Make 2014 the year you take that extra step to get involved. Call Cathy Meyer (321-0050) to find out where you fit in.



Keep Heat from Escaping Up the Chimney

It is that time of the year when, if you have a fireplace, someone wants a nice romantic fire. Or you may think that, since that big old tree was cut down in the back yard, this would be a nice way to heat the house. Wrong!

With the usual type of wood-burning fireplace, about 90% of the heat of combustion from those logs goes right up the chimney to heat the great outdoors. This also includes much of the heat you produced with your furnace. A fireplace burning wood produces about 20% radiant energy, which you feel when you sit or stand nearby, and 80% hot gases which go up the chimney.

A wood fire also needs a lot of air to burn, about 200 to 600 cubic feet per minute and frequently draws more. Unless you have added a source of outside air to the fireplace other than the house (a considerable expense and possible source of additional heat leaks), that means you are exhausting the equivalent of all the air in a 15- by 20-foot room every six to ten minutes.

If there is enough leakage around doors and windows, that is a lot of cold air coming in. If your house is quite tight, that air may be pulled down the flue for your furnace and gas water heater into

your house with all the pollutants such as carbon monoxide and sulfides that may be there. If you leave the damper open until morning while the ashes and embers cool, it's like leaving a window open all night.

So what can you do if you still want a fire in the fireplace or to heat with wood? For the latter situation there

the latter situation there are Franklin-type stoves which increase the radiation into the room considerably. They are installed with usually combustion air tube coming down the chimney so as to not use air from inside the house; but there is no romantic fire to look at. Glass doors on a fireplace help some, as do heat exchangers that bring in room air, heat it in the grate, and pump it out into the room.

We installed a gas-burning insert in the fireplace. It uses outdoors combustion air, has a glass door, a thermoregulated blower, and looks almost like the real thing with flickering flames, glowing logs and embers. They are not cheap, but they add little, if anything, to the heating bill and don't produce the particulate pollution of a log fire. There are also DVD's of burning fires that you can play on the TV with no pollution and little cost.

Expect Grace

This "Parson to Person" column Pastor Walter wrote for the Journal Times in August, 2007, was read at his funeral by his daughter, Laura.

I was having one of those days when everything seems to go wrong. I got a late start in the morning, left some important papers on the kitchen table, and learned that a proposal on which I had spent hours and hours

preparing had been turned down.

And then something happened which made all of these minor annoyances fade into the background. I drove to a coffee shop to meet some friends. As I transferred from the driver's seat to my wheelchair, my foot got caught on the seat

brace. Instead of having a cup of chai with my friends, I found myself on the floor of my van.

Pinned between the wheelchair and the driver's seat, I was completely helpless. After a minute or two of being angry, I started to cry.

I'm not telling you all of this to seek your sympathy or pity. I'm sure many of you can tell me stories of even worse days in your life. Perhaps it's the day when you lost your job or was a victim of a crime or experienced the agony of a loved one dying. This is not a competition to see who has had "the worst day ever." It's about what God does when we experience a Worst Day. This has to do with grace.

I am privileged to spend some time each week with seniors at several Lincoln Lutheran facilities.

> Last week, I asked them if they could describe the times in their life when God felt particularly close them. Ι had imagined that the answers would be centered on memories of vivid sunsets Thanksgiving dinner tables laden with food and surrounded by loved

ones.

Instead, most of the people remembered feeling closest to God in times of loss or crisis. "I felt God's presence most clearly when my wife died." "God was closest to me during the war, when I was about to go into combat."

What was happening here? They had experienced just what I had found to be true on my Worst Day: we often experience God's

presence and grace most clearly during times of sorrow or trial.

After I had a good cry on the floor of my van, I discovered that I could reach my hand back and pull out my cell phone. Using my one free hand, I called a friend who was willing to drop everything to come and help me. With a combination of ingenuity and muscle, he got me off of the floor and back into the driver's seat. I drove home humbled yet again by the incredible kindness of friends.

Still shaking from my experience, I entered the house and greeted my wife Lynn, telling her about my hard day. When I finished, she didn't respond with the expected sympathy or commiseration. Instead, she said, "Go look in bedroom."

I entered the bedroom with some hesitation. When it comes to decorating, I'm not the most observant person in the world. Had she made a new pillow for the bed, or hung a new picture on the wall? What if I didn't notice what she had changed? It would be one more thing to add to my litany of bad events that day.

As I feared, I didn't notice it at first. But then I looked above the

sliding glass door that gives me access to our back yard. There on the wall, stenciled in beautiful dark green capital letters, were the words "EXPECT GRACE."

I couldn't stop smiling. This was a two-word sermon which summed up everything that had happened to me that day. It recalled the apostle Paul's promises that there is nothing in death or life that can separate us from God's love, and that God will always give us access to the grace and strength we need to endure

whatever trial or evil confronts us.

EXPECT GRACE reminds us that even though "bad things happen to good people," all people can look to God for good things, especially when bad things happen!

EXPECT GRACE doesn't downplay the difficulties of our situation, or make light of our pain. It just doesn't let them have the final word.

EXPECT GRACE challenges us to open our inner and outer eyes to the presence of God in the midst of our suffering. As I learned from my Lincoln Lutheran friends, our trials can be gates through which God can enter our lives.

EXPECT GRACE invites us to be the bearers of grace to others in need. God can work through you to bring grace to others. Perhaps you can make a phone call to someone who is lonely, thank someone for a job well done, or even carry a picket sign for a just cause.

I was especially grateful that Lynn placed the sign above the glass door. It reminds me every morning that our world, which is so burdened by violence, pollution and hatred, is still filled to the brim with God's incredible amazing grace.

Just for fun, why not try to EXPECT GRACE today? Assume that God (or Spirit, or Creator) intends to touch you in your place of greatest need. All you have to do is receive the touch.

Watch out: you may be changed forever!

Door Replacement Plans Are Reassessed

During the many weeks we have been limping along with malfunctioning front and back doors, a number of proposals and estimates have been considered to

remedy the problems. Complete replacement of the doors and hardware, together with upgrading the lock system for security, was first considered. However, the cost for new doors, including the new high tech security measures proposed, was prohibitive.

In their January meeting, the church council decided that other options needed to be studied. Since that time, Loren Larsen and Pastor Mary have met with representatives of the lock and security company and received a new quote that fits within the designated dollars budgeted for the project. That would include using the existing doors while completely changing and upgrading all the hardware, including handles, locks and openers. New weather stripping would also make the doors more airtight.

Rather than traditional keys, the reworked doors would function with a system of fobs that would allow for tighter security and access, giving the ability to delete lost fobs through computer programming. As Pastor Mary puts it, "This would be like total knee and hip replacement and a pacemaker put into the existing body, still making use of what

works, but replacing what doesn't."

Because old keys will no longer work in this proposed radical update of our doors, those people who are

in need of "keys" at the time of the project completion will have to request new ones. Rather than a traditional key, a small fob, which can be attached to a key chain, will be issued. A contribution of \$5.00 per fob will be required, and each fob will be computer programmed to the name of the holder. It will then be possible to track times and dates of all entries made with a fob, including which issued fob has been used to enter the church.

The executive committee of the council has given the locksmith the go ahead to order parts, and the installation will take place after the weather moderates.

We are grateful for a very generous gift of memorial money in memory of Al Beck, which makes up the majority of the designated gifts for the project.

then take simple steps toward fulfilling a faith-based pledge to cut your energy use, often saving money in the process! There are lots of ideas, come of which cost little to nothing. At the end of the year, we'll see what we have been able to save.

inner workings of a diverse inner city community. They were fortunate to experience hands on with the EASY kids. And. likewise, the kids were thrilled to the have extra attention.



