Housing Needed


Emmaus has been asked to provide housing for the three women and four men of the Watermark team. They will be arriving on the afternoon of the 11th and leaving the morning of the 12th.

Christian Children's Fund has sent us a progress report on Cristina Ogardo, the Philippine girl sponsored by the Emmaus Sunday School program since 1992. Cristina, who will be 11 years old February 20, is in the fourth grade and attends mass at a Catholic church every Sunday.

Last year, she received a grade average of 80% in school. She loves sports, but prefers staying home to play with her dolls and to watch TV. Before playtime, however, she helps her mother with household chores such as cleaning house and washing dishes.

Cristina participates in scouting, spiritual activities, and the National Children's Congress. Through the Christian Children's Fund, she has received educational assistance, a scout uniform, an annual medical check-up, and medicine and vitamins as prescribed by her doctor.

Cristina added her thanks in a postscript to the report, writing, "This is the most important gift that you have given me." The report is posted in the Sunday School Office, along with a picture of Cristina which was included with the report.

Emmaus member Chester Meyer has been putting a hobby to good use on behalf of Goodwill Industries of Southeastern Wisconsin. Meyer, a Kiwanis Golden "K" member, has built over 25 toys for a special lending library at Goodwill's Racine location, at 5420 21st Street.

The lending library has nearly 200 toys catalogued and numbered, available to Racine and Kenosha county child care givers to check-out at a minimal fee. The toys are designed for children with disabilities, who may have difficulty enjoying commercially available toys.

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Groups contributing toys, paint, and money include the West Racine Kiwanis, the Walden III High School art class, and the Racine Community Foundation.

Meyer creates wooden toys in his woodworking shop at home. In an article in the September issue of Goodwill's newsletter, Meyer says, "I get satisfaction out of making the toys. If a child will get some pleasure and benefit from the toys I've made, I'll be happy."

Meyer showed a table-top full of homemade wooden toys to the Emmaus Senior Fellowship Center in December. The toys included cars, trucks, trains, and a ship.

L.Y.E. plans overseas visits at the invitation of national churches and mission organizations. Since 1964, L.Y.E. has sent over 300 young adults to 49 different countries.

1994 Offering Envelopes Mailed

1994 offering envelopes were mailed out this year in an attempt to reduce the cost of making them available to all Emmaus members by taking advantage of bulk mail rates. Emmaus maintains a bulk mail permit with the post office which allows us to send mailings of 200 pieces or more at reduced rates.

Last year, after everyone had been given the chance to pick their envelope box up in the narthex, and after the pastors had spent a month delivering envelope boxes in person, we were left with 51 boxes to mail—at a cost of \$1.44 per box. While the exact bulk rates vary, the cost of mailing them in bulk this year averaged about 20° per box.

All members should have received their envelope box by now. If your box has not arrived, please notify the church office.






The proposed budget of \$223,857.00 was discussed and approved.

L.S.S. Announces Plans to Acquire DePaul Health

MILWAUKEE -- Lutheran Social Services (LSS) of Wisconsin and Upper Michigan announced on January 2 plans to acquire De Paul Health Corporation.

According to Robert E. Duea, President and Chief Executive Officer of Lutheran Social Services, the two organizations have signed a letter of intent to affiliate, pending fulfillment of several conditions.

LSS is the largest not-for-profit human service organization in Wisconsin and Upper Michigan. Headquartered in Milwaukee at 3200 W. Highland Blvd., it operates programs at more than 150 sites in the two-state area. The agency employs 1,500 people and has a \$39 million budget.

Statewide, LSS has certified alcoholism counselors among the staff at its 62 mental clinics, and operates 15 residential programs that teat adults and adolescents for alcohol and drug abuse. Ten mental health clinics and seven of the residential facilities are in the Greater Milwaukee area.

Added Duea, "We feel a combined operation will strengthen both LSS and DePaul, and will position us to meet the challenges of an emerging health care system that is emphasizing affiliations among related providers. Both LSS and DePaul share a commitment to maintaining and enhancing the availability of high quality chemical dependency services for Milwaukee and Wisconsin residents."





- Get to know people who have mental retardation in your church or synagogue. Extend friendship to them and their families.
- Encourage people with mental retardation to participate in activities in your religious community, from worship services to study groups to recreational activities.
- Offer respite care time away from home and family to the parents of a person with mental retardation.
- Teach your children about mental retardation and encourage them to invite their peers with mental retardation to neighborhood and religious activities.
- Adopt a group home. People with mental retardation living in the community need the friendship and support that congregations can provide.

By including people with mental retardation in the community life of your synagogue or church, you will contribute to the richness of their lives as well as adding a valuable member to your congregation. 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Looking for "Lost" Members

You may have heard that Emmaus trimmed more than 250 members from its "parochial report" under the category of "statistical adjustment." Does that mean Emmaus actually lost that many members in 1993? No! As far as we know, we've "lost" those members over the last ten years or so, expecially as we've made the move to record keeping on the computer.

Prior to the computer, the membership numbers were calculated by taking the previous year's numbers and



making known additions and subtractions. The computer, on the other hand, counts members according to the actual records we have for each individual. Somewhere over the last several years, those two methods of number keeping have diverged significantly.

The 267 "members" removed by statistical adjustment is the number of members for whom we have no computer record. We have no names, addresses, or phone numbers to be able to follow up on these "lost" folks. If you have any idea where pre-computer era records might be at church, from which we might recover some of these names, we'd appreciate your help.

ELCA RESPONDS TO CALIFORNIA EARTHQUAKE!

A severe earthquake struck the greater Los Angeles area of California early in the morning of January 17. Strong after-shocks continue. Communication with the area has been difficult. The Southern California (West) Synod Bishop, J. Roger Anderson, reports that more than 20 ELCA congregations are in the affected area. Early reports are that several ELCA church buildings and California Lutheran University have sustained severe structural damage and much breakage of stained glass and other windows.

The ELCA Domestic Disaster Response, through the Inter-Lutheran Disaster Response, has already provided funds for emergency supplies and needs of people whose lives have been disrupted by the earthquake. The Rev. Leon Philips, Director for the ELCA Domestic Disaster Response and the Inter-Lutheran Disaster Response, is channeling funds and services through Lutheran Social Services of Southern California, Diane Nissen—Executive Director.

Through the ELCA Domestic Disaster Response and our network of synods and Social Ministry Organizations we have a direct, low-cost way to get help to our affected congregations and the communities they serve. The ELCA always responds to disasters of greater magnitude.

Most needed now are funds. Synod offices will be advised later of needs for assistance with material aid and volunteers.

Pastor Mary's Column

Is Growth Optional?

