#### EMMAUS INVITES NATIONAL CONVENTION

The decision to sponsor the national convention of the United Evangelical Lutheran Church was voted enthusiastically at the annual meeting of the congregation in December. In spite of difficulties that may arise with the housing problem, the general sentiment was in favor of the task. The last convention sponsored by our church was twenty years ago, and the newly decrated church seemed ready to invite all to see its new dress. The convention will be held June 24-29.

Our president-elect, Henry Anderson, has been active since his installation and at the first council meeting in January appointed a general convention committee composed of Henry Lund, general chairman; Ernest Petersen, chairman on halls and ushering; Oscar Scheel, chairman on hall appointments; William Christensen, housing and registration; Chris C. Christensen, convention music.

Investigations as to availability of halls had already been made prior to the appointment of this committee and those under consideration had been Memorial Hall, Danish Brotherhood Hall, DeKoven Foundation, and the Women's Club. In each case some major difficulty arose. However, after reconsideration with the general convention committee application has been made for Washington Park High School with its cafeteria, auditorium, and recitation rooms. By the time you receive this edition we expect favorable reaction from the Board of Education, Mr. Lund informs us after conversation with Mr. Konnak.

The Danish Evangelical Lutheran Church will hold their convention on the week preceding. It is expected they will hold their convention at Holy Communion Lutheran Church and Parish Hall. The head of the church of Denmark, Bishop Fuglsang-Damgaard, is expected to visit both conventions.

Your cooperation on the housing problem is solicited very early and William Christensen will be asking you soon for space. Various estimates of 500-600 have been made. The neighboring congregations have usually aided in the housing problem. Let's get off to a good start and make this a convention long to be remembered by all attending.

# PASTOR ANDERSEN TO BE CHAPLAIN

On Sunday, February 2, Rev. E. R. Andersen will be installed as hospital chaplain by Rev. Geo. C. Hansler at 3:00 p.m. at the Atonement Lutheran Church. The Lutheran Welfare Society cooperating with the National Lutheran Council Churches of Racine have engaged Rev. Andersen as hospital chaplain beginning in February. All are invited to attend this service.

His duties will be to call on all Lutherans in the hospitals of Racine, inform their pastors of their residence there, minister to them while in the hospitals, and to other Lutherans unaffiliated with any church. This work has formerly been done by volunteer services of Lutheran pastors in Racine. The engagement of a chaplain will make visits possible more often and give opportunity for more effective ministry.

All patients entering the hospitals ought always to specify their religious denomination as Lutheran, not Protestant. This will facilitate an early ministry to all in residence.

THE FEDERATED LUTHERAN BROTHERHOOD of Racine is the proposed name for the new organization coming into being among our National Lutheran Council Churches. One general meeting and one preliminary committee meeting for drafting a constitution have been held. The next meeting will be held Tuesday, April 29, at Emmaus Lutheran with the Rev. A. Reuben Gornitzka of Milwaukee as speaker. The proposed constitution will be discussed, and adopted that evening if satisfactorily formed.



#### AN URGENT MESSAGE

The tragic physical and spiritual conditions which menace the Lutheran Church in Europe and Asia hinder the Church's recovery; in some instances its very existence is imperiled. The life and health of our Church both abroad and at home are at stake. We cannot sit by indifferently and with idle hands at a time when millions of souls and the fruit of centuries of Lutheran achievement are thus gravely jeopardized.

First, in most parts of Europe the Church is so handicapped and crippled that vast quantities of religious equipment and materials are essential to its recovery. Urgently needed are dozens of temporary chapels, millions of Bibles, devotional books and texts for worship and for religious instruction; financial support for schools to train pastors and teachers; supplies for extensive Christian programs of youth activity; and subsidies for the functioning of church operations of many types. For these and for other items, money is needed now.

Second, our gifts of food and clothing for Lutheran World Relief and our contributions of money for our child-feeding program must quickly increase, that many who otherwise would die in the coming months may live.

Third, the preservation of hundreds of thousands of souls in Lutheran orphaned missions and the protection of immensely valuable mission properties now endangered still depend upon continued support from American Lutheranism.

