It's the Polar Bear Dip on January 1 to benefit R.E.S.T.



Aiken Speaks at Conference for Educators

KidsHope director Marty Aiken was invited to speak at an annual conference for educators from special needs schools in southeast Wisconsin.

Approximately 47% of the student body from Wadewitz is from low income families, thus making the school eligible for special "P5" government funding. Marty Aiken sits on the P5 Committee of the school and was invited by them to participate in their conference held in Lake Geneva in early December.

As Marty was preparing his presentation on the KiidsHope mentoring program, he determined that he could benefit from using

some visuals to convey his message.

One thing led to another (see article page 7), and within two weeks, a special eight-minute professional video was produced on the E m m a u s - W a d e w i t z relationship and the KidsHope program.

Principal Pat Limburg facilitated Marty's presentation, and since

that time, several educators have indicated an interest in initiating the program in their schools.

At this time, the Emmaus-Wadewitz KidsHope program is the one and only such program in the state of Wisconsin.

Emmaus Submits 2001 Report to Siebert Foundation

On December 21, Pastor Mary handed a report of over forty pages over to Assistant to the Bishop Sue Ruehle to be passed on to the Siebert Lutheran Foundation.

With the help of Nancy Smith, Marty and Kathryn Aiken and Sue Ruehle, the report on behalf of nine Racine congregations was assembled, communicating to the Siebert Foundation how the \$70,000 grant had been utilized.

The grant report included information regarding outreach in the neighborhoods of Emmaus/Wadewitz and Redeemer/Mitchell School. In

addition, photos and the written word conveyed the ways lives of children were touched through KidsHope, the neighborhood carnival, Vacation Bible School and Sunday School.

Other church-school connections were also highlighted, as was the weekly Sanctuary service.

Detailed financial information was included so that the Siebert Foundation Board could be aware of how grant money was spent during the past year. Over \$30,000 of the funds were granted to Emmaus for salaries and programs related to

\$8,200 In-Kind Donation is Gift to Emmaus

When Marty Aiken was talking with his brother-in-law Andy Garcia at a family Thanksgiving gathering in Madison, little did he know how quickly the seeds of an inquiry would bear fruit

Marty had been asked to give a presentation at a conference for educators in southeast Wisconsin. The topic was to be KidsHope USA, the mentoring program Marty directs for Emmaus. So, when Marty was considering doing a little amateur video, he asked Andy if he could help splice Marty's video with a training tape from KidsHope. As that conversation continued a bit further, so did the magnitude of the project.

The results? Andy Garcia, owner of Andy Garcia Production Studio in Madison (who has Harley Davidson as one of his primary clients), offered to send a filming crew to Racine.

Within ten days, two men from Andy's staff came to spend an entire day filming — everything from scenes at Wadewitz with mentors, kids and teachers, to shots of Emmaus and an interview with Pastor Mary.

The following week, three full

days of editing took place, with Marty spending two of those days in Madison providing video through which sound and images portray a concise and compelling "infomercial" for KidsHope. The video is eight minutes in length and would retail for \$8,200.

The entire cost is being absorbed by Andy Garcia as his gift to Emmaus and to a program he views as worthwhile. (We're of course grateful he happens to be married to Kathryn Aiken's sister!)

Lutheran Brotherhood Matches 2001 Fund Gifts



American Heart Association Urges Everyone to Be a Heartsaver

Cardiovascular is the single greatest cause of death in America. Every year about 480,000 American adults die from a heart attack or its complications. About half of these deaths are from a complication of heart attack called cardiac arrest that's almost 250,000 lives each year. To increase Cardiac arrest survival rate the American Heart Association is launching a public awareness program during American Heart Month this February to urge Americans to Be an American Heartsaver!

Know the Symptoms

Know the symptoms of heart attack and cardiac arrest. The warning signs of a heart attack are:

- fullness, squeezing or pain in the center of the chest lasting more than a few minutes
- Pain spreading to the shoulders, neck or arms
- Chest discomfort with lightheadedness, fainting, sweating, nausea or shortness of breath.

When a person goes into cardiac arrest, the heart's electrical impulses become chaotic. This irregular heart rhythm, called ventricular fibrillation, causes the heart to stop suddenly. The warning signs of cardiac arrest are

different:

- ► The person collapses
- Loss of consciousness
- Stops breathing
- Loses pulse and blood pressure.

Once you realize that someone is having a heart attack or is in cardiac arrest CALL 911 IMMEDIATELY!! 911 links the victim to the health care system.

Start CPR. CPR is important because it maintains blood flow to the heart and brain until medical help arrives. I encourage you to learn how to give CPR through one of the courses offered by the American Heart Association. About 80% of cardiac emergencies happen at home, so the victim will likely be someone you know and love.

Recognizing the signs and symptoms, calling 911 and beginning CPR are part of what the American Heart Association calls the "Chain of Survival," a process for providing quick treatment in the event of sudden cardiac arrest.

For information on CPR courses, call 1-877-AHA-4CPR toll-free or visit www.cpr-ecc.americanheart.org. I am also a CPR instructor, so classes are a possibility if you are interested. Let me know. As always I can be reached through the church office or at home (835-2372).

Pastor Mary's Column

The Body of Christ

During the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity in January, there was time for both action and reflection on being a part of the body of Christ. I had the privilege of leading the January 20 Sanctuary service where a number of Emmaus folks were represented.

What music! What spirit! The Zoe Praise Team from Zoe Outreach Ministries (Zoe is the Greek word for "life") had us standing on our feet with their upbeat music.

Velvetta Hargrove, our Community Outreach Minister and one of the vocalists in the group, motioned for me to come join the Praise Team. I thought, "Help! Doesn't she know I can't sing?" Fortunately, a couple others also came forward to "rescue" me!

