The Annual Meeting

The annual meeting of Emmaus Lutheran Church was held December 1, 1947, in the church parlors with Pres. Henry Anderson presiding. The meeting opened with prayer led by Pastor Magnussen. Minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

Christensen; assistant financial secretary, (1 year) Hans Jepsen; nominating committee (1 year), Fred Simonsen, C. C. Christensen, Alfred Sorensen. Appointed to the vacation school committee, J. William Christensen, David Christensen; to music committee, Hans Jepsen, Omar Junker; as auditors, T. C. Sundsted, Henry Lund, E. E. Petersen. Elected as organist, Gordon Petersen; assistants, Mrs. Elmo Andersen, Alice Klingberg; choir director, Harry James.

THE CONTINUATION MEETING

The continuation meeting of the congregation was held Monday, January 19, at 7:45 p.m. After the approval of the minutes the financial secretary and the treasurer gave their reports. (The detailed report will appear in the next issue.) The pastor gave an encouraging report of increased attendance at services, and renewed interest of many members in various phases of congregational life. The parish summaries were as follows: adult accession by confirmation, 12; transfer and renewals, 16; total 28. Baptized 24 children (one or both parents members) and 6 (parents non-members); 2 children received with parents previously baptized; baptized gain, adult 28, children 32, total 60. Wedding performed, 9 (three non-members, others one member each). Losses, by transfer-18 adults, 11 children; resigned, 13 adults and 1 child; deaths, 7 members (8 non-members). Total communicants for the year, 1468. Confirmed membership, Jan. 1, 1948, 640; baptized membership, 917; voting membership, 471.

THE BUDGET


The budget of \$11,284.00 was adopted for current and benevolent purposes in 1948. A resolution was adopted to pay supply pastors the same amount plus expenses. Upon the resignation of the financial secretary, Elmo Andersen, because of other pressing duties, the nominating committee presented the name of Earl Woodward as candidates. No other nomination being accepted, a unanimous ballot was cast by the secretary. A motion was made, seconded and carried that \$650 of the mission fund balance be given to the Church Extension Fund of the synod. A motion was made, seconded and carried that \$500 from the current funds be placed in the local improvement fund. A motion was made, seconded and carried that \$300 be appropriated as an aid to the choir when ready to purchase new robes. (The choir has a fund of about \$120 for this purpose on hand.)

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WIDENING HORIZONS

By this time all interested in the work of the church will know that we are really making an effort to put our church and school on the map. We undertake big things, even though we are one of the smaller sectors of the Lutheran Church. All around us from Canada to California, to Maine, and back to the Middle West we see evidences of the Home Mission work extending the church in new fields. No less than eleven places are involved. Will you help these churches get on their feet so that they may mature without too many childhood deficiencies? Then give in love for the Lord's work generously!

Pioneers and the Christian School

Ever since early pioneer days our people have considered their schools the cornerstone of the synodical set-up. State universities and secular institutions of learning are ours too, but there we can try to catch the Lutherans on the run through Lutheran Student Service and its pastors. At our church schools the influence is Christian. Needless to say its mission is a great one, but many people forget the throngs of young people seeking God, absolute truth, spiritual values, the dignity of man, and freedom along with and in their preparations for all walks of life. We look to them for greater service, but we must provide facilities for their training. Again that new administration-library building rears its tower, and urges us to reach high for the goal and dig deep for foundation.

Where Did You Get Your Pastor?

Almost without exception our pastors receive their training at Dana College or Trinity Seminary. Numbers of loyal laymen consider Dana their alma mater. What if you did attend another school? As a project of our synod we have committed ourselves to the utmost. Without the best support we cannot get the best in education either. By investing wisely and well, we too can look proudly to our school overlooking the broad Missouri River from a beautiful hill-top.

How We Plan To Do It

Why needlessly prolong C.S.D.D.? (Church and School Development Drive is its name.) We should like to get contributions by check or cash by the first of May 1948. Whether you make this weekly or monthly or in a total, you will know best. But a large committee of about 40 members will call on you (beginning the last week in February) to ascertain your wishes. A goal of \$190,000 for the two-fold purpose of Church Extension, \$85,000 and Dana Building Fund, \$105,000 is our aim. How much shall I give? You see the need; you know your ability; the Lord blesses those who serve Him. But if we are to do this right we must average not less than \$25.00 per married couple, or \$12.50 per single adult. But to maintain an average we cannot think in minimums. What ought you to give?

We ask you to meet our visitors courteously. They volunteer their services for a good cause. You may have questions to ask, but having read this you will no doubt already know what you plan to do. Do gladly what you do! The Lord looks at the heart!