Life is Change -- Growth is Optional. That's the title of a book which I recently received as a gift. While I've only taken the time to skim the book, I have thought about its title a number of times.

Change and potential growth are two topics which have come up a number of times here at Emmaus since the first of the year. We certainly have experienced change in our pastoral staff--from Pastor Lyle to Pastor Sandy to Pastor Dale to Pastor Paul in half a year's time. And then there has been change in our model of leadership--moving from the Senior/Associate model to the

Co-pastorate model. And, in addition to the change of some of the faces on the church council and the committees, there are the changes that each of us is experiencing in our own lives. Some are experiencing the birth of a new baby. Others are making wedding plans. Still others are moving from long-time homes into the more maintenance-free environment of an apartment or a condo. Many are experiencing changes in their health or in a significant relationship. Yes, change is inevitable!

It seems, though, as the book title suggests, that growth is not so clear cut, but rather, it may be optional. Last week's church council retreat focused on just some of the possibilities of growth here at Emmaus. There is the opportunity for spiritual growth as we look at the need for more adult education. Do we see that as an option, or is it an imperative?

There is the opportunity for growth in attendance as we *personally* invite a friend to worship on a regular basis. Do we see that as an option, or is it an imperative?

There is the opportunity for growth in **mission** as we carry the gospel message beyond the walls of this place, touching the lives of the hungry, the naked, the sick and the lonely. Do we see that as an option, or is it an imperative?

There is the opportunity for growth in building Shalom and wellbeing as we gather together around bread

and wine as members of the Body of Christ. Do we see that as an option, or is it an imperative?

There is the opportunity for growth in **commitment** in the giving of **our time and our money** so that the ministry may flourish and grow. Do we see that as an option, or is it an imperative?

If we are *truly* committed to growth here at Emmaus (and we are, aren't we?), then there aren't a whole lot of options. We are reminded that we are to "Go therefore and make *disciples* of all nations, baptizing them..." And, as disciples who follow Christ, we are called to proclaim the Good News, to feed the hungry, to clothe the naked ... to love our neighbor as ourselves. As we do so, we grow spiritually; we grow not only in numbers, but also in faith and in deeds of Christian love toward one another.

Here at Emmaus, may our Lenten journey be one of growth both individually and as a community of faith. As disciples of Christ, growth doesn't seem to be so optional after all! Let us embark on this adventure of growth





CHURCH HIGHLIGHT

Emmaus Lutheran Church

Emmaus'
Co-pastorate

A small group of Danes and Norwegians met August 22, 1851 to form the future Emmaus Lutheran Church. The original church was a small building (38' x 24') built on a lot on the west side of Marquette Street between State and Liberty Streets. Later the building was moved to face State Street where Dania Hall now stands. The church was named Emaus (in English Emmaus) in 1876, although legally the church was known as the First Scandinavian Lutheran Church until 1932.

with the large influx of Scandinavians to Racine County in the late 1800's the congregation built a larger church on Mound Ave. (then known as Chippecotton St.) in 1876-77. Over the next five decades groups split off to form Bethesda and Immanuel (now Lutheran Church of the Resurrection), Bethania, Our Savior's and Gethsemane Lutheran Churches.

Emmaus moved to its present location at Yout and Summit Avenues in the fall of 1955, enlarging the facility again in 1984. While a large number of the members of the church are still of Danish heritage, Emmaus is now home to an increasing variety of members.

Emmaus is one of the sites for the YWCA's Teen Parenting program, which provides quality day care services to children of parents who are still attending schools such as nearby Horlick High School. Other community services under Emmaus' roof include its Senior Fellowship Center on Tuesdays and the Racine Emergency Shelter Taskforce (REST) on Friday night; Hands-On Science, led by Carol Rudey on Wednesday evenings offers youth from ages 4 to 12 a faith-based educational experience

Emmaus operates along the Co-pastorate mode. The Rev. Mary Janz began her service at Emmaus in July of 1991. A native of Minot, North Dakota, Pastor Janz completed her undergraduate work at Concordia College, Moorhead, Minnesota, majoring in Spanish and Business. Janz taught those subjects for six years before working in the student travel, business for 15 years. Fluent in Spanish, she managed the business and arranged travel and exchange programs for high school students traveling to Spain and Mexico. Janz has studied and worked in Madrid and has also spent considerable time in Mexico.

Prior to coming to Racine, she lived in the Twin Cities, where her business was based and where she received her seminary training. A 1990 Masters graduate of Luther Northwestern Seminary, Pastor Janz interned at Lord of Life Lutheran Church in Fairfax, Virginia before receiving her call from Emmaus.

The Rev. Paul Nuechterlein came to Emmaus from Grace Lutheran Church of Howell, Minnesota at the beginning of 1994. First ordained in 1985, he holds a Master of Divinity degree from Lutheran School of Theology at Chicago. He and his wife, Ellen, have three children, Joel, Matthew and Joshua.

The recent move to Wisconsin was the first time Paul or Ellen have lived outside of Michigan; he was born and raised in the Detroit area and she in Saginaw. Pastor Paul did go to school in Valparaiso, Indiana (graduating in 1978) and to seminary in Chicago, so he is not a complete stranger to the west side of Lake Michigan.

RACINE MISSION CLUSTER NEEDS YOUR HELP

However, at the same time these programs have put a great strain on the Cluster's budget. some of the funding for these programs comes from the Cluster's 16 member congregations, but if these programs are to continue, more money will be needed.

Each Racine Cluster congregation should be represented by its pastors and at least two lay delegates (the number depends on the size of the congregation); retired and non-parish clergy are also slated to caucus at the Assembly. The agenda will include consideration of the Cluster Council budget and preparations for the June Synod Assembly at Carthage College.

Festival Proceeds
Donated to REST

The Epiphany Festival was, once again, a very enjoyable and inspirational event in spite of the cold, snowy weather. The proceeds from the free-will offering were donated to the REST program. All who participated in the program or other activities for the festival did so as a gift of their time and talent. We are grateful to all of them.

REST Program

Addressing the problems associated with the homelessness in the City of Racine is a primary concern of several constituents; so much so that seven area congregations have agreed to open their doors and provide 315 volunteers for staffing to ensure that there is some place for people without shelter to come.

People have heard of REST from word of mouth, press releases, INFONET, fliers and agency referrals. During the time span of October through December of 1993, 151 people had been registered with REST for temporary shelter. Five families were included in that count. It is possible that the lower number of women and children is due to the options of Homeward Bound and the Women's Resource Center.

