jesus Christ and to take whatever steps necessary to ensure the flowering of grace in our community and world.

2. To reach out in our respective communities to invite and welcome our neighbors to join with us in worship, mission and ministry.

3. To intentionally seek justice for all people.

4. To stand against racism and all forms of oppression.

5. To serve all those in need especially the unemployed, the aging, the hungry, the homeless, and the abused.

6. To abandon competition among congregations and share the gifts and blessings God bestows on us.

7. To share, as the Body of Christ, programs, ministries and resources to carry out our congregational responsibilities and mission.

8. To affirm our ecumenical and interfaith connection and commitments.

9. To develop common strategies for the future so we may be more effective in our witness and service.

Partnership Covenant

By this agreement the congregations of Atonement, Emmaus, Our Savior's, and Saint Andrew bind ourselves together in a mission partnership of substance. We take as our model for corporate life the Trinity. God is three persons, absolutely unique and as individual as any three persons. Yet, they are so closely bound that they cannot be spoken of as three entities, but one entity, one being. They are bound by a deep love for each other and a common mission.

Our congregations are bound by that same love (agape) which is profoundly committed to the well-being of the other partners as well as a common commitment to seeking God's will and partnering in God's mission.

God has used each of our congregations in significant ways for more than a century. Each of our congregations has its own history, culture and proud identity. We, in this agreement, acknowledge the importance of each individual congregation, but we also believe that there are a number of compelling reasons which draw us to this new way of being. First, we believe this partnership is a result of the movement of the Holy Spirit in our midst. This truth, by itself, is compelling enough to cause this partnership to be brought into existence. Second we believe that God's mission finds substantial commonality among us. Third, we believe that a careful and honest assessment of our assets, liabilities and existing mission may lead to new and creative use of our assets to serve that mission and diminish those liabilities. In other words our common strengths and resources might be brought to bear upon God's mission in our midst, regardless of parochial concerns and that the liabilities of one place might be overcome by the common strength of the partnership. We are stronger together than apart. Finally, we believe that such a partnership has the potential to create a new mission-oriented, joyful, positive energy for our congregations.

We see those common missions to be the following:

- 1. Worship: together we provide worship in a variety of times, locations, styles (and thanks to Emmaus) languages. Over time we may consolidate similar worship types and create new forms and styles to meet the needs of the 21st century.
- 2. Each congregation has significant food ministries. Because we understand these ministries to be so significant, we believe that some of our initial partnership work will focus upon food ministries.
- 3. While we will continue to attract, welcome and learn together to do excellent ministry with seniors, we believe that outreach to children and youth is a part of every healthy congregation. We believe that our congregations could provide a significant youth ministry together that might elude us individually.
- 4. As we move farther into this new era of mission oriented church, it becomes very clear that we are a priesthood of all believers. In order to be the most effective priesthood we can be, we need to be strong disciples of Jesus. Therefore, a major part of the mission that we undertake together must be discipleship training to deepen our relationship with God and to witness to the transforming love of God by word and action in our daily lives.

- 5. A part of the church's mission has always been to seek justice for the poor. We are increasingly challenged to do that while supporting multi-location ministry by member giving. Therefore, we perceive the need for entrepreneurial mission which may provide resources for new and continuing mission while at the same time providing opportunity for members and others who are in need to gain financial independence and strength.
- 6. Our congregations are involved in a variety of world missions which can be shared more broadly with each partner congregation.
- 7. The church has always been concerned with the health of individuals and communities. Our mission must always include healing and the creation of wholeness. Our common goal will be to support, create and strengthen professional ministries in our midst. These ministries include pastoral care, health ministries, and legal services.
- 8. The church has always understood that we have an obligation to care for God's world. Individually our congregations have begun journeys in recent years to become better stewards of God's creation. We will continue in this ministry by careful use of resources, the re-creation of facilities to be more energy efficient, and the creation of facilities which have a small energy footprint and which may even produce energy.
- 9. Our separate geographic locations emphasize the fact that we share a common parish which encompasses the greater Racine metropolitan area. If our parish includes everyone in the area, our concern must be for their long-term health and wholeness. Our preference must be for the poor, and thus we seek social justice for everyone in our parish and beyond. We must understand this commitment to be not only charity but also addressing the causes of injustice and suffering.

We embrace the following core beliefs:

- 1. We exist for mission God's mission. That's the bottom line. We honor the past, we embrace the goodness of each partner congregation, but in the end our decisions must be dictated by mission. We are not committed to survival, but to fulfilling God's dreams.
- 2. There is no location that is absolutely sacred. This partnership demands that everything be put on the table as God's resource for the sake of God's mission. We must battle the idolatry of buildings. At the same time we understand the value of each congregation's mission and the importance of place.
- 3. Our congregations must become examples of the appropriate use of resources so that God's earth is not damaged, but replenished.
- 4. We believe that there is no such thing as race, but rather the human family joined by Christ's love, and as a partnership we will struggle with the sin and evil of racism wherever we find it, including within ourselves.

