

## Center for Community Concerns Serves Racine

For over 25 years, The Center for Community Concerns (CCC) has helped devise creative and effective programs to address the social concerns of our community. The Center coordinates the CROP Walk for hunger, helps distribute Toys for Tots, and connects volunteers with worthwhile programs.

Current CCC programs include the Retired and Senior Volunteer Program (RSVP), Last Resort Assistance Program, Volunteer Today, Corporate Volunteer Council (CVC), Youth Volunteer Network (YVN), and Emergency Pharmaceutical Fund.

RSVP provides volunteer opportunities for Racine County people age 55 and over, such as VIPS, an intergenerational program involved with school tutoring. Last Resort steps in where other public and private agencies cannot help because of red tape difficulties.



CVC includes the Giving Tree project; in 1992/3, it provided 2,600 Christmas gifts to needy children. The Emergency Pharmaceutical Fund is a United Way program to provide one-time assistance with prescriptions for people experiencing financial crisis.

A Grantsmanship Partnership Program has been set up with the City of Racine and other local agencies to offer grant writing assistance to Racine organizations.

At the December WELCA meeting, the women voted to give \$100 to CCC. Pastor Mary serves on the CCC Board and is a member of its Interfaith Committee.


#### Subscribe This Month to the Lutheran

#### **Consecration Sunday Inspires Great Response**

The numbers on the response to Consecration Sunday are better than we might have even dared to predict. A big increase not only in the number of pledges, but

also in the average amount pledged, combined for an overall increase in monies pledged of almost \$44,000! The chart below tells the story in numbers:





more details on the Consecration Sunday response.) 1994 may go down as an important year in the history of Emmaus. The foundation of facing challenges together has been laid, so that we may


continue to face the ventures of years to come.

May the Lord richly bless our 1995 and the years to come, as we carry forward the ministry of Jesus Christ.





## Seminarians Begin "Teaching Parish" Partnership with Emmaus

Four seminarians from the Lutheran School of Theology in Chicago (LSTC) have begun their Teaching Parish assignments at Emmaus as part of their training for ministry. Bob Castro, Sharon Georgi, Bev Rautenberg and Claire Cruise Warren have been placed with us partly due to the fact that all four are "second career" students who commute to school from here in Racine or the Milwaukee area.

Castro, Rautenberg and Warren have been placed here to coordinate with class work over the next fifteen months (or four seminary terms). Georgi has been re-assigned at Emmaus to complete the last quarter of her teaching parish, meaning that she will be with us for only three months.

The Teaching Parish is a partnership between parishes and the

seminary. Parish pastor-supervisors and a lay committee in the parish work with groups of three or four students for four quarters while the students take courses in specific ministry areas. Students are permitted to give ten hours per week to parish activities (including travel time). In addition to course-related assignments or projects, the pastor-supervisors may include the students in various ministry areas appropriate to student and parish needs.

The focus for Sharon Georgi in this last quarter of her teaching parish is preaching. The first quarter focus for the other three students is worship, through Bob Castro has been granted a petition to forego this quarter due to prior experience in leading worship.

<u>Telephones!</u> We take them for granted. Could we get along without our phones? Millions of people have never used a phone, never will

Put 25 cents in the bank for each phone in your house and car. Pray that people all over the world will grow in their ability to communicate -- with each other and with God.

#### Thursday, March 9

#### Psalm 1

<u>Plumbing!</u> What would we do without our water pipes and faucets? In many places the poor have only one faucet for the needs of thousands of people.

For each water faucet in your home, and outside, contribute 10 cents.

Thank God for clean, pure water, for drinking, for flush toilets and sprinklers. Pray that all people may someday enjoy these same blessings.

#### Saturday, March 4

#### Luke 3:11; Matthew 6:25-30

<u>Hangers!</u> Our closets are jammed with hangers to hold all our clothes! The poor have no need of hangers.

Donate 1 cent for each group of 10 hangers you can count in your house.

Pray for the poor of the world who do not have enough clothes to wear. Ask Jesus to help you understand what He meant when He said, "I was naked and you clothed me."

#### Friday, March 10

Romans 10:14-15; Ephesians 6:13-15

Shoes! How many pairs of shoes do you have? In many parts of the world people go barefoot every day of their lives. For every pair of shoes your family owns donate 5 cents Pray that God will make our feet swift to bring Good News to the poor and that we will always wear the "shoes" of the Gospel of peace.

#### Sunday, March 5

#### Proverbs 30:8-9

Food! Each week most of us as families eat hundreds of dollars worth of food. We throw away more than the poor eat. Estimate how much your family will spend on food this week, and for each dollar put 1 cent in the bank to feed the poor. Pray that God will continue to bless us with good food, and that out of our abundance we will share our bread with the hungry.

#### Saturday, March 11

Ruth 1:15-17; Acts 2:41-47

Houses! For us a nice house, with several (or even many) rooms is a "must." It is a place to live; a place to call home; a place to welcome friends and guest. For the poor living in little one-room shacks with dirt floors; a real house is only a dream.

Give 10 cents for each room in your house.

Pray that your house will always also be a "house of the Lord" where all who enter will feel God's presence and God's love. Dedicate your home to God and ask God to shelter the homeless.

#### Monday, March 6

#### Jeremiah 14:14-16

<u>Television!</u> TV is one of our biggest luxuries. The average family watches 6 hours of TV a day. Can we imagine that millions of people have never seen a single TV program? For every hour of TV your family watches today donate 10 cents. Confess how much time you spend watching violence, infidelities, and frivolous entertainment -- compared to time devoted to Bible reading, worship, and service to others.

#### Sunday, March 12

#### Luke 4:14-20

Clocks! How many times a day do we check the time? How could we manage if our only time-pieces were the sun, or a crude sundial, or an hour glass -- which is all some people have? Count all the clocks and watches in your home; give 10 cents for each.

Pray that NOW is the time Good News will come to the poor, and that it will come through us.

#### Monday, March 13

Matthew 15:22-28

Pets! We love them, lavish kindness upon them and feed them sumptuously. They eat better than millions of people do. Those same millions have only scraps for their pets, if anything at all. Give 10 cents for each pound of pet food you have in your home, plus 15 cents for each pet.

Give thanks for the joy pets bring to our lives, and to the lives of others. Pray for those pets that must scavenge, or even take the lives of other animals to survive.

#### Tuesday, March 14

John 15:1-5

<u>Plants!</u> Most of our homes and patios are decorated with beautiful plants and flowers — a blessing never known by many. For each plant found inside your home, or on your patio, give 5 cents

Give thanks for the beauty of growing things, and pray that the world and its people may always be blessed with plants and flowers.

#### Wednesday, March 15

Mark: 18-23

Indoor Toilets! A necessity we could never do without! For sanitation and convenience, we must have them. Can we even imagine using only holes in the ground, or just going "behind the bushes," as so many poor must do.

For every bathroom in your house put 25 cents in the bank, and then add another 5 cents for every roll of toilet paper you have. Pray for the grace to be grateful for the luxuries we enjoy, and for the will to sacrifice a little of our luxury to bring hope to the poor.