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THE FORK IN THE ROAD

"There is a line by us unseen,
That crosses every path—

There is a moment in the life of each of us—it will surely come—a tick of the clock, beyond which the impudence of man cannot pass, and the forbearance of God will not go. There is a fork in the road, where the eternal destiny of each individual is decided. As to where that fork in the road is, let me repeat the testimony of a railroad engineer from whose eyes the light had gone forever. He said, "God had to make me blind so that I could see." That man had come to the fork in the road, and though bereft of sight, saw before it was too late, the words on the signboard.

I remember the story told me years ago by a friend of mine, the son of a farmer in one of the states of the Middle West. The glorious gospel message had gripped his heart, and he had taken his stand for Christ. This brought him into trouble with his father, who was an infidel. One early morning his father made ready to drive to town. The team was harnessed and hitched to the wagon. The father called to his son to ride to town with him. On the way, they came to a fork in the road. Approaching it, the father, calling his son by name, said that he must decide by the time they reached the fork either to give up the church and stay on the wagon with him and return home, or get off the wagon, and his home be home to him no longer.

The young man bade good-bye to his father and got down from the wagon when they reached the fork. The call of God was stronger than the call of home ties, and for conscience' sake he became an exile. He had come to the fork in the road, and to the minute when he must decide his destiny.

The apostle Paul was answering for his faith before Felix. The Spirit of God was struggling with the Roman hireling. He trembled as the apostle reasoned. He had come to the fork in the road. He knew what he cught to do; but, reaching the breaking point between himself and God, he cried out to Paul. "Go thy way for this time; when I have a convenient season, I will call for thee." His convenient season passed with that opportunity.

Let me cite another case. The apostle Paul had been passed on from Felix to Festus, and from Festus to Agrippa. Paul was before the king, again to answer for his faith. The truths to which he gave utterance

were doing their work. The Spirit of God was pressing them home to the heart of the king. The supreme moment in Agrippa's life was reached. He stood at the fork in the road. He knew what he ought to do. God was calling for the surrender of his life. He saw in the apostle an ambassador from the throne of God, offering him grace and pardon for his sinful life; and the words involuntarily escaped his lips, "Almost thou persuadest me to be a Christian." Not having the courage of his convictions, Agrippa failed when he reached the parting of the ways, and his "almost persuaded" became "almost, but lost."

Friend, have you reached the fork in the road? Have the truths of the Holy Bible been gripping your heart? Have you not heard the still small voice calling you into the pathway of obedience, "This is the way, walk ye in it?" Will you say as did Felix, "Go thy way for this time; when I have a convenient season, I will call for thee?" The convenient season may pass with the reading. Will you say as did Agrippa, "Almost thou persuadest me?" Almost means to put aside the proffered mercy. Almost may mean lost.

Today as the Savior of the world is fulfilling in your experience His own words, "Behold I stand at the door, and knock: if any man hear My voice, and open the door, I will come in to him, and will sup with him, and he with Me,"—do not keep Him waiting, knocking.

"Yes, the wounded hand still knocketh And beneath the thorn-wreathed hair Beam the patient eyes so tender, Of thy Savior waiting there; Wilt thou keep Him waiting there?"



You and The Church of Christ

This Messenger goes out to the members of Emmaus Lutheran Church. It is designed to inform, inspire, and challenge those connected with our Church. This article is directed at you, church members and those interested in the church. It is our prayer that when you have read these thoughts, you might feel challenged and might regard your tie with Christ's Church in a more serious manner.

As one penetrates into the present status of church membership, he is appalled. Joining the Church has no more meaning than joining a social organization or a lodge. There is little distinctive about church membership.

Perhaps the Church is greatly at fault. Perhaps, she does not make great enough demands upon those who would enter her portals. It is quite a simple procedure to join a church. Perhaps, a few catechetical classes and then church membership—and some branches of the Church do not even demand those few classes.

We have an axiom, "Easy come, easy go." How true that is in church membership. When we have been impressed with the importance of a possession by struggling to gain that possession, we do not soon let it slip out of our grasp. Sliding easily into the rolls of a church will only mean that we have greased the path which leads out of the church.

As one reads church history he is impressed with the importance placed on membership in the early Church. Long sludy, testing, and proving were the requirements for membership in that select body, the Body of Christ. I am not urging that we return to the practice of the first few centuries after our Lord. Their methods were adapted to their historical situation.

However, I do urge that we make church membership something more than it is! We must make church membership something to be desired, something which someone on the outside, on seeing, desires.

