


Seasonal Banners Are Gift from Lincoln Lutheran

The year-end elimination of the Chaplaincy Department for all the facilities of Lincoln Lutheran led to a number of religious articles made available to ELCA congregations at no cost. Emmaus was the recipient of several pieces of ceramic communion ware as well as other communion supplies.

In addition, we received the large gift of a complete set of seasonal banners imported from Belgium. Both the Advent banner and the Christmas banners have already graced the walls of our sanctuary, and the Worship and Music Committee is currently discussing how the complete set of banners will be permanently displayed.

Altar Candles Are Refitted to Be More 'Green'

The disposable candle inserts used for the altar and chancel candles have been replaced by permanent plastic inserts, which can be refilled with oil rather than thrown away after they have been used.



Not only will the replacement of the inserts be a savings in the long run, but we will eliminate the need to dispose of the pre-filled inserts. Undesignated memorials given in the name of Howard Jensen have made this change possible.

Maintenance, Utilities Exacerbate Deficit


Not accounting for the final

week's offerings for 2010, it appears that Emmaus will end the year with a deficit of approximately \$20,000. Over \$6,000 of that amount is what is still owed to the Greater Milwaukee Synod for the pledged benevolence we have committed as a

congregation. Other big expenses have been utilities and major maintenance and repair.

For many weeks, adults and kids alike brought their recycled bottle caps to Emmaus to be rinsed and sorted by color. The buckets of the multi-colored caps would

provide the color for the large nativity scene.

Mark Falaschi used plywood to make the individual figures of Mary, Joseph, the cow, sheep, donkey, manger and star. He also created a stable out of plywood that would be primed and painted before the Wednesday night of the intergenerational "stable raising" event.

Adults came prepared with drills, and eagerly helped

the kids screw the colored bottle caps to the wooden forms. Following the Wednesday night meal served by Carol Yust, Kim Howser, Karen Reikena and their families, approximately 75 kids and adults joined in the collaborative event. In less than two hours the project was completed and ready to display at the evening worship service.

The following week, Mark set up the nativity scene outside the front door of the church, complete with a spotlight for night viewing. Just two nights later the forceful




winds snapped the stable in two, and Mark returned to make repairs and raise the stable a second time.


Following the service, over 250 people gathered downstairs for a feast which included everything




from chili to tamales to lasagna to fajitas—not to mention a wide array of salads and desserts. The Latinos of the congregation cooked and served the main meal.

Appliances, Gadgets Boost Energy Costs

In areas without natural gas, most of the electricity used goes to the furnace, the water heater, air conditioning unit, and lighting. To those of us who use gas for those first two uses, lighting, appliances and electronic items such as TVs, computers, DVDs, Blu-ray players and the like are the big users of electricity.

We can reduce our use of electricity, and thus our carbon footprint, not only by using compact fluorescent lamps, but by how we use our appliances and electronics. It was thought that increased efficiency would reduce our ever increasing need of electrical energy. Our insatiable desire for the latest technical gadget has overcome the efficiencies.

Many electronic devices are not truly off when you switch them off. The TV, microwave, DVD with its clock (blinking 12:00 all the time?) and computers that are not switched off at the surge protector are using electricity all the time. The switch on a surge protector can be a significant saver of electricity as well as protection in a storm. If something is not going to be used for a significant length of time, unplug it or otherwise cut off these

energy drains. While such "vampire" loads may be small — from 0.5 to 10 watts — it is estimated that a typical household will have 20 appliances pulling standby at any given time.

Other savings can be attained by looking for Energy Star-rated items. This program, launched in

1992 by the U. S. Environmental Protection Agency and U. S. Department of Energy, now covers more than 60 items. For example, replacing a clothes

washer made before 2000 with a 2010 Energy Star one could save \$135 per year in electricity and also may save water, which requires energy to bring to your tap. Replacing a refrigerator made before 1993 could save \$65 annually. The savings would be even greater if the old model is not in good working condition. It can pay to invest in environmental stewardship.

Pastors Meet With Churchwide Leaders

On Friday, January 21, Pastor Jhon Freddy and Pastor Mary traveled to Chicago with Pastor Chrostowski, Sandy Synod Director of Outreach and Evangelism. There they met with Ruben Duran, Director Development of New Congregations, and with Hector Carrasquillo, Director

of Latino Ministries of the ELCA.

Discussion included how our Latino ministry at Emmaus should be categorized and how that would influence funding from the Division of


Evangelical Outreach and Congregational Mission (EOCM). Concerns regarding the sustainability of the ministry were addressed, and other current and potential sources of funding were identified.

Support for the ministry will come from the national ELCA, the Greater Milwaukee Synod, Emmaus, partners and the Latino ministry itself.

Because the \$36,000 committed by the ELCA for 2011 will come from "New Start" allocations of the national church, the new ministry is required to maintain a separate ministry budget for the time being. Pastor Jhon Freddy is considered a pastor mission developer, and will be officially sponsored by the ELCA for visa purposes.

As a part of the sponsorship, the ELCA will assume any legal and government expenses related

to the religious worker visa (R1) for which Pastor Jhon Freddy is now applying. Secondary financial support will include the parsonage provided by Emmaus and funding from other partners, including the synod's Outreach for Hope



As the Mission Exploration process unfolds, it will be up to those of us who are participating, as well as to those from the neighborhood and wider community, to provide input that will help us envision how we best reflect being the Body of Christ together at the corner of Summit and Yout and beyond.

What is God calling Emmaus to be and do in the coming decade?







Saving Water Saves Energy

by John Berge

It takes a lot of water to make use of energy and a lot of energy to

make use of water. Saving water saves and saving energy energy saves water.