FaithWorks Receives ELCA Grant for Funding


An initial grant request of the

ELCA on behalf of FaithWorks was made last June. Grant monies were sought to cover expenses for a proposed community youth pastor and for the work by a local consultant in the area of developing a wellness initiative. The grant request, made

possible due to the creation of a new grant category with a focus on ELCA Area Mission Strategies, was then sent to Chicago and reviewed by an ELCA panel. While the initial request of over \$100,000 was slashed considerably, the review panel did put a conditional hold on \$32,000 for funding in 2014. They made the release of the funds contingent on a refinement of the original grant proposal and budget, which was then resubmitted to the ELCA in December.

The reworked proposal modified the full-time staff position of an ordained pastor to

half-time in the area of youth /



also requested in the revised budget proposal.

Based on a January communication from the churchwide office of the ELCA, the \$32,000 that was previously on hold has been released. Further refinement of the missional plan will be required in order to receive partnership support beyond 2014. A May deadline has been set for the submission of that proposal. The national church will also want the pastor redeveloper and other key leaders of FaithWorks to be involved in Missional Leader Training scheduled to take place in Detroit July 30-August 3, 2014.

work second, vibrancy third, a

work second, vibrancy third, and maybe then growth. It's not a numbers game, it's spiritual belief and passion." ("Renew and Renovate," by Jane Oppermann, *The Lutheran*, January 2014, p. 22)

The article goes on to talk about the need for ongoing transformation, indeed conversion, in our life together as congregations.

In our merger, we are so fortunate to be experiencing combined numbers and lots of vibrancy. We are also experiencing a renewed sense of mission as we embrace each other's passions for serving the neighborhood of Emmaus and adopting the commitment to share food from the St. Andrew garden with those less fortunate in the Racine community.

In all of this expansion, let us not forget that renewing our spiritual life must undergird all the rest. In addition to going bigger, let's also go deeper, deeper into the life of the Spirit and into our relationships with each other. We are in process of solving some of our financial problems. But that is no reason to rest on our laurels. Rather, that can free us to pursue more fully the strengthening of our faith as we revitalize our experience of community.

There are so many

opportunities in activities that already exist for us to be intentional about growing deeper: new worship experiences, hearing new pastors and voices of the laity, meeting and making new friends, chances to talk at the coffee hour, the St. Andrew Bible study on Thursday mornings, the Emmaus educational programs on Wednesday evenings, the combining of committees, the small groups provided by the green team Cool Congregation program, the joining of youth groups, the shared work on mission projects. We can see these as opportunities to share our faith commitments with each other.

Let's use all of these as fresh opportunities to learn more about our faith, to renew our prayer life and our love of God, to deepen our love for one another, to care for those among us who are ill or troubled or struggling, and together to find new ways to care for God's creation. Let's be intentional about talking with each other about what matters most to us in our effort to find our renewed identity as people of God in this corner of the world.

As Paul said in Romans: "Do not be conformed to this world but be transformed by the renewing of your minds, so that you may discern what is the will of God."

Clean Water Is Vital Resource

With the recent chemical spill into the Kanawha River in West Virginia, and the resulting draconian ban on the use of tap water for drinking, dish washing,

cooking, bathing and other uses, we see once again the importance of clean water in our lives. Can you imagine how that would affect your household if it happened here?

In the creation stories of Genesis, the wind blew over the waters and they were separated above and below the dome or a stream came from the earth to water the land in the first "days" of creation. Water was very important to the people of the Bible since they lived in a land of desert and frequently suffered droughts. The ancient Greeks had water as one of the four elements along with earth, air and fire. Without fire our Wisconsin weather would be quite untenable; without earth, we would be "lost in space." But without air and water, we cannot live.

In our prayers, we should thank God for our abundant supply of clean, fresh and wholesome water. In our actions, we should do all in our power to keep our water clean, fresh and wholesome. What we put on our lawns or spill in the streets goes quickly into Lake Michigan, the source of drinking water for most of us. If we pour unwanted medications down the toilet or

> sink rather than hold onto them until the medicine collection occurs in spring and fall, we contaminate our water supply.

Unwanted, left-over water-based paints should be left to dry in the opened can and then put in the regular

trash; cans of wet paint put in the trash will be crushed in the truck and the paint ends up in our streets and waterways.

Oil-based paints and varnishes, pesticides, organic solvents. mercury containing products and other chemicals should be saved for the Household Hazardous Waste collections that in Racine are held monthly from April through October. There are separate collections for agricultural chemical waste.

All the salt we put on our streets, walkways and parking lots ends up in the lake (or the Mississippi River for those members of the congregation west of the mini-continental divide). So many of our actions directly affect our drinking water that we should think before we act.



What's Essential? What's Not?

What does a pastor do with a weekend when she isn't busy doing sermon prep or isn't "up front" preaching and leading worship? This pastor spent much of the past weekend off in the basement sorting, organizing, labeling, schlepping, and disposing of "stuff." Upstairs... downstairs... to the attic... to the trash... to recycling... to a friend... to a temporary storage area. So much to process! So many decisions!

What amazed me was the thought process that took place when I awoke just a few hours after collapsing in bed exhausted that Saturday night. I wasn't rewriting the sermon in my head, as often

happens in those awake times on the weekends. Rather, I kept seeing parallels between life at church and the whole process of emptying the basement at home, which is being done, by the way, in preparation for an upcoming renovation.

How do we visualize something new when we are almost literally buried by the old? How can we make better use of space? What needs to be shared, because it's no longer of use? What do we need to let go of in order to have freedom, creative space and the ease of moving unencumbered? What can be repurposed? What might best serve future needs? What are we clinging to because of nostalgia and memories?

Fortunately, the longer the Smiths and I have lived in our home on Main Street, the easier it

has become to decide what is essential and what is not. And we have been working together in the basement, purging, reorganizing, and consulting along the way. Oh, by no means do we have it all figured out, nor do we

always agree! But each of us has pitched in, and we have done our best to take one another into consideration as we do our "reorganization" in preparation for something new.

I see much of the same occurring as we, the people of St. Andrew and Emmaus, are "sorting out" what we hold as most treasured in our patterns and

practices, and yes, even our "stuff." I am reminded of a big word I learned years ago at seminary: audiaphora. That's a word that refers to what is "extra" or "non-essential, something that is neither prohibited nor prescribed in scripture." In other words, some things are essential or non-negotiable, and others can be considered "audiaphora" and even superfluous.

As we continue our life of worship together, we are entering more frequent conversations about "What is next?" "Where do our core beliefs and values lie, and what is audiaphora?" At times, it's easy to be impatient with our partnership process, but then we do have to consider that it does take time to build relationship and trust as we move forward together. We have agreed that, as followers

of Jesus, we are called to be a missional church and to share the life-giving Good News to ALL of God's creation. As we continue in conversation with God and with one another, I'm convinced the Holy Spirit will help us move to the next steps-helping us to sort and reorganize and communicate in love, and, yes, even to shed the audiophora when necessary. God is about making all things new! I count it a blessing to be a part of this Emmaus / St. Andrew "renewal team" as we move forward together!

So, back to work...there is still a lot of processing, culling, and communicating to be done as we "roll prour sleeves" together!







The fast days are intended to bring attention to the still unmet needs in our community for



RIC is petitioning our county board to request the federal funds (previously rejected by Gov. Walker) so that adults between 100 and 138% of the poverty line could be fully covered under BadgerCare

> (Wisconsin's version Medicaid). As of April 1, these people will be required to pay premiums, deductibles and copays for insurance through the exchange, but because of their low income level they won't be able to afford it, even

with the discounts. All of the states around Wisconsin have opted to expand their Medicaid program to include all people up through 138% of the poverty level.





Locally Grown Food Aids Sustainability

by John Berge

With the weather we have experienced this winter, locally grown food is probably not on your list of what to look for or what to do to support sustainability — being a good environmental steward when it comes to food.