It is impossible to escape the plain fact that an outpouring of contributions to Lutheran World Action far beyond those already made and anticipated is now imperative. By such liberal gifts means will be provided for saving much of the Lutheran Church in Europe and Asia which otherwise will be irretrievably lost. To withhold these gifts is to doom those who rely upon us. It is solemn and awful to realize that we hold in our hands the welfare and ultimate fate of so many of our Christian brethren.

We dare not abandon our brethren in their distress. This means that we must keep the faith in both areas by a witness of personal sacrifice such as we have not yet given. The price of the survival of Christianity abroad has been paid by our brethren in the coin of imprisonment, destitution, agony and even death.

Therefore, we call upon every member of every congregation in all participating bodies of the National Lutheran Council to increase his gifts to Lutheran World Action to the utmost of the means God has provided and to unite with us in the common prayer that our love may not fail but may be powerful "in deed and in truth."

#### CHURCH WINS TAVERN ISSUE

A great sigh of relief went up from all concerned when a decision of 9 to 5 from the Common Council of Racine was granted the residents in vicinity of Emmaus Lutheran in their effort to keep out a tavern at the corner of Liberty St., and Mound Ave.

After untiring efforts, Mr. Martin, representing property owners in the area, Henry Andersen, president of the congregation, the trustees, your pastor, together with Mr. Molbeck, our fifth ward alderman, and Mr. Swan, eighth ward alderman and member of Emmaus Lutheran, sufficient evidence was accumulated to persuade the Common Council that the license ought to be refused. The minority report of Mr. Jackson and Mr. Swan stressing the issue of tavern license as "a privilege, and not absolute right" was finally adopted. This was in spite of the majority report of three members in favor of the license being granted. We are deeply appreciative of the interest of His Honor, Mayor Francis H. Wendt, in the case.

To members of the congregation and friends who either spoke in our interest, or helped circulate petitions, or appeared in the council chambers in moral support, our hearty thanks. United and persistent effort together with wise counsel can accomplish more than we sometimes expect.

Upon the recommendation of the Music Committee the following nominees were elected by the congregation, having expressed their willingness to become candidates: Organist, Gordon A. J. Petersen; Assistant Organist, Mrs. Peter Thomsen; Choir Director, Harry James; Assistant Director, Mrs. A. B. Christensen.

A motion was made by William Christensen that a student be engaged as an assistant to Rev. Magnussen for the summer, and to act as head of the Daily Vacation Bible School for the stipulated sum of \$300.00. Seconded by Henry Lund; carried by the congregation. A motion was made on the recommendation of the Council that the sum of \$100.00 be added to the proposed budget for the Lutheran Welfare of Wisconsin. Seconded by Victor Anderson; carried by congregation. A motion was made at the recommendation of the Council that \$1250.00 be budgeted for Lutheran World Action for the coming year. Seconded by Miss Olga Nelson; carried by the congregation.

The motion was made at the recommendation of the council that the two bonds held in the Building Fund, face value of \$1000.00, be used to pay off on the \$2500.00 loan for improvements borrowed from the Farmer's and Merchant's Bank. ### JANUARY CONGREGATIONAL MEETING

Following a musicale presented by the choir, and a fellowship supper in the church parlors, the continuation meeting of the Emmaus Lutheran Church was held on Sunday, January 26, 1947, at 7:00 p.m. President Henry Anderson presided at the meeting. After song, and scripture reading and prayer by Pastor Magnussen, the minutes from the annual meeting were read and approved.

Pastor Magnussen gave his pastoral report and especially emphasized the proposed monthly printed paper. New pictures of the church exterior and interior would be taken, which would later be used in the convention issue. One page of advertising would ordinarily carry the expense of the paper. The pastor expressed his appreciation of the services of the outgoing officers and their cooperation. Continuing together in the same spirit would surely bring fruits in the Kingdom of God.

President Anderson indicated that the new year would be an active one, and that people were asking where they might serve.

The auditor's report was given by Ernest Petersen and accepted by the congregation. The financial secretary's report was presented by Elmo Andersen, and accepted by the congregation. The treasurer's report, given by Oscar Scheel, was accepted by the congregation. Mr. Scheel handed in his resignation as treasurer.