Thursday, March 16

Luke 2:29-32; Matthew 5:14-16

<u>Light Switches!</u> "What a blessing!" (Many people would say, "What a miracle!") Turning night into day!

Count all the light switches in your home and for each one give 3 cents.

Give thanks to God who is "The Light of the World," praying that we will be little lights shining in the darkness of the world's suffering. Ask for the grace to become switches to turn darkness into light.

#### Friday, March 17

Psalm 92:1-3

<u>Music!</u> It is a joy to pop in a tape or a CD and hear music that delights the ear and lifts the heart. For many of the world's poor the only music is that which they make themselves.

Count all the tapes, CD's and records your family owns and put 2 cents in the bank for each one.

Pray that all our music will reflect God's harmony with us, creating new harmonies among us all.

#### Saturday, March 18

I Timothy 6:6-8, 17-19

<u>Pockets!</u> Most of the clothes we wear have pockets, especially trousers and slacks. We need those pockets so we have a place to carry our money and other valuables. We need a lot of pockets because we have a lot of "stuff."

Count the pants, slacks and shorts your family has and for each pair put 2 cents into the bank.

Pray that all whose needs are abundantly filled will learn to share abundantly with those who still wait for a reason to have pockets.

#### Sunday, March 19

Joel 3:18; Exodus 3:7-8

Milk! We buy as much as we want, whenever we want, and rarely stop to think of the children of the world whose thirst for milk's sweet nourishment is never satisfied.

For each container of milk in your refrigerator give: 25 cents for quarts, 50 cents for half-gallons, and \$1.00 for gallons.

Pray that God's generous gift of good things will keep on flowing from a generous earth, and then through the generous hearts of

God's people to nourish those whose cups are empty.

Monday, March 20

John 13:3-15

Baths and Showers! We bathe more than any other people on earth! For us it is daily routine, for others a rare luxury. For each bar of soap you find in your home donate 5 cents; for each tub or shower donate another 25 cents.

Give thanks for soap and water. Pray that our clean bodies will be matched by clean hearts that seek to know and do God's will.

#### Tuesday, March 21

Proverbs 30:14-16

<u>Toothbrushes!</u> "Brush twice a day," the dentist says. We use toothbrushes and nice tasting toothpaste -- not rough sticks like those used by many of the world's children.

Count every toothbrush and toothpaste container in your home, and for each one put 10 cents in the bank.

Pray that those who prey upon the poor would be stopped, and that greed and injustice would cease.

Wednesday, March 22

Luke 4:16-19; Acts 8:26-35

Reading! Magazines and newspapers! In our homes they're "a dime a dozen." Most of the poor can't read, and those who have learned now hunger for the printed page.

Count all the newspapers and magazines you have in your home today. Put "a dime a dozen" into the bank.

Pray for how we use the gift of reading -- that we read God's Word for ourselves, and that we share our understanding of it with others.

#### Thursday, March 23

John 15:16; Matthew 12:33

Fruit! Fresh fruit is an enjoyable part of our daily diet! We can get any kind we want anytime. The only fruit many people ever eat is that which they are sometimes able to find growing wild. For each piece of fresh fruit you find in your house today give 5 cents. (Grapes count as one piece.)

Pray for the fruit of the Spirit working in you to give you joy, peace, love, hope, and life -- and that we will share these gifts

with others.

#### Friday, March 24

Mark 6:30-32

<u>Vacations!</u> We take family vacations to "get away from it all."

Life goes on at the same dreary pace day after day, year after year.

Give 5 cents for every day of vacation your family will have this

Pray that the Sabbath rest which God has promised may become a reality for those whose lives are an endless burden with little joy and no hope. Give thanks for your own life of work and rest.

#### Saturday, March 25

#### James 2:14-17

Jackets, Coats, Sweaters! On those cold and rainy days what a blessing to have clothing that keeps us warm and dry! Can we even imagine not having one single jacket, coat or sweater? For every coat, jacket or sweater you can count in your house, donate 5 cents to help warm the poor.

Pray for the warmth of God's love, and the heat of the fire of God's Spirit, to fill us, and then radiate through us to touch those whose lives are cold and bare.

#### Sunday, March 26

#### Malachi 3:10; Daniel 6:10-12

<u>Windows!</u> Imagine a house without windows or just openings in the wall with no glass or screening. The homes of many poor people are like that.

For every window or glass door in your house, put 5 cents in the bank.

Pray that as we look out of our windows onto the world around us, we will see not only the light and the beauty, but also the dark ugliness of poverty.

#### Monday, March 27

#### I Kings 17:10-16

<u>Kitchens!</u> They are so well-equipped with appliances, large and small. Imagine homes with no kitchen no stove, no refrigerator -- only a charcoal pot to cook on!

Count all the appliances in your kitchen (if you don't count at least 10 you've probably missed some!). For each one donate 5 cents. Offer prayers of thanksgiving for pantry and refrigerator shelves that are never empty, and for stoves and ovens that are used daily.

#### Tuesday, March 28

#### John 21:3-14

Grills! Outdoor cooking on a gas or charcoal grill! What a treat! Many poor people always cook outside over charcoal, and it's a treat for them, too, because it means there's food! For every grill (gas or charcoal) your family owns, contribute 50 cents.

Pray for the Spirit to set our hearts on fire with love and compassion.

#### Wednesday, March 29

#### Mark 2:1-12; Luke 9:58

Beds! We sleep in comfortable, clean beds with springs and mattresses. In the homes of the very poor there are often no beds - or only one for the whole family to share.

For every bed in your house give 25 cents to the poor via the Lenten bank.

Pray for all those who this very night are homeless and without a bed. Give thanks for sleep, for its peace and refreshment; but pray that we never fall asleep to the requirements of our discipleship.

#### Thursday, March 30

#### Isaiah 25:6-9

Sweets! Cookies, cake, ice cream! We eat more sweets than we ought to every day! Imagine never tasting a cookie, or a piece of candy in your whole life

For every bag, package, container of cookies, candy or ice cream in your house, put 10 cents in the coin canister.

Give thanks for the sweetness of God's grace, and for a life flowing with milk and honey. Pray that God will take away the bitterness of the life of the poor.

#### Friday, March 31

#### John 4:7-15

Swimming! Clear, safe water for the luxurious fun of swimming. A blessing only a few in the world enjoy.

<u>T-shirts!</u> They are an indispensable and fun part of our wardrobe with their pictures and words -- especially for the young. For some poor children, one T-shirt is their only wardrobe.

For every 10 books you count in your home give 5 cents to help children of the poor learn to read.

Give thanks for teachers who have taught us, and who teach others, to read. Ask for guidance in choosing the best books to read.

#### Monday in Holy Week, April 10

Mark 11:15-19

<u>Bicycles!</u> We use them mostly for fun and exercise. For many they are the only form of transportation. Some people only dream of the day they might own one.

For every bicycle your family has, give 25 cents.

Pray that all of us will learn more and more to use God's gifts as God desires, and above all that we will learn to share.

#### Tuesday in Holy Week, April 11

Mark 11:27-33

<u>Power!</u> Remember the last time the power failed and how inconvenient it was? Think about those for whom the power never goes on.

Look at your last electric bill. For every kilowatt hour it says you used, give 2 cents.

