Emaus Reopening Update

(Revised 6/10/2021)

Because the COVID-19 pandemic is ever changing, requirements for worship will need to be fluid. Any future adjustments will be announced as they are adopted.

• In person worship

Current worship with Emaus:

- Saturday 4:30 p.m. and Sunday 9:00 a.m. in English. Sunday 11:00 a.m. in Spanish
- All worship services are available to view after on the Emaus ELCA website (emauselca1.org)

Requirements for in-person worship:

- Those who have not worshiped in person at Emaus in 2021, please register upon arrival. Pre-registration is no longer required for anyone.
- For persons fully vaccinated, masks are optional. If you are not fully vaccinated, please be respectful of others and continue to wear a mask.
- Worshipers need to stay seated in the marked areas. Children MUST always remain with their parents.
- Limited congregational singing will be allowed.
- Directions will be given for Communion.
- Directions will be given for dropping offerings into designated boxes or plates.

Emaus to Refinance Its Mortgage

At its June meeting the church council agreed to move ahead with an application for refinancing the church's mortgage. Why would we want to do that? Well, we have some major expenses to deal with. First, there is the issue with our boilers. One is not functional and the other two are old. Second, we have borrowed from ourselves to pay for repairs to our elevator. That elevator makes our church building handicap accessible. Third, you may have noticed that the walls in our entranceway are peeling, and the ceiling is falling down.

The application has been made to Thrivent, our current mortgage lender, for \$80,000. We could have asked for a lot more, but we must be mindful of the fact that we must pay back the loan and there is a limit to what our operating budget can withstand. Thrivent tells us that it could take at least two months to get this loan underwritten. Stay tuned ...

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Video Streaming at Emaus

Since the pandemic started, Emaus has been videoing nearly all their Sunday morning services. You can find those videos at EmausELCA1.org. Many churches are now video streaming their services. The Greater Milwaukee Synod of the ELCA and the Siebert Lutheran Foundation have recognized this technology as the "wave of the future", much like the copier and the computer technologies were to churches in previous generations. There is a need for this technology. There are many in our congregation who, for one reason or another, may not make it back to church in person after the pandemic. There are others who may not be able to travel to a wedding or a funeral but would want to see the event in real time. In addition, this capability will provide easy access for those seeking to hear the Word on a regular basis, no matter where they are.

The Siebert Lutheran Foundation has given grants to Wisconsin Lutheran synodical organizations (i.e., ELCA, WELS, LCMS) to support the purchase and installation of the cameras and other equipment. Emaus has been promised \$2,500 from the synod if we pursue this project. The church council voted to go ahead with the video streaming project at its meeting on June 15. The vendor that has been selected is Metro Sound and Video. Their proposal offered the equipment that will be the easiest to use and will offer expandability in the future. Their proposal includes a cost of about \$8,000. This is obviously outside our current budget. Accounting for the \$2,500 from the synod, we will need to find the additional \$5,500. Out Of Crisis Comes Opportunity

• Miracles in the Kitchen

When the refrigerator went down again recently—again—we heard the bad news from the repairman that our unit was beyond repair. As we thought of ways to afford a new one, an anonymous angel came forth and wrote a check for \$3100 to replace our aging appliance. Miracles never cease. A new industrial refrigerator has been installed.

Very recently, when a rep of the Racine Community Foundation learned about the good works that go on in that kitchen, we were asked us to dream big and give them a list of what we really needed. So, we acknowledged we were in need of a new commercial range. Presently, a team of people has come together to fulfill that need at no cost to congregation. We will provide an update as things transpire.

• A Word About Our Emaus Pre-Opening

Being closed for a long seventeen months gave us the opportunity to take a good look at our facility. We realized we needed much more than hand-sanitizer to open the doors—so we began compiling a list and developing a process to get the work done right. The list proved to be quite long, because it included numerous items that had been overlooked for years. But the good news was donations of money and time came pouring in.

The next step was to prioritize and assign work crews to tackle the pages of projects. As of this date, we stand in awe of all the work that has been accomplished. Consider this: Painting, replastering, deep cleaning in all areas, window washing, removal of old equipment that no longer worked, replacing 120 new chairs for fellowship hall and giving away the old ones, installing a washer and dryer unit in the basement, power-washing tables and chairs, updating the restrooms, shampooing the carpeting, etc. etc. A special thanks goes out to Soledad, Mario and Nancy Posadas for all their hard work. (For a complete list, see Mary Janz.) In addition to all of the maintenance and purchases, the EASY staff has sorted through all materials and weeded out old games and other materials that have seen better days. A revamped children's library has taken place, including a face-lift of the space, as well as a refurbishing the book collection to include new books covering history and current topics that are age-appropriate and engaging.

• Worship Preparation

In-person worship has resumed, but we still are taking some COVID precautions. We will continue social distancing, contact tracing, and have changed our communion practices to provide as much safety as possible.

People who are fully vaccinated need not wear a mask; however, those who still need to be vaccinated should still wear face coverings.

We are happy to announce that all these efforts made it possible for children to make their first communions. Early in May, fourteen communicants made their first communion at the Spanish service, and on Pentecost Sunday, May 23, six more communicants made their first communions at the English Service. Congratulations!

Like in all crisis situations, life marches on, and we march with it. We still have more work to do but plan to have the whole list completed by July 2^{nd} . Thanks goes out to all!

From Our Parish Nurse Heat information from the CDC

People aged 65 years or older are more prone to heat-related health problems. If you're an older adult or a caretaker, review this page for information on how you or the person you're caring for can stay safe during the heat.

CARETAKER CHECKLIST

Keep a close eye on those in your care by visiting them at least twice a day, and ask yourself these questions:

- Are they drinking enough water?
- Do they have access to air conditioning?
- Do they know how to keep cool?
- Do they show any signs of heat stress?

Why are older adults more prone to heat stress?

- Older adults do not adjust as well as young people to sudden changes in temperature.
- They are more likely to have a chronic medical condition that changes normal body responses to heat.
- They are more likely to take prescription medicines that affect the body's ability to control its temperature or sweat.

Stay cool, stay hydrated

- Stay in air-conditioned buildings as much as possible. If your home doesn't
 have air conditioning, contact your local health department or locate an airconditioned shelter in your area.
- Do not rely on a fan as your main cooling source when it's really hot outside.
- Drink more water than usual and don't wait until you're thirsty to drink.
 - If your doctor limits the amount of fluids you drink or has you on water pills, ask them how much you should drink during hot weather.
- Don't use the stove or oven to cook—it will make you and your house hotter.
- Wear loose, lightweight, light-colored clothing.
- Take cool showers or baths to cool down.
- Do not engage in very strenuous activities and get plenty of rest.
- Check on a friend or neighbor and have someone do the same for you.
- Follow additional tips on how to prevent heat-related illness.

Stay informed

Check the local news for health and safety updates.

Seek medical care immediately if you have, or someone you know has, <u>symptoms of heat-related illness</u> like muscle cramps, headaches, nausea or vomiting