As I mentioned in my sermon the following Sunday, I had been stretched and moved outside my comfort zone as we worshiped together with our African American brothers and sisters that evening. It was truly a time when we joined hearts and hands and voices as we worshiped and praised God together.

As one Lutheran pastor put it, "Tonight I have seen here a glimpse of the kingdom."

As we continue to find our common threads with Christians from other denominations and faith traditions, does that mean we give up something as Lutherans? Do we

lose our identity? No, not at all! More than ever, I celebrate being Lutheran. I celebrate our emphasis on Word and Sacrament.

I know as a Lutheran that God has claimed me in my Baptism and that I can't even begin to describe what the wonder of God's grace is all about. I know that Lutherans are actively a part of building community and struggling with issues of social justice.

As a part of the ELCA, I am reminded that we are part of a much larger community. I am grateful for the emphasis in this synod on collegiality and mission; the church is strengthened by such commitment.

As we remain strong in our identity as Lutherans (and as many of us are influenced by the Scandinavian roots of our piety), we can celebrate those places of common ground with a variety of Christians. And as we share in worship, fellowship and learning together, it is my prayer that the Body of Christ will become even stronger in our own community.

Even though we may be "stretched" at times, I yearn for more "glimpses of the kingdom" in the months and years to come. I hope you will join me as those opportunities present themselves—we will all be richer for it.





Pastor Mary, Marty Aiken Attend Anti-Racism Training

February 8-10, Pastor Mary and Marty Aiken had the privilege of attending the first Anti-Racism Training session sponsored by the Greater Milwaukee Synod. They were part of the initial group of fellow synod members to undergo training.

The session was designed and taught by Crossroads Ministry, who many of us recognize as a Racine neighbor with

Racine neighbor with many connections to Emmaus. Supported by the Siebert Lutheran Foundation, these sessions are an integral part of the synod's commitment to self-understanding and genuine openness towards achieving greater justice and mutual community on matters of race and culture.

If there was a single theme to the training, it could be summed up in Jesus' words "I have come that they might have life, and have it more abundantly." The suspicion often is that in order to be "antiracist" we must accept criticism or

"give-up" something we have or are. The encouragement of Crossroad's spiritual insight into racism is that it is racism that is forever asking us to give up something of who God is saying we are.

Being anti-racist is to claim God's identity of who we are, and how we are to be in relation to all of God's children and our neighbors. As we begin to open ourselves up to our neighborhood we have the great encouragement that we are giving God a new opportunity to open up "more abundantly" to us.



5 tips for talking with someone about alcohol or drug abuse

One-third of the residents of Wisconsin and Upper Michigan are directly affected by alcohol abuse and drug addiction, either through their own behavior or that of a loved one. But how do you talk with another person about this touchy subject? Here are some tips:

- Don't discuss it when the person is drinking or high. A better time to talk is shortly after an incident of abuse, when the person is hung over or remorseful.
- ▶ Be specific about incidents of abuse. Don't blame or generalize by saying, "You always...."
- Use "I" phrases, such as "I noticed...I'm worried."
- **Don't worry if you don't say** things perfectly. What's most important is to talk, listen and show a caring attitude.
- Don't be discouraged if the person denies the problem. Denial is a common symptom of addictive diseases. But be prepared to immediately set up a contact with a professional resource or self-help group if the person is ready to accept help.



Lutherans Help Make Winning Touchdown for 'Souper Bowl'

CHICAGO (ELCA) — As the New England Patriots of the National Football League claimed victory on "Super Bowl Sunday" Feb. 3, thousands of Lutherans also made the "winning touchdown" in a challenge of a different kind.

Members of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) participated in "Souper Bowl of Caring," a national effort to fight hunger. Organizers reported their results on game day. As of Feb. 6, about 6,350 faith groups across the country raised \$2.6 million. The total is posted on www.souperbowl.org — the Souper Bowl of Caring's Web site.

Seven congregations of the ELCA Northwest Synod of Wisconsin participated in the Souper Bowl of Caring. Members of Osseo Evangelical Lutheran Church, Osseo, Wis., contributed canned goods and \$281.73 to support the Tri-County Food Pantry. Young members of Joy Lutheran Church, Prescott, Wis., collected \$239.55 for the Prescott Food Shelf, and the youth group at Our Saviour's Lutheran Church, Stanley, Wis., collected \$92.00 for the ELCA World Hunger Appeal.

With one dollar, the ELCA World Hunger Appeal can provide food for one day for children with AIDS living in Africa, said Stephen Padre, associate director for hunger and disaster appeal communication, ELCA Department for

Communication. In the United States a dollar can leverage \$15 worth of surplus food for local food banks, he said.

Souper Bowl of Caring began when the Rev. Brad Smith, Spring Valley Presbyterian Church, Columbia, S.C., made reference to the National Football League's



Super Bowl Sunday as "Souper Bowl" Sunday in a prayer. The senior youth fellowship of the congregation

took the pun in earnest, and a national effort to fight hunger was born. Smith now serves full-time as executive director of Souper Bowl of Caring.

The partnership has grown from 22 churches in 1990 to more than 12,500 congregations in Canada and in every U.S. state. The effort generated more than \$3.6 million in 2001. Lutheran congregations raised about \$500,000 for local and national hunger organizations and the ELCA World Hunger Appeal.





Palestinian Bishop Blasts Media Reporting

CHICAGO (ELCA) — Lutheran

Palestinians working for peace and reconciliation in the Middle East are not featured in most international news reports, according to the Rev. Munib A. Younan, bishop of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Jordan (and Palestine).



The dehumanization is "counterproductive" to negotiation efforts between Israelis and Palestinians, Younan contended. He said that most of the world does not know about the "90 percent of Palestinians who are seeking justice, peace and reconciliation or

two-state resolution."