Many individuals caught in the grey areas of life find themselves unable to receive services merely because they are male, unmarried and/or childless, and possibly earning too much income to qualify for general assistance subsidies; requirements needed to receive food bank referrals more than once a year or to receive extended stays at any shelter (3 days or more) such as Homeward Bound and Women's Resource.

Clearly REST is filling a need given that these individuals were taken in during times of mild weather conditions.

REST provides more than a spot to spend an evening. REST site staffers are providing leads and possible referrals to local agencies which can aid unemployed guests with their job searches. Others are given encouragement as they struggle to obtain to provide basic needs such as food, clothing and medical care with very low wages.

Several of our congregations - Our Savior's, Holy Communion and Emmaus - are hosting the REST program. As many as a dozen men, women and children are sheltered each night. At times these congregations find it difficult to staff all shifts adequately and would appreciate help from other congregations. If you have members who are or might be interested in getting involved, please have them contact Donna Bumpus (Our Savior's) or your Cluster Council representative.

Dear Disciples of Emmaus,

In February we contacted you by "telegram" with news of a "cash flow crisis"; and you responded with our best offering of the year that next Sunday. Emmaus has historically been a congregation which responds with generosity to need when it is made known! We give thanks to God for that sense of grace which has moved us to respond so generously through the years.

Unfortunately, it is time once again to make known our needs. Our February "telegram" cited bad weather as the reason for the shortfall. Your Church Council, in carefully looking at the projected numbers for income in 1994, has realistically come to the conclusion that our cash flow crisis is longer term than something we can blame on bad winter weather. Our current projected income simply does not add up to being able to financially support the ministry we have set for ourselves. Despite your generous response in mid-February, council has been forced to use thousands of dollars from undesignated memorial funds in order to meet regular operating expenses.

Church Council has responded by creating a "Stewardship Task Force," chaired by Financial Secretary Tim VanBerg and staffed by the pastors, several council members, and other concerned lay leaders. We have been meeting weekly, with a charge from the council to analyze our financial situation and to present strategies for addressing our needs.

Our analysis of the situation has so far led us to concentrate on the side of stewardship. On the other side, namely, that of cutting expenditures, we are seriously pursuing a reworking of our mortgage to take advantage of the lower interest rates. But, otherwise, beyond our most basic expenses, we have a 'bare-bones' budget with few easily identifiable cuts. We would prefer to begin on the premise that we have already chosen a ministry to undertake and should place our first and best efforts into financially supporting it through our stewardship.

Our first step as a task force, then, is to begin to inform you, the disciples of Emmaus, of our situation. In addition to this note, we have planned temple talks for April 10 and 17, as well as an Adult Forum for April 17. We have pledged to keep you better informed regarding our finances, through weekly updates in the Sunday bulletins and monthly updates in the Visitor. We are confident in Emmaus' spirit of responding to need...so long as we do our job of letting you know!

The next step is to begin to offer you various ways of responding. We have initiated plans for periodic fundraisers, coordinated "wish lists" for special giving, and embarked on a campaign of pledging toward debt-retirement. Our hope is that enough options will be offered so that everyone is able to make a positive contribution. You can look for details in the coming weeks.

In the meantime, your first avenue of response can be prayer. Please pray for Emmaus and our mission. As with those first disciples travelling to Emmaus, we think we are on the road to exciting times. We have just called a new pastoral leadership team. And the times present us with many exciting challenges for ministry in the name of Jesus Christ. We are confident that Emmaus -- with all of us working together, and with the Spirit stirring us-will continue to move forward in meeting such challenges!

Tune Out the Noise

Dear Disciples of Emmaus,

I am very much looking forward to my first Holy Week/ Easter celebration with all of you! I have heard many good things especially about the music, such as the brass ensemble on Easter, which is always the centerpiece of such celebrations.

And I recently came across a Holy Week reflection which extended the gift of music to be a metaphor for our



whole experience of salvation. Music represents the beautiful harmony that God has intended for us to live in relationship with creation, with others, and with God. Noise, on the other hand, represents the confusion of relationships and priorities that we actually live in. This writer pointed out that for C. S. Lewis, noise measures our spiritual confusions. Hell is "the

Kingdom of Noise," while in heaven "all that is not music is silence." We live in two worlds at once: "our citizenship is in heaven" (Phil. 3:20), but we still live amidst the raucous noise of this world's competing values and claims. It is easy to become preoccupied with our own interests, busyness, calendars, and agendas. Schedules inflate to titanic proportions until we are so bombarded with noise that we can no longer hear the music of God's promises to us in Jesus Christ.

What is that heavenly music all about? How can it bring us into harmony? Our Holy Week worship begins on Palm/Passion Sunday with a reading from Phil. 2:5-11. Scholars tell us that St. Paul is quoting an early Christian hymn. We no longer have the music (in the literal sense), but St. Paul has recorded for us the words of God's music (in the metaphorical sense) in Jesus Christ: "who, though he was in the form of God, did not regard equality with God as something to be exploited, but emptied himself, taking the form of a servant...he humbled himself and became obedient to the point of death--even death on the cross. Therefore God also highly exalted him...." How can we live together in harmony? By learning to sing that same tune as Christ with a life centered on humbly serving God. What's more, since our Lord is risen and lives among us, we already live in the

promise that someday Christ's harmony will be all-in-all. At the symphony's end, the sour notes of sin and death will melt away to the sweet harmony of God's music in Christ. In the meantime, Christ's music acts as a counter-theme amidst this world's discord.

How can we push back some of that noise in our lives right now? Our Lord has established his own orchestra in the midst of this world's cacophony. It is called the Church. It is God's people centering their lives on singing Christ's tune of humbly serving God. Come join us at Emmaus as we hear that tune once again this Easter; and be part of that orchestra of God's people serving God, until that promised and glorious day when all of creation will be one big orchestra making heavenly music together.



Teen Parenting Completes Seventh Year

To the folks at Emmaus Church: May 17, 1994

We are just finishing our 7th year with the YWCA Teen Parenting Program. Eight mothers are graduating: one mother is going on to the Milwaukee School of Art and Design, one mother is going to Parkside for Accounting, three are planning to go to Gateway, and one mother wants to work for the state.

Our funding this year has come from United Way, community block grant, and the Kaiser Group, which is an CONTINUED ON NEXT PAGE

organization contracted with Human Services to pay the daycare cost for at-risk parents.

On May 5th, we had a Denver screening of all the children in the daycare currently and alumni children. They were tested for any emotional or physical delays. To date the results have been very good and no serious problems are apparent.

We are in the process of finishing a survey of all the parents that have been serviced through our program. The results have been very encouraging. We have completed and compiled data on a control group of 35 alumni.

Statistics were: all the parents have graduated from high school. Three were divorced, seven were married or engaged, twenty-five were single.