Pray for God's power and for the grace to use it as Jesus did -- for others.

#### Wednesday in Holy Week, April 12

Mark 14:1-9

<u>Perfumes/Colognes!</u> We invest much time, money and care just to make sure we smell good. The poor pray only for that which they need to survive.

## **Emmaus Mortgage to Enter Tenth Year**

Several questions were raised during the annual meeting concerning the status of our mortgage. It is helpful to pull all the facts of that history together in one place from time to time, as we will do here.

The initial cost of the addition in 1985 was \$550,000; \$250,000 was raised up front through member loans and special The pledges. closing of the mortgage for balance



#### BUILDING FUND UPDATE

was July 31, 1985 -- a \$300,000 loan from Lutheran Brotherhood which matures in 2005. It began with an interest rate of 10.75%, but is renewable every five years. We are currently coming to the end of our second five years during which the rate has been 10.0%. According to the mortgage contract, August 1, 1995 is the second time the interest rate may be adjusted.

As of our February 1 mortgage payment (\$2,466 per month) the remaining balance of the loan is still \$231,989.77. In that paymayment, \$532.75 was toward principal and \$1933.25 was toward interest. In 1994, our \$29,592 in mortgage payments divided as follows: \$6,011.65 toward principal and \$23,580.23 in interest. In other words, we paid 80% interest and 20% principal!

Obviously, it would help to be able to make extra principal payments. But we must stress that, in recent years, our finances have dictated that our first priority for debt retirement has been to simply pay the monthly mortgage payment. Your generous gifts to Debt Retirement have made it possible to make those payments.

As our financial stewardship improved in 1994, we were able to make three extra principal payments totaling \$1,471.12. We hope that 1995 will further our success in reducing the principal. One last note in this regard: if you make a contribution that you want to go only to extra principal payments, we are faithful in honoring such requests.

## Council Approves Heating Project, Pest Control

After all of the bills for 1994 have been paid, there is \$1,250 remaining which will be used toward our benevolence commitment. We will still be short in benevolence giving for 1994 by about \$5,000.

The 1995 budget was approved by the council. The budget has been revised in a new computer program which improves the way it is read and understood.

The council approved moving ahead with two heating projects for energy conservation. Pastor Paul presented information regarding replacing the parsonage furnace, updating the boiler in the church and repairing the pneumatic thermostat system. The projects will save an estimated \$1,500 per year in gas bills. Skip Toslek and Pastor Paul have worked diligently to provide estimates and gather the necessary information to get this work done and take advantage of rebates and loans from the Wisconsin Gas Company.

The council approved using pest control to rid the church of ants and gnats and the parsonage of carpenter ants. People using the church kitchen need to be very careful about cleaning up food spilled on the counters and the floor and making sure garbage is contained in covered garbage cans which will be purchased soon.

Pastor Paul will be attending a Creation Awareness Conference in Madison on January 20 and 21. He encourages anyone interested in attending to join him. Council Retreat will be Saturday, Feb. 11, 9:00-noon at the Atrium.

Installation Sunday will be February 5.

#### **Work Projects Completed**

In a three-day period January 17-19, the following Building and Grounds projects were completed: new energy-efficient furnace installed in the parsonage; new gutters constructed on the parsonage; a new computerized boiler control installed in the church; repair of the air compressor for the church thermostats; and the first spraying for ants in the kitchen and Fellowship Hall (which will continue at least two additional months). Still ahead in the coming weeks is the possible replacement of several thermostats in the church, which are "rusty" after several years of disuse.

Funding for these projects has been various: the gutters have been funded by special donations (though \$394 is still needed; see article on "Wish List"). Pest control will come out of the budget. The three heat-related projects are being funded by a low-interest loan through Wisconsin Gas. The total cost of the three projects has been calculated carefully to approximately equal to the significant gas bill savings over the five-year life of the loan. And we become better stewards of God's creation to top it all off!

## **Remembered Generosity**

...a woman came with an alabaster jar of very costly ointment of nard, and she broke open the jar and poured the ointment on Jesus' head. But some were there who said to one another in anger, "Why was the ointment wasted in this way? For this ointment could have been sold for more than 300 denarii...

[Jesus said,] "Truly I tell you, wherever the Gospel is proclaimed in the whole world, what she has done will be told in remembrance of her." (Mark 14:3-5 & 9)

This story of the woman anointing Jesus is one of my favorites. What total love and dedication, and what nerve and generosity! This woman was so bold in her seeking out Jesus and so extravagant in her giving (and so inappropriate in her

inappropriate in her behavior, according to those observers who were at the dinner party with Jesus). She certainly wasn't bound by old norms and rules or by financial "common sense."

When it comes to that lavish expression of her love for Jesus, I can picture how uncomfortable it must have made those who were with Jesus that day. They no no doubt questioned the woman's "crashing the party" as well as her frivolous act of breaking open that alabaster jar of expensive ointment, only to see it be used to anoint Jesus! What a waste in their eyes! Couldn't she have

been more practical?

Breaking open the jar — what a generous, bold expression of faith by one who had been marginalized by her culture. She made a statement about her love for Jesus that would never be forgotten as long as the Gospel was proclaimed (Mark 14:9). Jesus commended what she had done as a beautiful thing.

"Breaking open the jar" -the theme that will be used throughout this country in 1995 to commemorate the 25th anniversary

of the ordination of women in the Lutheran church. That wasn't an option for me as I was receiving my education and being trained for a teaching career in the mid '60's. But there were other women and men who were bold enough not only to see

the ordination of women as a possibility, but to "break open the jar" in a faith-filled response to Jesus. Thus, the doors were opened for many women, including myself, to later pursue theological studies leading to ordination. I am grateful for those who had the courage to "break open the jar," in spite of how they were viewed by the by-standers.

How can we as a congregation be a faith-filled community and bold in faith, broad in vision, generous in giving -- as we "break open the jar"? How do we get beyond the miserly,

#### Pastor Paul's Column

## From Brokenness to Healing

the Pastor

Dear Disciples of Emmaus,

I invite you to join us on our Lenten journey in search of healing. We have entitled our Lenten series "From Brokenness to Healing."

That title might seem a bit out of place. More in the language of our times might be something like

"From Sickness to Health." A word like "brokenness" isn't often used in modern medical lingo.

But Pastor Mary and I would like to suggest that, in our Christian context of talking about healing, using a word such as "brokenness" fits just fine.

Let's continue the comparison for a few moments. The approach to healing in modern medicine has built its success by focusing on physical sickness. We find out what is wrong with a person's body; and we have been able to do it better in this century than anyone could have imagined. The increase in knowledge about how our body works has been astounding.

But even modern healers are beginning to admit the limits to this approach. Oh, the humble among 20th century doctors have always been frank about how much there is yet to learn. But I'm talking about a different kind of limit to this focus on our physical

bodies: namely, that human beings are much more than physical bodies. Focusing just on our bodies, no matter how good we get at it, will still come up short

> because we are more than bodies. So recent studies in medical research have begun to be much more cognizant of those other aspects of who we are as persons. They've noted

things such as the connection between stress and heart disease. They've even begun to talk more about things like the link between one's **spiritual well-being** and how well your immune system fights disease.