Bishop Younan

Younan said some international editorial writers and political leaders, including some in the United States, have linked Palestinians to the Taliban. "We are not the Taliban. Osama bin Laden does not care for the Palestinian cause. To make an analogy

that Mr. Yassar Arafat is against the American administration and like Bin Laden is wrong. Mr. Arafat is with the American administration, not against it," Younan said.

The 2001 ELCA Churchwide Assembly called for an end to suicide bombings, urged international protection for Palestinian people in Israeli-occupied territories and acknowledged the "pain and suffering" of all involved in Middle East tensions.

ELCA Continues Response to 9/11 Attacks

CHICAGO (ELCA) — In the wake of the September 11 terrorist attacks, U.S. Lutherans have responded with a record-setting outpouring of support for affected individuals, families and communities. Income as of mid-January was \$20 million, a total that is expected to rise.

The ELCA has received over \$6.5 million from members and congregations. As of December 18, ELCA Domestic Disaster Response had disbursed \$2.7 million of that amount.

Lutheran Disaster Response-New York has been coordinating its efforts with other disaster response partners, including ecumenical and secular organizations. LDR-NY is helping provide grief counseling for children, tuition assistance for Lutheran school students who have lost family members, and ministry to immigrants and undocumented workers.


A Different Kind of Excitement

FROM THE

PASTOR

Last week, I was having breakfast with some friends who are pastors. During the conversation, my call to Emmaus came up, and one of them commented that I did not seem excited about it.

I replied that, quite the contrary, I was very excited about it, but ... it was a different kind of excitement — the kind that happens when something that has been there all along has finally been made official. I say that because I felt a



Pastor Mary and I talked for perhaps ten minutes, a rough number of hours and responsibilities were agreed upon, salary was touched upon, but no set amount was chipped in stone. Somehow, it didn't seem important to me at the time.

Something else was moving me; I like to believe it was the Holy

Spirit, because when I tried to tell my husband about the conversation, he smiled and said, "That's what you might call an open-ended contract!"

I had to agree, but I told him that I felt that there would be three of us working under this agreement: Emmaus, the Spirit, and myself, and after all, short of the Greater Milwaukee Synod shuffling and signing some papers, isn't that *really* what a "call" is all about?

How can I help but feel excitement, and may the Holy Spirit keep moving us wherever it may lead.

The talented Sanctuary band will have a more integral part in worship leadership, with Pastor Kris leading the service weekly. More emphasis will be placed on building community and on reaching out to


the wider community.



Community Meal Program Begins 22nd Year of Service

Community Meal Recipe

Ingredients:

2 lbs. ground beef Onion (chopped, diced or grated)

1½ lbs. french cut green beans (frozen)

2 cans of cream of chicken or cream of mushroom soup

11/2 lbs. tater tots

Brown the beef, onion, salt and pepper and put in the bottom of a 9"x13" pan.

Sprinkle the green beans over the beef. Pour both cans of soup over the beans.

Spread the tater tots over the top of the whole kit and kaboodle.

Bake at 350° for 45 minutes.

Nancy Smith sent me two excellent paperback books on how to start a book club. They both are very helpful in instructing us how to plan our book club meetings.


The book chosen for our April



ELCA Bishops Told LWF Prays in Wake of Sept. 11

VANCOUVER, B.C. (ELCA) — The trauma of the Sept. 11 terrorist attacks on the United States is "still deeply rooted," in the United States, said the president of the Lutheran World Federation (LWF). The Rev. Christian Krause assured the ELCA Conference of Bishops that LWF members throughout the world continue to pray for healing.

Krause, who recently retired is bishop of the Evangelical

Lutheran Church in Brunswick (Germany), spoke to the ELCA Conference of Bishops on March 11, the six-month anniversary of the terrorist attacks. He noted the events of Sept. 11 were one of three events that changed the world at the turn of the millennium. "Our guarantee of security ended," he said of that day.

about peace and reconciliation, Krause said. "How about calling for an 'axis of hope, faith and love,' rather than pointing out where the good guys and bad guys are?"

Other events which Krause cited as having changed the world at the turn of the millennium are the end of the Cold War in Europe and globalization in electronic communication and economic activity.

The end of the Cold War offers opportunities in Eastern Europe, where there are few Christians, he said. In other parts of the world, he said, churches in the Southern Hemisphere have been neglected, and "charismatic movements" are growing.

Krause discussed the LWFoperated Augusta Victoria Hospital, located on the Mount of Olives in execution of thousands of Anabaptists for their belief in the complete separation of church and state, which threatened the church-state society of the day.

Anabaptists hold generally that the Christian sacrament of Baptism is valid upon confession of faith. "Anabaptism" means "re-baptism." Mennonites take their name from the "Mennonite Confession of Faith," which was developed by such Swiss Anabaptists as Menno Simons.

Jerusalem. Most of its patients are Palestinians, some of whom are part of a dwindling Christian presence there. "We are determined to stay (at Augusta Victoria) for our Christian brothers and sisters, and we pray for peace for all."

Augusta Victoria Hospital is currently involved in a tax case with the Israeli government. Israel wants the hospital to pay millions of dollars in back employment taxes, from which the hospital has been exempt for many years. The case is now in an Israeli court, and a judge overseeing the case has urged the parties to reach a resolution.

The issue is not necessarily the hospital building, he said. "It's the soil," Krause said. "We have made it clear we will not move. We do hope we can solve this issue."

Spirit of the Living God, Fall Afresh on Me

As I sit down to write these words of reflection, it's the beginning of Holy Week. It's gray and windy and cold outside, not looking like the spring season that is indicated on the calendar.

It is Lent and it feels like Lent, but I realize that you will probably be reading this in the Easter season. So, it's not appropriate to have a focus on darkness, is it?

