


Middle School Youth Reserve Peppermint Gym



spent considerable time working with her as well as on the computerized process for itemizing budget expenses and bill paying. the long-term benefit of this is that in the future we will have a standardized process which can more easily be passed on to future treasurers.



A directory board and signs for the rooms are being ordered by Chris Hansen. A motion was passed to use up to \$300 from undesignated memorial funds to pay for the signs. The Deacons Committee will decide

which signs to order. Building and Grounds Committee reported that our thermostats need to be upgraded to continue to save on energy costs. A timer would cost approximately \$1,125. A recommendation was approved to authorize \$2,600 from the Binder Capital Funds memorial monies for this

purpose.

The annual meeting will be Sunday, January 21 between services. Sunday School teachers will be given the option of holding their classes that day or having another activity provided so that they are able to attend the meeting.

The budget hearing will be Sunday, January 14, during the Adult Forum.

Financial Picture for 1995 Appears Positive



Northside Food Pantry Distributes 45-50 Thanksgiving Turkeys

The Northside Food Pantry at Trinity United Methodist Church, 3825 Erie Street, reports that they had served 431 people in the month of November. Pantry Coordinator Mary Haas estimates that they gave out 45-50 turkeys for Thanksgiving. The pantry received \$258.08 in the month of November and spent \$810.80; their checkbook balance at the end of the month was \$1,081.14.

A concern at all of the food pantries is the end of General Assistance at the close of 1995. Well over 3,500 people were served in 1995 at the Northside Food Pantry, and 1996 is expected to be a recordbreaking year for assistance requests.

Some suggested items for food pantry donations include canned tuna, tuna helper, pancake mix, syrup, jam or jelly, breakfast snacks, powdered milk, pasta, rice, and soup. Emmaus members can donate non-perishable items by leaving them in the shopping cart in the narthex on Sunday mornings, or you can include a monetary offering designated for the food pantry for the purchase of perishable items.

1996 Offering Envelopes Feature New Format

Please note the new format for your 1996 offering envelopes. This year, for your convenience, we have added places to designate all your different types of offering in three basic categories.

"General Fund" designates your regular weekly offering toward current operating expenses, as in previous years. But new this year is a line for "Building Fund," for those times you give to Adopt-a-Sunday or other donations toward the mortgage. Some of you also make regular gifts to the Building Fund, which you can now do in the same envelope.

The third category is simply "Special," which is meant to cover




Exercise, Anyone?

It was stuck, moving less and less as time went on.

It had been made to move freely, and yet when it didn't, the pain set in. I don't know how it happened; I think it must have been gradually. At first, I tried to ignore it. Maybe it would go away. But when "over-the-

medication couldn't mask the pain any longer, I finally made my first move and called the doctor. The diagnosis: adhesive capsulitis



What could be done? The adhesions could be "broken lose" under an anesthetic and that would be followed by physical therapy. I knew it was time, so I said "yes" to the possibility. The procedure was successfully completed, and I have since been going through the rigors of physical therapy.

I've been so aware in the past weeks of the necessity of activity and movement for my shoulder — to retain the movement that's been restored and also to reach and to stretch even further as I continue exercising.

That's how it is with our spiritual lives as well. Movement and activity keep us from "freezing up" and from atrophy. Without that spiritual activity, a dis-ease sets in. Maybe we can't quite put our finger on it or

diagnose the problem. But it's there.

When that daily "exercise time" of prayer, devotional reading, reflection and meditation gets short-changed, that is an invitation do "dis-ease." When regular worship is replaced with "family time" or "personal time" or an extra couple of hours to sleep, "dis-

ease" sets in. It may not be apparent at first. It's so easy to find excuses not to exercise (I know - I'm an excuse expert!), whether it be physically or spiritually. Most often

the excuse is lack of time. But now is the time to get "unstuck."

As the new year begins, it is my prayer that all of us step back and reevaluate how we use our time. In addition to the need to be fed, we also have a need to be broken loose and challenged and stretched. We need to address the dis-ease in each of our lives as we worship and study and pray together. I invite you to join me in a commitment for the new year -- a commitment to be spiritually active. both at Emmaus and in our personal lives. We need to exercise for our own health and well-being! Let's shelve the excuses and get ready to flex those muscles!



Second Phase of Thermostat Upgrade Completed

When the church building addition was completed ten years ago, a new, efficient three-stage boiler system was installed. Unfortunately, the means to regulate that system was

not upgraded. Last January, we began work to improve our ability to regulate that system and to make best use of its efficiency.

A "smart box" and timer unit was installed to more finely run the boilers themselves; a set-back thermostat was installed in the Fellowship Hall (which has its own

pump); the sanctuary blowers were reconditioned; and the pneumatic thermostat system for the old part of the building was made to function once again, after sitting idle for several years. The parsonage furnace was also replaced. All this was done with a special loan from the gas company that costs us \$1,500 per year for five years.

How did we do? In this first year, we saved \$1,050 in gas bills!

This January, we continued the work with continued upgrades of the pneumatic thermostat system, putting it on a timer and replacing six of the 40-year-old thermostats in crucial places. Council decided that spending \$2,500 of the Evelyn Binder capital improvements fund is a good investment toward the continued

lowering of our gas bills - and better stewardship of our resources.