Spiritual well-being. That's a matter we've addressed in the church all along. And when someone's spirit is down, we usually don't say it is "sick." We often say his or her spirit is "broken." I think this is partly because we realize that spiritual well-being has mostly to do with relationships getting broken.

Join us for the mid-week Lenten worship services on a journey "From Brokenness to Healing." Jesus came into this world to heal our broken relationship with God. In so doing, he offers us healing for all our broken relationships, including our relationship to our own bodies.

## Pastor Paul's Column Continued

Each week we will focus on a different healing story from the gospels. Often it is the story of a physical healing, but with Jesus that always goes to a deeper level of who that person is. The schedule is as follows:





# Second Annual "Miracle Sunday" Coming May 14





#### ELCA Seminarians Are Older, More Diverse

There are more women and people of color enrolled in master of divinity courses this academic year than last at the eight seminaries of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA). Also, more of the seminarians are over 39 years of age. Statistics gathered by the ELCA Division for Ministry indicate that 1,618 students are currently working toward an M.Div. degree in the denomination's seminaries, a slight drop from a peak of 1,631 in 1992-93.

A total of 725 women were enrolled in ELCA M.Div. programs in

1994-95 - 44.8% of the total. That percentage has steadily increased in recent years. 60 seminarians this year are Lutherans of color, an increase of six over last year.

As in other seminaries, the trend toward an older student population continues. 37% of the students in ELCA M.Div. programs are in their 20s; 27% are in the 30s; 26.8% are in their 40s; and 8.9% are 50 to 64 years of age.

# Daylight Savings Time Begins

Scientists at the Mount Palomar Observatory predict that the night of Saturday, April 1, will be one hour shorter than usual. "We believe that the phenomenon may be due to the accumulation on the planet of timesaving devices, such as fax machines, microwave ovens, and instant tea," said spokesscientist Dr. Geoffrey Steub.

Scientists have dubbed the phenomenon "Daylight Savings Time," and predict that due to the lost hour, the sun will begin rising one hour later than usual. While it is not known where the missing hour will have gone, Dr. Steub expressed confidence that the mystery will be solved within six months.

The bishop's office has expressed concern over the possibility of widespread panic caused by the missing hour, and is urging Lutherans to set their clocks ahead one hour before going to bed April 1 so that nobody will be late to church on April 2.

Where can we turn for that renewed hope and promise of healing and shalom?


That healing salve comes in many ways: reading and reflecting upon scripture, hearing God's word of promise in word and song during worship, being forgiven and nourised



# "Time & Talent" Pledges Opportunity Planned for Miracle Sunday



# **REST Program Completes Second Year**

As you may know, Racine Emergency Shelter Taskforce (REST) is a grassroots volunteer-driven effort begun in the fall of 1993 to provide shelter to homeless men, women, and children in Racine. Seven churches rotate the responsibility for providing shelter and volunteers to assist the "guests" throughout the cold months of the year.

Funding for this program is provided through Federal Emergency Management Administration (FEMA; 21.6%), churches (41%), a foundation (21.6%), business and club donations (8.6%) and individual donations (7.1%). This money is used to pay the salary (very modest) of the coordinator, supplies, postage, taxes, printing and a telephone. FEMA funding is designated and cannot be used for such things as food, bus tokens, or the coordinator's salary.

Due to an increase in the number of guests and a decrease in individual donations, there isn't enough money to pay for laundry, salaries, and bus tokens. The 1995 season will end at the end of April, but there is a definite need for financial assistance.

This program has really been successful. Many of the guests are employed but their salaries are insufficient to provide for housing. We all are working to decrease the need for such shelter for the homeless, but right now people need help.

If you are able, please consider making a donation to the REST program or think about volunteering any night of the week at any of the



sites. Emmaus provides shelter on Friday nights, and we need more people to help us.

# After Oklahoma City: We Are Not Helpless

PASTOR'S

Dear Disciples of Emmaus,

I have watched, as have you, the unfolding events these past days, since the horrifying bombing in Oklahoma City. I have cried with the parents and family of slain children; I have felt outrage at the extremist groups responsible.

Yet one feeling I have not felt,

which is otherwise a common response to such acts of terror, is helplessness. It is so easy to view such random acts of violence and to feel helpless, to feel that there is nothing one can do in response. But I have

instead felt strangely renewed renewed in my sense of call to speak the gospel about God's remedy for such violence. For my deepest conviction is that that's precisely what the Gospel of Jesus Christ is: God's response to the problem of human violence. So we are not helpless in the aftermath of events like Oklahoma City, if we are armed with the Gospel.

It is also a conviction of mine, however, that the Church has gotten somewhat off-track in understanding the gospel resource that is ours, with which we are able to stand against the forces of evil and violence. The Church, in fact, has its own bloody history of supporting the forces of violence rather than standing against them. We must begin by "cleaning our own house."

The first thing we need to be absolutely clear about is the God

whom we come to know through Jesus Christ. One of the investigators of this crime called it a "godless act." Unfortunately, I don't think this is quite true from the standpoint that most of these extremist groups definitely worship their own version of a god. It is not the God whom we worship, but that is why we need to be

clear about who that God is.

A more subtle example involves our response to those who perpetrated this crime. Our most natural response has been for 'swift and certain justice' that climaxes in their

execution. But I was moved by a pastor in Oklahoma City, whose mother still lay in the rubble. He said that his feelings for Timothy McVeigh were expressed by our Lord on the cross when he said, "Father, forgive them, for they know not what they do." What a witness!

And so we might ask ourselves: Which God do we believe in? A God whose righteous anger calls us to exact punishment on the perpetrators of violence, or a God who breaks the cycle of violent revenge through forgiveness? We must be clear about which God we worship through Jesus Christ. I believe that the cross shows us a God who stands against our violence by becoming a victim to it, instead of responding with divine violence. And I believe that the

resurrection promises ultimate victory to those who follow in God's way of nonviolent resistance to the violence.

Another big step to reform might be to ask: Is our use of the Bible part of the problem? Don't we need to learn to use God's-Wordmade-flesh in Jesus Christ to critically assess God's Word as it comes to us through Scripture? I believe the Bible to be "in process" of revealing God's Word in Jesus Christ. As such, it sometimes falls short of the mark in helping us to know the God revealed in Jesus. It reveals, at times, a god who resorts to violence. Can we learn to accept that those portraits of God simply are not faithful to the God we come to know in Jesus? We probably need to renew the entire way in which we do Bible study, always careful to use the gospel portrait of God in Jesus Christ to measure all other portrayals of God, even those in other portions of

Scripture.

The Book of Revelation (which we begin studying this month on Tuesday nights) is a prime example. It is a favorite of extremist groups! Without the Christ of the gospels as a measure, it is the most misused book in Scripture, used to justify human violence by the supposed command of a god who does violence.

Join me in proclaiming a different God, one whose answer to human violence is the love of Jesus Christ! We may still feel outraged and grieved by the violence that continues in this world. But we need never feel helpless. The final victory will be the Lamb's, whose feast we already begin to share! And so we are nourished to take a different stand—a nonviolent one—against the evil of this world.