But, the darkness is real to me today — as I hear about more deaths of Palestinians and Israelis, as more

remains are being uncovered at Ground Zero, as I read of an escalating rate of suicides of young people in our country, as families struggle with serious health issues.

But, just as real to me is hope. It may be a bit like the people on the eastern seaboard hoping for rain to fill their reservoirs and bring the promise of on-going life. But, it's more than just spring rains that I long for. It is my prayer that I personally and we together as a congregation experience in a whole new way the promise of the resurrection this year.

The song "Spirit of the Living God, Fall Afresh on Me" keeps running through my head. I find myself praying for spiritual renewal and signs for the living God as we enter the Easter season. I pray that

the *living* God will be revealed to us in a whole new way this Easter — that as we walk the road to Emmaus (take time to read Luke 24 again) with the resurrected Christ, we will be able to say with certainty, "Yes! Death has been conquered! No! Darkness and sin and brokenness do *not* have the final word!"

I pray fervently that the young people who find themselves surrounded by darkness, might have the miracle of God's hope and light and promise revealed to them. It is my prayer that the Spirit of the living God fall afresh on each of us, showing us the promise of new life.

Jesus knew darkness beyond what any of us ever will. Yet, God had the power to conquer even that death and darkness, moving us to declare, "Christ is Risen! He is risen indeed!"

I celebrate that our God is a God of miracles and that in the resurrection of Jesus Christ we are able to live as people of hope. God is a God of *life!* That makes all the difference in the world.

Please join me this Easter season as we pray, "Spirit of the *Living* God, Fall Afresh on Us..." that we may be renewed and may live life fully in the resurrection promise. Let's walk into the Easter season as people of light and life!




Women Tell of Malagasy Church Growth

ELCA Council Approves 'Stand With Africa'

CHICAGO (ELCA) April 11— The Church Council of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) designated \$350,000 to support "Stand With Africa," a three-year Lutheran campaign that focuses on issues significant to Africa, including HIV/AIDS, economic justice, food security, and peace and reconciliation.

The Church Council is the ELCA's board of directors and serves as the legislative authority of the church between its churchwide assemblies. The council met here April 5-7.

on the fifth and final ballot for bishop, receiving 267 of 477 votes cast, or 56%, to 210 votes, or 44%, for the Rev. Susan Tjornehoj,

assistant to the bishop of the Saint Paul Area Synod.

Rogness' term as bishop of the Greater Milwaukee Synod was due to expire this year. "I intend to work with leadership in both synods to see that the summer months make for smooth transitions in both places," Rogness said.

Born in 1945 in Mason City, Iowa, Rogness grew up in St. Paul and was graduated from Augustana College, Sioux Falls, S.D., and Luther Seminary. He was ordained July 8, 1973. He served Wellington Park Church, Milwaukee, from 1973-75, and Hephatha Church, a primarily African-American congregation on Milwaukee's north side, from 1975-85. In 1985 he was

elected bishop of the Southern Wisconsin District of the American Lutheran Church (ALC), and following the formation of the ELCA, was elected bishop of the Greater Milwaukee Synod, where he has served since 1987.

His wife, Gerry, teaches fourth grade in the Milwaukee public schools. They are the parents of four children and also have one grandchild.

The Saint Paul Area Synod is one of 65 synods in the ELCA and includes 120 congregations with some 165,000 baptized members in Anoka, Chisago, Dakota, Isanti, Ramsey, Scott, and Washington counties. Its offices are located in St. Paul.

Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod (LCMS) World Relief, and Lutheran World Relief — the overseas relief and development agency of the ELCA and LCMS — the campaign includes a strategy for increasing available financial resources by encouraging individual and congregational giving for Africa.

The council moved to ask members of the ELCA to support Stand With Africa with the "intensity that disasters elicit, but understanding that 'marathon' rather than 'sprint' giving is required."

In the same resolution, the council acknowledged that, in addition to the \$350,000 it designated, additional funds had been provided by the ELCA since 1999 to respond to the crisis in Africa. That included \$1.45 million in ELCA World Hunger funds and \$325,000 from the church's Ministry Among People Living in Poverty funds.

The council also moved to a c k n o w l e d g e "with appreciation" a report from 16 ELCA leaders who participated in a Stand With Africa study trip last January. The study trip was "a life-changing experience for me," the Rev. Callon W. Holloway Jr., bishop of the ELCA Southern Ohio Synod, Columbus, told council members.

Holloway said it was difficult "to grasp the tragedy in

Africa, especially the HIV/AIDS crisis, refugees and poverty. That was overwhelming. We often hear about the crisis in Africa. But, not until you actually witness it can you appreciate the gravity of the tragedy. At the same time, I was surprised to see that there is hope among the people of Africa."

The study group's "intent was to send a message to the church" on the severity of the situation in Africa, said Earl L. Mummert, Harrisburg, Pa., council member. "Our church has contributed more than \$2 million. To me, that is sending a message. But we need to raise substantially more than that to make any kind of a difference in Africa," he said.

Ellen T. Maxon, Hartland, Wis., council member, asked the council to reconsider its decision on designating \$350,000 for Stand With Africa efforts and increase the designated amount. Her motion was defeated.


There are many stores and restaurants that participate in the Scrip program. We keep a number of retailers on hand, but are happy to order anything you need.

Exercise, Diet Are Crucial for Healthy Bones

Many women suffer from osteoporosis. The disease can also affect men. The term osteoporosis comes from Latin and may be translated "porous bones." Osteoporosis is a progressive disease in which the bones gradually become weaker and weaker, causing changes in posture and making the person very susceptible to fractures.

Women are most often affected because of hormonal and nutritional factors. Half of all women between the ages of forty-five and seventy-five show signs of some degree of osteoporosis (bone loss.)

