# Emmaus Responds to Need for English Classes

As the neighborhood surrounding Emmaus continues to attract more and more Latino/a families, it is apparent that many of

the Spanishspeaking adults have a real desire to learn English. That desire has been expressed by two of the mothers of children participating in our EASY program.

The kids in the after-school program speak English very well, but that is not always the case

with their parents or grandparents.

Kay Gregor, Executive Director of the Racine Literacy Council, confirms that there is a high demand for ESL (English as a Second Language) instruction in Racine. Currently, the RLC has a waiting list

of over 900 people wanting to learn English!

Joint conversations including Pastor Mary, Cassell Lawson of Gateway,

and Kay Gregor of RLC have led to a new ESL offering for January. Beginning January 27, English classes will be held at Emmaus every Monday and Wednesday from 5:30 to 7:30 p.m.

The classes will take place in Fellowship Hall and on the second floor, leaving the main floor of the church available for meetings and other activities on those evenings.

Classes are free to those who register. Child care is a possibility, but no decisions have yet been made regarding that. Anyone interested in being a child care provider (\$8.00/hour), please contact Pastor Mary.



# Emmaus to Host Solutions for Success Training

After nearly two years of organizational and background work, Racine Vocational Ministries opened its doors on August 12.

Modeled after the Abundant
Life Ministry vocational
program of Milwaukee,
RVM is a collaboration of
Racine congregations
including ELCA Lutherans,
Episcopalians, Roman



They offer employment and training services to program participants. RVM also establishes partnerships with local agencies and community groups, employers, and labor organizations.

After holding initial intake interviews with the participants, RVM then trains all participants through their four-day Solutions for Success program. Following several conversations with Jim Schatzman and Sherry Hartog of RVM, Pastor Mary recommended to the church council that Emmaus serve as the site for their January training.

The council approved the January 13-16 training, committing the use of the Sunset Room, kitchenette and Fireside Room to RVM. The rooms will be used from 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m.

After participants have completed the Solutions for Success training, they will then be eligible for job placement. Following job

placement, on-going one-on-one job counseling is provided by RVM.

#### Interim Coordinator of EASY

January to March, 2003

Hours: 2:00 p.m. - 6:00 p.m. Tuesdays and Thursdays plus 4 hours of

flexible time weekly (12 hours per week)

Rate of pay:

\$15.00/hour

Responsibilities:

Together with pastor and regular program volunteer, plan daily activities for the 15 children who participate in the program. This will include time for homework help, free play, directed lay, computer, crafts, hands-on science and cooking

activities, and reading.

The coordinator will purchase (or recruit volunteers to do so) needed items for snacks, activities, and the smooth running of the program. S/he will plan a weekly schedule and communicate that with the pastor and volunteer. S/he will be on site and will work with the children in attendance on Tuesdays and Thursdays. S/he will supervise paid teenage interns and volunteer staff, will set the tone for acceptable behavior, and will communicate with parents as necessary. S/he will keep accurate records of expenses and attendance.



## Actions Speak Louder Than Words

"Preach the Gospel at all times, and when necessary, use words." These words of St. Francis of Assisi were a gift to me in the form of a plaque on the day of my ordination. It's taken you, the members and friends of Emmaus, to live out those words and to teach me (and many

others) just how powerful servant action in the name of Jesus Christ really is.

I still remember the conversations which took place nine years ago as the REST program was being conceived in Racine. When I came back to the Emmaus Council asking how Emmaus might like to support the homeless shelter, I expected a token monetary response. Instead, the leaders of Emmaus offered our church building, together with volunteer support for the program.

Strong lay leadership has been key since those early days when Sue Kiger stepped in to say "yes." Most recently, Pat Liesch has been the miracle worker — shopping, schlepping and hauling everything from mats to groceries, scheduling volunteers, cooking, serving, coordinating ... and the list goes on.

Just this past weekend, there were 55 people eating and sleeping at Emmaus. Unfortunately, the need for shelter for the homeless continues to grow.

Responding to the growing need for leadership at the city-wide level, Pat is now the part-time program coordinator for the Racine REST program. These new responsibilities for Pat will mean that others will have to be trained to carry on with many of the logistics

that will keep the program r u n n i n g smoothly each Friday from October through A p r i l a t Emmaus.

How are you called to reflect Jesus' love in the year to come? I have no doubt that you will continue to tach me and amaze me as you respond in new

respond in new ways to God's call to serve. As we enter the new year, let us be attentive to what God has in store for our personal lives and for the ministry of Emmaus. And let us respond in the affirmative to letting our light shine in the name of Christ.

#### Pastor Mary's Column

## Are You Bilingual?

Recent headlines in our newspaper acknowledged that the Hispanic population has now surpassed that of the African American population in our country. I think Wadewitz School and the neighborhood surrounding our

church is a microcosm of what is happening nationwide.

And, not unlike the days of my S c a n d i n a v i a n ancestors, the children are often learning English much more quickly than their

parents. I see that in the little girl I mentor each week. As her language skills grow by leaps and bounds, her mother is left to depend on her children to be her interpreters and translators. And, unfortunately, they sometimes pick and choose what they are going to share with their mother!

We know there is a need among the adults of our neighborhood to learn English, and we also know that it might be a bit frightening or intimidating to figure out how to even begin. I think back 36 years ago to my first experience outside the country. I had had the advantage of four years of high school Spanish and four years of college Spanish. Yet, when I got off that plane in Madrid, knowing I was there to study, I was nearly paralyzed. Whom could I trust?

How could I express my needs when I realized the Spanish I had learned hadn't prepared me for everyday living? (Somehow the terms I learned in Spanish literature weren't very practical when I wanted to know if the water was okay to drink

or when I needed directions to get to a certain place!) It was scary at first, but that anxiety faded as I got to know some Spaniards who were there to help me learn. I made some whoppers of mistakes with the language, but those

Spaniards patiently encouraged me and showed me and taught me not to take myself quite so seriously.

After lengthy conversations with folks from the Racine Literacy Council and Gateway Technical College, we are about to try our hand at reaching out to our neighbors with assistance in learning English. Laura Knudson, an extremely capable instructor who just returned to Racine after living and teaching in Uruguay for sixteen years, will be the instructor for our Monday and Wednesday evening English classes for adults.

Will those who so desperately want to learn English dare to venture out to an unknown place and register for four hours of weekly English classes? Are we yet at a point where enough trust has been

established with our Spanishspeaking neighbors that they will feel comfortable coming to Emmaus to study English? The next days will tell whether our word-of-mouth publicity has been adequate.

Meanwhile, we will continue to speak the language of love, the language Christ has mandated that we learn, as we reach out to those around us. And we are reminded that to remain fluent in that language of love, we need to practice it every single day.

In a few days, I'm off to Spain to visit long-time friends and to reconnect with that place that taught me how hospitality plays a



Granted, my Castillian Spanish is now quite rusty after not having used it much over the past dozen years. May our ability to speak the language of love bring that same sense of hospitality to our Spanish speaking brothers and sisters right here in Racine.

## What Does Ubuntu Have to Do with Me?

According to Martin Luther in the Small Catechism, baptism "brings about forgiveness of sins, redeems us from death and the devil, and gives eternal salvation to all who believe it, as the words and promise of God declare.."

When someone is baptized, they are brought into God's huge and amazingly diverse family. When you were baptized (or if you choose to be baptized if you are not already) words like this were said, "by water and the Holy Spirit we are made members of the Church which is the body of Christ. As we live with Christ and Christ's people, we grow in faith, love, and obedience to the will of God." I wasn't baptized to live alone. Neither are you. Our baptisms call us to live with Christ and Christ's people.

So What?

At this moment you're reading the paper or writing e-mails. Atother moments you may be doing your homework, or doing the dishes, or doing your hair. You may be talking to friends, discussing something with your youth group, eating pizza, or going to class. I'm. probably doing some of those same things. But overall you're doing the same thing we're all doing - life.