Fossil fuel (coal, oil and natural gas) and nuclear power plants

use a minimum of 136 billion gallons of water every day to cool the steam after it goes through the turbines that generate 90% of all electricity in the United States. That doesn't include all the water used in extracting fuel from the ground, washing the coal and transporting it across the country.

Meanwhile, pumping, distributing purifying, reclaiming water consumes 13% of the electricity generated each day. That figure includes heating the water in our homes, factories and commercial establishments.

There are a couple of exceptions to the need for water to generate electricity. Once built and installed, wind turbines require no water and solar panels use only a little bit more to occasionally wash off the dirt and grime that may collect on them.

Some time back, I suggested to the head of the Racine wastewater utility that other communities have nearly eliminated the energy needs of their operations by installing cogeneration units to convert the methane from the sewage digestion process to electricity and heat. He said Racine would do so as soon as they can obtain the land for such a unit. Until then, we should all save water and save energy.



ELCA Relief Effort in Haiti Continues

CHICAGO (ELCA) -- The Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) continues to be actively engaged in Haiti, concentrating its efforts on a multiyear rebuilding effort there one year after a devastating earthquake struck. The church's efforts include meeting human needs by providing food, water, temporary shelter and medical supplies while focusing on longer-term efforts such as responding to

housing needs, and providing educational and income-generating opportunities.

Members of the ELCA gave more than \$12.6 million for relief and recovery in Haiti after the earthquake, said the Rev. Daniel Rift, director of the

ELCA World Hunger Appeal. Through January 12, about \$4.2 million has been spent for work in Haiti and for Haitians who were sent to the United States for medical care, he said.

As part of its long-term strategy today, the ELCA is working primarily through the Lutheran Church in Haiti and The Lutheran World Federation-Haiti, said the Rev. Rafael Malpica Padilla, executive director, ELCA Global Mission.

"We are committed to accompanying the people of Haiti as they rebuild their nation, their lives and their livelihoods," he said. "Given local conditions it will take us a little bit longer than we anticipated to accomplish the outcomes we set as a response to the earthquake."

A significant issue that has emerged is lack of land titles and the right to build on that land, he said. Malpica Padilla met with the

chief economist of the government of Haiti on this topic. "The money is there. The people in need are there. But we cannot build a house on land where the person is not the title holder," he said.

Working with the Lutheran Church in Haiti, Malpica Padilla said ELCA

funds are helping to fund training for skills in trades such as masonry and carpentry. Another project aims to provide income generation opportunities through agricultural production.

In partnership with The Lutheran World Federation-Haiti, ELCA funds provided temporary schools to continue the education of youth and provide stability.

Another helpful ELCA link to Haiti has been through the companion synod relationship of





What do Joseph, Mary, Pharaoh, MLK Day, Pakistan, texting, racism, equal rights, respect, abuse, love, justice, truth,

In this month's article, I quote solely from David Suzuki's little book The *Legacy: An Elder's Vision for our Sustainable Future.* Suzuki is a Canadian of Japanese ancestry

and an internationally renowned geneticist and environmentalist.

"The first thing every infant needs is a breath of air to inflate its lungs and then announce its arrival to the world. From that

moment on to his or her dying breath, every person need air fifteen to forty times a minute ... Our great boast is the possession of intelligence, but what intelligent creature, knowing the critical role of air for all life on Earth, would then proceed to deliberately pour toxic materials into it? We are air, so whatever we do to air, we do to ourselves."

"Every person in the world is at least 60 percent water by weight ... The hydrologic cycle of evaporation, condensation and rain ensures that water cartwheels around the planet. We are part of the hydrologic process ... Again, we say we are intelligent, but what intelligent creature, knowing that water is a sacred, life-giving element, would use water as a

toxic dump? We are water, and whatever we do to water, we do to ourselves."

"Soil is alive, created by life and supporting an astounding array of organisms ... every cubic centimeter of soil teems

with billions of microorganisms ... Every bit of the food we eat for our nutrition was once alive, and most of it comes from the soil. We take the carcasses of plants and animals, tear them apart and incorporate them into our very being. We are Earth. We say we are intelligent, but what intelligent creature, knowing the role earth plays in constructing our very bodies, would then use the earth as a dump for our waste and toxic material? We are the earth, and whatever we do to the earth, we do to ourselves."



Green Teams Tout 'Meatless Mondays'

On February 12, ardent representatives of about ten congregations in and around Racine with Green Teams or Green Congregation committees met to review what their congregations have been doing and to adopt plans for the immediate future.

Among the future common projects adopted was to have each congregation urge its members to participate in Meatless (or vegetarian)

Mondays during

Lent this year. By going meatless one day per week, you can reduce your carbon footprint, save money and precious resources such as fresh water and fossil fuels, lower your caloric intake by up to 450 calories. You may reduce your risk of chronic, preventable conditions such as cancer, cardiovascular

disease, diabetes and obesity.

It has been said that reducing our meat intake by one-seventh saves as much energy as buying locally produced food for the whole week. The energy required to produce eight ounces of soy or other types of beans is over 23,000 calories *less* than to produce the same weight of corn-fed beef.

The Meatless Mondays program was started in association with the John Hopkins' Bloomberg School of Public Health and it asks us to do just what its name states – skip eating

meat one day per week.

If you don't have enough meatless or vegetarian recipes, you can go to www.meatlessmonday.com, or www.racinegreencongregations .org, or run your own search of the web for meatless (organic?) recipes.

ELCA Presiding Bishop Accepts Appointment to Presidential Advisory Council

CHICAGO (ELCA) — The Rev. Mark S. Hanson, presiding bishop of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA), said his appointment to a presidential advisory committee strongly affirms the involvement of ELCA members "in serving our neighbors."