Several factors are known to influence a person's risk of developing osteoporosis. The first, and probably the most important, is

the peak bone mass achieved in adulthood; if the bones are larger and more dense, bone loss is not as critical. Small fine-boned women are at greater risk, as are women of northern European or Asian background.

Dietary and lifestyle habits are also important. Calcium intake is important, but one must also be aware that a diet high in animal protein, salt and sugar causes the body to excrete increased amounts of calcium. Caffeine, alcohol and some drugs have similar effects.

Exercise also plays an important part because the body responds to weight-bearing exercise (such as walking) by depositing more mineral in the bones of the legs, hips and spines.

While osteoporosis causes no specific symptoms until it is advanced, there are some early warning signs that may signal that bone loss is occurring. These include a gradual loss of height, a stooping or rounding of the shoulders, and generalized aches and pains. If you notice that your clothes deem to be getting longer, that may be a clue.

Recommendations for prevention of osteoporosis are:

- Eat plenty of foods that are high in calcium and vitamin D. Good sources include broccoli, clams, dark green leafy vegetables, flounder salmon, shrimp and tofu.
- Consume whole grains and calcium foods at different times. It is best to take calcium at bedtime when it is best absorbed.

• Soft drinks, high-protein animal

foods and alcohol may slow calcium use by the body. High amounts of salt and sugar and smoking may also interfere with calcium intake.

Talk with your doctor about c a l c i u m s u p p l e m e n t s. Thyroid hormones, anticoagulant and some diuretics may alter the amount of

- calcium you need. Your needs may be higher or lower depending on the medications you are taking.
- Keep active and exercise regularly. A lack of exercise can result in the loss of calcium. Many sources indicate that walking is the best exercise for maintaining bone mass.
- Encourage young people to eat foods that are high in calcium and to exercise regularly. Bone mass built in formative and young adult years may be the best prevention for osteoporosis.

We know that walking is good and also that praying is good. You might combine both into your personal "Prayer Walk." As you are walking pray for those you meet and for needs that come to mind as you walk. I have heard some powerful testimonies of prayer at work.



Greater Milwaukee Synod was created in 1987. Rogness was elected bishop of the Saint Paul Area

Synod Apr. 21.

Stumme-Diers was elected on the fifth and final ballot for bishop, receiving 252 of 461 votes cast, or 55%, to 209 votes, or 45%, for the Rev. Greg Van Dunk, pastor at All People's Church, Milwaukee.

Keep Safe in Your Back Yard

by Carol Eschmann, RN

Summer in Wisconsin means we spend more time outside playing and working in our yards. I would like to share some safety tips that may help you to enjoy the outdoors even more.

Use a sun-safe sunscreen that protects against ultraviolet-A and violet-B. The SPF should be at least 15. Apply the product to all exposed areas and reapply following the directions. UV radiation can penetrate clouds, so sunscreen is necessary all the time. It may also be wise to wear protective clothing and a hat for more protection from the sun.

Take regular rest breaks and drink plenty of fluids on hot days. Take the necessary steps to avoid heat exhaustion and heat stroke. Symptoms of heat stroke include

chills, nausea, dizziness, weakness, confusion and clammy skin. If you experience any of these symptoms, lie down in a cool place and drink plenty of fluids. Heat stroke symptoms include dry skin, shallow breathing, rapid pulse, small pupils, high body temperature and unconsciousness. If someone you know is experiencing these

Work during the afternoons or evenings if you suffer from hay fever, asthma, or other breathing disorders or allergies. Pollen is usually released from 5:00 a.m. to 10:00 a.m., so it is best to avoid working outside in the morning.

Respite Ministry Offers Varied Services

Caregiver Support Specialist can help to support and assist care givers to maintain their physical and emotional well-being.

In-Home Respite Care provides trained volunteers who go into the home to stay with the dependent person while the care giver takes a "time out."

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Be safe with your lawn mower. Do not mow slippery, wet grass. If your yard is on a steep hill, be sure to cut across the slope, rather than mowing up and down the hill. Clear your yard of any rocks or sticks before you begin to mow. Always wear protective shoes and eyewear. You might also consider ear protection. Small children should not be anywhere near mowing equipment.

Protect yourself from insect bites. Use an insect repellant on all exposed areas of skin. If you are stung, use tweezers to remove the stinger. Use a cold, wet cloth or an ice cube to relieve the pain. To relieve itching and inflammation, use a calamine lotion or hydrocortisone cream. If you or someone you know has a serious reaction to an insect sting, contact your primary care physician. If breathing is affected or unconsciousness occurs, call 911. Symptoms of a serious reaction could include:

- Difficulty breathing
- Swelling around the eyes, lips or throat
- Numbness or cramping
- Hives and itching all over the body
- Slurred speech, nausea or vomiting
- Mental confusion
- Unconsciousness

Have emergency numbers and a first aid kit nearby. Place paramedics and poison control center important numbers such as doctor, near the phones. You should always have your address near the phone so that if a guest must call they will be able to give your correct address.

The first aid kit should include assorted Band-Aids, sterile gauze pads/rolls, small scissors, tweezers, elastic bandages, chemical cold packs, antiseptic wipes and antibiotic cream. You may also want to include Aspirin or Tylenol.



KidsHope Looks Forward to Third Year

Always trying to take a creative view of what Kids Hope is, while never overlooking the details, is a pretty good description of what I try to do as our Kids Hope director. Recently I was given both a uniquely creative way of viewing Kids Hope, and a new set of details I had never anticipated.

Both perspective and details came from the teachers at Wadewitz. And, in the "wonderful ways of the Lord," rather than feeling I had been guilty of an oversight I felt privileged to be a part of an ongoing blessing. Let me share with you what I have been learning.