And, no, you're not in the middle of a prison sentence. You can do life many different ways. You can be selfish. You can decide to not share with others the gifts God has given you. You could decide to not allow others to share their gifts with you.

You can try to be an island no one gets anything from you and no one gives anything to you. Or you could horde things and gifts and people and energy. You can take everything that other people try to give you and never really care about trying to be a good steward of what God has gifted you with.

You could decide to not care about others. "So what my classmate is in pain over their parent's divorce?" "I don't care if people in Africa are starving. What have they ever done for me?" "I'm not going to visit my friend if they don't come to see me first."

That's one way to "do life." God will love you just the same if you live this way, but, God's calling you to something better. God's calling you to "do life" with compassion and freedom. God's calling you to "do life" in community, with others - the people who may be different, or strange, or weird, or older, or younger, or far away, or nearby. 

No one's expected to understand everything I've said alone. Hey, I don't understand it all and I wrote it. And that's exactly the point. We are created by God to understand everything through someone else. Through the love of Christ and while living in community with others and all of creation, we can understand all this a bit better.

So, Do Life! Ubuntu!

# Crehan Accepts Directorship of Neighborhood Camps

As of February 24, 12,396 congregations and organizations had reported raising a total of \$3,500,329.



# Special Congregational Meeting Votes On Mortgage Plan

The church council called a special meeting of the congregation for 10:20 a.m., Sunday, March 30, to consider a proposal to restructure Emmaus' mortgage loan. The council endorsed a proposal to take advantage of lower interest rates.

In 1985, Emmaus took out a \$300,000 mortgage through Lutheran Brotherhood to build the addition, which includes the Sunset Room, church offices, the nursery, and areas used by our Sunday School as a Temple Room, arts and crafts room, computer lab, and audio-video room.

Since 2000, Emmaus has been paying \$966.00 per month at an interest rate of 81/2%. As of February

12, the balance of the loan, now held by Thrivent Financial for Lutherans, stood at \$59,129.15.

The council has recommended approving a new ten-year mortgage at more than two points below the current interest rate. Pending congregation approval, Thrivent Financial Services for Lutherans would then lock in the lowest possible rate at the time of written request.

Assuming that payments would continue at the \$966.00 per month level, the mortgage could then be completely paid within six years. Final details of the meeting and terms of the mortgage will be included in the May *Visitor*.



This month, the Community Meal Program begins its twenty-third year of providing free

### Community Meal Recipe

Ingredients:

2 lbs. ground beef Onion (chopped, diced or grated)

Salt and pepper

11/2 lbs. french cut green beans (frozen)

2 cans of cream of chicken or cream of mushroom soup

1½ lbs. tater tots

Brown the beef, onion, salt and pepper and put in the bottom of a 9"x13" pan.

Sprinkle the green beans over the beef. Pour both cans of soup over the beans.

Spread the tater tots over the top of the casserole.

Bake at 350° for 45 minutes.

### Fire Guts Bay Pointe Project

On the night of Shrove Tuesday, March 4, Bay Pointe at the Atrium, the assisted living apartments being built by Lincoln Lutheran of Racine. burnt to the ground. Thankfully, they were not yet finished and, therefore, not occupied. Residents at the adjacent Atrium were evacuated to avoid the smoke, but there was no loss of life. One firefighter was injured after falling on the ice which, ironically, attends any fire-fighting effort in this weather.

We at Lincoln (and elder-care ministry associated with the ELCA and our Synod) are incredibly thankful that the human toll was so slight. We, however, are also feeling the shock and grief of seeing something for which we've worked and planned literally go up in smoke. We had more than enough ashes on this Ash Wednesday.

We remain confident in God's helping presence, whatever the future holds. I ask for the support of your prayers: in thanksgiving for the firefighters and for the fact no lives were lost, and for guidance and support of those who are dealing with the aftermath of this loss.

### Bishop: 'We Are a People of Hope'

March 22, 2003 Dear Partners in Ministry,

As we prepare for worship tomorrow morning, in many ways it feels as though there is a pall cast over our preparations. The specter of bombs being dropped, of tanks rumbling, and the overall anxiety which accompanies such actions weighs heavily upon each of us, and certainly will be upon those who will gather tomorrow. It feels as though our joy is veiled by this pall, which dampens our mood and threatens to immerse us in despair.

Let us, however, not lose sight of the fact that we are people of hope, those striving for moral and peaceful solutions to the ills of our world. Indeed, we are people of the resurrection, and as such we recognize through eyes of faith that the pall cast over our times is in reality the garment of our baptism. As such it cloaks us in the promises of a God of grace and forgiveness, and it calls us more deeply into the identity that claims us through this sacrament. This identity we affirm in the words of our Affirmation of Baptism service:

"Do you intend to continue in the covenant God made with you in Holy Baptism: to live among God's faithful people, to hear his Word and share in his supper, to proclaim the good news of God in Christ through word and deed, to serve all people following the example of our Lord Jesus Christ, and to strive for justice and peace in all

the earth?"

"I do and I ask God to help and guide me."

These baptismal tenets are carried out in community, the central expression of this sacrament, and as such they accompany the prayers we extend out today and tomorrow. These prayers embrace the wide spectrum of God's people, those from our congregations serving in the armed forces as well as those whom Jesus instructed us in particular to pray for, our "enemies." encompass the families of those serving our country, and they encompass those in families in Iraq, and all who are impacted directly or indirectly by the "collateral" damage of warfare...and who is exempt from that category?

We also must recognize the importance, particularly in this season of Lent, for repentance. Each war, each act of violence toward another, whether "justifiable" or not, must be accompanied by a deep and abiding repentance.

Finally, let us enter together into the "shock and awe" not of firepower and destruction, not of human constructs and endeavors, but rather of the holy meal we share as the family of God tomorrow. It is this awesome gift and the grace it bestows that orients our lives toward true community, and to the one who alone creates the peace that passes our human understanding. Join me in praying for that peace.

### Pastor Mary's Page

### Beyond the Darkness...

While at a recent gathering, I was speaking with a community leader regarding the current state of affairs of Racine and of the world.

He shook it wend, saying, "It's tough, Mary. We're struggling to find money for important programs and to accomplish what needs to be done in our community. In this strapped economy and with the country at

war, there seems to be a paralysis."

He went on to say that with all the chaos and confusion and darkness in the world, there seems to be a temptation to walk away from the problems at hand. Too often we are convinced that the future is nothing but grim. But then, this man, who is also an active Christian, quickly added, "But, if we can't speak a word of hope, who will?"

Yes, we have had the stark reminder during this season of Lent of darkness and brokenness and violence. We are faced every single day with the reality of our broken humanity. It is evidenced in the war, and I have also witnessed families torn apart for a myriad of other reasons.

I have had a knot in my stomach as I have been a part of a group where conversation ends abruptly and when one or more people leave hurt and angry. Parts of our world are nearly overwhelmed with AIDS, poverty, hunger and disease.

It is indeed a dark world, and it is into this world that the Son of God came to teach and heal and love and speak the truth. The powers of

darkness eventually felt so threatened that they chose to snuff out the One who was a glimmer of hope for the weak and vulnerable and needy.

On Good Friday, we experience that darkness in

the Tenebrae worship service. In the service, the candles are extinguished one by one. We hear the haunting words of "Were You There When They Crucified Our Lord?" The images, the final words of Jesus on the cross and the darkness seem to shout out that the darkness and violence have won after all.

But our God of light and life won't let darkness and death and violence win. Something brand new happens when we return to the dark tomb on Easter morning. The darkness has been overcome!

And so, during this Lenten season — of the church year, of our lives and of the world — we tremble as we walk through the darkness. We walk with hope. And we pray that the Resurrection light and life come quickly, knowing that in Christ there is no darkness at all.

# Congregational Meeting Approves Mortgage Plan

Emmaus members at a special congregational meeting on March 30 approved a proposal to restructure Emmaus' mortgage loan. The church council made the proposal to take advantage of low interest rates.