T. C. Sundsted moved that the reports be accepted as read and that they be filed. Henry Lund seconded the motion and it was carried. Mr. Sundsted, as chairman of the nominating committee, moved that the resignation of Oscar Scheel be accepted. W. E. Reckhow seconded this, and the motion carried. The nominating committee further named Christ C. Christensen as their candidate for treasurer to succeed Oscar Scheel. Henry Lund moved the nominations be closed and that a unanimous ballot be cast by the secretary for Mr. Christensen as treasurer. Elmo Andersen seconded this, and the motion carried. Mr. Christensen was declared unanimously elected as treasurer by President Anderson.

Old business from the December meeting was the disposition of the bonds originally set in the building fund. T. C. Sundsted spoke of the possibility of reducing the indebtedness of \$2500 at the Farmer's and Merchant's Bank by \$1000 through the use of the bonds. Ernest Petersen stated the council wished the authority of a congregation decision before using the bonds. Martinus Jepsen moved that the bonds, (face value \$1000, actually \$944), be transferred to the Improvement Fund, and that our indebtedness at the bank be reduced by \$1000. This was seconded by Henry Lund. The congregation proceeded to ballot and the motion was carried by 37 to 32 votes.

Under new business the motion was made by C. C. Christensen, and seconded by Niels Petersen, that we add an additional sum to the \$944 to make it \$1500, and that the latter amount be paid the Farmer's and Merchant's Bank to reduce our indebtedness. The motion was declared carried by the chairman upon a vote by acclamation.

A report was received from the general chairman of the convention committee, Henry Lund, who stated that an effort was being made to obtain Washington Park High School as the place for the convention. Alternate plans were for Memorial Hall. However, if the cafeteria at the High School could be obtained, this would solve a difficult eating problem. Additional room would also be requested for convention use. The congregation will be requested to aid in housing the guests.

President Anderson spoke of a proposed "youth council" for the young people of the church, as an aid in an expanded all-around program, and as an assistance to the pastor.

A suggestion was made by the president that a new plan of leaving the church more orderly might be tried in the future at morning services.

The chairman appointed Ernest Petersen and Martinus Jepsen as a committee in charge of synodical papers sent to the congregation.

A thanks was extended to the ladies who served the supper before the meeting, and to the choir and organist.

Members of the congregation were urged by the chairman, the pastor and others to attend the committee of the whole meeting in the City Hall Chambers in the interest of opposing the transfer of a liquor license to the vicinity of the church at the Mound-Liberty-Marquette intersection. After much discussion, the trustees were appointed to spearhead the Emmaus opposition, and members were urged to contact their aldermen and the license committee. (Summarized by the editor.)

Henry Lund made a motion for adjournment which was seconded and carried. Pastor Magnussen closed the meeting with prayer.

### RELIGION AND BUSINESS

HIS NOON, through the radio, I listened to a representative of the U. S. Chamber of Commerce. He was pleading for the "American way of life." By way of contrast he characterized the totalitarian German state. Correctly it was pointed out that the Nazi state is deified until the state takes the place of God, and that the Nazi philosophy of life is a religion for its adherents. He then went on to say that we Americans get our God from the Bible (I should have liked to hear him say that our God gave us the Bible), and then added the text for this editorial, when he said that in contrast to the Nazi state, "we keep our religion and our business separate."

It reminded me of a certain business man who said that he practiced Christian charity through his church organization, but not through his business. We have all too long heard the slogan, "Religion is religion, and business is business." Here is one of the worst aspects of our modern religiosity.

The religion which is kept separate from business is not the religion which comes from the God of our Bible. The great prophets of the Old Testament did not keep them separate. Corruption, fraud and dishonesty in business were constantly attacked by these men of God. Jesus did not consider business to be outside of the area of religion. If we may judge by the amount of space given to the subjects in the four Gospels, there were three subjects upon which Jesus dwelt more than upon anything else, and these three were the Kingdom of God, hypocrisy and man's relation to wealth. Dealing with the problems of wealth, He did not separate business from religion. He who would separate religion from business does not know his Bible, or if he does, he is a hypocrite when he asserts allegiance to it.

I am not sure just what a religion which is separated from business would be good for. Perhaps its adherents would look upon it as a kind of insurance policy (pardon the mixing of religion and business in the figure) to cash in on when they die. A man said to me

some years ago that he was not certain as to the truth of the Christian religion, but that he belonged to the Church because he wanted to be on the safe side. Well, the death benefit on such insurance will not be very great either for the insured or his survivors.