I was in discussion with the

teachers whether our mentors should continue on to the third grade with their children, or begin again with new students in the first grade. We have very finite resources as a congregation and a need to be prudent stewards in their use. An obvious limitation is the number of people who can serve as mentors.

We can be very proud that even with our limitations in size we have served Wadewitz as people of generosity rather than shortcomings. We have approximately 30 people serving in a committed way inside Wadewitz. By contrast, Big Brothers/Big Sisters has only 90 relationships in the city of Racine.

Limburg continues, "We are entering the third year of the program, and the church's commitment is as strong as the first The mentors are extremely reliable. If a mentor cannot make a session, the


church provides a substitute mentor. The KidsHope USA model stresses the importance of honoring one's commitment to the students, and these mentors do that."

This is an extraordinary comparison.

So I began presenting my dilemma to the teachers, and this is when I soon began to be amazed. The first teacher, almost before the question was finished, answered me immediately: "Continue into the




"Their mentor may be the one individual who has built up a relationship with the child that has developed trust between them. And the relationship is just right, neither too much nor too little, to allow the child to depend upon them. Your mentors will be the people they need."

I was amazed. Notice that I was trying to ask about an imminent shortcoming, and she answered me by telling me about unique resources that only we had to give. And, they weren't resources that we had to begin with, but were resources entrusted to us through the initial risks of giving more than we thought we had.

Every other teacher said the same thing. I am tempted to say "even" the first grade teachers, but I should say "especially" the first grade teachers. By saying this they put themselves at risk of not having something they now want, our mentors with their children. But they also still think of those new third graders as their children, and won't sacrifice their care for them to the teachers' own convenience.

Those first grade teachers are my new models. They are willing to take a risk, and to trust that they will receive what they need. What they need are a few more of us to come share with them the opportunity to care for their children.

Ask yourselves if maybe there was something you missed learning in the first grade. If there was, please pray about it and see if this might be your chance to go back and learn it.

Study Finds Risks in Hormone Replacement Therapy

Women's health issues are in the news daily. Many of you have received information about recent findings of the Women's Health Institute regarding Hormone Replacement Therapy (HRT). The Women's Health Initiative is one of the largest prevention studies of its kind. The study was designed to look at the effects not only of HRT, but also diet modification and vitamin and mineral supplements.

Nearly 67,000 women nation wide are participating in the clinical trials. The study is also following the medical history and health habits of another very large group of women to examine the relationship between lifestyle, health and risk factors with specific disease outcomes. Final results are expected in 2006.

Information about HRT is readily available. I have posted the informational letter from All Saints regarding this important issue. I wish to share some alternative therapies so that you can make informed choices with your physician. Your personal risk factors affect your options.


You can reduce risk of heart disease by stopping smoking and by keeping your weight, cholesterol levels and blood pressure under control. Some antidepressants can relieve hot flashes. There are some options to help protect against osteoporosis. Weight bearing exercise (walking) also prevents loss of bone.

Herbal remedies are also available. The newsletter from the Medical College of Wisconsin urges caution: "Just because something is derived from a plant does not necessarily mean it is safe. Some herbal remedies work a little, but some don't work at all. Many have potentially dangerous health risks. There is even less data on herbal remedies than on HRT."

You should discuss any alternative herbal therapies with your physician or pharmacist as they can interact with other medications you may be taking.

The most important message is that women need to understand the risks and benefits so they can make informed choices about hormone replacement. Your physician or nurse practitioner is the best person to discuss your concerns with because he/she knows your complete health history.

At press time, there are twelve openings in the September 18 Hormone Replacement Therapy Roundtable. However, if you are interested in these informative sessions, be sure to phone LifeSpan at 687-4800.

The decision followed a June meeting at which synod officials conveyed their finding that Redeemer was no longer a viable congregation.

Redeemer Lutheran Church began in 1906 with fifteen families who met for worship in the pastor's attic. It has shared space for the past two years with Cristo Rey, a Hispanic ministry. Rick Deines reports that plans are for Cristo Rey to continue use of the building.

The 2002 ELCA yearbook lists Redeemer as having 102 members and a weekly worship attendance of 43.

How Large Is Our Church?

As a Pastor, I am very often asked the question, "How large is

your church?" I struggle with how best to answer that question.

Do I quickly reply with a figure of 600+ and leave it at that? That number represents those baptized folks "on the rolls," but I don't think it leaves an accurate impression of Emmaus.

Or, do I refer to numbers representing regular contributors or

average weekly attendance? matter what I answer, I get responses that vary from "Oh, that's a good-sized church" to "I didn't realize your church was so small."

As Paul Berge has undertaken the tedious task of trying to decipher faded script of former pastors and record-keepers (written in Danish until the 1930's), over the past months he has transferred name after name and date after date to a computerized record of baptisms since 1851. Behind what is recorded in those old tomes are stories of how large our church actually was and is.

In the 1870's, '80's and '90's, there were as many as 120 people baptized in any given year. As people "came off the boat," leaving behind families and friends in the old country, they came to Emmaus

and to other churches in the area. eager to be a part of this new family.

Also behind those names and dates are stories of lives impacted by the words, "baptized in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit." As a family of God, we share a promise, and we share a part of our pilgrimage of faith together. And, those who were here before us have shaped our church and our lives in ways we cant even name. The words of Hebrew 12 come to mind:

Therefore, since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us also lay aside every weight and the sin that clings so closely, and let us run with perseverance the race that is set before us, looking to Jesus the pioneer and perfecter of our faith...

On Sunday, September 8, there will be a visual reminder of that cloud of witnesses as a long, long paper chain will be hanging around the sanctuary. On each link will be one of the nearly 5,000 names who are included in this "cloud of witnesses" of those baptized at Emmaus.