Emmaus has been paying down the mortgage on the 1985 church addition at an interest rate of 81/2% since 2000. The new fixed-rate ten-year mortgage has an interest rate of 51/2%. If we continue to make monthly



payments in the amount of \$944, the loan will be repaid in 51/2 years.

The restructured loan has been negotiated with Thrivent Financial for Lutherans.

The original amount of the loan was \$300,000 in 1985. As of April 14, the balance of our loan stood at \$54,924.91.

### **Eight Sites Host Neighborhood Camps**

Building on last summer's pilot program of Neighborhood Camp at

four churches (Emmaus, Our Savior's, Redeemer and Zion), four additional congregations will host camps in 2003. Bethania, E m m a n u e l, H o l y Communion and Good Shepherd will also open their doors to 6-to-12-year-olds for this summer's day camp experience.

The ambitious financial goal for the eight churches sponsoring camp this summer is \$50,000. Thanks to funding from the

Siebert Lutheran Foundation and other pledge and commitments, over 30% of that goal has already been reached.

Two additional grant requests are still pending, and on April 8 came word of a new challenge. An anonymous donor has come forward with a matching challenge for the month of May. Any and all contributions made in May through any of the ELCA churches will be matched dollar for dollar up to \$5,000!

In addition, 25% of the proceeds of the Fiesta Mexicana goes to Neighborhood Camp, as will \$500 in matching funds provided by Thrivent Financial for Lutherans.

Under the leadership of Neighborhood Camp Coordinator Valerie Crehan, a planning team representing the eight participating ELCA congregations is busy working on publicity, staffing and curriculum. Each site will have its own staff.

### Children Learn About 'Our Father's World'





### New Privacy Laws Affect Member Care

If you have been to your doctor, dentist, pharmacist, or the hospital since the middle of April, you know that a new federal privacy

law means that you have some extra papers to sign. Health agencies are now required to take extra steps to safeguard the privacy of your medical information, and to get



One effect of the new law is that hospitals no longer automatically inform churches of each of their members who have been admitted for care. The patient (or someone acting on the patient's behalf) must actively consent to the release of this information.

### **Emmaus Prayer Chain**

In the interest of informed consent, here is what we do when the volunteers at All Saints call to tell us we have a member in the hospital. Our secretary, Paul Berge, is usually the person to take the call.

The volunteer tells him the name and room number of the patient. Paul passes this information on to Pastor Mary and Pastor Sharon.

Once one of the pastors has had a chance to visit with the patient, she and the patient agree on how much information needs to be included on the prayer chain, if any. We currently have eighteen Emmaus members who make up the prayer chain; the chain receives a list of prayer concerns once a week.

As an example, members of the prayer chain might be told that Fred Bunsen is in St. Mary's recovering from a sprained toe. If Fred does not want his name included on the prayer chain, the chain members are not told his name. If Fred does not want to be included on the prayer chain at all, we respect his wishes.

Since health officials will err on the side of not releasing any information at all, we encourage family members to let the church office know whenever there is a need for pastoral hospital visits. If a family member is admitted to the hospital on a weekend, please call the pastors at home.

cluster treasury. The previous formula was calculated at 45¢ per baptized member; the budget for





### Lutheran Laity Movement Disbands

CHICAGO (ELCA) April 17 — Lutheran Laity Movement for Stewardship (LLM), a self-supporting membership organization within the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA), will cease operations immediately and officially dissolve May 31. LLM, based at the

ELCA churchwide offices here, has been an advocate and leader in stewardship ministry for nearly a century. It is currently best known for providing professionally led capital stewardship campaigns in congregations.

The LLM board of directors took the action March 31, when it met by

conference call. Reasons for LLM's closure include declining membership in the organization, increasing operational costs and fewer congregational fund-raising campaigns since the terrorist attacks on the United States of Sept. 11, 2001, said Joyce B. Cain, LLM executive director.

In 1997, the Rev. H. George Anderson, then ELCA presiding bishop, wrote: "When the organization was founded in 1907, it was called the 'Laymen's Missionary Movement.' It invited individuals to contribute a minimum of \$100 per year toward the eradication of deficits in the benevolence programs of the church. It never tried to become a men's brotherhood or social organization, but focused on improving the giving methods of congregations. The narrower focus

became clear when its name was changed to 'Lutheran Laymen's Movement for Stewardship.'

"The LLM reached its greatest strength and influence during the 1950's, when it was given responsibility for supporting and managing the stewardship programs

of the United Lutheran Church in America," Anderson said.

LLM became part of the ELCA through the former Lutheran Church in America, one of the ELCA predecessor church bodies.

Presently, the organization has about 1,500 members who contribute financial gifts ranging from \$100 to \$5,000 annually.

The Rev. Mark R. Moller-Gunderson, Director of Congregational Ministries executive director and coordinator for mission support, said said he is "personally saddened" that LLM must cease operations. In an April 7 letter to members, he praised the "dedicated and highly skilled" staff, and noted the organization raised "millions of dollars, and thousands of lives were touched by this unique ministry."

"My life as a steward leader was shaped early in my ministry by an LLM practicum," he wrote. "I thank God for the energy, passion and vision of the original LLM founders that was carried on through successive generations."

### ELCA Presiding Bishop Gives Thanks For Apparent End to War

CHICAGO (ELCA), April 17 — The Rev. Mark S. Hanson, presiding bishop of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA), said in

an April 16 statement that he is thankful the most intense phase of the military conflict in Iraq has ceased. Hanson said he is grateful for sacrifices made in the war with Iraq, remains

concerned about support for all affected by the war and is committed to moral deliberation "about pressing issues of our country."

Hanson, who leads the 5.1 million member ELCA based here, has been an outspoken opponent of the war since the possibility was first mentioned by Bush Administration officials in the summer of 2002.

"We now have a renewed opportunity and responsibility to consider the questions of war, peace and human community to which this moment in history calls us," he said.

Hanson called Saddam Hussein's regime "brutal" and expressed thanks that several "dangers" related to the war did not happen, such as "massive refugee displacement, use of chemical, biological or nuclear weapons or wide destabilization in the region."

He noted the sacrifices of military personnel and civilians in the conflict. "With grateful hearts we honor the sacrifice made by those service personnel who have been injured or died in this war, and mourn the loss of all innocent persons," he said. "Our heartfelt prayers go out for all soldiers and their families who, in service to their country, have sacrificed so much in this military conflict."

"Continuing care" should be offered to military personnel as they return home, Hanson said, noting that they carry "in their minds, hearts and bodies the effects of war and violence."

### Bishop Hanson's Racine Visit Canceled

The office of Bishop Mark Hanson announced with regret that Bishop Hanson will not be able to come to Racine on May 8 as previously announced. Hanson, Presiding Bishop of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, was to have attended a discussion of his book, Faithful Yet Changing: The Church in Challenging Times, at Mt. Pleasant Lutheran Church.


### Feed My Lambs

"Let the little children come to me." And Mariana came...

Last summer, Mariana (her name has been changed to protect her anonymity) arrived at camp early each morning — some days up to an hour and a half early.

Rain or shine she sat in front

of the church and waited for the arrival of the staff. Mariana's clothes were disheveled. The shoes she wore — her only pair — were too big and her long dark hair was always falling in her face.



Mariana was eight years old. She lived with her mom, two stepsiblings, and a stepfather in a rundown home. There was no hot water. Her stepfather had been abusive. More than once her family had taken refuge in the local women's shelter.

For six weeks Mariana came ... she came to Neighborhood Camp and she experienced a safe and nurturing environment.

And other children came ... last summer, Emmaus and three other ELCA Lutheran churches in

Racine opened their doors to the children of their respective neighborhoods. The children came to play, to learn and to experience the love of Jesus Christ.

Some of the children had their only meals of the day when they were served breakfast, lunch and a

snack daily. For a n u m b e r of children, it was their first experience in a church. Some have come back for Sunday School and others to our after school

program (EASY). Several have been asking, "When does camp start this year?"