# Council Considers Rewriting Mortgage

We have discovered a very important fact about our mortgage since we last updated you in the February Visitor.

First, let's rehearse the basic facts again: it is a 20-year note for \$300,000 signed on July 31, 1985, with a payment structure and interest rate that is adjustable every five years. What we recently re-discovered is that this note matures in 2005 with a \$114,000 balloon! This has prompted council to seriously consider rewriting the mortgage with another

lender in time for this year's interest rate adjustment on August 1.

In the meantime, your contributions toward debt retirement are very welcome! We still have a principal balance of over \$225,000 after 10 years of payments. The amortization schedule is still roughly at a 4-to-1 ratio of interest to principal.

Your gift of \$500 to debt retirement, for example, saves us nearly \$2,000 in interest! Not a bad return on your gift!



# **Miracles Continue Unfolding**

The spirit was one of celebration on Miracle Sunday, May 14. Just a year ago, the first Miracle Sunday was celebrated at Emmaus, when a strong financial response addressed the monetary crisis then being faced.





hotline for families, relatives, and friends of victims. A mobile van serves as a counselling headquarters in the Latino community, where a multilingual counsellor from LSS Iowa spent the day comforting

the family of an Assembly of God pastor, killed as he escorted two of his members to the Social Security offices. Counseling efforts will be increased in the weeks to come.

Special materials will be prepared to help children cope with the tragedy. Support groups are being organized. Emergency grants are available through LSS, some of which will be used for funeral and other expenses.

# Chilstrom Sees "Future Bright with Possibilities"

A portion of the annual message from Bishop Herbert Chilstrom, Bishop of the ELCA:

Someone may paint in a future time a clear picture of what transpired in our first years together in the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America. That is not easy to do when in the middle of the day-to-day joys and struggles of church life! As I approach the end of my term as your bishop, what I can say is that we have sought to live out a Christcentered vision of our church: "a church, so deeply and confidently rooted in the Gospel of God's grace, that we are free to give our life joyfully in witness and service."

My time in office is winding down. But my hope and expectation for the future of the ELCA grows stronger as I reflect on the possibilities that lie ahead for this church.

Along with you, I am praying for the guidance of the Holy Spirit as we look toward new leadership in many of our synods and the ELCA as a whole. I pray that God will bless us with synod bishops and a bishop of the church who will build on the foundation that has been laid and will help our church to grow in strength for mission. These persons will have to deal with some of the same issues that have taxed our unity these first years of our life together. Inevitably, other stressful matters will come before the church in the years to come. Yet in the confidence that is born of the Gospel, we look forward to a future bright with possibilities. I invite you to join

me in prayer for our new leaders.

#### Churchwide Assembly Issues

In August, our family will gather for the Churchwide Assembly. in Minneapolis. Not only will the assembly elect officers, including a new bishop; it also will make decisions about the future of theological education in our church. We all know how important strong leadership is for our congregations and for all parts of our church. Decisions made in August will shape the way we train those leaders. Other decisions relating to budget, to a statement on peace, to urban issues, and to many issues raised by synods for churchwide consideration will be on the agenda of this important churchwide gathering. We will also highlight the 25th anniversary of the ordination of women in our church -a real milestone!

The Lutheran Book of Worship is nearing two decades of service among us. It remains the primary resource for worship in our congregations. Yet, there is a growing call for new hymnody and varied liturgical settings to enhance our worship life. Even as our church develops additional, supplemental worship materials, we will also be engaging in church-wide study and reflection on our sacramental practices. This two-year process will deepen our understanding of the means of grace we receive in Baptism and Holy Communion. I encourage your congregation's participation in this conversation.

#### Church Growth

The hum of activity, the air of anticipation and the expectation of new life became apparent almost immediately that day. I had taken part of the day off to go to a nursery

greenhouse to select flowers to be planted outside my condo.

What a world of new life! There were so many varieties to choose from. Flats and flats filled the greenhouses with new buds, new flowers and new growth everywhere. It was hard to imagine that the myriad of colors

and all those flowers came from hundreds and thousands of tiny seeds in the first place. What patience and care it must have taken to get them to this place of healthy little plants!

After a fair amount of agonizing and trying to visualize these flowers growing in my pots and flower beds, the selection was finally made. Then, the expertise of an experienced gardener (thanks, Al!) came into play as the flowers were planted later that afternoon. How will they respond to the water and sun and Miracle Grow that they'll receive in the coming days and weeks? I realize that part of the responsibility is up to me to "tend the garden," making sure the flowers get plenty of water and care as they grow.

As three baptisms over the Memorial Day weekend remind us, we as a church continue to be blessed with

new life. And how do all of us, as members of the Christian church on earth, contribute to growth in the faith after those waters of baptism are poured over the heads of these

As we look ahead to Pentecost Sunday, celebrating the gift of the Holy







The Women of Emmaus were given a grant from Lutheran Brotherhood of \$400.00 for bibs and quilts.



## Synod Assembly Highlights

April 28-29, 1995

#### **Assembly Goes Into the City**

For the first time ever, the Greater Milwaukee Synod held its annual assembly in the city of Milwaukee. On Friday and Saturday, April 28-29, clergy and lay leaders gathered at Our Savior's Lutheran Church, 3022 W. Wisconsin Ave., under the theme "Rooted in Gospel, Growing in Community, Living in Hope."

The goals for holding the assembly in a new place and with a new format were based upon the theme of Gospel, community, and hope, explained Aleta Chossek, synod assembly chairperson. "By changing location and format, we hoped to begin to see ourselves in new ways, to see our connections to one another and to our neighborhoods in new ways, and to experience Gospel in new ways," she said.

As a symbol of hope, the seedling trees that had been given to each congregation at the 1994 assembly were brought back to this year's assembly. The seedlings that had been cared for since last year were carried up to the altar in a procession at the beginning of the opening service. They will be replanted in various locations in the community.

During communion, delegates were given a flowering bulb to take back and plant in their congregation's community "as a reminder that we are an Easter people of hope," said the Rev. Audrey Lukasak, a member of the synod assembly planning committee.

The offering at both the opening and closing services was for Cross Lutheran Church, which is planning to rebuild its innercity church following a devastating fire.

The Rev. Reginald Hansome, Our Savior's Lutheran Church, Milwaukee, served again as assembly chaplain, opening and closing plenary sessions with prayer and rousing choruses of "alleluia."

Keynote speakers were the Rev. Barbara Lundblad, Our Savior Atonement Lutheran Church, Manhattan, and Jody Kretzmann, author of Building Communities from the Inside Out (Northwestern University Press.)

## Ministry Events Are Highlight of Assembly

Twenty-four "Living Ministry Events" were held in ministry sites in the inner city on Saturday morning to demonstrate the anchoring of ministry in local needs and to lift up the abundance of mutual ministries across diverse settings.

Delegates agreed that these ministry experiences, which found "hope in the city," were the highlight of the assembly.

Topics included Mission Partnerships, AIDS Ministry, Outreach Through Food Ministries, Youth Focus, Parish Nurses, Employment Ministries, Outreach Ministries, Multicultural Music in Worship, Tutoring Programs, Shelters, Prison Ministry, and Chaplaincy. Sites included the Next Door Foundation, Milwaukee Innercity Churches Allied for Hope (MICAH), Bread of Life, Sojourner Truth House, Guest House, Salvation Army, Lutheran Human Relations Association (LHRA), and several area churches.