Many of those dear saints have gone before us, leaving a legacy of ⇒ Continued on page 33



Denise has already learned how to use the multi-projector, and she often finds herself on the phone or the internet tapping the resources that will help enhance the program.


Jamie Toslek has assumed the



The success of the Academy Award-winning movie, "A Beautiful Mind," starring Russell Crowe as the Nobel Prize-winning mathematician John Nash, has opened the door to widespread public discussion of mental illness, symptoms, treatment and recovery. Some viewers are surprised to find persons with mental illness can and do contribute to society.

The film invites compassion as it reveals the progress of a beautiful mind destroyed by schizophrenia. Perhaps it is most effective in drawing the audience into the

delusions of Nash's mind to the point where the viewer doesn not know what is hallucination and what is reality.

But the film does not leave us without hope. Nash was able to survive years of madness, and in an almost miraculous way come out on the other side. Not all persons with mental illnesses have such remissions.

Those interested in John Nash's story will want to read the original book, A Beautiful Mind, by Sylvia Nasar, published by Simon & Schuster, 1998.


Pastor Mary's Column

Rooted, But Not Rootbound

Tell me about your roots ... If someone you knew and trusted were to ask you to do just that, to look at

your heritage and your roots and expound on them, how might you respond?

During this month of October, I will be reflecting on that question at more than one level.



What? You've never heard of it? It's a large annual Scandinavian festival, complete with food, art, handmade goods, entertainment, and several ambassadors visiting from Scandinavia.

This year, I look forward to meeting a long-lost Norwegian relative who will be at the festival displaying and selling his art work. I'll also eat lefse and other Norwegian treats as I listen to family stories of days gone by. Celebrating my heritage and recognizing that those roots run deep will be highlights of my North Dakota visit.

Later in October, we will have

another celebration at Emmaus. On the last Sunday of the month, red balloons and banners and paraments

The questions are now being asked by a number of ELCA Lutherans of Racine, "How do we reform our old notions of "turf" and

begin seeing ourselves as a city-wide parish of the ELCA? How can we partner and collaborate to better serve the whole people of God?"

I'm proud to be the pastor of Emmaus, because I truly believe that you also look at new possibilities and ways of sharing God's love and grace. We are able to join God in the on-going work of re-creation, reformation and re-visioning.

I thank God for the privilege of being a part of the Racine community and the rich resources that are ours to share. We pray for God's guidance as we journey together, partners in building up God's Kingdom here on earth.






All proceeds will go toward the Summer Youth Trip to Atlanta.







Moving Forward in a Cooperative Spirit

John Donne (1572-1631) once said, "No man is an island..." As some of you might guess, in this century, I'd add, "No woman is an island."

When we are participating members of the Body of Christ, we know how important it is to be a part of a larger community. We are not placed on this earth to be isolated and so fiercely independent that our only concern is "me, myself, and I." Rather, we are healthier and thrive more fully when we live in relationship,

interdependence and mutual caring.

As I was talking recently with the director

of a non-profit agency dealing with job placement and counseling, he told me that those who are a part of a faith community have a higher rate of employment, job retention and wages than those who are not.

Being a part of a caring, supportive community can and does make a difference at a number of levels. We know what it is to encourage and network and pray for one another. When times are challenging, we know we're not alone.

No Church Is an Island

I'd like to add to John Donne's insight that "No church is an island." Not too many years ago, the trend

for Lutheran churches was to emphasize the autonomy of individual congregations, and with that came emphasis on "turf." Lutheran churches saw themselves in competition as they vied for the loyalty of those who already called themselves Lutheran. Here in Racine, there have often been accusations of "sheep stealing" as disgruntled Lutherans have left one church for another.

I'm happy to report that hard work is now being done by the ELCA

clergy of Racine to reverse that trend.

We acknowledge that there are some ELCA congregations in transition due to a recent conflict or

pastoral vacancy. We are also aware that during those times there will be members of those churches choosing to worship elsewhere.

For some, that may simply be a need to have a sheltering, nurturing place for a time. Following time for healing or change, those members will eventually want to return to their home church. There will be others who will want to make their change a permanent one.

We as clergy in Racine have agreed that we will not receive membership transfers from ELCA churches undergoing major transition. Instead, we will welcome

any of their members as full participants at any time.

And then, when a new pastor/staff is in place in their home church, those members can discern where they would like their membership. It is our hope that this policy will minimize hasty decisions that might be regretted later. It is also our goal to be supportive of those congregations and members that might be most vulnerable during difficult times of transition and not to take advantage of them in any way.

Cooperation Benefits All

This spirit of cooperation and collaboration among ELCA congregations goes much further. As the result of partnerships, several congregations have been recipients of generous grant monies that would not have been available to the churches individually. That has been true for grants received from the Siebert Lutheran Foundation, Aid Association for Lutherans, Lutheran Brotherhood, and the Synod Outreach Fund.

For Emmaus, that funding has allowed us to be much more intentional about neighborhood outreach: Kids Hope USA mentoring program, EASY (Emmaus After School for Youth) and last summer's six-week Neighborhood Camp. Other ELCA congregations in partnership have also received funding for Neighborhood Camp and for church/school outreach. What a

difference cooperation and collaboration can make!

This is just a beginning of collaborative ministries among the ELCA congregations of Racine. How can we vision and dream in a way that will lead us to a "One Body, One Spirit" way of thinking and being? Those questions will be asked as the ELCA clergy of Racine meet on November 14 for a full day retreat at the DeKoven Center.

Please keep the "One Body, One Spirit" vision in your prayers (and give me a call if you would like to be a part of the clergy/lay visioning team which is bound to follow). I am grateful that you of Emmaus so often capture that vision of the wider church!

May God guide us in our journey together.