And so once again we take a tremendous leap of faith as we plan for Neighborhood Camp 2003. While we don't know yet where all the funding will come from (not all the grants requested materialized as hoped for), we do know that we have been called once again to share the stories and love of Jesus to hungry kids.

They are kids who are hungry for love, hungry for spiritual and physical food, hungry for attention and hungry for affirmation.

It is my prayer that all who read this might ask themselves how they can be a part of supporting this



# **Lutherans Assess Damage** After May Tornadoes

CHICAGO (ELCA), May 7 — Lutheran Disaster Response, a ministry of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) and the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod (LCMS), are assessing damage in Arkansas, Kansas, Missouri and Tennessee after storms and tornadoes brought death and destruction May 4.

"The hardest-hit states are Kansas, Missouri and Tennessee," said the Rev. Gilbert B. Furst, director for Lutheran Disaster Response.

Some of the worst damage is along the Kansas-Missouri state line and in south Pierce City, Missouri. Major damage occurred in Cherokee County and Crawford County, Kansas, and Lawrence County. Tennessee. A network of Lutheran Disaster Response coordinators began assessing the damage and determining appropriate responses for the church "from the beginning,"

Furst reported. Interfaith efforts have also begun.

Staff of Lutheran Disaster Response is working with staff of affected ELCA synods and LCMS districts, as they rally congregations to provide support for recovery efforts, said Furst.

"It is certain that major cleanup will be needed, as well as spiritual and emotional care for the children and adults whose lives have been affected by this destructive weather. Emergency disaster grants will be provided as specific needs are assessed," he said.





# Synod Assembly Draws Theme from ELCA Youth Gathering

PEWAUKEE (milwaukeesynod. org) — The 2003 Greater Milwaukee Synod's assembly theme was: "Ubuntu – Do Life!" with emphasis on youth and how the synod includes youth in its ministry efforts. The assembly brought together 390 voting members and 50 guests June 13-14 at the Country Inn & Convention Center in Waukesha.

The voting members passed two resolutions, the first expressing support for "Treatment Instead of Prison" legislation. The second resolution urged greater efforts to promote outreach and appreciation of racial and cultural diversity in each of the synod's congregations.

Voting members elected seven synod council members and a new synod secretary, Sally Newman. The synod council members were elected to four-year terms. The synod assembly is the annual gathering of the synod's highest decision-making body.

"Ubuntu – Do Life!" was drawn from the 2003 ELCA Youth Gathering theme. Ubuntu (pronounced "oom BOON too") is a term drawn from South African theology that refers to community: "I am because we are; we are because Christ is."

On Friday night, the assembly was opened by a keynote address by Archbishop Timothy Dolan of the Archdiocese of Milwaukee. Dolan reflected on the assembly theme by saying that Ubuntu is a word like "alleluia" or "hosanna" that "packs a punch of revelation in one word. Ubuntu calls us prefer 'being' to



- Special event tickets (that you may have purchased)
- Some form of identification
- Water bottle (Hydration is important!)
- Comfortable walking shoes
- Sunscreen
- Rain gear
- Banner identifying your congregation (optional)
- Gathering offering
- In-kind offering contributions
- Quarters! Quarters! Quarters!

What you will receive:

- Backpack (distributed after counselor orientation)
- Bible, including CD-ROM (The Bibles include daily devotions and journal)
- Guidebook
- MARTA passes (rapid transit trains)
- Wristbands for admission (There's a \$75 replacement fee if you lose yours!)



Due to heightened security measures at the Georgia Dome, all backpacks will be searched before you enter the Dome. To avoid a delay and the loss of property, TAG suggests that you think carefully about what you put in your backpack. Security employees at the Dome entrances will confiscate items that pose a safety risk to Gathering participants or a distraction to the program.

Items that will not be allowed into the Georgia Dome include, but are not limited to:

Over 1,100 volumes of children's books are waiting for the


last step of their processing before being shelved. Volunteers will be needed in the coming week or two to place the appropriate cards in pockets and to then shelve the books that have been processed.







'having' or 'doing.' What we do must flow from who we are."

Youth and young adult leaders shaped this assembly by leading worship, Bible study, forum and preassembly workshops.

Bishop Paul Stumme-Diers offered an ubuntu vision for the synod, outlining possibilities for synod ministry in the next three years:

- adding youth representatives to congregational councils;
- adding a youth representative to synod council;
- extending Latino ministries beyond Milwaukee;
- extending satellite ministries for mission;
- strengthening partnerships among synod congregations;
- and increasing awareness of synod ministry through the email list-serv and other synod communication efforts.

### Youth Play Key Role

The 2003 synod assembly drew inspiration and leadership from an often overlooked source of creativity and faithful witness — the synod's young people.

Youth (and adult youth leaders) were at the center of the assembly's worship, Bible study and workshops.

On Saturday morning, Lillie Robinson of Cross Lutheran in Milwaukee led the assembly in Bible study, choosing as her text Paul's words, "I can do all things through

Christ who strengthens me."

Robinson, who is bound for Carthage College next fall and the recipient of a scholarship designed for young leaders of color who desire to serve as ELCA pastors, reflected on the pressures and the trials that she overcame to become who she is. "I grew up to be as

powerful as I could be." She cited the influence of her mother, her mentor and her pastor as adults who pushed her to be confident and to succeed.

The synod's Youth and Family Network organized eight preassembly workshops on Friday afternoon. Sessions were designed for adults and youth who were interested in sharing their ministry ideas on a variety of topics – the Internet, teen worship, small church ministry, middle school ministry and other areas.

### Synod Mission Plan Approved

The synod's 2004-2005 Ministry Plan (or budget) totaling \$2.65 million was approved by the assembly with only one line item

# ELCA Churchwide Assembly to Meet in Milwaukee Aug. 11-17

CHICAGO (ELCA) June 5 — Voting members of the 2003 Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) Churchwide Assembly will act on several proposals — including an evangelism vision for the church, and a social statement on health and health care — and elect a vice president and an editor for The Lutheran, the magazine of the ELCA. The assembly will be held at the Midwest Airlines Center in Milwaukee, Aug. 11-17.

More than 2,000 people — including 1,031 voting members elected by synods — are expected to participate in the ELCA's eighth biennial assembly. The theme is "Making Christ Known: For the Healing of the World." It is directly related to the theme for the Lutheran

World Federation (LWF) assembly, to be held July 21-31 in Winnipeg, Manitoba.

The ELCA Greater Milwaukee Synod, led by Bishop Paul W. Stumme-Diers, is hosting the assembly. Worship, Bible study and prayer will be significant to the assembly. It includes a "Global Celebration" Aug. 14, during which the afternoon sessions will be devoted to presentations, workshops and a celebration of the ELCA's connection to the global church and the LWF.

The Rev. Mark S. Hanson will chair the assembly, his first as presiding bishop. Assisting him during plenary sessions will be the

switching. \$2,500 budgeted for young adult ministry was transferred to Lutheran Campus Ministry.

Synod treasurer Roger Schroeder set the tone for the ministry plan by outlining the decrease in benevolence funding the synod has experienced since its peak in January 2001, resulting in a depletion of cash reserves. "We can manage it, but our ability to react to emerging opportunities is diminished. In this ministry plan, expenditures have been held level."

Schroeder emphasized, "A lot of good, exciting things are happening in the synod. I think we're going in the right direction."

He added, "It is extremely helpful to the synod if we see your benevolence funds coming in on a regular basis. There are a surprising number of congregations that have not yet given [the synod] anything. Anything you can do to send us some of your benevolence during the summer when the income is lighter will be greatly appreciated."

Rev. Lowell G. Almen, ELCA secretary.

For the first time, official "congregational observers" may register with the ELCA office of the Secretary to attend the assembly. Each of the ELCA's 10,766 congregations may send one representative.

Observers will have reserved seating in the plenary hall, and will receive reports and materials. Official observers have no voice in assembly discussions and do not vote.