Sixteen mothers were working. Three were currently going to Gateway and eighteen said they were beginning this summer or going to Gateway in the fall. The majority of the parents may wait a little while after they finish high school, but eventually they continue their training or education. Twenty-four parents stated the program was the only option for them to continue in school.

Thirty-two said immunizations were up to date. Thirty-two read to their children often. We state repeatedly to the mothers the importance of reading to their children for promoting bonding and how it correlates with their success in school later on.

Twenty-five said they did a better job of disciplining their children and related this to what they learned at the Center. The program helped alleviate stress in the home, which in turn affected interactions with the child. Thirty-two said they would definitely recommend the program to others. Seventeen mothers were on some kind of assistance and many expressed the desire to get off in the near future.

Many similar comments were: "I was able to finish high school and feel I am a better mother because of the program."

The testimonials we received from the parents are the best support I can give for the program. I personally hope the program can continue. I have seen the evidence of lives made better because of the time spent with us.

Many thanks to Joy Kousek for the cute pictures of the Daycare and the continued support of the program. Have a great summer.





The ELCA Task Force on Peace has published the first draft of a social statement, "Peace: God's Gift, Our Calling," which calls upon the church to model a community established for peace in the post-Cold War world. The



21-page document was completed in February and authorized for distribution to ELCA churches in March.

According to Rev. John R. Stumme, associate director for studies, the draft statement calls upon the ELCA to work actively for a just global peace. The statement "affirms non-violence while critically affirming the 'just

war' principles," Stumme said.

The task force included theologians, pacifists, a retired U.S. general, and experts in government and foreign relations.



"Cross-purposes" Means Working Together

The phrase "at cross-purposes" has taken on new meaning in the relationship between two churches in the Greater Milwaukee Synod.


"Cross-purposes" generally means to be at odds or operating counter to one another, but in the case of Cross Lutheran Church, Milwaukee, and Cross Lutheran Church, Ixonia, the term now represents a creative partnership.

Most recently the Crosses found common purpose in the unlikely form of bed sheets—lots and lots of bed sheets.

These bed sheets originated as hospital sheets, bed clothes of healing, which were then given to Hope House in Milwaukee's innercity to be used as bed clothes of hospitality.

When they were seen as inappro-

priate for the needs at Hope House, Joyce Ellwanger, a member of Cross, Milwaukee, recognized that the sheets still had at least one more purpose to serve.



She knew of the faithful efforts of the quilters from Cross, Ixonia, who meet each month to quilt more than 180 quilts per year to send to Lutheran World Relief. She knew that this small rural parish understood the importance of mission, not unlike the central city church she attends. Ellwanger knew of the need for sheets to use as quilt liners.

The next day, many boxes of sheets were delivered to Freida Bartel, a member of Cross, Ixonia, who has for years prepared the materials for the quilting day. Bartel saw much usefulness left in the sheets, and when load after load was carried into her special "quilting room" she said, "This is the best Christmas present I could imagine."

Who knows how many more lives

those sheets will have, from providing health to hospitality to hope to heart-felt thanks at their LWR destination? What a wonderful new meaning to the term "cross-purposes."



We Are Part of Great Things

You have a pretty good idea of what ministry activities you are a part of by being a member of your con-

gregation. But you are part of much more—your congregation is not all there is to your *church*. In this day of "information overload," most are left unaware of all you are a part of. One of the reasons I enjoy going to some of the churchwide meetings I attend is that I'm being constantly amazed at what all we/you do.

Did you know, for instance, that the system of Lutheran social service agencies in this country is the largest of any denomination or organization? The rest of the "top ten" now reads Catholic Charities, YMCA, American Red Cross, Salvation Army, UNICEF, Girl Scouts, Boy Scouts, Planned Parenthood, and Second Harvest.

Did you know, for instance, that The Lutheran is far and away the largest denominational magazine in the country (and by clear consensus among those in the field, the best)? The Lutheran goes into half of the ELCA homes in this country (and ought to be in yours, if it isn't)! Several large denominations have scaled back their publication, and one (United Methodist) has ceased it completely. Ours is an effective communication and evangelism tool.

Did you know that the "Inter-Lutheran Disaster Relief Organization," which we operate along with the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod, is consistently recognized as one of the most effective tools of immediate relief to victims of the midwest floods, the Los Angeles earthquake, the Florida hurricanes? And did you know that last year alone ELCA members gave \$1.1 million to this fund alone?

You/we are a part of a great church, where the love of God is proclaimed and acted out!

Confirmands Witness Service to the Poor

The confirmands at First United Lutheran Church, Sheboygan, began their Lenten journey by taking on the personality of a homeless person and waiting in the cold for a shelter to open, hoping to get in.

On Feb. 25-27, 32 young people participated in a retreat that focused on living out their baptismal covenant by helping the poor, feeding the hungry, and caring for the powerless.

On Friday evening, the group participated in a dinner at the church, in which some were served a meal from a wealth country, while others ate a meal like the majority of the world receives each day.

On Saturday, they traveled to

Milwaukee, where they visited a shelter for homeless people, food distribution centers, a shelter for battered women, and a soup kitchen. Their hosts were Cross Lutheran Church and young adults from the Lutheran Volunteer Corps.

Sunday morning worship was at Cross, which provided a multi-cultural setting with Gospel music, clapping, and dancing in the aisles. They ended with an ethnic meal provided by the church.

"I discovered the person behind the face of a homeless man or woman," one participant said. "My fears were changed to compassion and understanding."

Two Pastors Have a Lot in Common

There is a "spooky" string of resemblances between the two pastors at Christ the King Lutheran Church, Delafield. Besides serving the same church, and having the same initials, the Rev. Deane Peterson and the Rev. David Peters share the same birthday (Jan. 4). "I'm a little older, though," Peterson smiles.

But the coincidences don't stop there! The two pastors D.P. were also baptized on the same date. They went to the same seminary. They were ordained on the same date (June 23), and they were both installed at Christ the King on March 6.

"We probably could find more similarities if we looked," Peterson said. "But we're a little afraid to."

Congregation Steps Back in Time

The congregation of St. Matthew's Lutheran Church, Palmyra, took a step back in time Sunday, Feb. 13. An "old fashioned" service was held to celebrate the church's 150th anniversary.

Women were seated on the left side, and men were shown to the right hand side of the room.

Some parishioners wore period-style clothing complete with bonnets, beaded shawls, and floor-length skirts.

An old fashioned Lutheran service conducted by Pastor James Olia featured liturgy and songs from the early 1900's. The choir helped with the festivities by singing "Nearer My God to Thee." Scripture readings were taken from the King James Bible.