On Feb. 4, President Barack Obama announced his intention to appoint Hanson to the President's Advisory Council for Faith-based and Neighborhood Partnerships, which makes recommendations to government on how to improve partnerships. The council brings together religious and secular leaders, as well as scholars and experts in fields related to the work of faith-based and neighborhood organizations.

"We are known as a church whose members roll up their sleeves, get to work, solve problems and give generously," Hanson said. "The council will provide new opportunities for us to expand partnerships in local and global contexts and to address priorities for our nation."

"Lutherans learn from the Bible and our heritage that government can be a way God is active in our world when officials are reminded to work to preserve creation, work for the common good and to build up peace," said the Rev. Andrew D. Genszler. ELCA director for advocacy, Washington, D.C. "Presiding Bishop Hanson's seat on the council provides direct a opportunity to act on this belief -both by challenging and affirming public officials, and building relationships on behalf of people otherwise unheard."

Living as a Christian Is Radical



Whose We Are And Where We Are Going

What one often hears when they are asked about the 40 days of Lent is, "What are you giving up for Lent? Chocolate? Desserts? Something you really like to eat or do?"



region of Tanzania. Our coffee is a fair trade coffee, so the farmers who grow the beans earn a fair wage on the sale of their beans.

The Mt. Meru coffee project began when a coffee farmer in the Mt. Meru region of Tanzania asked a visiting Milwaukee pastor the simple question: "We grow coffee; you drink coffee; would you buy your coffee from us?" With an answer of "Yes," the Mt. Meru Coffee Project was born.

The Mt. Meru Coffee Project, Inc. is incorporated as an independent not-for-profit business entity and is a part of and supported by the Greater Milwaukee Synod. The Project is managed by an all-volunteer board of directors. The day-to-day operations in the US are managed by a Project Coordinator.

An average of nine tons of Mt. Meru Select Tanzanian Coffee are imported, roasted, packaged and sold annually. Sales are made through "Ambassadors" and "Missionaries" in church

If Bacteria Freak You Out, Skip This Article

The phrase "exponential growth" is frequently used to describe populations and other environmental factors — used correctly sometimes, but often incorrectly. Exponential growth

means that the rate of growth at any time is proportional to the number of persons or other elements present at that time. When there are not many present the growth is slow; when there are many, the growth rate is that much faster.

A good illustration of exponential growth would be a test tube full of nutrients to grow bacteria. One bacterium is added to the test tube and it begins to grow, dividing once per minute. The bacterium represents us and the test tube represents the planet. At time zero there is one bacterium; at one minute there are two; at two minutes there are four; three minutes there are eight and so on. That is exponential growth.

At sixty minutes the test tube is full of bacteria and there is no food left. When is the tube 50% or half full? At fifty-nine minutes, of course. At fifty-eight minutes it is one-quarter full. At fifty-five minutes it is only about 3% full. If

at that moment, one of the bacteria points out that they have a population problem, others would jeer, "97% of the test tube is empty and we've been around for fifty-five minutes!" Yet they would be only five minutes

from total collapse.

People must start with two rather than one as for the bacterium, but shortly thereafter the calculus, or arithmetic, is the same. We have had wars, famines and plagues to delay the inevitable, but we also have less drastic means to control our population growth if we are willing to use them. Population may well be the controlling factor in most, if not all, environmental problems.


and equitable housing support. We assert, with respect, that future legislation not place undo challenges on those in our state who can least afford to bear those burdens.

A Stark Reminder

Some of our midweek Lenten studies this year, both for adults and kids, have had the Last Supper and the time following as a focus. It was that Passover feast

shared by Jesus and his disciples the night before Jesus' crucifixion that has come to be known as the Last Supper. In our First Communion classes we have looked back at the scenario of Jesus' entry into Jerusalem on a donkey and the Passover meal that was shared shortly after that. We have also emphasized the servanthood of Jesus in

the account of the foot washing as recorded in the gospel of John's account of the Last Supper.

This journey to the cross during the forty days of Lent highlights our remembering those last days and hours in the life of Jesus. It's not an easy time or a comfortable time as we acknowledge the brokenness in the world we live in, which is the same sin and brokenness that brutally took Jesus to his death on our behalf.

This season of Lent is a time of prayer, of repentance and of remembering. It is also a time of facing the harsh reality of the crucifixion. Before we can celebrate the empty cross on Easter morning, we must first remember Jesus' journey to the cross. We

must never forget Jesus being betrayed, deserted, arrested, tried and mocked just as we must never forget the painful suffering on the cross leading to Jesus' death.

The crucifix at the front of the church during this Lenten season, draped in purple, (not only the color of royalty, but also the

color of penance), with the dry reeds at the foot (symbolizing death and the wilderness) is a stark reminder. Martin Luther emphasized in his "theology of the cross" that God is found in the very suffering of Jesus on the cross. This visual reminder of a dying Savior on the cross is not easy to look at!

Perhaps you, like I, have been raised in a Lutheran church devoid of the image of Christ on the cross. I most often associated that image as one that was Roman Catholic, and I was taught in the

the resurrection with an empty cross as a reminder.) I must admit that when the figure of a dying Christ on the cross, draped in purple, was placed in the front of our church this Lenten season, it made me pause and remember. Every time I look at it I am reminded of the suffering and death of Jesus in a way that didn't happen when there was not such a stark visual right in front of me. This cross is the center of our faith, according to Martin Luther.

Oh, how I yearn for the empty cross with the white cloth draped over it. Oh, how I yearn to sing Alleluia again. Oh, how I yearn to hear of the empty tomb. Oh, how I yearn to hear again how God has conquered death itself in

the Resurrection of Jesus. Isn't it Easter yet?? However, I'm reminded that as I write this we are still in Lent. We are still focusing on the way of the cross and the crucifixion. Yet the discomfort and the suffering do not/will not have the last word. Even as we stare death in the face. we have the hope of the Resurrection, the image of an empty tomb and of an empty cross ahead of us. Easter IS coming, and I give God thanks for that hope that comes through and beyond the cross!