### Evangelism, Health Care

At the 2001 Churchwide Assembly, voting members asked for the development of an evangelism strategy to be FORTHE presented for action in 2003. Since then a 32-member evangelism task force, led by the Rev. Gary M. Wollersheim, bishop MAKING CHRIST KNOWN of the ELCA Northern Illinois Synod, Rockford, has developed a strategy, "Sharing Faith in a New Century: A Vision for Evangelism in the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America."

The strategy was reviewed by the ELCA Church Council in April and transmitted to the assembly. The council also set in place several actions to implement the strategy, should it be adopted by the assembly. The proposed strategy is at http://www.elca.org/visionevangeli sm on the ELCA Web site.

The assembly will consider a

proposed social statement on health and health care, "Caring for Our Health: Our Shared Endeavor." The proposed social statement was authorized by the 1999 Churchwide Assembly. The text of Caring for Our Health is at http:// www.elca.org/dcs/healthcare state ment.html on the ELCA Web site.

### Reports and Resolutions

A key report to be presented to the assembly is a progress report on

> the ELCA Studies on Sexuality. The 2001 Churchwide Assembly mandated that the church begin a fouryear study process on homosexuality and the church. The assembly asked for a progress report in 2003 and a final report with recommendations at

the 2005 assembly.

The 2001 assembly also asked for a social statement on human sexuality that may be considered at the 2007 assembly.

The Rev. James A. Childs, Jr., an ethicist on leave from the faculty of Trinity Lutheran Seminary, Columbus, Ohio, was appointed director for the studies. The Rev. Margaret G. Payne, bishop of the ELCA New England Synod, Worcester, Mass., is chair of the task force.

### ELCA Pastor Naw-karl Mua Detained in Laos

CHICAGO (ELCA) June 13 — The Rev. Naw-Karl Mua, Light of Life Lutheran Church, St. Paul, Minn., a pastor of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA), has been detained by the government of Laos since June 3. Mua is reported to have accompanied two European journalists into the Xieng Khouang province of Laos to help them research a story on human rights violations and persecution of Hmong people by the Communist government in Laos.

Mua went to neighboring Thailand on May 12 for a missionary project; he has family and a relationship with a Hmong congregation there. While in Thailand he met two journalists — Thierry Falise of Belgium and Vincent Reynaud of France — and entered Laos legally on May 23 as their translator.

Mua failed to return to the United States for his son's high school graduation. The U.S. State Department said the Laotian government detained Mua with the two journalists, accused of cooperating with "bandits" to kill a security official in the remote northeastern village of Khai.

"Pastor Mua is clearly a leader in the Hmong community," said the Rev. Peter Rogness, bishop of the ELCA Saint Paul Area Synod. "He has organized two Hmong congregations in St. Paul and has also worked with church leaders in the ELCA Minneapolis Area Synod to serve the Hmong community there," he said.

Rogness added that Mua "has expressed concern to me about human rights issues in Laos and about the need for the U.S. government and the church to address these issues. However. nothing we know about him would be consistent with the charges against him by the Laotian government."

Mua is a native of Laos. He lived in a refugee camp in Thailand for one year before moving to France in 1978, where he lived until he immigrated to the United States in 1985. He is now a U.S. citizen.

The Voice of America reported or June 26 that Laos has filed charges against Mua, Reynaud and Falise. A trial was set to begin July 27 in the town of Phonesavanh.

### Bishops Support Suit Against Concealed Weapon Law

CHICAGO (ELCA) June 23 — Six Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) bishops in Minnesota made a public statement June 19 supporting a lawsuit filed by the Edina Community Lutheran Church, Edina, Minn. The lawsuit against the state of Minnesota is an attempt to have concealed weapons banned from church-owned property.

The Minnesota Citizens' Personal Protection Act of 2003, referred to as the "conceal and carry law" took effect on May 28 and allows concealed firearms to be carried into non-governmental buildings by individuals who have applied for and received concealed weapon-permits.

For establishments — including

churches— to keep firearms out, signs must be prominently posted at each entrance stating that concealed weapons are not allowed. According to the provisions in the act, church properties are considered private establishments or establishments in which concealed firearms are allowed unless otherwise posted.

"We believe the presence of firearms on Lutheran church property, unless carried by government peace officers on official business or on land designated for hunting purposes, is entirely inconsistent with the Lutheran church's theology, mission and worship practices," the bishops' statement said.

### Ubuntu! Do Life!

Ubuntu!, the theme for the upcoming Atlanta Youth Gathering of the ELCA, comes from a rich word from Africa. The word best translates, "I am because we are. We are because Christ is."

That theme was also highlighted at the recent assembly of the Greater Milwaukee Synod.

More and more at Emmaus, we are catching the spirit of Ubuntu. "I am because we are" reminds us, as God's people, that we cannot survive in isolation. We all need community, and we are called to be community.

You, the people of Emmaus, live and grow in that spirit whenever you are there to mutually support one another and whenever you reach out beyond the doors of the church.

This past month alone is a sign of God's community at work in and through Emmaus. What I have observed and experienced in the past month alone has been phenomenal. I have marveled at teenagers who have given hours and hours processing books for the kids' library and preparing for Neighborhood Camp — and for the adults who are teaching and leading them.

And then there are those who painted and built and planted and watered and cleaned, readying Emmaus for even more ministry opportunities. I give thanks to God for parents who are organizing and chaperoning TAG (The Atlanta Gathering) for our youth later this month. I am so in awe and so grateful for the abundance of resources we have received this month — individual monetary contributions to camp and the church, grant funding, and memorials.

"I am because we are. We are because Christ is." Doing life and choosing to be an intentional part of the Emmaus community is all rooted in our reason for being in the first place: we are members of the body of Christ. Life can and does flow through the members of Emmaus only because that gift of life has first been given to us in Jesus Christ.

Every single day I give thanks to God for that gift of life, and I pray that we of Emmaus will continue to grow into our calling of "Ubuntu!" Thank you for your partnership in "doing life" in Christ's name.



# ELCA Atlanta Youth Gathering Celebrates Spirit of Ubuntu

ATLANTA July 25 — Hi Pastor Mary and the rest of Emmaus:

The Emmaus Youth group is definitely in the spirit of Ubuntu! in Atlanta. We are very tired but still having a wonderful time. The rest of the group (Mt. Pleasant and St. Andrew's) is excellent! We've made many, many friends (even some who are grown-ups)!

Let's give you a day-by-day recap of what we've done:

Day 1: Leave from Mt. Pleasant at 10:30 a.m. and arrive in Knoxville, Tennessee at 9:00 p.m. We got to know each other on the bus ride. Some kids we already knew from school and previous mission trips. Watched some movies, slept, ate junk-food; you know, the usual.

Day 2: Knoxville. Did a service project today. Thirty of us went to a local Goodwill and sorted clothes and ten went to a park to pick up trash. And guess what? The director of the Goodwill was from Racine! Her dad worked for J.I. Case. The park we cleaned must have been used for the homeless because we found a lot of old "campsites" which had clothes, books, shoes, etc. in them. The kids, really got a dose of reality today and counted their blessings...twice!

But it rained so we did indoor things like Ruby Falls (an waterfall in a cave, the Chattanooga Aquarium and IMAX theater.) Stayed overnite, swam, had Devo's (devotions) and left early the next day for Atlanta, Georgia.

Day 4: Atlanta. First day here and is this convention center *big!* Gregg, Carol and the adults went to register and we just played in The Globe and activity center for the kids. Our bus driver took us to the hotel where we checked in and relaxed then went to the afternoon service in the Georgia Dome.

What an experience! Bands, speakers, video and 18,000 wild, screaming kids doing a conga line! Later we went to a Dance Club at our hotel (our hotel is the "hot spot" in mid-town Atlanta) and finally got to bed at 1:00 a.m. (after Devo's, of course)!


also found, three bicycles, old car batteries, clothing and many garbage cans full of glass bottles.

Ubuntu! I am, we are, He is!