## **Several Speakers Make Points**

- Malcolm ("Mac") Minnick, executive director of the ELCA Division for Outreach, spoke about the interdependent relationship between congregations, synods, and churchwide programs. He also presented the 1995 assembly video, "Making Christ Known," featuring ELCA Bishop Herbert Chilstrom.
- Paul Quello, staff for the ELCA Foundation, entertained delegates by singing a jingle set to the tune of "Oh my darling Clementine": "Oh my Lutherans, oh my Lutherans/ Paul Quel-lo is his name/ he will come and teach planned givin'/ and you'll never be the same."
- The Rev. Howard Beutler, chair of the Mult-synodical Candidacy Committee, discussed the need for identifying those people in congregations who have gifts for pastoral ministry. According to the "early discernment process," synods should be contacted 8-10 months before candidates apply to seminary.
- The Rev. Richard Jensen spoke about the newly-formed Covenant Cluster of seminaries: Lutheran School of Theology at Chicago; Trinity Lutheran Seminary, Columbus, OH; and Wartburg Theological Seminary, Dubuque, IA. In affirming theological education as a "foundational priority" of the ELCA, the bishops of the synods in Regions 4 and 5 will meet with seminary representatives on a regular basis as a kind of long-range planning committee.

## **Reflections on Freedom**

Dear Disciples of Emmaus,

As this newsletter goes out, we are celebrating the wonderful freedom we enjoy in this country. It is part of our identity as citizens of this nation to be confident in the freedom we enjoy as no other civilization or nation before us.

As disciples of Jesus, we are doubly blessed. It is also part of our identity as Christians to celebrate and to claim an even greater freedom, living in the Spirit of Christ Jesus.

How can there be a greater freedom? I invite you to read and reflect on St. Paul's letter to the Galatians, which we are currently reading on Sundays. This is Paul's most impassioned letter, as he feels that the members in Galatia are being led astray. And the whole issue for Paul boils down to one of freedom: "For freedom Christ has set us free. Stand firm, therefore, and do not submit again to a yoke of slavery (Gal. 5:1)." What is the slavery they are in danger of falling back to? In Paul's view it was adding the Jewish Law to the gospel, as his detractors were apparently calling for.

For us to really take this seriously, we need to take the Jewish Law seriously. We need to see it as representing the very best human option for living, just as we now see our own Constitution as the best system of law and as a champion of freedom. I think that Paul is making the argument that any system of

human law is still slavery compared to the freedom of the gospel.

Why is this so? Paul uses the language of parenting to help us understand the difference (especially in



3:23-29). When our children are young we need to help them understand the limits and dangers of the outside world, so we

use the law. We make a lot of rules and support them with rewards and punishments.

But I think it is the hope of every parent that as our children mature, they get beyond being motivated by just those rewards and punishments. Otherwise, there is a sort of slavery: our children will always be acting to meet someone else's system of rules. They will never know the joy of finding an internal motivation, of knowing who they are, and acting on that basis.

That freedom of an inward sense of being comes from being loved, doesn't it? It comes from knowing you are lovable, that you have qualities and gifts as a person that are valued and important. So you come to use those gifts because you want to, not


just because the rewards are right.

This is what St. Paul is talking about. To have faith in Jesus Christ is to come to know God as the ideal parent, who has lovingly created us to be someone special. Any system of Law, on the other hand, is impersonal; it can never make us feel loved. It cannot show us who we were made to be; it can only offer us a reward or threaten a punishment on the basis of its system of rules. So if after having known the freeing love of the Father through the Son you return to life under the Law, any law, you are submitting to slavery.

I want to wish you a wonderful 4th of July celebration of freedom and a refreshing summer. And I also want to invite you to keep your Emmaus family in mind for summer worship and for making your fall plans. For it is among our sisters and brothers in Jesus Christ that we can truly learn to live and grow in freedom. And we can celebrate freedom not just once a year, but every Sunday, as we gather to celebrate our freedom in Christ!

### **REST Begins Third Year of Help to Homeless**

The REST (Racine Emergency Shelter Taskforce) program is getting underway for the 1995-96 season beginning at Emmaus with the first Friday of October. Emmaus provides a safe place for the homeless of Racine to sleep every Friday night from

October through April. We share the responsibility for providing volunteers to staff the site from 6:30 p.m. to 7:00 a.m. with Community Christian Church.



Participating in this program is an important part of our community outreach effort as we extend our Christian hospitality to those in need of shelter. Please consider becoming an active supporter of this program through donating time, financial assistance, and prayers.

guests in leaving (guests clean their own mats), stores laundry in the closet, takes out garbage, and leaves the kichen and bathrooms clean.

We need three people for the first shift, two people for the second, and two or three for the third shift.

Last year, several very committed members of Emmaus gave generously of their time and energy through volunteering frequently. Because this level of commitment caused some volunteers to

feel burned out, we want to increase our pool of volunteers this year.

## Gift Bibles October 8





The train is coming on October 21 to load the Racine area donations of school and health kits, blankets and quilts, sewing kits and men's and children's clothing. Millions of people overseas continue to have need for aid

and assistance.

Boxes for donated items are located in the narthex. \$5.00 will purchase a blanket and can be donated through the church office.

Below are the materials for school and health kits

#### School Kits

For children whose lives have been disrupted by war or some other disaster, receiving a school kit is a sign that someone far away cares. Adults in literacy classes appreciate the supplies needed to learn to read and write.

Each school kit is to contain the following items:

Pads or notebooks of ruled paper approximately 81/2 by 11 inches containing 100-150 sheets of paper.

Done blunt scissors. The "safety" scissors with imbedded steel blades is an excellent choice.

F One 30-centimeter ruler, or a ruler with centimeters on one side and inches on the other.

n One pencil sharpener. 

\* One eraser approximately 21/2 inches long.

12 sheets of construction paper in f. assorted colors.

73 One box of 8, 16 or 24 crayons.

One cloth bag approximately 12 by 14 inches with cloth handles.

Pack all the items in the bag, fold the handles over and secure with two large rubber bands, if you wish.

Here is a "no waste" pattern for three cloth bags with handles made from a piece of sturdy fabric 30 by 45 inches. The seam allowance is 1/2 inch.



Clean hands, good grooming, bright and shining smiles-you can help bring them about through the gift of health kits.


Each kit is to contain the following items:

- Tone hand towel.
- One washcloth.
- One bath-size bar of any brand of soap.
- " One toothbrush.
- Tone tube of toothpaste, 5-7 ounces.
- \* One comb.
- To One metal nail file, or nail clippers with file attached.
- TSix Band-Aids, preferably 1/2 to 3/4 inches.

Wrap all the smaller items in the towel or pack in a zip lock plastic bag. Tie securely with ribbons

or yarn.