Triptych Proposed by Leadership Groups

Don't Cry Over Spilt Mercury

Some people are averse to using compact fluorescent lamps (CFLs) because of fear concerning the small amount of mercury that they contain and the possibility of

breakage. There is much more mercury in the long fluorescent lamps one may have in the workshop or the circular lamps in many kitchens. We have had up to three dozen fluorescent lamps in our house for years and never broken one.

If you do break a CFL, the EPA suggests the following cleanup procedure.

Have other people and pets leave the room, closing the door to the rest of the house. Air out the room for 5-10 minutes by opening a window or door to the outdoors. Shut off the central forced air heating or air conditioning and collect your cleanup materials (stiff paper or cardboard, sticky tape, damp paper towels or wet wipes and a sealable container).

Be thorough in collecting broken glass and visible powder. The sticky tape does an excellent job in picking up the small pieces that one can hardly see. Place all bulb debris and cleanup materials in the sealable container (plastic bag or glass jar). Promptly place this container outdoors or in a garage or storage shed until it can be taken to the Household Hazardous Waste site (open on the third Saturday of every month from April to October, 8:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m.).

The City of Racine trash collection allows burned out or broken fluorescent bulbs in the trash, but if you have seen the way the trucks crush the long fluorescent bulbs, you know that

is not a good idea.

Continue to air out the room where the bulb broke and keep the forced air circulation system off for several hours to be on the safe side. A broken bulb is rare and should not cause panic or reluctance to use CFLs. Just use some common sense.

Most incandescent bulbs will soon be unavailable. Then there are LEDs (light emitting diodes) which contain no mercury, are awfully difficult to break, but are still rather pricey.

On the Other Side of Fear

Wasn't the tomb found empty? Weren't the reports that He had risen from the dead? Hadn't death been conquered after all?

If all this was true (and it was!), why were the followers of Jesus so distraught? Why were they so afraid? Do you suppose

they wondered what would be next? Were they afraid to go out into the neighborhood because they could get hurt or even killed? Maybe it was safer to stay huddled inside together.

It's into the middle of the unsettling fear about what is next that the resurrected Christ shows up! Even when the disciples were huddled together in fear,

with the doors locked tight, Jesus manages to enter in. He comes and pronounces a word of peace. His very presence offers hope for the future.

How often are we bunkered down, peeking to the outside world, but afraid to really engage and confront the powers out there. It just seems too impossible! How often do we tend to be like those early disciples, who were probably wondering if God were in charge after all. We look at that outside

world and wonder where there is a sign of hope in the aftermath of violence and death.

In this Resurrection season, expect the resurrected Jesus to show up when you least expect him—in the midst of the dark places of fear and grief and

despair. Somehow God manages to break in even there, and maybe especially Who there. brings you a word of peace and hope when you are most down and despairing? Do you see the face the of Resurrected One in that person?

"I'm so afraid"...of the diagnosis I just received, of the upcoming divorce, of the possibility of having to move from my home, of financial instability, of the path my grandchildren seem to be on, of changes taking place within the church, of losing health care, of what is happening to education in our community... Those fears may grip us and prevent us from living today to the fullest.

The One who conquered death itself isn't afraid to walk into our dark places. He shows up with words of assurance, "Be not afraid," and offers the peace that only he can give.

Let's read and absorb those post-resurrection accounts with special attention this Easter season. The empty tomb isn't the end of the story—it's the beginning! More than ever, we need to step

out beyond those fears and welcome the resurrected Christ in the weeks following Easter Sunday. We need to move out beyond those paralyzing fears and allow the risen Christ to bring a word of hope and life.

Remember to Reuse, Recycle

On our recent mission trip to Argentina, we witnessed men eking out a living recycling trash from along the roads and in the fields. Some had motorized carts,

other carts were pulled by horses and even a few were man-powered. They picked up and recycled cans, bottles, plastics, scrap metal and just about everything except the ubiquitous plastic grocery bags.

Here in our area, volunteers do the cleanup along our highways. The local group of the Sierra Club recently picked up eleven large bags of trash and almost as much recyclable material along a threemile stretch of Highway 38. (If you would like to help on our three times a year program, give me a call at 633-8455.)

With the good recycle programs of our local municipalities, we should all be recycling everything possible and properly disposing of the rest. The

city does not accept plastic grocery bags in its recycling program, most grocery stores do. Talk to the employees or manager so that they know you want and appreciate this service.

As for those bags the newspaper is delivered in, many are reused to clean up after pets. If you don't reuse all of yours, check with your delivery person to see whether he or she would like to reuse them. They have to buy these bags, so they and the environment would appreciate their being used more than once.

In Midst of Turmoil, Our Refuge and Strength

Psalm 46:1 "God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble."

In times of turmoil, where do we find our refuge? When troubled, where is our support?

In a conversation with a friend recently, she shared the story of

her good friend who lives in Georgia. The mother of two, her friend was widowed at a young age. After remarriage and the birth of a third child, life seemed to once again be going very smoothly. However, there was further major disruption in the family when the 43father vear-old diagnosed with incurable caner. The disease has weakened the once vibrant dad and husband.

He now is unable to work and is undergoing treatment to prolong his life for what may be 12 to 24 months. The family is about to lose their home, and it feels as though the entire world has shaken beneath their feet.

When my friend asked the struggling mom and wife what would be of most help to her right now—perhaps some financial assistance—the response was, "What I need most right now is someone to talk with, someone I

can safely vent to and cry with—would you be able to come for a visit?" A shoulder to cry on, a listening year, a friend who shows compassion—she was asking for a safe refuge in her time of trouble.