The desire to separate religion from life is simply a practical atheism. The Bible knows of no such separation. In the Old Testament it is difficult to find a word which exactly corresponds to our word "religion." The reason is not to be found in the fact that there was so little religion, but rather in the circumstance that everything had its religious connotations. No area of life was separated from the religious outlook. Wherever religion has functioned vitally, it has served as an integrating center for all of life. One of the functions of religion is to give meaning to life in all its aspects, including our business relations.

The attitude which we are considering is the primary cause for the collapse of our civilization. We have been drifting around without any sense of direction, like a ship at sea which has lost its rudder. One of the functions of religion is to serve as a rudder for life. In our Christian faith we have a rudder which will stand the test of the storms of life. Nothing else will do and nothing else will work in the long run. The depression before the war and the war which is now raging both emphasize in no uncertain terms that we need to mix our Christianity with our business.

Unless we permit our religion to give meaning and direction to life and serve as an integrating center for all of life, we do not have the religion of the Bible. For the Christian, the distinction between sacred and secular should cease to exist. The secular is the life or that area of life which is lived without reference to God. No part of the life of the Christian should be lived without reference to God. The Christian cannot separate his religion from his business. If the Christian business man cannot practice his religion in his business, he must either get out of the business or change the social pattern in such a way that it may be possible for him to make business of his Christianity.

In the reconstruction period after the war, if business refuses to be guided by Christian principles, business will be doomed and our whole economic structure will crumble. Here is a message for the Church to bring to our chaotic world.

# NO HANDS BUT OURS By Clifford Ansgar Nelson, D.D.

HE SCENE: ruined St. Mark's Lutheran Church in Frankfort-am-Main, Germany—a ghastly shell of its former beauty.

There, the ceiling that once sheltered the stately sanctuary is but a gaping hole open to the sky. Black shadows from twisted metal and charred beams streak across the heaps of rubble and shattered walls.

Grim reminder of a grimmer work—bomb-havoc that left not a single church in Frankfort unmarked. Bleak. Empty, but for one thing that remain intact—almost intact.

Against a scarred background of ragged bricks and chipped masonry, high in the chancel above the altar and pulpit, still stands the statue of Christ. As if rising out of the pastorless pulpit, Christ stands—His arms outstretched in benediction. His arms—but, look closely, His hands are gone.

Christ amid chaos. A parable. So it struck me, as I walked through the ruins with its pastor, Dr. Otto Fricke. Christ still there, but His hands—gone.

Is it not like that in our chaotic postwar world? Amid the ruins of Europe and Asia, where fury of war all but crushed the fabric of our civilization, where are the hands of our Lord who wants to rebuild and restore the broken hearts and homes of men? Are they gone completely?

Ah, no! His hands may have been broken by the bombs of war, but it is for us to be His hands today, to be His healing and restoring hands.

It was Pastor Fricke who told me that when the church is restored, the statue will remain untouched. The hands will not be replaced. It will remain forever a remembrance of those tragic troubled years of Christ's call to service.

# VICTORY CONFERENCE HELD

On Sunday afternoon, March 9, about 150 Lutheran World Action workers gathered at Emmanuel Lutheran Church on High Street for a Victory Conference. Results of drives in the twenty-odd churches in the vicinity were given, which totaled 61% of the two year goal. This was slightly under the national average of 67%. An excellent view of L.W.A. "in action" was presented in the film, "Mission of Mercy." Representing Emmaus were Mr. and Mrs. David Christensen and Mr. and Mrs. Omar Junker. Others were unable to attend.

# MORE PEOPLE ARE WAITING

"More people are waiting to be asked to go to church, than there are people to ask them," was the statement of an ardent and successful church worker. Because those are our sentiments too, our president, Henry Anderson, is organizing "deacon's helpers" to assist us in locating these waiting people. Do you wish to go to work in God's kingdom?

#### BIBLES DISTRIBUTED

A committee of eleven men, including the chairman, C. C. Christensen, aided in the free distribution of Bibles in Racine on Sunday, February 23. Twenty-four churches cooperated in this project and had been given over a thousand Bibles by the Home Bible League of Chicago that might be distributed wherever the people would read them. The area assigned to our group was bounded by the Root River on the west, State Street on the north, Wisconsin Avenue on the east, and Sixth Street on the south. Since the 50-75 homes visited in this area were scattered widely, the committee traveled a good deal. In all except one home a hearty welcome was given. Seven homes received a Bible and promised to read it. We appreciate the willingness of the committee in this worthy endeavor.