# Privacy Law Affects Church Notification

Federal Privacy Laws (HIPPA) have gone into effect. These laws are intended to protect your personal information from being used or shared in any unauthorized way.

What this means for you is when you are admitted to the hospital, you must give the hospital permission to inform your church that you are a patient in the hospital. When you are admitted to the hospital, do the following:

- Make it very clear to the admitting clerk what church you belong to and that you want your church informed of your admission.
- Call your church and inform your pastor directly that you are in the hospital and would welcome a visit.
- 3. If you wish to be on the church prayer list, let the church know you wish to be included in the list.

# **ELCA Approves Statement on Health Care**

The churchwide assembly, the chief legislative authority of the

ELCA, met in Milwaukee Aug. 11-17 at the Midwest Airlines Center. About 2,100 people participated, including 1,031 ELCA voting members. The theme for the biennial assembly is "Making Christ Known: For the Healing of the World."



Health Care Statement

The Assembly adopted a social statement on health and health care, "Caring for Our Health: Our Shared Endeavor." The assembly adopted the statement Aug. 15 by a vote of 935-34.

There was some discussion on a proposal to remove a sentence from the text that addressed malpractice costs. It said increased costs force medical professionals to

leave poorer areas of the country, creating shortages of qualified workers in rural and inner-city locations.

The Rev. David E. Monsen, voting member, ELCA Southwestern Washington Synod, argued that the language should be removed because rising

malpractice costs are only one of the reasons why health care providers move from rural areas.

The assembly decided to drop the sentence about the increase in malpractice costs from the text it adopted. The introduction to the social statement states: "Health is central to our well-being, vital to

relationships, and helps us live out our vocations in family, work and community. Caring for one's own health is a matter of human necessity and good stewardship. Caring for the health of others expresses both love for our neighbors and responsibility for a just society. As a personal and social responsibility, health care is a shared endeavor."

The social statement addresses the church and health care crisis. "The Christian Church is called to be an active participant in fashioning a just and effective health care system," the statement said. "We of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America have an enduring commitment to work for and support health care for all people as a shared endeavor."

The text discusses health, health care, illness and healing from a biblical and theological perspective. It addresses public health services, whole patient care, caregiver support, research and technology development, and professional education. The statement advocates for equitable access to health care for all, and suggests ethical guidance for individuals and families.

#### Vice President

The 2003 Churchwide Assembly of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) has elected Carlos Pena, Galveston, Texas, to serve a six-year term as vice president, the highest elected lay position in the church.

"I have been called and I look forward to serving the church," said Pena." I humbly accept the challenge."

Pena, who is the first man elected to the position, is the president of Kleen Supply Co, Inc. Galveston, and C.M. Distributing, Houston, which grew from a company his father founded. His first job after college was as a music teacher at the high school he graduated from, and he still keeps a trombone in his trunk "just in case."

Pena serves on the regional governing board of Christus Health Care and as vice president of Galveston Historical Foundation. In the ELCA, he has served as vice president of the ELCA Texas-Louisiana Gulf Coast Synod and as a member of the ELCA Church Council, in addition to leadership at First Lutheran Church, Galveston, Texas.

#### Evangelism

The 2003 Churchwide Assembly of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) adopted "Sharing Faith in a New Century: A Vision for Evangelism in the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America" August 13.

By a 933 to 42 vote, Sharing Faith in a New Century became the official evangelism strategy for the ELCA. The assembly commended the strategy for "study and implementation by congregations, congregational leaders, synods, synod leaders, churchwide units and institutions and agencies" of the church.

It affirmed the four major objectives of the plan — calling the church to prayer, preparing and renewing evangelical leaders, teaching discipleship and starting and renewing congregations— and, the assembly referred the strategy to the ELCA Office of the Presiding Bishop for inclusion in the church's overall strategic plan and to the "appropriate" churchwide units for study and implementation.

#### Treasurer's Report

ELCA treasurer, Christina L. Jackson-Skelton, reported positive fiscal news coupled with caution for upcoming years. "The churchwide organization completed fiscal years 2002 and 2001 with an excess of revenue over expense in its current budgeted operations," Jackson-Skelton said. Since the report to the 2001 ELCA Churchwide Assembly, revenue exceeded expenses by approximately \$3.3 million in 2001 and \$800,000 in 2002.

For the first time since 1994, mission support dollars — unrestricted income from congregations given through synods to the churchwide organization — declined in 2002. In 2001, congregations gave \$69.5 million,

but in 2002 gave \$68.8 million, a decrease of \$700,000.

"The trend of the past two years for flat or declining mission support appears to be continuing in 2003,

and projections from synods for 2004 are again below expected levels," according to Jackson-Skelton, who called this "an area of growing concern."

On August 16, the assembly adopted budgets for 2004 and 2005 Aug. 16. For 2004, the budget was approved at current fund fiscal year income of \$84,310,000, and World Hunger income was approved at \$16,250,000. For 2005, the budget was approved at current fund fiscal year income of \$85,140,000, and World Hunger income was approved at \$16,500,000. World Hunger income is designated for addressing chronic hunger and poverty in the United States and around the world.

Three major purposes to which funds are directed in the approved budget are 24.2% to

vocation and leadership; 23.9% to worship and evangelism outreach; and 19.3% to service and justice work.

Significant expenses in the proposal are \$37 million toward financial support grants to congregations, seminaries, global companion ministries and many other entities; \$29.1 million toward staff compensation; and \$6.7 million to retiree health benefits.

#### Middle East

The Assembly affirmed by a

910 to 64 vote the church body's support for Lutheran ministries in the Middle East.

Included in the assembly's action is reaffirmation of the ELCA's "commitment to accompany the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Jordan (and Palestine) [ELCJ] and its ecumenical and interfaith partners, to carry out public policy and human rights advocacy on their behalf, and to offer humanitarian relief and development assistance."

In the same action, the assembly voted to affirm the ELCA Prayer Vigil for Peace in the Middle East, asking that congregations and church members "hold all people of the Middle East in their prayers"; and to ask that the ELCA continue advocacy efforts related to a tax

case that Israel is pursuing against the Lutheran World Federation (LWF) that threatens its ability to provide humanitarian services and health care for Palestinians through the LWF-run Augusta Victoria Hospital on the Mount of Olives.

By a 958 to 18 vote, the assembly acted to endorse "The First Alexandria Declaration of the Religious Leaders of the Holy Land," a document signed in

Alexandria, Egypt, in January 2002 following a summit of Muslim, Christian and Jewish religious

leaders in the Middle East.

The Alexandria Declaration says, in part, "According to our faith traditions, killing innocents in the name of God is a desecration of His Holy Name, and defames religion in the world. ... We call

upon all to oppose incitement, hatred and misrepresentation of the other."

#### Christian Churches Together

Voting members adopted an action to join Christian Churches Together (CCT), a new ecumenical organization. "The purpose of Christian Churches Together is to enable churches and national Christian organizations to grow closer together in Christ in order to strengthen our Christian witness in

the world," the recommendation said.

The assembly adopted the action with a vote of 918 to 48. Christian Churches Together expects to be officially launched in 2005 with 25 founding member organizations.

Sexuality Issues

Voting members voted 687-278 against altering the time line set for the church's Studies on Sexuality process.

The 2001 ELCA Churchwide Assembly called for a study that would lead to possible

recommendations to the 2005 Churchwide Assembly on whether or not to bless same-gender relationships and whether or not people in such relationships should be pastors of the church. The 2001 assembly also asked the ELCA Division for Church in Society to draft and propose a social statement on human sexuality.

The ELCA Division for Ministry, which develops standards for the church's pastors and lay ministers, and the Division for Church in Society prepared a time line to conduct a joint churchwide study of issues related to homosexuality to meet the mandates of the 2001 assembly. That study would inform the

drafting of a social statement on human sexuality for the 2007 Churchwide Assembly to consider.