So often it is in one another that God provides us with that

place of refuge and strength in our time of need. Early on in my ministry in Racine, Emmaus had sweatshirts made that carried the message "Emmaus, A Safe Harbor." I saw one of those worn recently and was reminded that we continue to be called to offer that place of refuge and safety in God's name to all those who seek it.

Emmaus has come to be known as a place where all are welcome in Christ's name to be embraced by unconditional love. Here we bring a word of hope as we listen to those who have been shaken by turmoil in their lives.

This past week I heard yet another story from a young mom who was at the point of feeling overwhelmed, as though she was drowning. She sat in conversation with another staff person and myself telling of the past month in

the life of her family—her husband has been laid off due to a workrelated injury, but has not yet received any disability compensation. Their home was broken into and ransacked when the family was away for a couple of hours-jewelry and electronics were taken. She has just learned that funding for her full-time job with benefits for a not-for-profit organization may end in a month. She didn't come asking for money; she simply came to be listened to, to be surrounded by people who care and to receive a word of hope and encouragement and hope during this tumultuous time in the life of her family.

We are called to be a safe refuge, letting all God's people know that they do not walk alone. We are called to pray for one another and to mutually support one another, in good times and in bad. Emmaus has become like a beacon of light at the corner of Summit and Yout. I believe that God is calling us to keep the lights on, bringing that message of hope and compassion to all those who are in need. Thank you for being partners as we reach out to one another in this important ministry to which we have been entrusted!

Everyone will be invited to not only share a dish, but also to share in more brainstorming ideas. What will have been accomplished in terms of action items between the June and the July meetings will also be highlighted.

The council also talked about the possibility of a council leadership retreat in the near future, emphasizing the need for commitment and to be a part of the solution to the challenges being faced.

Pastor Mary to Modify Schedule

At the June 12 congregational meeting, Pastor Mary explained that she would like to have more personal time off than in prior years. For the past twenty years, she has had one day off each week. To allow for more personal time

"to possibly take an art class, to accomplish some home projects, to read, or to take a short road trip," she requested that she be put on 34 time status, with the first

full week of the month off, to allow her to pursue some of those personal goals. A guest preacher would take responsibility for preaching either the first or second weekend of each month. Pastor Jhon Freddy and other pastors would be on call for pastoral emergencies during that week.

The congregation approved the proposal, which modified her salary compensation. She will receive 75% of the minimum base salary recommended by the Greater Milwaukee Synod for a person of her tenure. After the added expense of guest preachers is factored in, the annual savings to the congregation will be approximately \$10,000.

The first week off for Pastor Mary will be the week of July 4, with Pastor Cliff Hanus preaching the weekend of July 9 and 10. In August, Pastor

Mary will be out of town the first two weeks of the month. She will spend August 2 and 3 taking a class at Luther Seminary in St. Paul. The class has a focus on the use of websites and social networking for churches. The remainder of her time will be spent visiting family and friends in Minnesota. Claranna Vytlacil will preach the weekend of August 6 and 7.

Elevator Undergoes Major Repairs

After a number of service calls trying to remedy the finicky controls for the elevator, it was determined that it was impossible to solve the problems without replacing the entire motherboard. When that panel was replaced, the elevator resumed operation without the earlier problems. The elevator was installed in 1987

when the south section of the building was added to the church.



Cityowned golf courses are not included in the proposed smoking

ban.

As President of the Board of Health, I am well aware that our recommendation was based on the effects of secondhand smoke, even out of doors, on public hygiene and safety (stepping on cigarette butts on the beach or having young children picking them up or even putting them in their mouths)

and the bad example permitting smoking in such areas presents to our youth.

now."

time to leave was

others, I have been glued to TV newscasts and to

livestream reports as I log onto my computer. I see my former elementary school, my junior high school and my old neighborhood completely under water. I email and send Facebook messages to relatives and friends who used to live in Minot, trying to get news of those who are still there.

It's hard to fathom that up to one-third of my hometown of 44,000 residents is now under water. It's hard to imagine that about 12,000 people have been forced to evacuate. It's devastating to think that much of the damage

won't even be covered by insurance. It's truly mind boggling to think this is affecting so many people I know personally, including cousins and the two pastors and their families from my home church.

What makes me proud to be from Minot are three words that constantly seem to surface in the

midst of this adversity: faith, community and hope. I might add to that list "determination, compassion and perseverance." Even during these times of living in cramped quarters, of

suffering from sleep deprivation, of boiling water and of wondering what's next, people continue to reach out to one another and to be more than just good neighbors. Sore backs and aching muscles will attest to the help that has surfaced during the evacuation.

Many have literally welcomed others into their homes for an indefinite length of time. Makeshift worship and prayer services are being held in spite of a number of churches being under water. Emergency clinics and

pharmacies have been opened. Volunteers see a need and do what they can to fill it. Because of them, water bottles are being delivered to the people living in trailers in the parking lot near the edge of Sandwiches are being town. offered to the workers of those operating the heavy equipment. That is what community is all about, something that is being exemplified by that very community that molded and shaped me during my childhood. It's the community of believers that finds it possible to move forward in spite of adversity; it's the community that embodies the commandment "Love another."

Sometimes it takes a disaster of the magnitude of the one in my hometown of Minot, North Dakota, to put things into perspective. At a prayer service held at Zion Lutheran, my home church, Bishop Mark Narum, of the Western Synod Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, said the whole point of the worship was to unite the human spirit.

"Events like this help pull us together. People need to be together, and remember what grounds us," Narum said. "We are going to confront fear, anger, and all sorts of things, so again we need to be reminded of who we are, and who we care about."

Remembering that we are all part of an interconnected community, we continue to pray for and to support our brothers and sisters living in adversity—where ever they may be--knowing that we are called to share God's love and hope with ALL of God's people.