In order to focus our congregations on our partnership goals and core beliefs, we will by this document establish a Mission Council. The purposes of this group will be to assess missional needs continually (what in our world is causing God pain?); to recommend missional solutions which are not necessarily congregationally bound, but which use the resources given by God to the whole partnership; to create an ongoing evaluation of resources available for mission; and to have the authority to instigate the use of those resources, while understanding the distinct congregational polity to which each congregation is currently constitutionally bound.

Each congregation council will appoint two lay persons and one pastor to be a part of the Mission Council.

By this document, we authorize the Mission Council (if it so determines) to create a part-time, paid position which could be filled by either a lay person or member of the clergy, whose task it will be to help organize our congregations for distinct partnership ministries.

The Mission Council will set the parameters of the leader position at its earliest convenience.

We commit to complete the asset mapping process and create the Mission Council by April 1, 2012.

As soon as we receive congregational councils' approval of this document, we will continue throughout 2012 as an experiment in communal partnership. Should the Mission Council and the congregational councils deem the experiment a success, individual congregations will approve this partnership at Annual Meetings in 2013. This covenant will commit congregations to two years of profound partnership following the ratification of the covenant.

The covenant is meant to be a living document. It may be modified by action of the Mission Council and ratification by a majority of the partnership congregations.

Pastor Mary's Report by Rev. Mary L. Janz

I think most will agree that 2011 was a transitional/pivotal year for Emmaus. It sometimes felt tenuous and shaky, particularly in the middle of the year. Becky Smurawa, our choir director, left to pursue Master's studies in the Netherlands. Claranna Vytlacil retired and stepped down from her teaching position as an AIM. I reduced my time to three-quarter time to give me some room and space for personal time, travel and projects. Emmaus began a mission exploration process, which didn't take off with the momentum we had anticipated. We also found ourselves in the middle of an extreme financial crisis. Many feared that all or some of what was happening was the sign of a dying church.

However, in the midst of what was causing anxiety to many, there was a renewed commitment to ministry and mission by a number of faith-filled, dedicated people. Latinos and members of our English speaking community began to build relationships and get to know one another's stories as they joined together in the English speaking circles initiated by Kathy Christensen, Carol Eschmann and Diane Melander. Many Latinos worked hard to contribute to what has also become their church, offering their prayers, work and money to assure that the ministry of Emmaus would continue. Brenda Trumbauer stepped in to offer more of her time in arranging for special music and giving direction to the choir so that they could continue singing once a month at Sunday worship.

Diakonia student and member of Atonement, Diane Thygeson, stepped in to become a strong colleague of Nancy Smith in the EASY after school program. The number of students served in that program significantly increased (nearly 40 participants), as did the number of

volunteers. More mentors now come to the church weekly to work with the children and to build healthy relationships with them. Grandchildren of two of our members, Kate Syslack (Bev Hansen's granddaughter) and David Lopez (Carolyn Wooster's grandson), are now on the staff of EASY, as are two Horlick students, Andrea Macias and Jose Zuniga. Jenn Haman, Ryan Lamberton, Anthony Medina and Abby Maranger are among the other young people from Emmaus who are serving as role models for those who are younger than they. Brenda Trumbauer and Rich Benson have stepped to the fore to lead the ever-evolving middle school group on Wednesday evenings. The ambitious and comprehensive after school and Wednesday night programming would not be what it is without the selfless contributions of three generations of volunteers and paid staff. Carol Yust, Karen Reikena, Kim and Dale Howser and their families and friends, along with Milt Christensen, see to it week after week that a hot meal is served every Wednesday night and that the kitchen is functioning smoothly. It truly is a team effort!

Knitters and sewers, home visitors and hospitality hosts, together with worship planners, altar care volunteers and leaders, have all generously shared their gifts and time and talents for the sake of mission and ministry at Emmaus. A special thank you goes to Pat Jensen and friends as they provide a delicious hot meal, complete with table decorations and special touches, for the monthly gathering of the Keenagers. We also acknowledge Harold Miller for his 60 years of service as an usher at Emmaus. Many members, including a number of homebound foiks, are part of the prayer ministry of Emmaus, praying daily for those with special needs who are named on the prayer chain.