Pastor Olia, who sported black



robes and a circular white collar, read a 130-yearold sermon titled "Forgiveness and Fear." As was probably typical a century and a half ago, children fidgeted in the wooden pews and a few eyelids drooped during the half-hour lesson.

After the benediction. the congregation sang the

final "Amen." Husbands and wives rejoined each other, and children could be heard discussing the morning's activities.

While many things have changed over the past 150 years at St. Matthew's, the message of Jesus remains the same. "To them that believe on His name. He giveth power to become the sons of God, and hath promised them His Holy Spirit."

Stewardship and the Spirit of Family

Dear Disciples of Emmaus,

A warm thanks to all of you who took part in Miracle Sunday and helped to make it such a success! The almost \$16,000 in additional pledges was only one portion of the day's accomplishments. To have 150 people for fellowship at the brunch, a wonderful musical by the youth choir, the gospel of God's miraculous grace, and more -- it all came together for an uplifting morning at Emmaus.

Overall, the underlying spirit of family was most uplifting for me. And family is always the most meaningful connection with stewardship for me, as well. Stewardship and family? Yes, for if they are separate matters to me, then I experience them as in competition: most of my resources I save for my own family, and then I have to decide to give some up for "the Lord's work." But the other way to look at it is this: if "the Lord's work" of stewardship is to take care of family, then taking care of my family and giving to church are part of the same task. I see my life with Ellen and the boys as every bit as much of "the Lord's work"

as anything else I do. For there is no "Lord's work" other than taking care of family. But what the Lord graciously does is expand my sense of family beyond my "biological family." So church enters the picture, not as something in competition with my family, but as our extended family in Christ that God has given us.

One of the greatest miracles of God's grace is to be able to experience an ever expanding sense of family. When people are able to work together in a neighborhood, or a workplace, or a school, or a nation, or even across the globe, amazing things happen. We care for one another as brothers and sisters.

On Miracle Sunday, we wondered if that wasn't a better way to think about the miracle of the feeding of the five thousand. Certainly Jesus had the ability to multiply

food for thousands. But wouldn't the more important miracle be one of changing peoples' hearts? That they might change from being strangers on a hillside, hoarding any food they might have had, to being brothers and sisters, caring for one another by sharing what they had?

Whether married or single, old or young, children or no children, we are able to come together as brothers and sisters in Christ with a common mission. The spirit is here; we only need to continue to find new channels for that spirit to multiply the ways we care for one another. That's what Miracle Sunday is all about!

Emmaus Faces a Crossroads

At the July 18 and 19 worship services, on behalf of the Church Council, President Randy Sanders and Treasurer Bill Loendorf shared the following message with the congregation:

We members of Emmaus are facing a crossroads much like the disciples did as they traveled the road and met Jesus.

Our Church Council has made a commitment to keep you, the members of Emmaus, much better informed than we have in the past. We sincerely want to do more than we have in the past to keep you up to date on the current financial status of Emmaus, as well as to be in dialogue with you about the ministry and mission of this church.

Our first step was Miracle Sunday, a successful day of fellowship and celebration, as well as some success at *lowering* our level of deficit, but it did *not* erase it. So we continue to keep you informed weekly in the bulletin. Obviously, more needs to be done.

On Monday night, our Church Council dealt with the financial situation for almost the entire meeting time. On Tuesday night at a special meeting, we

met with Ken Wheeler, Assistant to the Bishop, from the synod office. Another special meeting of the church council has been set for Monday night to continue our discussion.

We discussed a pro-active approach to the financial crisis and that is to focus on three items:

1.) increased stewardship--we must be challenged to meet or beat our pledges for 1994.

- 2.) accountability for our shared ministry--once we get our giving up to or exceeding 1994, we will be able to continue to grow our ministry.
- 3.) leadership--we will be getting the pastoral team out with the lay leaders to find out what your concerns are and to better inform you of our financial situation.

To accomplish these items, we will be setting up a series of eight to ten cottage meetings where we as your lay leaders and the pastoral team will be there to encourage your input.

We want you to know that this is happening—that we are working hard to take positive action not only to address our financial short fall, but to keep you informed and to listen to you. As a result, you can expect several things in the coming weeks. In the next issue of the Visitor, you will be informed in more detail of the three council meetings and of what is coming next. In addition, in about a month, you can expect to be invited to one of the cottage meetings which will be held in the homes of our members. There you will have an opportunity to learn more about the story of Emmaus, and just as importantly, to

about the story of Emmaus, and just as importantly, to give your input to church leaders at each of those meetings as they *listen to you*.

We look forward to the cottage meetings this summer and to having all of us together unite and build Emmaus to be a church that will be strong into the next century. Remember, it's in 2001 that we will celebrate 150 years of history. At that time, we hope to look back at 1994 as a year of renewed commitment and communication leading to new growth for Emmaus.

Please keep Emmaus in your prayers as we look forward in faith.

Emmaus Council Holds Special Meetings

The Emmaus Church Council, at its regular June meeting and at two special meetings held June 14 and 20, addressed the ongoing financial shortfall of the church. The monthly pattern has been one of deficit spending (withdrawing money from the non-designated memorial funds

and from the monies of the Evelyn Binder estate) in order to meet expenses of the regular operating budget of the church. At the current rate of transfer, those funds will be depleted by summer's end. Those accounts are the only reserves of non-designated funds from which we have to draw.



How can each of us respond in the short term?

1.) Pray. Ask God to provide us, COUNCIL both individually and as a community of believers, with the courage and commitment to boldly support the mission and ministry of the church.

2.) Stay up-to-date with our current pledges and commitments to Emmaus. If possible, be a part of accelerated giving (i.e., paying ahead on your pledge through the summer and beyond), allowing more "breathing room" to deal with the longer term situation.

3.) Participate in one of the upcoming cottage meetings (beginning the week of July 18). Come to listen and to be heard. You will hear more about the ministry and mission of Emmaus, and more importantly, there will be a chance for your input. These meetings are *strictly* set up to be times of open and honest communication.

WHY TEACH? from The Parish Teacher

As the year ends, we begin the task of looking for teachers, and it is time to think about why we do this thing called teaching. Especially as Christians, what calls us? What grounds us in this task?

Spend some time thinking about your favorite teacher. What did he or she look like? Sound like? Move like? After a few minutes, jot down some of the characteristics or qualities of that person.



Can you come to any conclusions about what makes a good teacher? How did you define good—were you learning mostly about the subject? Yourself? Relationships? The world? Some combination of these things?

Why teach? Can it be just for the sake of the subject matter? Let's begin at our creation.