September Worship Centers on Season of Creation

This coming September 11 will be the tenth anniversary of the terrorist attacks on our country.


The people who carried out these attacks tried to hijack not only airplanes, but also the Muslim faith. They sought to create a climate of fear and hostility in





Pick Up Fall Envelopes in Narthex





ELCA Launches Malaria Campaign, Tightens Budget at Churchwide Assembly

ORLANDO, Fla. (ELCA) - The 2011 Churchwide Assembly met in Orlando, Florida from August 15 to 19. Voting members from Racine included John Berge of Mt. Pleasant Lutheran Church and Rev. Sue Ruehle of Lutheran Church of the Redeemer.

Every 45 seconds, a child dies from malaria, a preventable and

treatable disease. Now the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) will join with Lutheran churches in Africa, to work toward a malariafree future. This effort is part of the ELCA Malaria Campaign, officially launched by the ELCA Churchwide

Assembly by a 968-19 vote. A goal of the campaign is to raise \$15 million over a four-year period.

"Throughout our life as the ELCA, we have focused our work with our global partners around the concept of accompaniment, our relationships with companion churches all over the world," said the Rev. Andrea DeGroot-Nesdahl as she introduced the campaign to voting members. DeGroot-Nesdahl is the campaign's coordinator.

By a 942-34 vote, the assembly adopted "Genetics, Faith and Responsibility" a social statement

on genetics. The statement is one of the first by an American church that develops a comprehensive ethical framework for addressing human power and issues such as medical, agricultural and cultural concerns.

Voting member from the Greater Milwaukee Synod Bruce Campbell reported, "My own take



on the statement is this: The scientific, business, and bioethics communities are already talking about the potential new technologies swirling around genetics. This statement brings the church to the table."

The assembly approved, by a vote of 919 to 33, a two-year ELCA budget which included significant cuts in many programs including campus ministry.

ELCA Adopts Social Statement on Genetics

At its August 15-19 Churchwide Assembly, The Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) overwhelmingly adopted a new and groundbreaking Social Statement, "Genetics. Faith and Responsibility" ... by 96.52% of the over one thousand delegates at the Assembly in Orlando.

Initiated by a memorial the from Northeast Iowa Synod to 2005 Churchwide the Assembly, and arising from the conflict in agriculture between farmers using genetically modified organisms, organic farmers, and those just not wishing to be beholden to particular agribusiness, quickly study

expanded to the multitude of places where modern-day, cutting-edge genetics intersects with our lives. These present and expected fields include gene therapy, pre-implantation diagnosis, inherited mutations, molecular medicine, personal genomics, cloning of plants and animals, and "pharming" of drugs in plants or animals that never had such genes in their DNA before.

It is difficult to condense a 15,000 word document down to the 300-600 words I usually write, but it is safe to say that I was pleasantly surprised to read the scriptural, philosophical, scientific and moral discussion that fills this social statement.

God is a creator god that continues to create; we are to be part of that continuing creation.

> The statement does not endorse without qualification any of the numerous genetic technologies. Nor does it come out in direct condemnation anything genetic research or practice, with the exception of the practice of eugenics, discrimination based on genetic profiling,

human cloning and similar areas.

The statement does provide the basis of continued discussion and (hopefully) provides help to those who will be required to give counseling in areas for which their training may never have prepared them. At one point the statement reads, "Christians are called to discern how God's gifts of genetic knowledge and technology may be wisely evaluated and responsibly

LWR Delivers East African Drought Relief

BALTIMORE, August 16, 2011 — As the number of people in danger of


starvation continues to increase in East Africa, Lutheran World Relief (LWR) is working with partners on the ground to carry out an immediate

and long-term crisis response. "With more than 12 million people now at risk of starvation, LWR and partners are acting now to reach people in need," says LWR president John Nunes.

The worst drought in 60 years has taken hold in Kenya, Somalia, Ethiopia and Djibouti, sending millions of people to the brink of starvation. Last week, the United Nations declared famine in two additional regions of Somalia, bringing the number of regions experiencing famine to five.

LWR already committed \$500,000 to its immediate response

through partner The Lutheran World Federation to expand its



longer term response.

In Kenya, more than 1,500 people a day are arriving at the refugee camps in Dadaab in dire need of food, water and medical attention. Some have walked upwards of 15 days to reach the camps. Most are in poor physical condition, especially children, many of whom are arriving malnourished.



used to serve the good of all."

Discernment is an important aspect of this statement. Personal decisions, and those of the Church, should be dependent upon respect, justice, sufficiency, sustainability, solidarity, participation, wisdom, knowledge, humility and the precautionary principle, each of which is discussed in some length in the statement.

Even to summarize each would take much more space than is available here. The full social statement will be available from the ELCA this fall and I recommend it to all.

A theme of creation-centered (environmental) stewardship is

developed in this statement, rejecting the anthropocentric view that the world was made for humans and that the rest of creation simply provides resources to serve human well-being. Yet apparently "only human beings can value other beings and systems beyond their own kind for their own sake as created and sustained by God."

As one speaker pointed out, "Remember, these documents are gospel, not law." The statement reminds us that "genetic science represents gifts intended by God to contribute to the human vocation to order and shape, nurture and invent."




Imagine parents and children



Pastor Mary's Column

Strength in Unity

As I stood on Monument Square the afternoon of September 11, I not only remembered the tragedy of ten years ago. I was also struck by the respect and the calm resolve and unity displayed ten

years later. Muslims, Buddhists, Christians and others gathered, and we heard the voices of those who are passionate about peace and tolerance and a shared future—no matter our religious beliefs or affiliations.