## **ELCA Domestic** Response

## HURRICANES CAUSE DEVASTATION IN THE CARIBBEAN: ELCA RESPONDS

DISASTER-GRAM September 18, 1995

Close on the heels of Hurricane Luis which caused much damage on Antigua and St. Martin, HURRICANE MARI-LYN devastated the U.S. Virgin Islands. Damage to St. Thomas was catastrophic while St. John and St.Croix experienced extensive and widespread damage. Early observers saw the destruction as worse than Hurricanes Hugo and Andrew: widespread destruction of homes(more than 80% have suffered extensive damage) hospitals, churches, and Lutheran Social Service institutions.

As of this writing, Reformation Lutheran Church, St. Thomas and a nearly new Lutheran Social Service group home for the developmentally disabled, have been reported as destroyed. The extent of

damage to the other 6 ELCA churches and other church-related institutions has not yet been reported.

\$36,000 has already been sent from the ELCA Domestic Disaster Response to Lutheran Social Service of The Virgin Islands. This agency gained valuable expertise in disaster response management during the recovery from Hurricane Hugo 6 years ago. A disaster assessment team has been sent and a plane has been chartered to deliver urgently needed supplies.

## **Statement on Peace Approved**

H. George Anderson will be installed as bishop of the ELCA on November 18 in Chicago. Anderson, 63, was elected on the fifth ballot at the ELCA's churchwide assembly August 17-22 to succeed Bishop Herbert W. Chilstrom, the church's first bishop.


In other action, the overwhelmingly assembly approved a comprehensive statement on world peace. The statement asks churches to become models of peace in their own gatherings and to equip members to "act for peace in all their communities."

The statement urges Christians to take part in the affairs of government, locally and globally. "With its significant economic, political, cultural and military power, the United States plays a vital leadership role in world affairs," the statement notes. "It cannot and should not withdraw or isolate itself from the rest of the world." The statement warns against having the U.S. assume the role of the world's police force, but notes that economic aid, disaster relief, and other humanitarian aid can foster world peace.

#### \$87 Million Budget


The assembly approved a budget of over \$87 million for 1996-97. The largest piece of the budget, \$21,451,100, is devoted to witness, providing resources for starting 40 new

The budget also congregations. includes \$4 million in grants to support ELCA seminaries, and \$12 million toward relief of world hunger. The budget anticipates increases in support from synods, giving congregations and individuals. Should

"churchwide day of healing," and that materials be provided to help congregations raise awareness of the AIDS epidemic. The memorial also affirmed that "this church does not discriminate against persons who carry the AIDS virus in its calling or employment practices."

Delegates voted to call for a "statement on human sexuality reflecting the areas in which there is sustained agreement within the church" by 1997. The Church Council had earlier decided to postpone a statement on sexuality indefinitely.

Delegates rejected a Church recommendation Council churchwide assemblies to meet every three years instead of every two. The next churchwide assembly will be August 14-20, 1997, in Philadelphia.

## Real Economic Freedom

Dear Disciples of Emmaus,

I would like you to reflect with me for a few moments on a much-cherished value of the modern world: "economic freedom." It seems to drive nearly everything, doesn't it? If we have a modern idol that we tend to worship the most, isn't this it? The much-sought-after ideal in our society would seem to be this: to attain enough economic means so as to have the freedom *not* to let economics determine your life.

Our family, for example, recently made the big decision to become a two-income family. Ellen went back to work outside the home after ten years of being a stay-at-home mother. What a big change for all of us! So we also hope that this decision is based on positive reasons and not just economic necessity. We don't like to feel trapped by our finances. We'd rather feel like we are making this decision with some measure of economic freedom—or at least like this decision is going to greatly enhance our economic freedom.

But, as with any idol, there is also a dangerous illusion involved. In the case of economic freedom, I think the illusion is this: even if we are wealthy enough to not have economic necessity drive our decisions, do we then have the wisdom to know what is best for ourselves? If we think we know such things on our own, then we are deceiving ourselves.

Isn't that the message of the

Parable of the Rich Fool (Luke 12:13-21) that we read on Sunday again recently? This wealthy man was the epitome of modern economic freedom. He had enough money to decide whatever he wanted for himself. But God steps in and tells him, "Fool! This very night your life is demanded of you. And the things you have prepared, whose will they be?" A dynamic that struck me about this parable for the first time is that, up to the point where God intervenes, the man has only talked to himself. I would like to suggest that this man's problem was not simply that he was greedy, but that he only talked to himself. In other words, he assumed that he alone knew what was best for his life. His "economic freedom" duped him under the illusion that he didn't need God's guidance for his life.

I would like to suggest, then, that this is one of the most important Christian principles for our lives: Instead of talking to ourselves when we make decisions, we need to be in dialogue with God. And that means more than just talking at God; it also means listening to God.

How do we listen to God? This is another place where I think modern influence can stear us wrong. We tend to think in individualistic terms. So we might tend to think that the best way to listen to God is by ourselves.

But when was the last time you heard God 'speak' directly to you? God more often, I think, speaks to us through others. Most importantly, we believe that God spoke to us through Jesus Christ-and, even then, most of us don't often hear Jesus speak directly to us. But we do have the witness of the early apostles, who recorded for us what Jesus said and did. continue to speak to us through the Bible and through the Word and Sacrament ministry of the Church. So we might say that Jesus comes to speak to us primarily through the "Body of Christ." In short, we can best listen to God in the Church, through traditional things like going to church and studying the bible with others.

Which finally brings me to stewardship (the fall stewardship emphasis begins this month!), as a way to wrap-up these reflections on "economic freedom." Real economic

freedom comes from listening to God's direction for our lives. And it comes from making decisions to support those ways in which we can best listen to God. Dare I say it? Yes, the timehonored way of making a decision to support your life of listening to God is by making a pledge of time, talent, and treasure to your church. There, I said it. But I hope that in the context of these reflections you can approach this year's pledge as an opportunity to truly enhance your economic freedom. If talking to yourself like the rich fool is economic foolishness, then learning to listen to God for your life through the Church is economic prudence. Come hear and embrace God's economy of grace in Jesus Christ!





and, with Chris Pearson's help, installed "kick-stands" for a number of church doors.







# HURRICANES CONTINUE ASSAULT ON U.S.: ELCA RESPONDS

#### **DISASTER-UPDATE**

October 9

While the U.S. Virgin Islands were digging themselves out from the wreckage of Hurricane Marilyn, Hurricane Opal roared into the Florida Panhandle causing at least 19 deaths and \$2 billion in losses, resulting in a widespread destruction of homes, businesses and jobs in a four-state area.

As the storm approached, the ELCA Domestic Disaster Response and its partner, Lutheran Ministries of Florida, had a disaster response team and a truckload of emergency supplies on its way to the storm area. Appropriate Lutheran social ministry organizations will carry out our disaster response in other affected states.

The damage caused by Hurricane Marilyn in St. Thomas, Virgin Islands, proved catastrophic: 80 percent of the homes were destroyed or badly damaged; ELCA congregations and a new LSS group home for the developmentally disabled were destroyed. St. John and St. Croix also suffered damage (20-40 percent of the buildings were damaged). After Hurricane Hugo six years ago, wind insurance became either unavailable or unaffordable.

As the Rev. Leon Phillips, director of the ELCA Domestic Disaster Response, was leaving St. Thomas, an elderly ELCA member said, "Please don't forget us."