Genesis 2:7 can be translated: "Then the Lord God formed man from the dust of the ground, and breathed into his nostrils the breath of life; and the man became a living being." The Hebrew for this last word is nephesh. It means your whole self, your life. It is the combination of all your gifts and foibles, your body and emotions and spirit. All of this was animated with God's breath of life.

God created a miraculous potential in each of us. Our calling as teachers is to see that divinely created "soul-self" in each person (including ourselves), and to help nurture that potential into life and reality. Calling forth *nephesh* is meant to be done in community, together.

Think of a person in your life who has honored your nephesh and nurtured it. Tell others in your group about an incident which demonstrated this. Reflect on how this person called for your "you."

June 2-4, 1994

Seventh Assembly Meets At Carthage College

The seventh annual Greater Milwaukee Synod Assembly met at Carthage College, Kenosha, June 2-4 under the theme "Rooted in the Gospel—Growing in Community."

A pre-convention workshop on Thursday afternoon featured discussion of the ELCA draft statement on human sexuality. Speakers included Bishop Peter Rogness, the Rev. Sandra Roberts, the Rev. Harley Meyer, and the Rev. Jim Bailey, a member of the study task force. After the presentations, the gathering broke up into smaller groups for dialogue. Most participants agreed that the discussion was helpful and healthy.

Opening worship Thursday evening featured a special offertory procession. Members of each congregation walked forward carrying a five-gallon bucket of dirt from their church grounds. The dirt was mixed together, and then during the closing worship service, each congregation received a seedling in the mixed-together dirt to nurture until next year's assembly in Milwaukee. Connected to each seedling was the name of a "sister" church to be lifted up in prayer during the year.

The opening worship also featured the installation of the Rev. Susan Schubert as pastor/developer of a new mission start in southeastern Waukesha. "Pastor Schubert has great gifts of talent and energy to bring to this call," Bishop Rogness said. Assembly offerings totaling nearly \$4,000 were collected as a "birth gift" for the new mission.

Assembly keynote speaker was Dr. Tom Sine, Christian futurist and author of *The Mustard Seed Conspiracy* and *Wild Hope*. He spoke on "Creating the Future — Anticipating Tomorrow's Opportunities" and "Discerning God's Purposes."

The Rev. Bob Bacher, assistant to ELCA bishop Herbert Chilstrom, spoke about the changing life of denominations in this country and the effect of financial cutbacks on the life of the church.

Workshops dealing with the assembly theme were held Friday afternoon. Topics included "Healing Traditions," "Leadership Development," "Growing the Church," "Worship and Community," "The Middle Years," "Mutual Ministry," "Our City Churches," and "Complaints, Criticisms, Conflicts."

Bishop's Report Emphasizes Community

The report of Bishop Peter Rogness, given at the opening assembly plenary session June 2. concentrated on the theme: "Rooted in the Gospel, Growing in Community."

The bishop said that the gospel is the center of our life; it defines who we are. But roots have to have growth, or they wither and die. The growth happens for us in community, he said, in three basic ways: in our worshipping communities, in the whole church lived as a community as the body of Christ, and as our communities of humanity where we live and work.

Although his report touched upon the practical matters of staffing, committee works, programs, and finances, the bishop was concerned that we look toward the years ahead.

Special Assembly Report

"The world is changing. Our task is to hold on to what is central and to discern together where God is leading us," he said.

He is hoping for two things from this assembly: that our discussions and dialogues "cross-fertilize" each other for where we do ministry now, and that we have stimulating conversation about where God is calling us into the future.

priority. It is the heart of the life together we have in the ELCA."

But our second priority is to "reach out beyond that to the world, to the great need in our communities and throughout the world. Being rooted in gospel gives us confidence, and it also sets us free to give joyfully in witness," he said.

- 5. To recognize violence as an epidemic, to continue efforts in curbing violence in all its forms starting in our homes, and to support groups working on the underlying problems of violence.
- 6. To support continuing study of the draft statement on human sexuality and to send concerns, support, and suggestions for change to the national church by June 30.
- 7. To direct the church council of the ELCA to reverse the discontinuance of the Peace Education Department and to ask for greater emphasis on peace education at both the national and local levels.

- 8. To advocate the concept of regional federations to promote world peace, and to advocate strengthening the International Court of Justice.
- 9. To amend the synod constitution to read that all retired ordained ministers on the synod roster shall be voting members of the synod assembly.
- 10. To pledge continued support to Project Equality of Wisconsin and congratulate them on their 25th anniversary of advocating justice in the workplace.

Assembly Notes:

- ✓ Many thanks to Aleta Chossek and the assembly planning committee for an excellent assembly!
- ✓ Organ music at worship was by Susan Klotzbach, Carthage College: piano music and choir direction was by Erica Johnson; and hymns were sung by the Hephatha Lutheran Church choir.
- ✓ The Rev. Reginald Hansome served as assembly chaplain, opened and closed the Friday plenary sessions with devotions, and provided pastoral care during the assembly.
- ✓ The 1995/96 synod budget totals \$2,414,805 and assumes a 2% increase in congregational contributions. 75.7% of congregational contributions are passed on to partnership ministries, including 61% support for churchwide mission.

Pastor Mary's Column

A Sacred Time, A Sacred Space

The busier my days become and the more demands that are made of my time and energy, the more I realize just how essential it becomes for me to spend my early morning time in my easy chair. It's a chair that I've had a number of years, and its comfort as a rocker and a recliner can't be beat! PASTOR'S

As the morning coffee is brewing, I sit in that chair and read the morning paper. That's also where most of my prayer and reflection take place during the week. It's a time to read from Scripture and other sources, a time to be fed. As I try to take time to listen and to question and to muse,

I find that I am often challenged and pushed and surprised. Most of the thought and reflection leading to the next sermon to be preached emerges during that morning time of reading, reflecting, questioning and praying.

That morning time gives me direction for the day ahead, too. It's as a I spend more time in journaling and reading and prayer that I'm better able to prioritize my "to do" list for the day. That two hours each morning has become a necessity rather than a luxury--a time apart that refuels and re-energizes me! I sense God's spirit and presence during those quiet times. A sacred time, a sacred space--for me, it's that time of solitude in my easy chair six days a week.

Henri Nouwen, in his book Making All Things New, writes:

Solitude is not a spontaneous response to an occupied and preoccupied life. There are too many reasons not to be alone. Therefore we must begin by carefully planning some solitude. Five or ten minutes a day may be all we can tolerate. Perhaps we are ready for an hour every day, an afternoon every week, a day every month, or a week every year. The amount of time will vary for each person...But we do not take the spiritual life seriously if we do not set aside time to be with, and listen to, God.