There is so much more power when we are able to honor one another rather than to flex our muscles or draw firm lines in the sand when there are differences. Don't you yearn for all members of Congress to practice compromise for the good of the whole, rather than to grasp for their personal power through the politics that blame and intimidate and degrade?

How will we, as people of faith, set a different standard in response to an aching country that cries and groans in despair? How will we come together, even in spite of our diversity, elevating each and every one of God's precious people? How will we grapple with the hard questions, allowing doubt and areas of gray to be part of our reality? How will we live out being loving, rather than being right, as our focus? How will we reflect Jesus' compassion for those who are

hurting and on the edge?

It is my daily prayer that our faith community and those involved in the Racine Area Mission Strategy (RAMS) process will be able to trust in the power of the Spirit, shedding



fear and despair and cynicism. It is my hope that we, as congregations, will have the ability to think big and to think beyond our own needs and survival. I believe that we of the Emmaus community are called to take the lead in modeling hospitality and a willingness to work together in Racine for the sake of mission.

Let's imagine a unified effort, and then let us live into it! Let's pay attention to where the Spirit is blowing and calling us! Most of all, let us trust and boldly move ahead, knowing that we do not travel this journey alone!





Emmaus Addresses Deficit

In response to some of the more immediate needs of Emmaus, the Latino community has earmarked recent gifts as follows: \$2,000 to the general fund from the Latino ministry checking account, \$1,250 to the general fund from proceeds from the festival, and \$1,250 to



EASY/children's education from festival proceeds. In addition, \$1,500 in earnings from the Scrip account has been deposited in the general fund. These one-time gifts make it possible to pay some of most our urgent outstanding bills.

Emmaus Leaders Articulate Mission

Leaders from ten ELCA congregations gathered at Emmanuel Saturday, October 22 for three hours of face-to-face conversations regarding mission, possible collaboration and future direction. Congregations

Congregational and Synodical Mission of the ELCA, Bishop Jeff Barrow and Rev. Sandy Chrostowski, Director of Evan-

gelical Mission. Council members invite any and all interested members from Emmaus to join them in the conversations, which begin at 9:00 a.m. November 19.

What are next steps? How do we participate boldly in God's imagination? Where do we go from here to be the missional church God calls us to be?







Team from Emmaus Packs Food for Haiti

Age made no difference—people ranging from 6 and 7 years old to 60 and 70 years old joined together for the October 13 Food for Kidz pack at the State Fairgrounds in Milwaukee. Seventy-seven people from Emmaus filled two school buses for the event, traveling to pack food to be sent to the people of Haiti.

Donning hairnets and plastic gloves, the kids and adults divided



in groups of 6 to 8 people, each forming their own little assembly line. Loud cheers could be heard each time one of the boxes was filled and ready to be sent. The Emmaus group not only gave of their time, but they also contributed \$1,000 toward the purchase of food to be used for the packing. Pennies, dimes, and quarters were combined with larger gifts made by Emmaus

members and friends for the Haiti food pack.

Following is a portion of a letter from organizer of the event, Karl Ralian:

We wish to thank you all for your support with our "Million Meal Pack for Haiti." While we didn't get close to one million meals, we did see to it that over 300,000 children got to eat a delicious, nutritious meal. We're proud to be able to ship this


amount of food to Haiti, and we thank all of our supporters who donated their time and money to make this happen.



2.5 Billion Lack Improved Sanitation

Here along the shores of Lake Michigan, we are blessed with an abundant supply of clean water for drinking, washing and sanitary facilities to safely get rid of our bodily wastes. The waste water departments in Racine and Kenosha return water to the lake that is purer than that which was taken out.

Not all the world is so fortunate. A recent UNICEF report stated, "Two and a half billion people, 38% of the world's population, remain without improved sanitation facilities, mostly in sub-Saharan Africa and Southern Asia ... 1.2 billion people still practice open defecation, the riskiest practice of all."

Unimproved sanitation facilities are those that "do not ensure hygienic separation of human excreta from human contact." Thus, improved facilities do not even have to be the flush toilets we are so used to. In our

travels, my wife and I have come across, and had to use, some of these unimproved facilities: holes in the floor that lead outside to a stream, wetland, or to some

> unknown place other than a treatment plant.

Every single minute somebody dies due to lack of basic sanitation. That is over 86,000 people a day or over 31 million every year dying due to lack of proper

toilets. About 5,000 children die each day from diarrhea-related This may not be a pleasant subject for a church newsletter, but one gram (1/28 of an ounce) of feces can contain 10 million viruses, one million bacteria, 1,000 parasite cysts and 100 parasite eggs!

That is why November 19 has been declared World Toilet Day. We can support those who are trying to correct this horrible situation that afflicts more than one-third of the population of the world.

The format includes 12 units of study with five, three-hour sessions per unit.

Kathy Christensen and Carol Eschmann are graduates of the Diakonia program, and Diane Thygeson, teacher in the EASY program, is completing her second year of studies.

Called by God to be Life Giving Change Agents

God's work, our hands...that's one of the more recent "slogans" of the ELCA. But, it is far more than a slogan—for the Christian church to survive and thrive in this world, our committed involvement in God's kingdom here on earth is something we must take very seriously.

In his book *Everything Must Change*, Brian McLaren writes:

More and more reflective Christian leaders are beginning to realize that for the millions of young adults who dropped out of their churches in the late twentieth and early twenty-first centuries, the Christian religion appears to be a failed religion...