# THE TOOLS' QUARREL

"The carpenter's tools had a conference. Brother Hammer was in the chair. The meeting had informed him that he must leave, because he was too noisy. But he said, "If I am to leave this carpenter's shop, Brother Gimlet must go too. He is so insignificant that he makes very little impression."

How careful we should be in finding fault with one of God's Tools."





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

#### A SUCCESSFUL CONVENTION

The Convention held at Washington Park High the last week in June was a distinct success from the point of view of service and facilities. To judge from the fine comments of the visitors and synodical officials Emmaus committees and other workers can be very proud of their achievement. A special word of appreciation is due our energetic and indefatigable chairman, Henry Lund, and his excellent staff. He estimated that between 2500 and 3000 working hours had been put in and stated that many of the workers were busy from early morning hours until midnight. Many gave up a week of their vacations and others took off from work whenever possible. All in all, if it had not been for the willingness to work and cooperate, and the ability to execute a large task, the convention would not have been the success it was.

On Saturday there were 456 registered delegates, pastors and visitors cared for and various reports of 500-600 were given as the number served Sunday noon. One might have wished for more workers, and that in itself commends those who still succeeded in caring for ever-hungry guests.

Though there were a few problems not anticipated, every phase of the work received commendation: ushers always on deck, ample music for all occasions, aclive waiters serving at the refreshment booth, efficient and well-informed help at the registraion desk, all appointments attractive, and last but not least-the cleanup committees were so efficient that school might have been held the next day. A hearty cheer for all those who carted all items to be returned and checked them in in good condition.

An excellent job of advance publicity was in evidence. Supplemented with the day-by-day reports of the National Lutheran Council publicity agent, the local coverage was deemed very good.

The demand for typists was incessant. All committees were suddenly aware of the convenience of these willing souls. It might not be such a bad idea to have a staff of secretaries secured by the synod for the unending clerical work.

The convention "Reporter" carried daily accounts of convention business. A few copies are still available to those interested.

A complete report of the financial outcome is not yet available, but the indications are that there will be a balance. With high prices here and a deficit there, it is only natural that convention costs had to be charged in proportion. Only those who have never run a convention can be too critical. And no sacrificially-minded congregation would be out to fleece the guests.

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THE SILVER ANNIVERSARY of Mr. and Mrs. Chris Sundsted was celebrated quietly on June 5, 1947. Because of Mr. Sundsted's illness no invitations were extended, but a large number of friends dropped in to congratulate them. We wish them God's blessing in the coming year.

THE JOINT DAILY VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL enrolled about 126 of which about 38 were from Emmaus. The school, held at Messiah and Immanuel because of the convention, was a distinct success. Jack Jacobsen of Immanuel was in charge and two Emmaus teachers, Sally King and Grace Klingberg, assisted together with five other teachers.

THE BIBLE CAMP at Spencer Lake, Waupaca, Wis., began Monday, July 21, with about 40 present that afternoon. A large group was expected. The rest will be spent at a cottage at French Lake, near Northfield, Minnesota.

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

#### BISHOP MALMSTRØM VISITS RACINE

Emmaus was highly honored on the eleventh of August as host to Bishop and Mrs. Malmstrøm of Viborg, Denmark. Racine friends heard an excellent sermon in Danish that evening, "Where Can Jesus Be Found in 1947?" which left an impression of simplicity in presentation, a definiteness in the call of the Gospel, as well as a stirring challenge to follow Jesus Christ today. From one among those who have suffered and have been oppressed, the message was especially timely to an indifferent American group who do not sense the opportunity and duty we have as free men with a great message.

A fine sense of humor and an excellent ability in description gave zest to the informal session after the English service at Our Savior's on the Tuesday following. Bishop Malmstrøm is also a fine pianist and accompanied a gathering of pastors at the Emmaus parsonage in English and Danish evening songs. Both our guests were well-informed on world situations, and their informal and friendly manner won the hearts of all.

Bishop Malmstrøm is one of nine bishops in Denmark and we are told has supervision over 250 congregations with 150 pastors and a constituency of about 250,000. The leadership of such a man speaks well for the church of Denmark, but under their present status, a lack of closer contact with the people is deplored, especially in the larger congregations.