ELCA Council Hears of 'Positive' ELCA-LCMS Conversation

CHICAGO (ELCA) — A Nov. 12 meeting in St. Louis of the Committee on Lutheran Cooperation (CLC), in which leaders of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) and Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod (LCMS) met to discuss matters of mutual interest. had a "different tone" and was "positive" compared to other recent meetings, said the Rev. Mark S. Hanson, ELCA presiding bishop, in a report to the ELCA Church Council.

The Church Council is the ELCA's board of directors and serves as the legislative authority of the church between churchwide assemblies.

In recent years, the relationship between the two churches has been In 2000, the LCMS stained. convention declared that it does not "consider [the ELCA] to be an orthodox Lutheran church body" and called for a review of cooperative ministries in which the LCMS and ELCA are partners.

Recent meetings between the leaders of the ELCA and LCMS, arranged by the late Rev. A. L. Barry, who was LCMS president, and the Rev. H. George Anderson, former ELCA presiding bishop, "were not particularly productive," Hanson said.

At the CLC meeting, LCMS officials expressed concern about the ELCA's current sexuality studies and the possibility that the ELCA may change its policies regarding ordination, Hanson said.

Other subjects discussed at the CLC meeting included cooperative ministries of the two churches, such as Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Services, Lutheran Disaster Response, Lutheran World Relief and Lutheran Services in America. and issues related to the current ELCA dialogues with Christians of the Roman Catholic and Orthodox traditions.

Hanson told the council that meetings with LCMS officials will take place every six months.

Hanson also addressed several other matters in his report to the council:

In response to recent concerns raised by some members of the Division for Church in Society board, Hanson defended his public statements on the situation between the governments of the United States and Irag.

"I take seriously that a pastor is called to speak publicly as a public leader," he said, adding that his comments are based in the social policy statements of the ELCA. Hanson — and other church leaders - criticized talk by U.S. officials about a pre-emptive strike against Iraq, which he said could not be justified under historic principles of "iust war."

Hanson said he is "deeply dismayed" at the decline in giving to the ELCA World Hunger Appeal, which may end the fiscal year as much as \$1 million behind its budget of \$16.5 million.



Synod Panel Urges Peaceful Solutions for Iraq

The following is a Statement Regarding Possible War with Iraq, passed by Peace and Justice Committee of the Greater Milwaukee Synod, November 6, 2002:

Congress has passed a momentous resolution granting President Bush the unilateral power to wage war against Iraq should he deem such a course necessary to disarm Saddam Hussein of weapons of mass destruction, as required by several U.N. Resolutions. The Congressional Resolution charges the President to consult with allies and to seek approval from the U.N. Security Council, but clearly gives him authority to proceed on his own

The debate in Congress over this grant of power was unfortunately colored by political considerations during this fall's congressional elections and was blurred by deep diplomatic misunderstandings and disputes among our allies and within the Security Council. Accordingly, we believe that a rush to war with Iraq is ill advised and should be avoided pending further public discussion of the issues.

judgment.

The Constitution of the United States wisely assigns the war-making power to the people, acting through their representatives in Congress. The executive branch is given no necessary role in this process. We believe the founding fathers were correct and that it is always

improper-and arguably unconstitutional-to cede this power to the executive. Such a grant of power to President Johnson in the 1964 Gulf of Tonkin resolution was used to circumvent congressional oversight of the Vietnam war. The results are well remembered.

The specter of war with Iraq poses not only constitutional and political problems; it raises—most importantly—the moral question of justice. As Christians we are committed to peace—to the propo-

sition that war is justified only as a last resort — after all peaceful means have failed and a hostile attack has occurred or is clearly imminent. To wage "preemptive war" is to undercut the only moral justification for the use of force.

We believe that in view of all these concerns, President Bush should be advised not to proceed toward war without fully exhausting diplomatic measures and then only as a "last resort."

We urge Christians to join us in communicating this message to the President and to members of Congress.

Pastor Sharon's Column

You Shall Eat Your Fill and Bless the Lord'

I just had a short conversation with our youngest son, Brent. He is part of the "loss prevention" team at ShopKo. He is one of the people that watch the cameras and detain or chase shoplifters.

I asked him about his work schedule for the next few days, because I had several projects I wanted him to do (like put up the Christmas lights) over then next few weeks. He reminded me that Thanksgiving marks the beginning of the feeding frenzy we refer to as "holiday shopping" and one of the busiest times for security in retail stores. I asked his forgiveness, that I, a mother, would forget such an important event in his work cycle.

He has had this job for the past few years, and the thing that struck me in our conversation was how he talked about the next few weeks until Christmas. It seems that people feel the need to have these material things to celebrate the season, and even they can't afford what they think they need, all too often they will go to any length — including stealing — to get it.

I remembered a story Brent told us last year about someone who had their young child push a cart full of merchandise out the door and then ran after it, as though to catch the child and bring him back. Of course, that did not happen, and the security team had to chase the parent and shopping cart across the parking lot, leaving the young child standing

there alone and crying. What message was the parent sending to that child?

Our Old Testament text for Thanksgiving, Deuteronomy 8:7-18, tells us that God provides for the people a rich land, with plentiful food, water and resources, where they can prosper. It tells us that we should praise God, be thankful for these things in life and remember who provided them.

As I go about my task as a chaplain for Lincoln Lutheran and talk to the people I meet every day, I am always reminded how they have learned to appreciate the simple things. Many have sold their large homes and accumulated possessions. (One lady told me, "Honey, you just have to dust it anyway. It's much better without all of that!)

God has given us a beautiful and bountiful world, rich in the things we need to be happy. We are asked to do a few things while we are here, but on the whole we are blessed with more than enough, if we share and care for each other. We do not need to scramble for the superficial things our TV commercials tell us we need.

The term "Jesus is the reason for the season" has become a cliché. However, the idea that this time of the year, when the crops are harvested, the first snow has fallen,