Yet spring will come and farmers will be bringing their locally grown produce to farmers' markets and roadside stands. Buying locally grown food is the first of several choices you can make to support a sustainable food system on a list prepared for the National Town Meeting Shallow Footprint Working Group.

Other things they suggested you choose are:

- o Certified organic foods,
- Food that has been processed as little as possible;
- Products fairly traded to guarantee farmers and food workers a living wage,
- Eat less meat and dairy products, choosing pasturefed, organic or free range;
- Support sustainable food production to reduce environmental/social impacts;
- Grow your own and cook at home — fast food is some of the worst food nutritionally and ecologically;

Encourage public officials to support a sustainable food system.

Palm oil is an example of the effect of our food choices on society, the environment and our health. It must be the cheapest of all cooking and baking oils,

because you find it on all sorts of ingredients lists cookies, crackers, other baked goods and many packaged meals.

Other vegetablebased oils generally have less or zero trans fats and saturated fats, however. Part of the health

attributes of the Mediterranean diet is its use of olive oil, but corn oil and canola are probably just as good for you and the environment.

Much of the palm oil is coming from areas where rain forests are being cut down to put in palm trees, removing the natural habitat for such animals as the orangutan and wiping out the small farms of the natives, driving one to extinction and the other to poverty. The loss of rain forests is a major contributor to climate change. Thus, a simple choice to not buy palm oil or products containing it can be a win-win-win situation if we take the time to read the ingredients and make a sensible choice.

interconnectedness.


from "the Washington DC area" to "our kids went to Woodson High School in Fairfax, Virginia" — the same high school that Nancy and Art's kids had attended. Small world!

Council Issues Above & Beyond Plea

We've seen in it our heating bills. We've experienced it on our city streets. We have watched the mounds of snow give way to running water as temperatures have finally moderated a bit. This past winter has taken its toll in so

many ways—money spent on snow removal and heating, folks forced to stay inside for fear of falling and slipping, spirits down after so many gray, blustery days.

Sometimes, it all seems so unending, so insurmountable, doesn't it? Even as we enter spring, the aftermath of the winter blast continues to challenge Emmaus. How are we going to

pay the exorbitant WE Energies bill, the expense to fix the boiler and the backed up bills for snow removal around the church?

In the first three months of 2014, the energy expenses alone totaled \$9,405, a jump of 35% over last year. In addition, there was an unbudgeted expense of \$908 to repair the boiler in January. Added to that, the snow removal costs, which were \$700 last winter, skyrocketed to \$5,835 this winter. That's an increase of 734%!

At the March 18 council meeting, it was decided that a special plea would go out requesting "Above and Beyond" gifts from those who are able to go the second mile. The leaders also understand that there may be a

number of households that are struggling due to the very same set of circumstances challenging the church—elevated bills due to weather together with no financial reserves.

The plea for additional help is only to those who have the ability to do more. Thank you to each and every one who faithfully

supports the ongoing ministry of the church and to those who have already stepped up to help defray these unexpected costs.

Office Management Structure Changes

Christina Miller, office administrator for St. Andrew, has resigned her position in order to accept a new position offering her more hours and income. As a part of integrating yet another area of St. Andrew and Emmaus operations and ministry, the Executive Committees of both church councils have proposed a plan to consolidate much of the work of the two offices.

Paul Berge will assume responsibility for all the weekly bulletins, daily emails, church calendar, correspondence, mailings, and church records of both congregations. While the majority of the work can be accomplished from the Emmaus office, he will dedicate Friday afternoons to take care of any work that can only be accomplished at the St. Andrew site.

New office hours at Emmaus will be 9:00 a.m.-3:00 p.m. Monday through Thursday and 9:00 to noon on Friday. St. Andrew has a



part-time person who handles finances and the recording of offerings, and Mike Metz, a member of St. Andrew, currently prepares their online

newsletter. Meanwhile, a receptionist will be hired to be available at St. Andrew from 10:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon from Monday through Friday.

The leaders of both congregations are hoping to streamline the ordering of supplies in several areas, and further study will lead to recommendations regarding the most efficient and economical use and distribution of office equipment.

Hazardous Waste Collection Resumes



One of the most effective things we can do to be good environmental stewards is to protect the environment from the products of science, medicine and technology that nature cannot digest. It is reasonable to feel powerless to stop the oil and major chemical spills that pollute the land, air, streams, rivers and waters off our coasts. But we can influence our government

and companies we do business with to reduce this pollution. And we can make sure that those chemicals and medicines that pass through our homes and businesses are properly disposed of.

Unused medicines should never be left around so that children and others might accidentally ingest them nor should they be flushed down the toilet nor put out with the trash. Both of the latter may lead to their getting into ground or surface waters and wild life. Household hazardous waste (HHW) also should never be flushed down the toilet, thrown into the gutter or placed in the trash.

On the third Saturday of every month from April to October, there is a collection of household hazardous wastes from 8:00 am to 1:00 p.m. at






HHW that will be accepted includes but is not limited to:

- Household items that contain organic solvents (they usually have the words, flammable, combustible or contains petroleum distillates on the label), items containing mercury such as old thermostats, thermometers and fluorescent lamps,
- Many home improvement products such as solvent- or acidbased cleaners, oilbased, but not latex, paints,
- Automotive fluids and automotive repair products,
- Yard and garden products such as weed killers, pesticides, pool chemicals and poisons.

Some items such as ammunition, electronics, smoke

detectors, lead acid batteries, tires and propane tanks are not accepted.

In a separate traffic line at the same location, the Racine and Central Racine Health Departments will be collecting

And, I thought we would get the major grant we had worked so hard to prepare, only to learn that we would not be the recipients of the big chunk of money we were requesting.





Roadmap to Renewable Energy Unveiled

Most of the time in this column I write about lifestyle changes we can do as individuals to protect the environment. This month, however, I am writing about one professor's recommendation of what we, as members of the larger community, should be pushing for, lobbying our governments and businesses for what can and needs to be done.

In a news release earlier this year, Mark Shwartz wrote, "Stanford University scientist Mark Jacobson has developed a 50state roadmap for transforming United the States from dependence on fossil fuels to 100 percent renewable energy by 2050." If we are to avert a drastic climate change, we must wean ourselves from fossil fuels.

Jacobson unveiled roadmap at the annual meeting of the American Association for the Advancement of Science Chicago. The plan was developed with careful analysis of what resources were available, how much land would be required, jobs created, costs and savings.

For the state of Wisconsin, Jacobson projects: 45% onshore wind turbines, 30% offshore wind turbines, 15% solar photovoltaics plants, 3% residential rooftop photovoltaics, 3% commercial and

government rooftop photovoltaics, 2% CSP (concentrating solar power or solar thermal units similar to what are currently in use in the southwest of the country), and 2% hydroelectric. Note that there is no use of fossil fuels, nuclear power or biogas from landfills or other

sources in his projections. Other states are predicted to avail themselves of wave devices, geothermal and tidal turbines, but not Wisconsin.

The footprint for all this wind, water and solar (WWS) generation of electricity is only 0.51% of Wisconsin's land. There would also need

to be an additional 3.03% for proper spacing and protection. Currently the state's average fossil fuel plus nuclear energy costs are 24.9 cents/kilowatt-hour with another 5.7¢/kwh for health and external costs of using fossil fuels. With WWS the average electricity cost would drop to 6.0¢/kwh, saving each person in 2050 \$8,200 per year for energy and \$11,200 in health and climate costs. It would save 860 air pollution deaths per year and avoid health costs amounting to 3% of the state's gross domestic product.