Before long, those remaining in local churches and those outside of them share the same sense of doubt: message purporting to be the best news in the world should be doing better than this. The religion's results are not commensurate with bold claims it makes. Truly good news, they feel, would confront systemic injustice, target significant global dsysfunctions, and provide hope and resources for making a better worldalong with helping individuals experience a full life. If only they could find a faith community with good news like that...(pp. 34 and 35)

Even in times of economic difficulties, I see strong signs of Emmaus maturing and becoming just the kind of faith community that people are hungering for. You are people who passionately care about all of God's people. You spend time mentoring children from our neighborhood schools. You stock food shelves and feed hungry families here in Racine. You ride school buses up to Milwaukee to pack food for the children of Haiti. You spend time in conversation with our Latino friends, listening to their stories and helping them to understand all of our confusing expressions in English. You offer a ride to a child or a homebound person so that they may participate in activities and worship at Emmaus. You buy Mt. Meru coffee so that coffee farmers in Tanzania can earn a decent living.

You, people of Emmaus, are about change. You see hope in the eyes of a child who needs extra encouragement and love, and you are there for them. You are the hands and feet of Christ in this

Council, Staff Set Goal of Balanced Budget

Sharpened pencils, lengthy conversations, together with giveand-take and prayer, will be what


drive the writing of our 2012 budget. The goal is a balanced budget so that the leaders of Emmaus can spend their time and energy during the coming year being innovative, resourceful, collaborative and visionary, working together to create new possibilities for the future of the ELCA in Racine.

How will a balanced budget be accomplished? Some of the pieces that are already in place, or are taking shape and form, include:

• Pastor Mary will donate part of her time to the wider ELCA Racine conversation and collaboration, thus reducing her salary/benefits package by approximately \$10,000.

• The Latino worshiping community of Emmaus has committed to an annual gift of

\$10,000 for the overall operation of the church.



- The Fiesta Mexicana will be re-established for earnings of approximately \$5,000.
- There will be a fall fundraiser with an expected net of \$2,000.
- A sustaining fund has been established with the intention of eliminating the deficit and of establishing a reserve fund for capital improvements/repairs.
- The budget will be studied by the executive committee on December 1, who will then make recommendations for modifications and/or cuts.

RAMS Process Leads to Collaboration

Following approximately ten months of conversation and process, the Racine Area Mission Strategy (RAMS) group met on November 19 to make proposals for next steps. Led by Rev. Sandy Chrostowski, Rev. Stephen Bouman and Bishop Jeff Barrow, leaders of ten Racine ELCA congregations were invited to

present proposals and visions for the church of the future in Racine.

Representing Emmaus, Atonement, St. Andrew and Our Savior's, pastors from those congregations used song, PowerPoint, scripture, and handouts to help communicate "A Vision of Profound Partnership Among ELCA Congregations in Racine."

congregations are working together to form a deep partnership to covenant with one another into the future.

The mission goals of the four congregations include: social justice, ministry with the poor and marginalized, feeding the hungry, global mission, entrepreneurship opportunities for the unemployed and underemployed, reaching out to neighborhood kids and their families, ministry with people of color, a variety of worship styles,

discipleship training, care of creation and health and wellness.

A November 29 meeting was scheduled for the leaders of these four congregations to talk about next steps, which may include possibilities of sharing staff, using different sites to specialize in specific ministries, new funding possibilities, and the creation of a

new worship experience for young adults. Those who would like to be a part of future conversations are welcome and are encouraged to contact Pastor Mary or Pastor Jhon Freddy to learn more.

Bishop Jeff Barrow informed the group at the RAMS meeting of the number of

congregations in Racine that are either in the call process or currently have an interim pastor. These congregations are: Emmanuel, Redeemer, Bethania, Zion, St. Paul's, and Gethsemane.

Because none of these congregations currently has a full-time pastor, Bishop Barrow indicated the advisability of congregations yoking and sharing a pastor. By offering an incoming pastor a full-time call, Barrow told the group that there would be

Sustainability Fund Established

With dual goals of eliminating the deficit by year's end and of establishing a nest egg for capital improvements/repairs, Emmaus has established a sustaining fund. Gifts of \$500 or more earmarked "sustaining fund" will be divided as follows: 80% for deficit reduction and 20% for a capital improvement reserve savings

fund. Gifts of under \$500 should be earmarked "deficit reduction" and will go entirely for that purpose.

The fund, established less than two weeks ago, already has one-time gifts/commitments of \$8,000. Our deficit has been reduced from a high of \$29,000 two months ago to the current amount of just under \$12,000. With the exception of our

synod benevolence and internal

borrowing, all of our current bills have now been paid.


Wednesday Campers Explore Genesis Stories



Letter from Bishop Hanson

Hanson Urges Immigration Reform, DREAM Act

November 1, 2011

Dear President Obama:

As the presiding bishop of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) and a member of the Advisory Council on Faith-

based and Neighborhood Partnerships, I write to lift up the support of our national church body for comprehensive immigration reform and the DREAM Act.

We are a church that belongs to Christ, and we believe God calls each of us by name.

Therefore, the ELCA has repeatedly affirmed the biblical witness and our shared experience of working with and on behalf of America's newcomers through our ministry with Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Service.

The 2011 Churchwide Assembly of the ELCA voted overwhelmingly in support of immigration reform and the DREAM Act. The churchwide assembly is the ELCA's highest legislative authority serving on behalf of 4.2 million baptized ELCA members.

The biblical call to hospitality also inspired Lutheran congregations across the country to discuss transforming communities into centers of hospitality through relationship

buil-ding and advocacy. In addition, congregations are holding DREAM Act Sabbaths to lift up the experiences of undocumented youth and encourage broader public support for the legislation.

The need to overhaul the U.S. immigration system is becoming

ever more urgent. In the absence of comprehensive immigration reform, states have felt compelled to write their own immigration laws, which are often shortsighted and misguided. The ELCA needs your leadership. We urge you to continue to speak to Congress and the American public to take action on comprehensive immigration reform and the DREAM Act and to explore other compassionate policy reforms that advance the common good.


Carthage College Presents Christmas Concert

paper goods and plasticware.