And what about Sundays? My sacred time and space on Sunday mornings takes on a whole different complexion. On

Sundays, my "refueling" happens at church in the context of worship. Just as I need my Monday through Saturday quiet time, I also need the community worship that centers around Word and Sacrament on Sunday morning. A true sense of new life in the Resurrection is embodied for me each time we worship together as the Body of Christ. Just as solitude is imperative, so is that time of corporate worship. Sacred times and sacred spaces—for me a weekday morning in my soft, leather chair, or a Sunday morning at Emmaus. Where are those sacred times and sacred spaces in your life? As we think more about sharing our stories, maybe we can take some time to tell one another about the sacred times and the sacred spaces in our lives.

Shelter Program to Resume at Emmaus

Racine Emergency Shelter Taskforce (REST) shelter sites first opened their doors to our city's homeless on October 18, 1993, providing shelter to men, women and children through the winter until April 16, 1994. Host sites included Emmaus, Holy Communion, and Our Savior's Lutheran Churches, St. Edward's and St. Rita's Catholic Churches, and Taylor Avenue Church of the Nazarene. Several other congregations of various denominations contributed materials, money, transportation and volunteers.

312 volunteers ranging in age from 17 to 82 pitched in to oversee the REST sites and see that clean bedding materials were available each night. Of the 116 homeless persons helped last year, 80% were

adults, 20% children. They included unemployed, semi-employed, battered spouses, and a family whose house had burned down.



Over \$12,000 was donated to the REST program by community organizations and individuals. Food was donated by such businesses as O & H Bakery, and Aid Association for Lutherans; St. Luke's Hospital helped by washing the bed linen.

This year, volunteers are needed to staff the shelters, and to drive the Red Cross vans to take the homeless to the shelter sites. To volunteer your time, please call Donna Bumpus at 632-7048.

Members Share Concerns at Cottage Meetings

Representing the Church Council, facilitators led fifteen cottage meetings during July and August. At those meetings, the majority of which were hosted in homes of Emmaus members, a brief overview of the history of Emmaus and a background on the financial situation were presented. Participants then shared their concerns and ideas on the strengths and the weaknesses of the church.

As some of the challenges were presented, a number of suggestions were also made to address them. All of the comments, both positive and negative, were recorded in written form at each of the meetings.

A meeting on August 22 began the process of gathering information from all the cottage meetings to determine which areas received most emphasis. Although the final compilation of results has not yet been completed, three areas of focus were worship, visitation and youth.

Rev. Ken Wheeler, Assistant to the Bishop, met with the Church Council on August 29 to begin prioritizing that information. The Council will now decide the next steps to be taken. An informational Adult Forum will be held Sept. 25 to update members of the Cottage meetings and their results.

A total of 135 people attended the cottage meetings this summer.



Lutherans Respond to Aid Victims of Midwest Flooding

from The Rev. Leon Phillips, director of ELCA Domestic Disaster Response

In response to last year's flooding of the Mississippi and Missouri Rivers and their tributaries in Wisconsin, Minnesota, Iowa, Kansas, Missouri, Illinois, and the Dakotas, Emmaus members joined other congregations in the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) and Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod (LCMS) in contributing \$4 million to the Inter-Lutheran Disaster Response as of May, 1, 1994. Emmaus' contributions to this effort topped \$1,100.

More than \$1,227,800 was spent on direct flood relief operations as of May 1, and an additional \$53,550 was spent on pastoral care. Work in both of these areas, particularly pastoral care, was augmented by tens of thousands of volunteer hours.

Lutheran Disaster Response provided more than \$450,000 in direct financial assistance to farm and rural families by May 1, and announced plans to continue this assistance through the summer of 1994.



By the grace of God, the ELCA was able to speak God's love to those who suffered along a path of devastation that exceeded 1,000 miles. No American disaster has ever reached the sheer scope of territory devastated by the Midwest Floods of 1993. And no previous disaster has ever reached the level of generous response that poured in to Lutheran Disaster Response efforts, making possible the church's ministry to those in need.

Dear Disciples of Emmaus,

Several weeks ago I received an unexpected challenge. Pastor Mary and I attended a two-day workshop on confirmation ministry, led by the ELCA's current 'guru' on confirmation, Pastor Rich Melheim. But he began with a challenge that went far beyond confirmation ministry.


He said that the roots of Sunday



LWR Fall Clothing Drive Gets Underway







Pastor Mary's Column Making the Connections

"Making the Connections" was the theme of the ELCA Conference on Worship and Evangelism that Pastor Paul and I attended in Chicago recently.

Walter Kallestad, pastor of a fast-growing Lutheran "mega-church" in Arizona, led a workshop on the variety of generations making up our church today. While generalities and labeling can be dangerous, I think some of his descriptions are helpful as we make an attempt to understand and connect with one another. See if they ring true to you and your observations.

- 1.) GI Generation born 1901-1924. This group of confident seniors are civic-minded heroes and are rational problem-solvers. They built the infra-structure of highways and gave us Disneyland. Affected by the depression, they are frugal. Having experienced the world wars, they are patriotic. Their patriotism and religion can at times blur together. They value institutional loyalty.
- 2.) Silent Generation born 1925-1945. This generation is described as the helpmates. They were leaders in the Civil Rights movement and many of them continue to reach out to all races. They value mediation and communication. As they encourage people to talk to one another, they often display diplomatic tendencies. They become involved in the area of social justice.
- 3.) Baby Boomers born 1946-1964. This group, numbering 75 million, grew up with the fear of nuclear war. Born into the "age of greed," personal "needs" have often been placed ahead of those of team, family and community. A lack of commitment is displayed by those who want to be "free agents" and who believe truth is relative. 34% of this group have dropped out and stayed out of church. A high rate of divorce, frequent job change, along with little loyalty to denominations or institutions, are common among them. They tend to ask "How can the church serve me?" rather than "How can I serve the church?"
- 4.) Busters (Generation X) -- born 1965-1976. This generation feels devalued and believes they are inheriting "busted" government and a "busted" environment. They spend more time with TV than with their parents. Their greatest fear is divorce of parents; 40-50% grew up in homes with divorce. They tend to be cynical and pessimistic and feel the church has given up on them. While they are results-oriented, they are beginning to

question workaholism and consumption.

5.) Those born after 1976 -- Pastor Kallestad suggests that they will be known as the "Boomerangs."