Their appreciation of small favors spoke of the difference in availability of items here and in Denmark. And Denmark is not among the ones suffering most.

Are we in America ungrateful for bountiful gifts we enjoy? Have we become hardened to small favors and our tongues given to much complaining? Do we find it an effort to make it to church each Sunday? For shame! We who are able to give and to share the greatest treasure, salvation in Jesus Christ, so careless that only our selfish wishes matter. Shall we learn before our privileges also are removed?

#### DANISH GYM TEAMS APPEAR

An unusually good presentation of Erik Flensted-Jensen's young men and Miss Signe Berthelsen's young women was given at Washington Park High, Friday, August 22. A wholesome, clean, entertaining and educational exhibition was given. When we look on these well-developed bodies, and their program of developing whole personalities, one wonders if we might not improve our own well-being with less attention to gate receipts, and more to production of fine specimens of Christian youth who may be leaders of tomorrow.

## "Just Another Dodge"

Coincidences are amusing things; let me tell you about one.

I go a calling—as ministers are supposed to do—and this day I make it my task to visit a few of the folks habitually delinquent in the matter of going to church. Excuses meet me at almost every door. And as I step from a home where another limping alibi for non-attendance has been advanced, an automobile passes me—a car as sadly decrepit as the excuses I have need to listen to—and as it passes, I read these mud-spattered words on the cover of the spare tire: "Just another Dodge." What a coincidence that this manufacturer's slogan should greet me at the close of a day on which I had repeatedly met with "Just another Dodge" when asking folks why they were absenting themselves so frequently from the services of the church.

But let us see who a few of these "Dodge Brothers"—and sisters—are. Judging from the many I have met, there must be a large family of them. May I introduce a few of them to you?

Here is the oldest brother; his name is "Tired Dodge." He talks like this: "You know, pastor, I work hard all week and when Sunday comes I am so tired and so worn out that I seldom get up before noon. I am very sorry, for I like to go to church, but my health comes first, and my health demands these extra hours of rest."

Sounds plausible, brother, and I might believe you, too, if I had not heard the corner grocer relate interesting yarns about your frequent Sunday morning fishing trips with him, and if at dawn on other Sunday mornings I had not seen you and yours start on family outings when I was up early to study my sermon.

And now I wish you to meet "Tired's" brother. His name is "Work Dodge." Listen, he is speaking: "You know, Reverend, I work late every day and when Sunday comes there are so many little jobs around the

house that must be done, that I just cannot get to church."

Well, brother, God made Sunday as a day of rest, and then, too, your story would sound better if I did not know that you play ball on Sunday afternoons, and if I had not heard of your frequent Sunday visits to Aunt Kate's, to stay all day, to eat and gossip and eat again.

And here comes sister "Company Dodge." Can't you hear her whimper? "Now, please don't scold. Really I was coming to church two or three different Sundays, but company came and I just had to stay at home."

Well, I have the sneaking suspicion that company would have been glad to come to church with you—even suggested it—but you said, "No, we can go to church any old time. Let's have a good visit and besides, our preacher is awfully dry anyway."


And look who's here now. It's "Dress Dodge." As the boys say, "It gives me a pain" to hear her story—but here it is: "Oh, I just love to go to church, but I don't feel at home there. Your people are so proud and no one speaks to me. I guess I am not wanted. I know why, too. They think I don't dress well enough. You know I am poor, and with my clothes I feel out of place among all those ladies wearing silk dresses and twenty-dollar hats."

Too bad, sister, but listen. The other night I passed by the theater just in time to see you buying a ticket—and you were nicely dressed, too. If your clothes are good enough for the theater, they are good enough for the church. And remember, God looks at your heart, not at your hat.

And thus, my friend, you see that those in the church who "dodge" their "ought to's" are as plentiful as Dodge autos. Indeed, the "Dodge Brothers" and sisters are a large family. Are you, perhaps—no, it cannot be; you are not one of them. Or are you?

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
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#### LOYALTY WEEK REPLACES MISSION MEETINGS

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
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#### BUY YOUR WAY TO HEAVEN!



In the past five years the cost of baby clothing has doubled; the cost of office equipment has doubled; and the cost of stationery and printing has tripled. A year's membership costs only \$1.00, which entitles you to vote, and to receive the Bulletin six times a year. But our love is greater than that—and our ability to give is too.