Your designation to "Hurricane Relief" enables us to respond to victims of both Hurricanes Marilyn and Opal (and others that may be following this season). We do honor designations to individual disasters, but marking checks "Hurricane Relief" will ensure a rapid and efficient response.

# On Metal Gates & Candy Dishes

From the

**PASTOR** 

Have you noticed the new metal gates at each entrance of the balcony in the church? Those gates, recently installed by Chester Meyer, were purchased with special gifts and memorials. And there is no question that the first time some of the kids saw the gates, they knew the message that

went with them: Keep Out!

Yes, that is the intention. The gates make a statement that the balcony is off limits to kids running around. We want to protect our very valuable children from accidentally falling, and we also want to protect our very valuable organ from the active, curious little ones wanting to try the pedals and buttons. So,

these gates have been erected, and most of us would agree that they are "good gates."


What other messages are visible for the children of our church? The bright red worship bags filled with crayons, paper and a story book and the worship bulletins designed for kids are intened to send the message: Welcome! We want you to ge a part of worship at Emmaus!

Even the candy dish in my office has become a familiar stopping off place for kids (and adults, too) after worship or a class -- a way of telling those who enter that they are welcome.

Hospitality -- being a welcoming

place to the newcomer and the stranger, while continuing to be there for longtime members and friends—that's a topic that was discussed at a recent Bible study I led. We asked ourselves whether we have erected any "bad gates" at Emmaus, perhaps invisible and most often unintentional. What are the barriers that don't

welcome folks in? Are there enough signs to make it clear the location of an entry, the elevator, the nursery, the Sunday School office or the Saturday evening service? Do visitors know that there is some parking (albeit scarce, but that's a topic for another day) in the alley? Is the worship service as printed in the bulletin clear for a



These are questions of hospitality. They are questions of evangelism (which in simple terms means "sharing the Gospel/Good News"). And these are questions that

go beyond the Deacon's Committee or a Bible study on discipleship. We can all take ownership and be evangelists. Those around us are so hungry for a word of hope and good news in their lives. We have that word to share.

It's up to each of us to begin breaking down those invisible barriers and gates. In the Bible study I heard some visioning for the future that was truly exciting.

Where can you start? Following are helf a dozen suggestions -- we can each begin with one. That's how seeds will be planted and barriers torn down.

- 1.) Invite an unchurched friend to worship.
- 2.) Be a person of Christian hospitality in your daily life; reach out to a friend or neighbor who is lonely.
  - 3.) Ask about being trained as a

Friendship Minister/Visitor.

- 4.) Share your ideas and visions in the idea box in the front entrance of the church (near the guest book).
- 5.) Pray that we may discern God's purpose for us and then have the courage to break down any existing barriers.
- 6.) Share the importance of your faith and your church with another person.




# **UW-M Group Condemns Racism**

The Directing Committee of Metro Milwaukee Lutheran Campus Ministry, an agency of the ELCA at UW-Milwaukee, reaffirmed on October 31 its statement condemning racism. The statement was originally adopted in March, 1988.

In part, the document states that "We believe in God who created all humanity in God's image, who established diversity as a gift to enhance our life together. ...Specifically, we condemn the recent racist incident at the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee. We support the efforts of the students and administrations of Milwaukee area schools to seek an end to racism on their campuses, [and] to provide an open and supportive climate for racial

minorites."

The reaffirmation of the antiracism statement was in response to the use of a racially offensive term in an opinion column of *The UWM Times*, a student newspaper.



People from every ELCA congregation in the



#### Pastor Paul's Column

## Forgiveness Means Everyone's Invited

Dear Disciples of Emmaus,

The holidays are a special time for family dinners. We gather together and share festive meals—meals of celebration and thanksgiving. More so than at other times of the year, we also make an effort to include the children. Christmas just isn't the same without the children.

I would like to take a few moments to share my thoughts and feelings with you about our family dinner at Emmaus. We have an important vote coming next month at the annual meeting for possibly opening Holy Communion to all ages.

I am a little uncomfortable sharing these reflections here, because there is the risk that this be perceived as "Pastor Paul's issue." But I've decided to share this with all of you in writing in the hopes that it *not* be just my issue. I sincerely would like to see this change be one that we can all embrace together. So I spend a few moments with you now, making clear why I think this matter is of such importance to us.

Let's get right to heart of the matter: forgiveness. This is what Luther emphasized in the Lord's Supper, and it is what many of us have grown up with. It is our faith that we hear the promise of God's forgiveness proclaimed to us each time we partake of this holy meal.

What has been meaningful to me, in my own reflections in recent years, has been to remember the first time that the promise of forgiveness was proclaimed to me: at my baptism. As a tiny infant, even before I had a chance to try to earn that forgive-

ness-something I cannot do, in the first place!-I was reconciled with God through forgiveness in Jesus Christ and called into God's family. The gracious meaning of forgiveness, then, is that God includes me in the Christian family without my having done anything to deserve it. In short, the gracious meaning of forgiveness is being included. This remains so, even though, since my baptism, I have acted in ways that have no doubt given God the justification for excluding me, for throwing me out. At Holy Communion, I hear once again that this true God, whom I have come to know in Jesus Christ, just doesn't operate that way. This God is about inclusion, not exclusion; about forgiveness and reconciliation, not condemnation and rejection.

Can Holy Communion convey such a word of forgiveness to us, if we practice it with rules of exclusion? This is the question that has made our exclusion of children such an urgent matter to me. We talk about what young children can understand in coming to our Lord's table. Something that they can understand at a very early age is whether or not they are being included or excluded. When they see others getting something that they are not, they know they are being left out.

That forgiveness means I am included in God's family, when God would be justified in excluding me, is something that has been made more clear to me in recent years through my involvement in the work of René

Girard. On Christ the King Sunday, I shared his first basic premise: that we humans live in a force field not only of natural forces like gravity, which we have come to understand better since Isaac Newton, but also in a 'force field' of desire, which governs our relationships with God and others. This force field of desire is constantly bringing us into rivalry with one another, and eventually into violent Girard's second major conflict. premise is that the way we deal with this rivalry and conflict is with acts of exclusion. We find some measure of unity by drawing lines between ourselves and certain others. attempt to achieve our sense of belonging and inclusion at the price of excluding someone else.

Jesus Christ came to both expose this exclusionary behavior of ours and to forgive it, making it clear that God does *not* operate this way. Right from the very beginning, Jesus was born as one excluded in a stable on the outskirts of town. The only ones to come visit this newborn baby were

shepherds and some *foreign* dignitaries, i.e., other outsiders. His life was lived with "sinners" and people who lived on the fringes. Finally, he was executed as a criminal, declared an outsider by our human law. God exposes this human way of doing things through Jesus and offers us a different way, the way of a radical forgiveness that invites everyone back into God's family, even though we continue to play our sinful games of exclusion.

This radical forgiveness is the wonderful basis for true peace that we celebrate once again this Christmas. It is the basis for the peace we celebrate each time we gather at our Lord's Table. I think we have an opportunity in January to make that celebration even more meaningful by including all our children. In the meantime, have a blessed Christmas! May all your family dinners bring you peace.