We must make church membership challenging. We must have church members willing to accept the challenge. Today, even in our congregation, there are many who reject every opportunity to serve their Lord through the Church. There are a thousand and one things more important than the Church to the average church member. Why? Has not the challenge been given to him?

We must make the fellowship in the Church a more vital reality. We speak of the "tie that binds." Still, often as one sees the discord where there should be concord, we wonder if the binding tie has not been broken. It is often said that we must love our enemies. Looking at the Church we wonder how members can pretend to love their "enemies" when they do not even pretend to love their fellow Christians.


Church membership must be made a sacrifice. Present day church members make very little, or no sacrifice. Christ said, "Take up thy cross, and follow me." When that challenging message is proclaimed from the pulpit, and the "cross" turns out to be a contribution of \$12, \$25 or \$50 a year to the church, people are confused. If men are made to sacrifice for their church, they will love it with a deep, abiding love.

Would you be a member of a church which made such demands upon its members? Why are you today a member of the church? Is it because you married someone in the church? Is it because you think "everyone" should belong to some church? Is it for business or social reasons? Or is it because the Church has brought you to God through Christ, and you recognize that the Church is Christ's arm extended to the sinsick world, calling it to "Come unto me and I will give you rest."?

Would to God that all of us might be members who could answer "Yes" to the last of the above questions. If you answer "Yes" to the last question, then you do know the importance of church membership, and it has become a sacrifice for you, and it is one of the most important responsibilities you have in the world.

How much does your membership in the "Body of Christ" mean to you? Have you slid in, and are you sliding out? Has it cost you any strife?

INTERESTING NOTES FROM SYNODICAL CONVENTION

Norman Bansen, who acted as public relations officer for our synodical convention, rushed from the convention hall in Fresno and telephoned the following resolution to the waiting religious world:

"Resolved that we, the members of the United Evangelical Lutheran Church in convention assembled June 17, 1948, do hereby authorize the Church Council to appoint a commission consisting of the President, the

Vice President, and the Secretary, together with two lay members of Synod: that this commission be instructed to contact the Church Council or authorized officials of the constituent bodies of the American Lutheran Conference and invite them to initiate discussions collectively by representatives of the bodies with the view of bringing about a greater cooperation and an eventual merger of the bodies of the American Lutheran Conference and the other Lutheran Churches of our Land."

The question of Lutheran Unity had been discussed in separate meetings of pastors and lay delegates. On the convention floor, it soon became evident that there was a strong sentiment in favor of closer cooperation with other Lutheran groups through some sort of federation or union. In the voting there was a resounding "yes" in favor of the resolution. When the chairman called for the negative vote, there was complete silence — not a single dissenting vote.

The question of Lutheran Unity will probably be one of the most important issues at the forthcoming Biennial Convention of the American Lutheran Conference this fall.

Among other important decisions made by the convention were the following:

Action on a new constitution for synod was postponed until the convention of next year.

The Convention votes its approval of the \$4,000,000 goal for Lutheran World Action for 1949 as proposed by the National Lutheran Council. Our share as a synod will be \$43,583.22.

The synodical budget adopted amounted to \$114,632. In the budget is included an addition of \$4,633.00 to the Pension Fund in order to provide a much needed bonus for the pensioners.

The voting delegation at the convention consisted of 133 laymen and 72 pastors. Over 400 visitors were provided with lodging. Many members of our six churches located in the Fresno vicinity also attended the meetings. A large joint choir from these churches provided the special music at the evening services and on Sunday. About 1,300 people attended the morning service on Sunday when Pastors Homer Larsen and Ejvind Nielsen were ordained to the holy ministry.

Dr. N. C. Carlsen was reelected President of Synod. In accepting the election he stated this would be his last term in that office. Rev. T. M. Hansen of Owaltonna, Minn., was elected Secretary and Rev. C. S. Kloth of Milwaukee, who served as chairman of the convention, was reelected for next year. Henry Lund was elected as one of the delegates to the Biennial Convention of the American Lutheran Conference, which will be held in Detroit in November. Your pastor will present one devotional period at that Conference.

Ernest Petersen and Olga Nelson served as the congregation's delegates to the convention.

No invitation was received for next year's convention.

Your pastor and the delegates take this opportunity to express their appreciation and thanks to the Emmaus congregation for making it possible for them to attend the convention. It was a fine trip which was enjoyed very much.

There will be a program centered around the Bible Camp and colored slides taken at the camp, will be shown. Emmaus had a good turnout for the Camp, let's turn out for this program.

Emmaus Brotherhod Picnic to be held Tuesday, August 24th, at Forest Park. Groups will leave the church at 5:45 p.m. and 6:30 p.m., so that those working longer can lattend. There'll be a devotional program, movies, and sports—plan to attend.