You know what? When the Holy Spirit is in the mix, leading and guiding, and when folks are passionate and caring and roll up their sleeves to get things done for the sake of mission, there is no way that the church becomes a dying church! That is something we were reminded of again shortly after the financial crisis of Emmaus was named and communicated to Emmaus members and to the other ELCA congregations of Racine. The council and the MET (Mission Exploration Team), headed by Kathy Christensen and Melissa Lemke, turned their focus from Emmaus alone to the broader RAMS process (Racine Area Mission Strategy) of the ELCA congregations. It was through the RAMS process that the passion for mission was articulated clearly by Kathy, Melissa and other Emmaus leaders. It was also through that process that three other congregations (Atonement, Our Savior's and St. Andrew) were identified as expressing similar energy, passion for, and interest in mission. Collaborative meetings and conversations led to a preliminary vision of what a profound partnership among the four congregations might look like, a partnership driven by mission rather than a survival mentality.

At the same time mission was being articulated, there was a concerted effort by the leadership of Emmaus to narrow our deficit gap and to set a goal of presenting a balanced budget for 2012. Both have been accomplished. We ended the year in the black, fulfilling all our financial commitments and repaying what we had borrowed internally.

I would be remiss if I did not express my gratitude to Pastor Jhon Freddy, Liliana Moncada, Nancy Smith, Brenda Trumbauer and Paul Berge. We support one another, encourage one another, challenge one another—and put up with one another's work styles and idiosyncrasies. Each person brings unique gifts and talents for ministry, and their dedication and hard work have helped me end the year with energy and hope. I want to thank them for allowing me to "think out loud" and for listening to both my dreams and concerns. I am also very grateful to all the members of the church council who showed leadership during the financial crisis and the RAMS process. Support from synod staff has also been an asset during this past year. And, a thank you goes out to each and every one who has prayed for me and for the ministry and mission of Emmaus. There is power in your prayers!

My gratitude extends to the Latino community which models for us faithfulness, dedication, perseverance, generosity and hospitality in so many ways. It is my hope that our two communities make even greater strides in learning how to communicate and share our stories with one another. It is also my hope that we all face the evil of racism, classism and all that divides us. It is when we truly are able to laugh, cry and pray together that we are bonded together as one family...all children of the same God, all sisters and brothers in Christ, all disciples joined together in love and striving for justice. Living into that dream can be a reality only when we pray for the guidance of the Holy Spirit and when we live into the two great commandments as mandated by Jesus: Love God and love neighbor. We are not alone. God promises to walk with us in this journey. Living in the promise of our Baptism, we can be bold and filled with hope as we move into a future, a future that is filled both with change and with new life.

I thank God and all of you for giving me the privilege of walking together as people of the promise.

EASY (Emmaus After School for Youth)


Like a revolving door – change happens

- some continue to move within the circle and some move on to other activities. For EASY changes have occurred in leadership and the population of kids. EASY continues to be a beacon in our community.

Claranna Vytlacil, who served an important role in leading EASY and Wednesday Night, decided to move on to spend more time with family. In September student enrollment went

from the mid twenties to almost 40. There is now a larger middle school group. Diane Thygeson excitedly jumped on board and Katie Syslack, a trained teacher without a position, also joined the staff. Andrea Macias and Jose Zuniga continue in their role as teen staff with David Lopez joining the EASY program in December.

This school year brought many changes to the EASY program. More enrichment opportunities are available. Monday, it's a hands-on science project. Tuesday is math day. Wednesday involves vocabulary and language skills. Thursday is a more relaxed



Ancient Egypt. Fifteen teens, each of whom asked ahead of time if they could help with camp, were engaged as volunteers throughout the summer in a special project. They designed and painted rain barrels that were auctioned afternoon. The kids are engaged in a variety of activities; some weeks they may play chess or pique their creative skills with art or Lego robotics.

The biggest change has brought the mentoring program to the Emmaus site. For years volunteers went to Wadewtiz to offer their help to students. Bringing the mentoring program to Emmaus has been a blessing. More than twenty persons from high school to retired folks have come forward to mentor our EASY kids. And the kids enjoy it! Many have even asked for a mentor!

Wednesday Night Activities

This past year the kids in the Wednesday night program studied a variety of Bible stories. One of the highlights was a unit on the Baptism of Jesus. This was in preparation for a special evening service in which several of our young people were baptized. Later in the spring, after studying a unit on Holy Communion, a larger group of the Wednesday Night kids and their families gathered for the service of Holy Communion where they were invited to take their first communion.