In a separate vote, the 2003 assembly defeated a resolution that would suspend the ELCA's full communion relationship with The Episcopal Church until after the conclusion of the ELCA's Studies on

Sexuality and until the ELCA has made a decision on whether or not to bless samegender relationships and whether or not people in such relationships should be pastors or lay ministers of the church.

Race Issues

By a vote of 915 to 53, the assembly adopted a recommendation from the memorials committee to reaffirm the values and goals in the ELCA's 1993 social statement "Freed in Christ: Race, Ethnicity, and Culture." That statement, in the words of the memorials committee, calls on the ELCA to "confront racism, give public leadership and witness of racial-justice issues, and persevere in our mission and ministry in a multi-cultural society."

Constitution and By-Laws

Members declined to begin a process that could lead to expanding the ELCA Church Council from 37 to 69 voting members — one member

elected by each of the ELCA's 65 synods plus its four churchwide officers. Council members are currently elected by the churchwide assembly.

The assembly voted 643-320 to adopt a recommendation of the memorials committee to affirm the current model of the Church Council, with 37 voting members, as the churchwide board of directors. That vote came after a more narrow 428 to 554 vote against considering a substitute motion that would have reaffirmed a request of the 2001 Churchwide Assembly to consider expanding the Church Council.

Members defeated 205-701 a proposal to require a majority of its synod assemblies to ratify any amendments to the ELCA constitution. The proposal would have amended the ELCA's constitution by giving the 65 synods a year to ratify or not any constitutional amendments approved by a churchwide assembly.


A similar proposal that would have required congregations to ratify any churchwide ecumenical agreements or standards for pastors failed the day before, 254-733.

The assembly also declined to remove a constitutional reference to the ELCA's Slovak Zion Synod, its only non-geographical synod. The ELCA has 65 synods, of which 64 have geographical boundaries.

ELCA constitutional provision

10.02 says, "Each congregation, except those which are in partnership with the Slovak Zion Synod, shall establish a relationship with the synod in whose territory it is located." The Church Council recommended dropping the specific reference in the exception to the Slovak Zion Synod as unnecessary because the matter is addressed in an ELCA bylaw.

The Rev. Wilma J. Kucharek, bishop of the Slovak Zion Synod, said the current wording is important because it provides a constitutional guarantee of the synod's relationship to its congregations rather than a bylaw provision, which is more easily changed.





#### ELCA Awards \$278,000 'In The City for Good' Grants

CHICAGO (ELCA, Sep. 23) — The "In the City for Good" Fund Team of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) awarded 44 grants totaling \$278,000 in 2003 to revitalize ELCA ministries in urban areas. Grants ranged from \$1,000 for Project Hope in Houston to \$30,000 for the Noah's Ark Community Coffee House in Davenport, Iowa.

Among these grants was \$10,000 for Racine's ELCA Neighborhood Camps this past summer.

The fund team received 123 applications, with requests for a total of more than \$2.1 million in funding. It can allocate up to \$500,000 each year. This year the

team awarded grants to projects in 20 states and Puerto Rico.

"This year we had more requests than ever from sites around the ELCA," said the Rev. David D. Daubert, the program's director and executive for renewal of congregations, ELCA Division for Outreach.

The fund was created with money from several sources, including an initial \$1 million grant from the Lutheran Brotherhood Foundation. Lutheran Brotherhood merged with Aid Association for Lutherans to form Thrivent Financial for Lutherans, a fraternal benefit society based in Minneapolis.

#### **More Mentors Needed**

Adult mentors for first through third graders at Wadewitz School will again serve as an important part of Emmaus' outreach ministry.

Each adult spends one hour per week with the same child for the entire school year, meeting during the school day. The scheduling is coordinated to accommodate the availability of the mentors. Training will be provided for new mentors.

Marty Aiken has directed the mentoring program since its inception. He continues in that role until the end of October when he and Kathryn move to Japan. Marty's work has provided for a strong beginning to the Kids Hope program as he has faithfully spent countless hours with Wadewitz staff, Emmaus mentors, and neighborhood children and their families.

He has recruited and trained mentors (26 active mentors during the past school year), listened to the needs of Wadewitz, assigned and scheduled mentors and provided ongoing support to all involved. Wadewitz, Emmaus, and Barnes & Noble (where the coffee shop serves as his "office") have become homes away from home as Marty has made important connections and nurtured them with care.

So many lives have been touched as a result of Marty's dedication, compassion and hard work during the past three years. Thank you, Marty!

We now welcome Valerie

Crehan as director of the mentoring program. New to Emmaus, Valerie will need our support as she assumes this important role.

Due to a high number of mentors who have moved away, new mentors are needed for this school year. To learn more, contact Valerie or Marty during October. They would love to hear from you — the life of a child (not to mention your life) could be positively changed if you respond to God's call to serve as a mentor.


If you're like me, this trick will work until Tuesday or Wednesday.

# ELCA Unveils Proposal For New Churchwide Structure

CHICAGO (ELCA, Sep. 16) — On Sept. 15 the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) Office of the Presiding Bishop unveiled a proposal that the Rev. Mark S. Hanson, presiding bishop of the ELCA, will present to the ELCA Church Council in November. The proposal would reorganize the churchwide structure of the 5 million-member church in February.

The proposal is to eliminate 41 of about 500 staff positions and create 18 new staff positions under a new structure. The ELCA would retain three offices; its six divisions would become five departments; the

work of its two commissions would be deployed to several strategic areas in the organization; its current six departments would become service units of the offices, and several new service units would be created.

The proposal is also to phase out the existing boards of divisions, steering committees of commissions and advisory committees of departments. It asks the Church Council to develop amendments to the ELCA Constitution, eliminating boards and steering committees, for

presentation to the 2005 Churchwide Assembly.

The strategic planning process that preceded the proposal traces its roots to comments Hanson made at the ELCA Churchwide Assembly in August 2001, during the election process for presiding bishop, said the Rev. Charles S. Miller, executive for administration and executive assistant to the presiding bishop, ELCA Office of the Presiding Bishop.

The proposal is to eliminate the positions of executive directors for three current ELCA divisions: Division for Congregational Ministries, Division for Higher Education and Schools, and Division for Outreach. A

Department for Congregational Life and Evangelical Outreach would, under the proposal, assume many of the responsibilities of the current Division for Congregational

Ministries and Division for Outreach.

Under the proposal, a Department for Youth, Education and Lay Leadership would assume some other functions of the Division for Congregational Ministries as well as many responsibilities of the current Division for Higher Education and Schools.

Lutheran Men in Mission (LMM), the men's ministry of the ELCA, would be housed in the new Department for Youth, Education and Lay Leadership, with the understanding that LMM would become self-funding by 2005.

The Commission for Multicultural Ministries and Commission for Women would cease to exist under the proposal. Two executive directors would

administer their functions from the Office of the Presiding Bishop. Staff responsible for the church's multicultural outreach ministries would work from the Department for Congregational Life and Evangelical Outreach.

Mission Support and Resource


Development Services is one of the new service units the proposal describes, gathering many of the church's stewardship and fundraising efforts in the Office of the Presiding Bishop. A proposed World Hunger and Poverty Ministries unit would assume responsibilities of the ELCA World Hunger Program. The proposal also describes ongoing talks to create a staff position on "public church and global relationships" in the Office of the Presiding Bishop.

#### ELCA Leaders Protest Concealed Gun Bill

Madison, WI (Sep. 9) — The Lutheran Office for Public Policy in Wisconsin today urged elected leaders to promote positive public safety measures and to abandon the illogical agenda of the national gun industry. It opposes the "Personal Protection Act," AB 444 and SB 214.

"The US continues to be unique in the industrialized world in

its level of gun violence and the manipulation of a culture of violence that benefits gun marketers, not American families and children," stated Rev. Sue Moline Larson, director of the Lutheran

Office for Public Policy in Wisconsin. "It is a sacrilege to interpret 'Blessed are the peacemakers' as the carrying of a handgun or any weapon, concealed or otherwise. The illusion that more guns in our homes and neighborhoods will create greater safety is belied by the dreadful facts that ten young people are killed every day by guns in the United States."

