#### Emaus Reopening Proposal

The following Reopening Proposal was approved at the EmausELCA Council meeting on Tuesday, March 16, 2021.

#### Current worship with Emaus:

- Saturday 4:30 p.m. and Sunday 9:00 a.m. worshipers will continue online worship service via Zoom 9:00 a.m. Sunday mornings or pre-recorded services on YouTube. Pastor Marcy emails link.
- The 11:00 am Facebook live worship will continue Pastor Jaime leads worship.
- All worship services are available to view after on the Emaus ELCA website (emauselca1.org).

#### Tentative Starting Dates 2021

April 25, 2021 for 11 am Spanish worship.

- May 2, 2021 for First Communion and Confirmation (11 am Spanish worship).
- May 22, 2021 for Saturday 4:30 pm English worship.
- May 23, 2021 for Sunday 9:00 am English worship and English First Communion.
- Baptisms can be held during worship services only.
- Building will remain closed for other groups (Pew Sisters , TOPS) and Hall use for events until at least August 2021.

#### Registration requirements

- Person/s must register to attend in-person worship to ensure safe practice of social distancing and to prevent having to turn people away at the door. Limit of 100 people. There will be a wait list for the next worship service.
- Please call Maribel Madrid to register between 9 a.m. 12 p.m. or 5:30 p.m. -8p.m. at 262-884-5284. Please no text message. Maribel must ask for information.
- Ramiro Flores will call families to remind them of the in-person worship and to verify attendance.

# Further changes or additions will be determined by the Re-opening Committee. Requirements for in-person worship

- Masks are REQUIRED.
- Temperatures will be taken
- 100-person limit.
- Follow directions from the Ushers and the posted signs.
- Persons MUST register to attend worship service.
- Families may sit together in the same group but maintain 6 feet apart from other worshipers.
- Worshipers need to stay seated in the marked areas. Children MUST always remain with their parents.
- No congregational singing. Music will be provided.
- No "Peace" handshake. Maybe a head nod to show "Peace".
- Directions will be given for Communion.
- When worship service concludes, offerings can be dropped into the designated boxes.

## Care for the Caregiver

At some time in our lives, each of us may become caregivers. Caregiving is the regular provision of care to someone. Care will vary depending on the need of the recipient. The reasons may be dementia, serious illness, or debilitation following traumatic illness. While there are specific suggestions for providing care for every condition, it is necessary for those providing care to take care of themselves.

It is ideal to be able to share the care with other family members, or to bring in help to assist with personal cares and treatments. Usually one person becomes the primary caregiver and bear more of the burden of organizing and providing care. It is helpful to plan ahead so that changes are less stressful. There will be days when you will need all the patience and love you have.

Because it is stressful, caregiving can have adverse effects on the caregiver's physical and emotional health. Health problems may worsen and anger and depression are common. Emotional support from family and friends provides an important buffer against the stress and burden of caregiving. Social contact is very important.

Many caregivers report feeling physically and emotionally better when successfully managing care giving challenges, but feelings of emotional distress or physical symptoms should be viewed that caregivers may need to take better care of themselves.

Make sure you get regular breaks to restore your energy and sense of self. Allow yourself to take time to do whatever it is that you like to do. Another family member or respite person can cover for the times you are gone. Even if you feel you cannot get away, it is important to pause, and take a moment to refill with the good things. Scripture, prayer, sunshine, worship, song, laughter, friends, hugs. Refill your empty, or you'll find those emotions (tears, anger, snarky words) overflowing with no reason why.

Have a list of suggestions, so that if friends or family offer to help you don't need to think of what may be helpful. If you are a friend offering assistance, you might suggest a specific action such as visiting for the time needed for shopping or haircuts. Bringing a meal that can be heated and served as convenient can also be helpful. Sometimes, caregivers are so overwhelmed that it is almost a greater burden to think of what may be needed.

Physical activity is also helpful in staying healthy and improving mood, so setting a specific time to get out is important.

## Ten Commandments for Husbands and Wives

#### **EASY**


Robots, Earth Day, Spring Cards/ Painting and Drawing YES - EASY Does It!