The key question now being asked is, "What is essential in our core values and to the mission to which God calls us? That question leads to a second, "How will what

is essential affect our decision about location?" common Pastor Michael, at the informational meetings following worship on April 26 and 27, spoke of the importance of the Latino and outreach ministry in and around Emmaus as being central to mission in our neighborhood. He then

Science Fair Highlights EASY Closing Program


On Thursday, May 15, you are invited to the EASY (Emmaus



Heavy Rains Wreak Disruption, Damage

Backaches, personal loss for Pastor Jhon Freddy and Liliana, financial loss for Emmaus, not to

mention time spent without heat or hot water, were all results of the sewer back-up affecting the parsonage following the May 12 rain storm. The parsonage was just one of many dozens of



houses in Racine suffering damage when the city's sewer system was unable to handle the stress of the torrential rains that evening.

Not only was it necessary to have professional cleaners come to clean and disinfect the basement (after Jhon Freddy and Liliana literally hauled all of their personal items to the dumpster), but the furnace, hot water heater and dryer also had to be replaced. Unfortunately, there was not a specific rider on the church insurance policy to cover damage in the event of a sewer back-up.

Cost of cleaning and replacement of the major appliances totaled approximately

\$10,000. Of that amount, \$335.00 was collected in a special "sludge fund" offering the following week. In addition, \$2,500 was contributed by the Emaús Latino community, \$1,000 was

given in re-designated memorial money, and a new dryer and water heater were donated by two Emmaus families. As of press time, a portion of the cleaning costs, together with the cost of the furnace, have not yet been covered. Special gifts designated "parsonage fund" are still being welcomed.

At the May council meeting the unanimous decision was made to add the sewerage back-up rider to our current insurance policy. That will go into effect one month after adding it to the policy.

Neighborhood Camp Needs Kitchen Volunteers

'Your People Shall Be My People'

Shavuot (June 4 this year) is a central Jewish holiday that celebrates both the spring grain harvest and the revelation of the Torah to them at Mt. Sinai. On this holiday, Jewish congregations read the biblical description of the people receiving the Ten Commandments and they also read the Book of Ruth.

The Book of Ruth tells the story of Ruth who leaves her native land of Moab and follows her mother-in-law to Bethlehem. The women must depend not only on the kindness of others but also on important social welfare laws that are in place in order to survive. Ruth is a strong woman who works hard and negotiates the system in order to care for herself and her mother-in-law. At the end of the Book of Ruth we learn that she is the great-grand-

mother of King David. In Jewish tradition the Messiah will come from the line of King David. The Book of Ruth is thus a text that uplifts a poor, immigrant woman and teaches us that those from foreign lands bring gifts we can yet to imagine.

It is compelling at this moment country, as representatives in Washington, DC, have been debating immigration reform and the plight of 11 million immigrants living in our communities is being decided, that we all hear the message of the Book of Ruth. Whether or not we believe that the Messianic age will come through the line of Ruth, may we all use this sacred text to remember that immigrants and their descendants are made in the image of God and deserve the rights, respect and care that all of God's children do.



Pipelines Heighten Environmental Risk

One the major environmental issues in the news is the Keystone XL pipeline and the tar sands bitumen they want to pump through it from Canada to the refineries on the Gulf Coast.

This has also become a political issue, but I want to stress the environmental and energy issues and bring it home to Wisconsin.

First of all, it is generally agreed the that toxic Canadian tar sands

are the dirtiest source of petroleum products in North America. It is also generally agreed that it takes as much, or almost as much, energy to get it out of the ground and shipped as anyone can get out of it for fuel. It has been ruining the homes, fisheries, wild rice sources and health of the native Canadians that live nearby.

So why dig it out in the first place? Somebody can make a profit if they can somehow get it to a refinery and the pollution and hazards can be "outsourced" that is, if somebody else picks up the bill. Why don't they pipe it to a refinery in Canada or to their ports? Because the Canadian

people won't let them. To top it off, greenhouse gas emissions are 17% greater for tar sands than for the average oil on life-cycle basis.

Do you remember the spill that contaminated the Kalamazoo River a few years back? That was

> "diluted bitumen" or "dilbit", bitumen from the tar sands of Alberta. Canada. had that been diluted with water in order to make it thin enough to be able to pump it through a pipeline.

Bitumen heavier than water

so it sinks to the bottom of a river and cannot be skimmed off the surface as with ordinary petroleum spills. It also contaminates the river beds where so much important life is carried on. That is also why the Kalamazoo spill, "The Biggest Spill You Never Heard Of," has still not been cleaned up almost four years later and is expected to cost one billion dollars! (A friend of ours and two colleagues won a Pulitzer Prize for reporting on this spill.)

Keystone XL would through the United States well west of here if it were permitted, and therefore many seem not to be

concerned about it. But Enbridge Energy has announced plans to expand their pipeline, Line 61, to

880,000 barrels/day. This pipeline cuts right through Wisconsin from Lake Superior to Illinois. It comes as close to us as Delavan after going by lakes many recreational areas in the process of going from

Alberta to Superior, Wisconsin, and then on down to the Chicago area and probable export of the refinery products.

Enbridge would increase the capacity of this line by both enlarging it and increasing the pressure with more and larger pumping stations. I don't have

space to write about their pipeline through the Soo area to Detroit, but imagine the effect of a spill

> there which could affect the drinking water of 42 million people.

There are those who say that we need this petroleum to fuel our cars, homes and factories. As long as there is the need, somebody may

approve these pipelines. Therefore, the way to stop them is by every legal means and, more importantly, by conserving energy and converting to renewable sources as soon and wherever possible. That is our environmental stewardship challenge!

Synod Assembly Focuses on Food Security


Voting members from Emmaus, Emaús and St. Andrew are attending the Greater Milwaukee Synod Assembly May 29-31, 2014 at the Country Springs in Waukesha.

As a part of this year's focus on food security, Barbie Izquierdo will be a keynote speaker. Barbie Izquierdo puts a human face on hunger and poverty in America. She and her family have suffered from food insecurity, and as a result of it she has been a hunger advocate for the past five years.

Barbie Izquierdo is a young mother who has found the task of feeding her children challenging. Having lost her job during the recession, she was often unable to buy enough food for her daughter, son, and herself. Looking back on the hardest days, Barbie recalls thinking, "I literally have nothing left. What do I give them?"

Some days, Barbie skipped meals to make sure that her children ate. "I feel like America has this huge stigma of how families are supposed to eat together at a table," Barbie says, "but they don't talk about what it takes to get you there or what's there when you're actually at the table."

Having gone hungry many days as a child, Barbie was determined that her children would not be caught in the hunger



and poverty cycle. Barbie dreamed of going to college and earning a degree in criminal justice so that she could earn a decent salary. But first she had to figure out how to keep her children fed. The seemingly simple act of providing food was a stressful struggle.

Barbie can be found in the documentary that urges a call to action "A Place at the Table and has been featured as a guest speaker at the White House. She has also been featured on WHYY radio, BBC World News, CNN, Associated Press, Philadelphia Daily News, Philadelphia Inquirer, Storytelling, The Moth Philadelphia Metro Newspaper, Washington Post, and many other media venues. She is a courageous mother of two fighting for substantial changes to end food insecurity.



Congregational Meeting Asked to Authorize Refinancing Loan

At its June meeting, the Emmaus council passed a motion to recommend refinancing the existing loan with Thrivent. It is proposed that the current balance of under \$18,000 be rolled over into a new loan, adding slightly over \$100,000 to that amount.

The additional funds would then be used to help defray expenses already incurred for winter utility bills, snow removal and the recent damage resulting from sewer back-up in the parsonage. Internal borrowing from designated funds has been necessary to meet those and other obligations. In addition, \$30,000 would be used for upcoming alley repair, and the remainder would be earmarked for future capital improvements.



The recommendation includes the parameters of keeping the monthly payments at under \$1,000 (current payment is \$992.00) with a fifteen year fixed rate. This recommendation will be officially made to the congregation at a special meeting to be held Sunday, July 27, at 10:30 a.m. in the Sunset Room.