Sponsored by the Luther League, the local **Gideon Society** will present a program at Emmaus on August 29, 7:45 p.m. There will be vocal and violin solos. The congregation is urged to attend this meeting as the guests of the League. Refreshments will be served following the program.

Wisconsin District Convention, September 9-12, in Milwaukee at Kingo Lutheran Church. The opening service will be held Thursday at 7:45 p.m. The convention theme is: "Lord, Teach Us to Pray." Besides the regular delegates and the Pastor, any visitors will be welcome. Milwaukee is just a stone's throw away, let's have Emmaus well represented. Our Pastor will lead the Friday afternoon topic. The District Women's Missionary Society will meet Saturday, September 11, and will sponsor the evening service that day.

The Emmaus Choir will resume rehearsals on September 9. All members please note. New members should contact Mr. Leroy Andersen or Mrs. Fred Simonsen, and plan to attend the first session. Rehearsals for Christmas begin at once.

Lutheran World Action was postponed by our congregation until the first part of October because of the C & S drive. Will you help?

The cross is still today's answer for a world dominated by power politics. Mankind is frightened. Peace is menaced by misery, fear and threats of aggression. Some would seek deliverance through education. Others propose economic abundance as a solution. Still others advocate world government as the alternative to pow-

er politics. Each has its place.

Yet Christians know that no formula will work without the Cross. This is God's way out! Christ can change people's hearts—brute force can't! Education alone won't purify men's motives. Full stomachs do not guarantee moral will power. It takes something more—a Savior—Jesus Christ.

To proclaim this is the Church's task every day of every year. Yet the Church, battered by the war in Europe and Asia, is hampered by its wounds and threatened by its enemies. Through Lutheran World Action the eight church bodies in the National Lutheran Council join hands to aid their brethren in the faith, to revive their strength of body and soul, that the Church may rise re-invigorated to achieve its greatest triumphs

The cross is still today's answer for since the Reformation. Again, "by this Cross" we shall world dominated by power politics.

Emmaus has always responded well since this work of LWA began in 1939. We have raised over \$1000 each year for several years. This year our minimum is \$850, but we are optimistically expecting to reach our former goal.

LWA helps at home too. In the Vanport disaster our Division of Welfare worked right alongside the Red Cross. At the universities, our Lutheran students leaders of the church of tomorrow, are followed by pastors of the Student Service Commission. America is house hungry. The Division of American Missions has followed her migrant people with the Gospel in temporary housing areas ineligible for workers and funds from regular Home Mission Boards.

Those who saw the film, "March of Faith," could not easily remain dry-eyed as they noted the on-the-scene pictures of the aid we gave. Somehow even our needs at home couldn't touch the pathetic picture of the wartorn world even today. A few dollars each will not be missed at home—but together it's the LUTHERAN WORLD in ACTION!

Reformation Festival Service

We are looking for you and your friends to be present at the Reformation Festival Rally, November 7, at Memorial Hall at 3:30 p.m. As Lutherans we should be proud of this occasion and certainly crowd the hall to capacity. A great speaker will be addressing us, The Rev. Franklin Clark Fry, president of the ULCA, and one of the great religious leaders of today. At the World Council of Churches at Amsterdam, Dr. Fry was elected vice-president of the central committee.

A massed choir, composed of singers from the cooperating churches of the county, will sing two anthems, "Arise, All Things," by Malmin, and "A Mighty Fortress," Noble Cain's arrangement of Luther's traditional hymn which was born during the 16th century Reformation movement. V. Magnussen, pastor at Emmaus Lutheran. An electronic organ is being installed for the occasion and will be used for prelude and accompaniment.

Under the direction of Ethel Fredericksen they will sing Fred Waring's arrangement of "Onward, Christian Soldiers," with a girls' chorus from Atonement taking the descant.

Pageantry and fanfare will be added this year also with the flag of the United States, Christian flags, Lutheran emblems and banners, a color guard, robed ministers and choirs. This will be a festive occasion. Come!



"On your pastor's part, I would say we had not thought of a change at all—several calls had been returned, in fact. But from sheerly personal motives, the call to Easton, Calif., will be accepted because of its semi-rural location and its smaller size. The climate was no factor at this point. Your pastor has felt the pressure of his duties for some time, and though the council has helped in several ways to lighten the load, the resignation at this time is based purely on this personal consideration. We regret—perhaps even more than the congregation-making this step except for the reason given. We appreciate the encouragement of many who wished we might reconsider. But no man is indispensable even in the Lord's work. A praying congregation will find another leader. Let us leave it there and go forward in unity, anxious to fill our place in God's work."