So, you may ask, "What does this have to do with today's church?" First, naming our differences may help us to better understand and listen to our brothers and sisters in Christ who are not exactly like us. I find Paul's words to the Ephesians a helpful reminder as we consider those differences. That letter addresses differences between groups of people and then goes on to highlight our unity and oneness as members of the Body of "So then you are no longer strangers and aliens, but you are citizens with the saints and also members of the household of God, built upon the foundation of the apostles and prophets, with Christ Jesus himself as cornerstone. In him the whole structure is joined together and grows into a holy temple in the Lord: in whom you also are built together spritually into a dwelling place for God" (Eph. 2:19-22). Centered in Jesus Christ, let us be "joined and knit together" as our body grows and is built up in love (Eph. 4:16).

We have as our center, One whom every generation of this broken, fragmented society is yearning for -- let us be bold as we proclaim the Gospel message of Jesus Christ, the only one who can truly connect us and heal our Pastor Mary





October 10 Council Meeting Constitutional Change Proposed

Church Council voted at its October 10 meeting to bring a constitutional change to the congregation at the January 22, 1995 annual meeting. Council is suggesting that we change our definition of a voting member by substituting the definition from the ELCA Model Constitution for Congregations for our current definition.

At present, Article VI.B.4 of the Emmaus Constitution reads: "Voting members are confirmed members who have attained the age of 18 years." The proposed definition to substitute for Article VI.B.4 reads: "Voting members are confirmed members. Such confirmed members shall have communed and made a contribution of record during the current or preceding year."


Emmaus will once again be a teaching parish for two or three students from the seminary in Chicago.

Stock Can Be Given as Offering

Did you know that members of Emmaus have made contributions via stock? It may be helpful for you to know that gifts to Emmaus of stock, particularly those

shares that have appreciated in value, are especially effective for tax purposes. Firstly, the donor will be entitled to a charitable deduction on his or her tax return equal to the full fair market value of the stock on the date that the gift was made. Secondly, the donor avoids having to pay any tax on the

appreciation of the stock.

The best way to explain this is by example. Assume that a member wishes to honor a loved one by making a gift to Emmaus. This member has shares of stock that he or she paid \$1,000 for, but are now worth \$5,000. The donor could sell the stock and then take the \$5,000 and donate it to Emmaus. It would also expose the donor to a \$4,000 tax liability represented by the gain that was made on the stock when it was sold.

A more prudent option might be to donate the stock directly to Emmaus. This allows the donor to avoid tax liability on the \$4,000 gain while still giving him or her the \$5,000 charitable tax deduction.

The benefit to Emmaus in either case is the same, but the gift of stock ends up costing the donor a lot less than a gift of cash.

Midweek Bible Study to Take Up Pastor Paul's Article on Holy Communion

The next 6-week segment of our mid-week Bible study begins November 1-2 and will focus on Pastor Paul's recently published article, entitled "Holy Communion As the Means of Grace to Serve.

One of the themes you may have heard in Pastor Paul's preaching — namely, that the church needs to continue the reform begun by Martin Luther — is taken up in this class. One of the keys to any reform movement is to "get back to basics." Two of those basics in the church are Word and Sacrament, both of which will be addressed in this class.



RESI Program Continues





Pastor Paul's Column

The Needs of the Giver

Dear Disciples of Emmaus,

I would like to begin by thanking you for your response thus far to our financial shortfall. Church Council has made a strong effort to communicate our need to you, and you have responded. We had needed to take monies from undesignated memorial funds in three of the first five months this year. We Pastor's are now through October, and we have not needed to do that since May. Generous Notes gifts to the debt retirement fund has built that balance up to the point that we have more than enough to meet our mortgage payments through the end of the year and beyond. Thank you for your generous response!

Now I would like to shift focus a bit. It might seem strange after making such a strong effort to communicate our church's need over recent months. But I would like for us to spend these next few weeks focusing on something I think is ultimately more important: rather than focusing on the Emmaus' need to receive, I would like for us to turn our attention to the giver's need to give. I believe this to be a deeply spiritual matter, one of the most important things we can attend to if each of us desires to keep growing in our faith. As we enter this time of the year of making a pledge to the stewardship campaign, I would like for each of us to focus <u>not</u> on what possibilities for growth this means for Emmaus, but rather on what the possibilities are for each of us to grow in our personal faith commitment to Christ.

This is not just a standard stewardship-time line for me. I am being perfectly sincere in my belief in the importance of pledging to a person's faith commitment. When I recognize how much money impacts almost every aspect of my life, I realize that my commitment to Christ cannot go unaffected by the daily decisions I make with money. My own personal experience with tithing has taught me how vital a matter it is. I am not about to tell you that tithing is an easy decision to make. Our family budget constantly runs up against the challenges of making that commitment. But Ellen and I have found that precisely because it is a difficult commitment to make and keep, it

is one that is most constantly challenging us to grow in faith by sorting through our basic priorities in life. The challenge is not simply how much we can spare for church but one of fundamentally prioritizing all our financial resources to express our commitment to Christ. I can honestly say that tithing has been a blessing to our family life, a source of growing together in our faith!

I will share more about my personal experience in a November 6 stewardship sermon. And the climax to this time of commitment will be our Consecration Sunday celebration on November 13, with Pastor Dale Larson as our preacher and leader, and with your opportunity to make a pledge at the end of the service. I believe that we will have much to celebrate that day, not just in terms of what it means to our joint ministry as a congregation, but also singterms of what it means to each of us in our personal commitment to be disciples of Jesus Christ. For the sake of your own growth in faith, I invite and encourage you to come and be a part of things these Sundays in November! Come share the Spirit!







A generous gift of \$3,000 has been added to a gift of \$1,500 given last vear toward the purchase of a new computer and office equipment. Church Council and Executive Committee have carefully researched (taking numerous bids) and purchased a



Risograph 4500 digital duplicator, a Dell computer system, and (leased to purchase) a Minolta copier. We still expect to purchase a new laser printer.

For those interested in these things, the new computer is a 486 DX-66 with an 8 mb RAM and 270 mb hard-drive, with an automatic tape back-up

system. Our current office computer is the old 8088 model with a 20 mb hard-drive, so this new system will dramatically increase the efficiency of our secretary's word processing and recordkeeping abilities. The digital duplicator (a mimeograph that works with the push-button ease of a copier) can produce copies at a much greater speed and with a much lower breakdown rate than a photocopier. Neighboring church secretaries have raved to us about the reliablility, ease, and speed of these machines.

Overall, we expect these new machines to serve us well, for a number of years to come, in our efforts to better communicate with you, the members and friends of Emmaus!

Waiting ...

Waiting.... What are you finding yourself waiting for these days? Is that waiting easy? Do you find that you are impatient or anxious or stressed as you wait?

Waiting...

Waiting in line, perhaps at the grocery store, department store or post office...

Waiting for the light to change and for