Throughout Lent the kids are taught about the Passion story. The Prayer Walk of the Passion, a reenactment of the Christ's final week highlighted the Lenten season. The sanctuary became the rousing entrance of Jesus into Jerusalem, the meaningful Last Supper, the prayerful and disturbing scene at the Garden of Gethsemane, the meeting with the Pharisees, the emotional trial and the long walk to the cross. All were invited to join the procession and follow the cross to the candlelit basement where a room had been converted into the likeness of the tomb where Jesus was laid. The kids look forward to this reenactment each year as they participate in the different roles of the Passion walk. One participant was heard to exclaim, "I couldn't wait for school to end so

that I could get to after school." Thanks to Chris Lamberton who takes the role of Jesus Christ.

This September, the Wednesday Night programming underwent another change and growth in numbers. The Latino community was invited to enroll their kids in this program as part of their preparation for First Communion. As a result, there are now six classes, which meant the need for more teachers. The young people of EASY and Emmaus have come forward to teach these classes. This past fall the kids studied God Makes a World and Noah's Ark. With the coming of December they were engaged in the Christmas story and preparing for the annual pageant.

In addition the middle school group continues to expand as the rising fifth graders who have come up in the program graduate. Thanks to Brenda Trumbauer and Rich Benson, who continually modify their program to accommodate the needs of this active and diverse group. A spring highlight was a trip to a local ceramic studio to create personal chalices for those who were taking their first communion.

Christmas Pageant: Census Time in Bethlehem. The kids learned that there are many names for Jesus. As one of the songs mentioned; Emmanuel means God with us. There are many ways to convey that God is with us, above us, below us, all around us. With a bit of humor B.A. Countable, census taker for the Roman government, realizes that Jesus Christ who has many names is indeed someone special, a child of hope for all. Thanks to Brenda and Ryan for their musical and sound support.

Thank you. Your encouragement and your prayers for these outreach ministry programs are appreciated! Your ongoing response to "come and see" announces to all, loud and clear, Jesus' mandate to love our neighbor.

Social Concerns Report by Diane Melander

Emmaus has a history of reaching out to those in need as Jesus taught us. Our Social Concerns Ministry completes many projects due to the hard work and dedication of many Emmaus members. Thank you all so much for saying "Yes, I can help". Your commitment and generosity has made it possible for this ministry to flourish.

Mt. Meru coffee is the delicious fair trade coffee we serve at church, and sell during coffee hour. The money from the sale of this coffee goes directly to the Meru region of Tanzania to help the coffee farmers and their families as well as to help their community. A portion of the money is used to purchase equipment for the farmers as well as help the farmers grow more disease resistant plants. Some of it is also used to improve the lives of the people of the Mt. Meru area by building schools and hospitals. This past year we've purchased, used, and sold 103 twelve ounce bags of coffee and 24 four pound bags of coffee. This translates to a donation of over \$2,000 to the Mt. Meru Coffee Project. On October 30, Emmaus hosted a Just Trade Event with the HOPES Center. The purchase of these beautiful Just Trade items reflects our commitment to pay a fair price so that artisans in third world countries can live in human dignity and take care of family responsibilities. The teachers shopped for books and educational games, so that each of our EASY kids received a book and a game from our church. This year our donations were fantastic, and the gifts were so appreciated by the children.

Every other month, Emmaus members cook and bake for the Community Meal Program, as well as transport the food to St. Patrick's Church and help serve it. Many members faithfully cook and bake every other month. Thank you all for your participation.

The Knit One Purl One group continues to knit scarves, mittens, baptismal shawls and prayer shawls The baptismal shawls are given to babies at their baptism. Prayer shawls are given to comfort those in need and the hats, scarves and mittens are donated to the children in the EASY (afterschool program). Northside Food Pantry by Cindi Larsen and Carol Therkelsen

The North Side Food Pantry served 1263 households this year. A total number of 5595 people were served – 3978 adults and 1617 children. This is 1508 more people than last year. We have also seen an increase in the number of members in a family with some having 8 to 14 in one household. This means a lot of food needs to be on the shelves. The pantry is open every Tuesday and Thursday afternoon from 2:00 – 4:00 p.m. and is located at Trinity United Methodist Church.

Emmaus donated 1482 pounds of food this year as well as \$365.54 in monetary donations. (Please note that other monetary donations by Emmaus were made that were used to purchase food and thus are accounted for in the total number of pounds.)

The total amount of money received from churches, organizations, and individuals was \$8,742.55 for the 2011 year. This is down over \$3100.00. For the year our expenses were \$10,850.65, which was down about \$2000.00. However, in the last four months we have had to buy more items to supplement what we provide families because we are receiving less from the government agencies. Thus spending will be increasing this next year from the funds provided by various groups.

We would like to thank all the volunteers who help at the pantry every fourth Thursday of the month and to those who help with the food deliveries. Also, thank you to everyone who has brought food or donated money to this very important mission in our community. Your continuing prayers are also appreciated.