Synod Aims to Be Gathered, Sent

The 2014 Greater Milwaukee Synod Assembly convened Thursday, May 29 at the Country Springs Hotel Conference Center at 2810 Golf Road, Pewaukee, Wisconsin.

In Thursday's worship message, Synod Bishop Jeff Barrow walked the road from El Salvador to Emmaus, professing


joy at being part of a church that was finding ways to find unity of purpose with other faith traditions.

On Friday, Rev. Ruben Duran offered "greetings from your colleagues south of the border at the churchwide offices," noting his close work with Rev. Sandy Chrostowski on the synod staff. He praised the "exciting outreach" in our synod, saying that Christ is present on the streets of Milwaukee and in the small towns and rural communities.

He said that population growth continues most in the south and west, with an ever growing Latino population. He reported that 1,400 existing congregations are located in zip codes with at least 30% Latino population, and 2,000 in zip codes with at least 30% African-American populations. In fact, he said, half of ELCA congregations are in communities that embody some significant form of diversity,

whether in population or finance or age.

That said, he added that "our identity is a theological identity," not intrinsically tied only to specific populations. While he said that "we are graying," there are new faces in our midst, and we possess the gift of hospitality. While Lutherans were once



"called, gathered and nourished," we now aim to be "claimed, gathered and sent."

In closing, Rev. Ruben recalled the Road to Emmaus, a downhill road seven miles long. Something happened, he said, on that road that caused the two disciples to run uphill to share the story of



Environmental Stewardship

Every Litter Bit Hurts

It has been said of some environmentalists that they worship nature -- the creation -- rather than the creator. Other environmentalists worship and serve the Lord by doing their best to preserve and protect that creation. I hope that we are in the latter category.

Both God and the creation will be here long after we are gone; what we can affect is the condition of that creation, how we share it

and what we leave for future generations. In a sense, we are just being somewhat selfish in that we want to live with clean air and water, with resources left for future generations to use, and that we are allowed to enjoy the presence of the other creatures God has created.

If we wish to preserve and protect, we should minimize our pollution and littering. I recently read of a celebration in which large numbers of helium-filled balloons were released, apparently without thought to where they would end up. The balloons do not stay up in the air forever. In our area, the odds are that the balloons will end up in Lake Michigan.

A latex rubber balloon will degrade in a few years, if it doesn't

end up fatally clogging up the stomach of a fish or other animal. A Mylar® balloon will not degrade for decades. If either reaches the oceans, sea turtles may mistake it for a jellyfish, their favorite food, and it can cause death or extreme discomfort.

Do we really wish to celebrate some event or memorialize someone by littering and causing the death of some other creature? This is but one illustration of the

importance of looking toward the end results of our actions.

In my April column, I urged people to dispose of any unwanted medications at the collection site set up by local health departments on the third Saturday of that month. Response was very good. 1,318 pounds of non-controlled and no longer wanted medicines were collected and incinerated.

In addition, about 150 pounds of controlled substances (narcotics, opiates, etc.) were collected, turned over to the police and properly disposed of. Thus, almost 1,500 pounds of medication were kept out of the landfills, our ground and surface waters, and away from children and others who might be harmed by them. The next medicine collection will be the third Saturday of October.





their meeting with Christ. What happened? On that road, they began to recognize the presence of Christ, who is walking with us. The disciples were left with burning hearts; they had a different look on the way back, a sense of urgency, couldn't wait to tell the story. We have the expectation to seek Christ every day.

Action on Resolutions

On Friday, voting members took up four proposed resolutions, voting to create a Synod Endowment Fund.

Voting members passed a resolution stating that the congregations of the Greater Milwaukee Synod oppose any legislation that authorizes acts of discrimination against any person or groups of people in the name of religion, and that the congregations of the Greater Milwaukee Synod continue to invite all people into congregations and communities.

Two other resolutions were referred to the Synod Council.

The Cluster Task Force reported that after a year of listening sessions, they found no clear consensus on realigning the present cluster system.

The Friday midday banquet featured keynote speaker Barbie

Izqueirdo, who was featured in the film "A Place at the Table," and continues to build awareness by putting a face to the issue of hunger.

On Saturday, Bishop Jeff

Barrow read from Isaiah 35, explaining, "These words provide the core of what I understand to be the heart of the Gospel of Jesus Christ, to stop lamenting and stop living in the past. We are the fragile vessels,

and this provides an awakening for those who have fallen asleep. It is a matter of discerning what we take and what we leave behind. ...

reater Milwaukee Synod

"In Isaiah, renewal began with employing the gifts of the sacred remnant – the dreams of a great new reality. ...

"I visited one congregation and asked for a tour of the building before worship. I saw every corner, talked about what had gone on there, and heard the dreams that never materialized in that space. Those may embody the seed of new growth. The trick lies in leaving behind the trappings of the institution, the buildings and hierarchy, but then to remember the important witness of those who have gone before."

Next Steps on the Journey Together

From the Racine Area Mission Strategy (RAMS) process to the FaithWorks mission partnership (currently with St. Andrew, Emaús, Our Savior's and Atonement) to joint worship services of Emmaus and St. Andrew, to assessment of re-

sources and listening sessions — step by step we have been on a journey together.

We have asked, "What is God's vision for mission together in Racine?" We have discovered more about ourselves and

about our partners in the process. We have asked tough questions like "What is essential to mission, and what might we need to give up/change/leave behind for the sake of God's mission?" We have expressed both fears and dreams for the future of the church.

To some, it may seem like we have taken baby steps and moved way too slowly. For others, what is familiar and comfortable remains front and center, and there may be resistance to moving ahead into what is unfamiliar territory. What we do know is that this is a new era in our society and in our

church, and we are called to be pioneers and to follow God's call, venturing forth into places unknown.

As leaders, many of us have invested considerable time, energy, prayer and work in this venture together. We believe that

> there is no going back and that it is soon time to take the next steps in this "Forward in Faith" journey we call FaithWorks.

We anticipate that after the listening sessions are completed in late July, and following a debriefing by the

listening leaders of what has been heard, the councils will then be prepared to take the next step and make a recommendation centered around coming together.

The stated goal of many is that in the fall, we (Emmaus, Emaús and St. Andrew) would come together in one location for worship and ministry as one body. And, even though we would continue to offer worship services both in English and Spanish, we would make a priority the task of building relationships and finding more and more ways of being a

Bishop Barrow has pledged from the Bishop's Discretionary Fund to start the ball rolling. "Believing that stewardship is never someone else's responsibility, I am happy to put \$100 of my own money toward this project. I invite you to join me in expanding the scope of the Mt. Meru Coffee Project. \$10,000 will have a big impact on the future of this great ministry."

Anti-bacterial Chemical May Pose Hazard

I once believed that to get properly clean in the shower and to be socially acceptable in public I had to use deodorant soaps and other anti-bacterial products that contained triclosan or one of its related compounds. When the studies came out showing that we have ten times more "foreign" cells in or on our bodies than the number of our own cells, this reinforced that belief. Then studies came out that showed that washing with plain soap and water was just as

Other studies have indicated that triclosan might be an endocrine disruptor or cancer causing agent, but these studies

reason to eliminate or cut back on our use of products containing triclosan. About 100 metric tons (220,000 pounds) of it washes into U.S. wastewater treatment plants each year. His research group has shown that concentrations of triclosan present in wastewater can

destabilize the anaerobic microbial communities that breakdown sewage in our wastewater treatment facilities.

It may also increase the chances of producing drug-resistant microbes that will be spread on agricultural lands or be introduced to the bodies of water that receive the effluent from the wastewater treatment facility. At higher concentrations than now experienced, laboratory studies showed a virtual crash of microbial (cleansing) activities as indicated by methane production. Treating

microbes that had never seen triclosan before caused a spike in the amount of a gene that causes drug-resistance in bacteria not only to triclosan but ciprofloxacin (the common antibiotic "cipro") as well.