ELCA documents define gun violence as a plague that must be reversed. The church urges legislative action to counter the terror for American children who are sixteen times more likely to be murdered with a gun than children in twenty-five other developed nations.

A similar bill approved in the Minnesota legislature earlier this year has resulted in a constitutional challenge by a number of religious groups, including the Minneapolis Area Synod of the ELCA. They cite the state's constitutional protection of religious expression, and protest the law's obtrusiveness, saying that it compromises rather than protects public safety.

Lutheran religious leaders in Wisconsin agree. "Many congregations in city neighborhoods

are places where children come to find safe havens from the violence in the streets. Churches are sanctuaries for children and families to share fellowship and express their faith. They should

not have to tolerate the risk of frearms being carried into their worship spaces," said Rev. Ken Wheeler, assistant to the bishop of the Greater Milwaukee Synod of the ELCA. "Legislators should have better sense than to impose this kind of 'protection' on houses of prayer and praise."

The Lutheran Office for Governmental Affairs in Washington, DC, recommends more helpful policy changes for states to adopt, such as the use of trigger locks and consumer safety standards for gun sellers. The American Journal of Public Health found that 2.6 million children live in homes where firearms are stored unlocked and loaded, or unloaded but stored with ammunition. Rather than allowing the carrying of concealed



weapons, LOGA recommends legislation that gun owners conceal from their children where they store their guns and employ safety devices to prevent accidental shootings.

The ELCA's "Statement on Community Violence" calls for public discussion that "objects to the

manipulation of fear of violence by some who hold or seek public office." It refers to the historic sixteenth century confessional documents of the church that state that "government is responsible under God for the protection of its citizens and the maintenance of justice and public order."



> sometime during his twoyear stay in Milwaukee. His witness is truly an inspiration!



## Bishop Hanson Withdraws Restructuring Plan

CHICAGO (ELCA) Oct. 22 — Because of "broad, often intense critique," the Rev. Mark S. Hanson, presiding bishop of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America

(ELCA), withdrew a proposed restructuring plan for the ELCA churchwide organization. Leaders of the churchwide organization, including the ELCA Church Council, must now address a projected \$2.8 million decline in income for 2004.

In an Oct. 20 e-mail message to churchwide

employees, Hanson said he will ask the council, which will meet Nov. 13-16 in Charlotte, N.C., to create a process and timetable to develop a new design proposal for the churchwide organization. The constitutional implications of any new proposal could be considered by the 2005 ELCA Churchwide Assembly.

The church council is the ELCA's board of directors, and serves as the interim legislative authority between churchwide assemblies, the church's chief legislative authority. The next assembly will be held in August 2005 in Orlando, Florida.

If enacted, the former restructuring proposal would have eliminated 41 of about 500 staff positions and created 18 new staff positions under a new structure. The ELCA would have retained three offices; its six divisions would have become five departments; the

work of its two commissions was to be deployed to several strategic areas in the organization; its current six departments were to become service units of the offices,

and several new service units would have been created.

"I heard from a number of people with their concerns and passed these concerns and some of my own on to the church council discussion list," said Ellen Maxon, ELCA Church Council representative of the Greater Milwaukee Synod. "Change is always

hard, whether it is in our individual lives, in our congregations, synods or churchwide. People usually want change, [but only] for the other guy!"

In a memo to ELCA's Commission for Multicultural Ministries and Commission for Women, Bishop Hanson wrote, "I intend to present to the ELCA Church Council, in November 2003, a recommendation that they develop a participatory and inclusive process for discussing and shaping a proposal for the design of the churchwide organization.

"Meanwhile, we are facing the need for budget reductions in 2004 that I will ask to be made in light of the ELCA Plan for Mission adopted by the 2003 churchwide assembly. I hope that during this period we will develop new patterns of doing our work collaboratively that reflect the same Plan for Mission."

## Dare to Share!

I walked into the first grade class at Wadewitz School with a name on a piece of paper. Mrs. Hartman, the teacher, had told Valerie Crehan, our mentoring coordinator, that I would be a good match for the identified child. Somehow a name on a piece of

paper couldn't tell me much, even after being told Maria (not her actual name) was a very high-need child and was already struggling academically.

Walking into unknown territory... taking a risk — it's not always easy, is it? Will I be effective? What do I have to offer, anyway? What if I don't make a difference? Am I using my time wisely?

Those questions tend to fade after that leap of faith is taken. Maria's big eyes and wide, toothless smile let me know immediately how thrilled she was to have someone come to spend time with her. In a classroom where she was floundering, she suddenly felt very special.

As our mentoring relationship began, Maria and I took our places at a table in the hallway. I had raided the Sunday School art room (the supplies there are available for all mentors to use) and went equipped with crayons, markers, colored paper, scissors and glue.

As Maria told me about herself, she drew a picture of her house and the members of her immediate and extended family. In that getting-to-know-you session, Maria colored pumpkins, drew a birthday cake with seven candles

(guess how old she is!) and traced her hand on another paper.

We took breaks for a snack of juice and grapes and for me to read a story to her. At the end of the hour, I taped all the pages (some *very* sticky with glue!) to make a "book." On the cover, Maria wrote, "Maria's Book."

Maria was so eager to show her book to her teacher, her student teacher, her parents ... and anyone who might

"ooh and aah" over it. Big smiles, words of "thank you," hugs and questions about when I could come back again gave me energy that I hadn't had when I walked into the school.

I was so blessed by the spontaneous gifts that Maria shared with me, making me eager to return the next week for more of those reciprocal blessings.

How is God calling you to share? Is it with your time? Your resources? Your prayer support?







Christmas shopping, monetary donations can be given through checks made out to Emmaus with "the Giving Tree" noted on the


memo line. An Emmaus member will then use your contributions to complete purchases of some of the needed gifts to brighten the Christmas of many young people and their families.



On Friday, November 7, Lutherans from all over Racine gathered at Atonement Lutheran Church. A joyous, spirit-filled worship gave a glimpse of the energy and excitement that would be present the next day as over 100 members of the Racine ELCA Cluster gathered to vision about ministry. #### Pastor Mary's Column

# Light in the Darkness

"In days to come the mountain of the Lord's house shall be established as the highest of the mountains, and shall be raised above the hills; all the nations shall stream to it ... they shall beat their swords

into plowshares, and their spears into pruning hooks; nation shall not lift up sword against nation, neither shall they learn way any more. O house of Jacob, come, let us walk in the light of the Lord!"—Isaiah 2:2,4-5

It's cold! The days are getting shorter and shorter. The trees are bare. It's the time of the year when depression and grief often take hold for those most lonely and isolated.

We might ask how we can label this season of Advent a season of hope. We hear of casualties of war, and we long for peace. We wonder whether the vision of Isaiah will ever be possible.

Called to be people of hope, we are also called to be committed Christians living in the tension of patience and impatience, in the tension of hope and of waiting. During my morning devotional time, I recently read:

Once upon a time, the dove said to the cloud, "How many snowflakes does it take to break a branch?"

"I have no idea," the

cloud replied. "I simply keep on snowing until it does."

"Mmmm," the little dove mused. "I wonder how many voices it will take before peace comes?"

"How long?" we ask, "How long? When will we see God's kingdom come to earth?

A hope and a vision for peace and for justice — within our families, in our community, throughout the world — where does that come from? It comes in the middle of the darkness as God lights a candle.

That candle of hope — the hope of Jesus for which the world cries out — helps us believe beyond today. That hope brings us to the trust that there is life beyond the struggles and chaos and brokenness. Our God will not let darkness overcome!

We once again look in anticipation as we prepare to experience the embodiment of that Hope in the birth of Jesus. We wait with expectation. With each Advent candle lit, we long for God's dream for this world to be fulfilled. May we be bearers of that Light and that Hope in a world waiting for us to carry the light of Christ. Let us walk in the light of the Lord!