So far, the Racine Wastewater Treatment facility has not seen any effects due to triclosan in the water that they treat, but they haven't been looking for it, either. Their laboratory does not test for triclosan.

So, what should a good environmental steward do? I have been reading labels on soaps and other products, avoiding wherever possible those containing triclosan ... a small but consistent effort. As an article in a recent *Science News* stated, "Currently the only way to reduce wastewater levels of triclosan is if consumers use less of it."



It's true. There are still so many unknowns. We don't even know yet where and how the Spirit will lead our congregations between now and then. What we do know is that nothing will ever again be the same again! Will the St. Andrew folks vote to join us in mission at the Emmaus site? What shape will Latino/a with relationships brothers and sisters take as we move into the future? How will worship and Bible studies take on deeper meaning as we move ahead? In what ways will searching youth and young families find a welcoming spiritual home? How will new leaders be developed? How does this fit into the bigger picture of FaithWorks?

In a recent staff meeting centered around the theme of kids' education, Pastor Jhon Freddy, Nancy Smith, Pastor Michael, Liliana Moncada, Pastor Gabriel and I sat in a circle as we asked the question, "Where are we called to go next with the responsibility of educating our children in the faith?" We looked at what has

been offered on Wednesdays and on the weekends, asking the important question of how to best serve ALL our kids, while fairly distributing the many resources we already have.

FaithWorks Congregational Votes Impact Future

Several significant votes took place at Racine ELCA churches on September 14. That morning, the members of Our Savior's voted unanimously to put their property, located on Taylor and Washington, up for sale.

The Our Savior's congregation has been worshiping at Atonement since the first of the year, and their building is currently being rented to two congregations of different denominations. The people of Our Savior's and Atonement also voted nearly unanimously to enter into covenant as they move forward together.

Two additional congregational meetings were held on September 14, one at Emmaus and the other at St. Andrew, making decisions which would greatly impact the level of future partnership. At Emmaus a motion was passed unanimously by voice vote that Emmaus remain in its current

location, inviting into covenant the congregations of Emaús and St. Andrew at the Emmaus site.

At the St. Andrew meeting a motion was made from the floor that St. Andrew remain in their building on Four Mile Road. That vote was cast using paper ballots,

with members voting two to one to approve the motion to stay in their present location.

While ongoing relationships and joining together in ministry opportunities are being encouraged,

the current relationship of worshiping together on a weekly basis will end after the October 4 and 5 weekend. That weekend, the last weekend of the Season of Creation, joint worship will take place at St. Andrew. The following weekend, there will be separate worship services at each of the locations.

Decision Made Regarding Thomsen Bequest

A check for \$17,850, a portion of the generous bequest from the estate of Olaw Thomsen has been received. Following the sale of Olaw's home, a second disbursement will be made to those named in his will, including Emmaus.



At the September 14 congregational meeting, it was agreed that the first of the bequest be divided as follows: \$5,000 for Latino ministry, \$700 for banner making, and the remainder of \$12,150 for capital improvements.

Thrivent Approves Mortgage Refinancing

Thrivent Financial has approved Emmaus' request for a \$120,000 loan, which is a net amount of \$107,086.42 after repaying our existing balance. The terms of the new loan are 15 years fixed at a rate of 5.25%. The current note is 6.1%. The new monthly payment is \$965, down from the current monthly payment of \$992.

In addition to payment for the alley replacement of the (approximately \$30,000) and for repairs and work already done to the parsonage due to sewer backup, the money will be used to repay internal loans made from designated accounts in order to stay current with monthly commitments. It was decided at the September council meeting that \$20,000 be set aside in a capital reserves account that could only be tapped in case of unexpected

major expenses.

The council also decided that an additional \$1,000 be set aside as a cushion for future obligations. The new loan is expected to close by mid October, at which time the 2014 Synod and FaithWorks commitments will be paid in full.

Members of the council were given the assignment of listing possible building upgrades, maintenance concerns and energy conserving projects for consideration, together with estimated costs. Those items will then be prioritized and decisions will be made about what might need immediate attention.

Looking Ahead: Commitment Sunday is set for November 23, Christmas Pageant is scheduled for December 14, and Christmas Eve services with Brass Nickel will be at 4:30 p.m.

Environmental Stewardship

ELCA Statement Urges Care for Creation

By John Berge

Years ago, I had the honor and privilege to serve on the task force that wrote the social statement on environmental stewardship for the Lutheran Church in America, a predecessor of our Evangelical Lutheran

Church in America. This statement was adopted by the national convention held in Dallas, Texas in July of 1972.

I attended that convention as a "resource person." I

believe my pride in having several of my ideas, sentences and phrases included in that statement was reasonably justified, since the Task Force included several theologians, college professors of biology (ecology was a seldom used word then) as well as a farmer, a housewife and me, an environmentalist and an industrial scientist.

After the merger, the ELCA also wrote and adopted a social statement on the environment entitled "Caring for Creation: Vision, Hope, and Justice" which I was told was based in part on the LCA statement. It was adopted by

the 1993 ELCA Churchwide Assembly.

In this column I usually try to suggest specific things that we as individuals, families and a congregation can do to be good environmental stewards, but this month I would like to look at the

church's philosophy and theology as reflected in its social statement. All below are direct quotes from that statement. Since I don't have room for all twelve pages, each quote is by definition "out-of-context." For a better understanding of the

ELCA's position one should read (or reread) the entire statement.

"We of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America are deeply concerned about the environment, locally and globally, as members of this church and as members of society. Even as we join the political, economic, and scientific discussion, we know care for the earth to be a profoundly spiritual matter.

"We see the despoiling of the environment as nothing less than the degradation of God's gracious gift of creation.

"In our time, science and

technology can help us to discover how to live according to God's creative wisdom ... [C]aring, serving, keeping, loving and living by wisdom sum up what is meant by acting as God's stewards of the earth.

"Alienated from God and from creation, and driven to make a name for ourselves, we become captives to demonic powers and unjust institutions. In our captivity, we treat the earth as a boundless warehouse and allow the powerful to exploit its bounties to their own ends.

"The idea of the earth as a boundless warehouse has proven both false and dangerous. Damage to the environment eventually will affect most people through increased conflict over scarce resources, decline in food security, and greater vulnerability to disease.

"We are called to acknowledge [the] interdependence with other

creatures and to act locally and globally on behalf of all creation.

"The earth and its fullness belong to the Lord. No person or group has absolute claim to earth or its products. The principle of sufficiency means meeting the basic needs of all humanity and all creation ... The principle of sustainability means providing an acceptable quality of life for present generations without compromising that of future generations.

"As members of the church, we commit ourselves to personal life styles that contribute to the health of the environment.

"We challenge ourselves, the economically particularly secure, to tithe environmentally. Tithers would reduce their burden on the earth's bounty by producing ten percent less waste, consuming ten percent less in nonrenewable resources, and contributing the savings to earthcare efforts."

God Always on the Move, Forming and Re-Forming

Once again anticipating Reformation Sunday, the last Sunday of October, I look back and I also look forward. Last Reformation Sunday was such a time of anticipation. It was the beginning of the time when Emmaus and St. Andrew began

worshiping together. We celebrated with a procession, a beautifully decorated sanctuary at St. Andrew, good music, the message of grace, and the dream of something new.

Over the period of more than ten months, we worshiped together,

we prayed together, we rolled up our sleeves together, and we built new relationships with our sisters and brothers from St. Andrew. We developed new friendships. What began primarily for the purpose of saving resources and for financial survival led to even more possibilities.

At the same time, after listening to one another and to God, more Emmaus folks than ever before began saying things like, "We have a mission in this neighborhood surrounding Summit and Yout. We can't abandon our growing relationships with the

neighborhood families, with the nearby schools and with our Latino brothers and sisters just for the sake of finances." And, because of my strong sense of call to lead a congregation whose mission is to share the Good News with those in our diverse and ever

changing neighborhood, my voice was part of that growing majority at Emmaus.

I have been asked by very faithful, responsible people, "But, what about the reality of light bills, snow removal costs, and all our expenses?" While recognizing

the reality of those day-to-day expenses, I also believe we are called to be creative with the abundance we have all around us.

I recall over and over again the daily gift of manna as the Israelites were moving in the wilderness toward the Promised Land. I also read and re-read Matthew 6. Not only does it contain the Lord's Prayer with Jesus' words, "Thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on Earth as it is in heaven," but Jesus also tells his followers not to worry -- that just as God provides for the birds of

The initial draft was presented to the church council at the


October meeting and has since been sent to Matthew Brockmeier,

annual congrega-tional meeting the last Sunday in January.





Siebert Site Visit Yields Positive Reviews





In a world where Sunday morning is often the most segregated time in our country....in a church where attempts at multicultural worship are sometimes awkward best.....Sunday was not only a joyful celebration, it also offered a glimpse of the church I want to be a part of: people young and old together....separate languages enhancing rather than standing in the way of worship....and children...plenty of children whose



welcome presence trumps everything!

I received two gifts yesterday. They did in fact present me with the mitre. I was deeply honored, really. Even more special, Pastor Mary Janz told me that instead of an honorarium, the church was sending a gift to the Boiler Fund at Redeemer Lutheran in Milwaukee

Household Tips Save Earth, Money

In a burst of file cleaning zeal, our Senior Choir Librarian at Mt. Pleasant Lutheran Church removed 125 choir anthems from the files, because of having too few


copies, outdated style or content. Rather than throw them out, she passed them on to us to see whether any could be used by other churches. I am pleased to report that all 125 have found new homes

with local churches and the choir at Lutheran High School, helping the budget of all these organizations. It is generally better to reuse than recycle but both are better than adding material to the waste stream and landfills.

The same is true when one does fall housekeeping or the weekly house cleaning chores. Many items that might be discarded could be reused by someone else through the church's annual rummage sale or other

groups such as the Salvation Army and Purple Heart. HHW (household hazardous waste) and unneeded medications will have to wait until next spring (the third Saturday in April for Racine

residents). Careful storage until then is imperative.



and to replace any that show excessive shrinking or cracking. Lack of weather stripping on doors and windows should be fixed as soon as possible.

Replacing or adding to attic insulation can be done at any time; it is generally economical up to 16 inches. Turn down the thermostat and put on a sweater. Have the furnace checked and replace dirty air filters that can restrict proper airflow — some say once a month.

If the air is too dry in the house, one can feel colder; so add humidification through mechanical devices, lots of house plants or dry some laundry indoors.

Ceiling fans should run slowly clockwise in the heating season. Limit use of portable heaters whenever possible — 1,500-watt heaters use lots of energy! Let the sun help with the heating by opening the shades or blinds during the day, and closing them at night.

Lighting can also be a big energy user, replace incandescent bulbs, halogen bulbs and even CFLs (compact fluorescent bulbs) with LEDs (light emitting diodes). The first two can get hot enough to cause fires. The incandescent bulbs can be thrown in the trash, but CFLs and the long tube fluorescents should recycled. They contain some mercury, but also valuable rare earths. Check which stores you shop at to see if they recycle them or hold until the next HHW collection.

Dust your refrigerator coils, fins and evaporator pans at least once a year. Don't let ice build up in a freezer — ice is a surprisingly

good insulating. Ask the Inuit about his igloo. Check the seals on refrigerator and freezer doors with a dollar bill in several places (it

should grip it lightly)
and replace the seals if needed.

When cooking on the stove, turn down the heat as the liquid starts to boil. When cooking in the oven, resist the urge to peek. The temperature can drop 25°F each time the door opens. The oven is another place to check the seal and replace if indicated. Energy efficient models of furnaces, refrigerators, freezers, stoves, dish and clothes washers and many other pieces of home equipment are now available. They may be more expensive to purchase, but you and the earth will save in the long run.


It's About Reform with a Little "r"

Different traffic patterns. A new layout. More fresh fruit. More ethnic foods. An enhanced deli area. A more diverse clientele. An invitation to 'taste and see." My recent trip to the supermarket at the corner of Spring Street and Green Bay Road was full of surprises. It just wasn't the way it looked when I was last there.

Change. Good news or bad news? I ran into an acquaintance who said excitedly, "Just wait till you see what's around the corner!" Then there was the older woman, a person I didn't even know, who blurted out, "Can you find anything? I'm so used to the way it used to be!" I admitted to her that I was also disoriented, but that the changes looked like they'd be for the best in the long run.

As Bishop Jeff reminded us, the celebration we had Reformation Sunday was more than Reform with a capital "R" (the historical reform almost 500 years ago), but was more about

One of the EASY kids who was invited to be a part of the processional shared with Nancy, "I want to come back to this church next Sunday!" He saw a place for himself amidst the diverse community. He saw the familiar face of his mentor, and he was eager "to help" and to be a part of what was going on. I see the change in the past several years at Emmaus as positive. At the same time, I'm not naïve enough to think that it comes easily for

everyone. I realize that some have become angry and left Emmaus because of our commitment to diversity and full inclusion. But, as Pastor Steve has reminded us in our Bible study, this is not about "us" and "them," but about "just us." That's what "justice" and the "Kingdom of God on earth" are all about as we are reminded by the words of Jesus in the Lord's Prayer and in the Sermon on the Mount.

God continues to be full of surprises! How will we be cocreators in the ongoing reformation here in Racine and beyond? Change can be good news! Let's be part of positive change as we look to Jesus who leads the way!





Updated Constitution Ready for Congregational Approval

An updated constitution for the church was approved by the church council at November meeting. This updated constitution necessary because the current one that we are operating under dates from 1986 before the ELCA was formed. During the past four months, a number of indicators have pointed to a refocusing for FaithWorks. Cochampions Pastor Mary and Pastor Steve, in one-on-one conversations with clergy and lay leaders, have observed that there is currently little buy-in for the initial idea of overall merger of the FaithWorks congregations.

On the other hand, new conversations are surfacing regarding a different model for a proposed FaithWorks food pantry

being proposed for the Atonement site. Further conversations around church/school connections are showing promise as Higher Expectations (see separate article) has invited us to the table to help launch a community-wide effort in these school partnerships.


Quilters Honor EASY Families

After considerable assessment of several areas of the church, the

Green Team folks with the encouragement of David Rhoads made a recommendation to the council regarding updating lighting. Ballasts in the EASY room in



the church basement will be retrofitted and more energy efficient bulbs will be installed before the end of the year.

On November 1, the Racine Green Congregations held a meeting at the Eco-Justice Center. Sixteen representatives of several

congregations met to discuss an ambitious proposal from the Steering Committee "to gain a vision of a green Racine in 2015 and then work back to see what steps need to be taken to achieve the vision and

who are the participants who make it happen."

This obviously goes beyond our own congregations which are still working to reduce their carbon footprint and to otherwise be "greener." It follows up on efforts by Sustainable Racine, Sustainable Business Network, Transitions, the Johnson Foundation and several others.

Each action and decision should lead to protecting our local life and earth, building the economy (especially for the unemployed and underpaid),

> working together for the common good, understanding what is at stake in the environmental crises, and enhancing the human spirit in relation to the rest of nature. Work in these

areas should address inequalities, hunger, racism, unequal pay and marginalized neighborhoods.

These goals were found to be far beyond the capabilities of the Green Congregations alone, so led to a lively discussion of ideas of whom we could partner with, effective leadership, how to get

ELCA funding for FaithWorks for 2015.

Recognizing the shift that is taking place and not wanting to

exhaust the FaithWorks funds in the meantime, Pastor Steve and Pastor Mary have made some temporary decisions regarding their roles. As of December 1, Pastor Steve will step down from his position, and the FaithWorks Bible studies will end

for the time being. Pastor Mary will continue as the interim leader of FaithWorks through the end of January, and she has requested that her compensation and time be cut to half of what it has been since she officially assumed that role in mid-August.

During the next couple of months it will be the responsibility of the FaithWorks Mission Council to write a revised covenant to be

> presented congregations for approval at their January annual meetings. Work is currently in progress, and the goal is to reduce the length of the current covenant, making it so concise that it will fit on one printed page.

Initial conversation indicates that there will be a strong focus on doing mission collaboratively and that anti-racism training be an expectation of FaithWorks leaders and congregations. A draft will be presented to the FaithWorks Mission Council for review at their December 9 meeting.

ideas of whom we could partner with, effective leadership, how to get grants, cooperation and support of other groups. We need a champion, advice from other communities already having

success in these areas, a core team of representative persons and a strong educational component.

Specific areas presented by the steering committee

were: energy, green economy, transportation, water, land use, waste reduction (including reuse, recycling and composting), food and financial.

Under energy were listed energy efficiency in government buildings, weatherizing for low income people, alternative energy sources, more LEDs in traffic and street lighting, and discounted group purchases of LEDs for businesses.

Green economy included green industries, green jobs, green training and buying local products. Transportation included getting buses and other vehicles onto natural gas, improved public transportation, bicycling and carpooling incentives.

Water items included watershed clean-up and

protection, reduced storm water runoff, rain barrels, rain gardens and conservation.

Land use ran the gamut from parks and beaches to empty lots and foreclosed properties, land

trust expansion and corporate, business and church lands.

Waste problems and solutions included green cleaning products, elimination of single use plastic

bags, waste to energy programs, local recycling businesses, citywide composting and air quality monitoring.

Food items included Community Supported Agriculture, urban gardens, food banks and community meals. It should have also included elimination of "food deserts" in the inner city.

There was just one item under financial, but a big one: "Government and industries (should) divest investments from fossil fuel industries and reinvest in companies whose products and services promote planetary sustainability."

Aprendamos sobre EL ADVIENTO



Por que es importante la Educación




Una gran herencia nos dejo Martín Lutero

En Ausburgo Lutero dejó claro de una vez por todas que el fundamento de sus creencias, y en general de toda su teología, era la Escritura y sólo la Escritura; para él esta autoridad de la Palabra de Dios superaba a la del Papa y a Concilios. Este compromiso valiente con las Escrituras fue reconfirmado tres años después en la famosa Dieta de Worms, donde compareció ante el emperador y la corte del imperio; en esa ocasión en que fue invitado otra vez a retractarse contestó: «No puedo ni quiero retractarme a menos que se me pruebe, por el testimonio de la Escritura o por medio de la razón, que estoy equivocado; no puedo confiar ni en las decisiones de los Concilios ni en las de los Papas, porque está bien claro que ellos no sólo se han equivocado sino que se han contradicho entre sí. Mi conciencia está sujeta a la Palabra de Dios v no es honrado ni seguro obrar en contra de mi propia conciencia. ¡Qué Dios me avude! Amén». Queda claro que para él las Escrituras eran el fundamento de su fe. Por eso, propongo como tesis central de este artículo que ese apego y esa centralidad dada a la Biblia es la primera y gran herencia que el Dr. Martín Lutero nos ofrece hoy.

Por otra parte, El principio de Sola Scriptura entrañaba la convicción de ser ella la fuente de revelación, de gracia, de fe, de justificación, de santificación, de salvación, de vida cristiana, de organización eclesiástica, etcétera. Como le dijo un día a un grupo de sus amigos íntimos: «La Biblia se parece a un bosque enorme con toda clase de árboles de los que se pueden coge los frutos más variados, y no hay ningún árbol de ese bosque al que no haya sacudido y del que no haya cortado un par de peras o manzanas».

Ahora pensemos en nosotros, cristianos Latinoamericanos que vivimos en el siglo XXI en al cuidad de Racine: ¿Qué reflexiones autocríticas o recuperaciones teológicas podemos hacer pensando en la rica herencia de la Sola Scriptura de Lutero?



A lo mejor la parroquia donde participas no lo es (aunque lleve el titulo de católica supuestamente) por el simpe hecho de que discriminas a la mujer que iba a ser apedreada, a los adúlteros, a los leprosos de nuestra época, a los homosexuales, a los que viven en pecado. A lo mejor -sin darte cuenta- estas creando un abismo enrome entre personas y no permites que otros se acerquen a Dios. TU el JUEZ quien determina quien se acerca lo sagrado y quien no?
- 4. Apostólica: el mandato a los apóstoles fue claro, "Id, pues, y haced discípulos a todas las gentes bautizándolas en el nombre del Padre y del Hijo y del Espíritu Santo, y enseñándoles a guardar todo lo que yo os he mandado. Y sabed que yo estoy con vosotros todos los días hasta el fin del mundo" (Mt 28, 19-20). Proclamen las buenas nuevas, hagan cosas mas grandes de las que yo hice dijo Jesús. Somos los apóstoles que vivimos dentro de la iglesia de Dios permitiéndole utilizar nuestras manos, nuestros pies, nuestra voz para mostrar el mundo entero su amor y su gracias. 




PRIMER ENCUENTRO DE JOVENES HISPANOS

Sabiendo lo difícil que es para nosotros lograr esto, nos dejó dos Medios de Gracia, es decir, dos formas en las cuales Dios actúa en nosotros. Hablamos de los 2 Sacramentos: el Santo Bautismo y la Santa Cena. Los Sacramentos son dados por Dios para sellar en nosotros su promesa del perdón de pecados y de vida eterna por medio de la fe en Jesucristo. En los Sacramentos se unen al menos 4 cosas:

un mandato y promesa de Jesús en la Biblia un elemento visible (agua; pan y vino) un elemento invisible (la gracia de Dios)

la fe de la comunidad

Acorde con las Sagradas Escrituras, Lutero encontró que la forma en que Dios más se entrega a nosotros es a

través de los mandatos del mismo coman..."nos Jesús: «Vayan y hagan discípulos a ofrece todas las naciones, bautizándolos en el promete nombre del Padre y del Hijo y del perdón Espíritu Santo» (Mateo 28:19).

«Tomen, coman y beban, esto es mi pecados, cuerpo...» (Mateo 26:26).

En el sacramento de la Eucaristía los elementos visibles son el pan y el vino, mientras que los invisibles son el cuerpo y la sangre de Cristo que nos son entregados por medio del pan y el vino. Con el Bautismo se enciende la fe en nosotros en un nuevo nacimiento en Cristo, y en la Eucaristía, confirmamos y fortalecemos esa fe en comunidad. Estos elementos son llamados medios de gracia y en cuanto son instituidos por Dios, no dependen de la fe del hombre ni de quién la administre. El Sacramento del altar (Eucaristía) es el verdadero cuerpo y la verdadera sangre (con-substanciación) de nuestro Señor Jesucristo, que está en y bajo el pan y el vino, que la Palabra de Cristo nos ha ordenado comer y beber a nosotros los cristianos. Cuando Jesús dice "toman y

coman..."nos
ofrece y
promete el
perdón de
todos los
pecados,
aunque esto
no podrá ser
recibido sino



mediante la fe. Más tarde, con la Confesión de Concordia en 1577 se hablará de: en, bajo y con el pan y el vino. De esta manera se resaltan más aun los dones y virtudes de este sacramento y la verdadera presencia de Cristo en él. Y cuando Jesús dice "por vosotros dado y derramada..." nos explica que es para que la aceptemos, disfrutemos y usemos. Quien escucha tal cosa y cree que es verdad, ya lo posee.