Still on the Wish List are further replacement thermostats in the old part of the building and set-back thermostats in the addition.

Adult Forum Task Force to Meet February 12

A task force is being formed with the goal of scheduling Adult Forums (held during the Sunday School hour) three months at a time. The first meeting of the task force will be on Monday, February 12 at 6:30 p.m., to schedule forums for March through May.

The Forum is an arena for members of Emmaus to be engaged in

their faith with issues that relate to our community and church life. If you have suggestions for speakers that you would find interesting, or if you yourself have something you would like to present, contact Pastor Paul.

Pastor Paul is also accepting volunteers for the task force. It is a one-time commitment for this February 12 meeting.

Sound System Repairs Approved

The good news for 1995 is that we were able to pay all of our bills in a timely manner and we met the budgeted amount of our benebolences – \$11,280.13 for the Milwaukee Synod and \$3,760.05 to Lutheran Social Services, for a total of \$15,040.18.

Repairs are needed to the sound system. A motion was approved to give the Music and Worship Committee permission to spend no more than \$1,000 for necessary repairs.

The Youth Ministry Committee asked that the youth be allowed to use the large room above the Sunset Room for their gatherings. That was the original intention for that room when the addition was built. The youth will

also have a bulletin board for their announcements at the east side of the front entrance.

The council reviewed a proposed budget and agreed to accept a budget at a total of \$218,204, which includes a 3% payroll increase across the board for all staff. This budget will be presented at a budget hearing on January 14 and at the annual meeting on January 21 for congregational approval.

The Nursery Committee has presented a list of improvements that they feel are needed in the nursery. Before professional people are hired, Emmaus members will look at the room to evaluate necessary repairs and to make recommendations.






What Is Faith?

Dear Disciples of Emmaus,

I would like to share with you a bible passage that has become very important to my faith—literally, to my faith, since it is about faith.

The setting is the last week of our

Lord's life (according to Mark 11). Jesus has entered Jerusalem on Palm Sunday and quickly looked around the temple before retiring to Bethany, a small 'suburb' opposite the temple mountain. At



Jesus answered them, "Have faith in God. Truly I tell you, if you say to this mountain, 'Be taken up and thrown into the sea,' and if you do not doubt in your heart, but believe that what you say will come to pass, it will be done for you." (Mark 11:22)

What does the "faith to move mountains" have to do with a withered

fig tree?! Jesus' response seems to be a non-response, non-sense. Which is probably why we have also tended to take this verse out of its context. Jesus' response here has become well-known in its own right, as a grand metaphor

about faith. Faith is trusting in God to be able to do deeds beyond our imagining, the so-called "faith to move mountains."

Taking it in context, however, we find a small

clue that I think makes all the difference in the world: Jesus apparently is not talking about faith to move any ol' mountain, because he says "this mountain." Jesus is pointing to a particular mountain. And, in this context, which is the only mountain that Jesus could be pointing to? Yes, the temple mountain. Thus, I am convinced that this verse should not be seen simply as a grand metaphor for trusting in God to do any deeds beyond our imagining. No, I think Jesus is being quite specific about what faith involves. It involves being able to live without our human institutions of sacrifice. Increasingly, I have come to see that Jesus' whole mission-the one that the entire Bible is trying to put into focus for us-revolves around the issue of sacrifice.

The problem is that living without our sacrificial institutions—as I think Jesus is suggesting for the person of faith—ends up being the most

bewildering deed beyond our imagining. The number one obstacle is that we have a difficult time even recognizing our institutions as sacrificial. Even for the people of Jesus' time, who used the temple regularly, this was hard to see. They were sacrificing lambs and pigeons, etc., not people, so they thought they were just fine. They had no idea why Jesus would be so angry, 'cleansing' their temple. From what? Tragically, it took Jesus dying on the cross at the hands of our sacrificial institutions for some to begin to see that even our more 'civilized' versions of sacrifice have deadly consequences.

For us modern people, the problem is compounded by the fact that our mechanisms of sacrifice are even less obvious. We think, 'We don't do sacrifices anymore, right? Such temples are long a thing of the past, right?' Yes and no. I have come to the view that ritual sacrifice is only the most obvious form of the sacrificial spirit, which sooner or later, under the power of sin, comes to reside in *all* human institutions in some form.

Let me venture to put it briefly in this way: The basic shape of the sacrificial spirit is to distinguish between 'insiders' and 'outsiders.' The insiders then band together at the outsider's expense. They seek to gain a relative peace among themselves by either killing, expelling, blaming, or simply neglecting those designated as outsiders. Even relatively benign neglect has deadly consequences, doesn't it? Doesn't this dynamic sound familiar? One that we can point to in so many places, even if the temples are long gone?

I realize that I take a risk in sharing this because it sounds so bizarre. We don't want to believe it. But I do so with a passage from Scripture that is itself very puzzling yet, I think, crucial. I have come to see faith itself as the willingness to take a hard look at ourselves under this light and to risk living in God's new reality based on Christ's self-sacrificial forgiveness.

Finally, I feel I owe it to you to try putting where I am at into words in this forum. You have no doubt noticed that this perspective informs my preaching and teaching and everything I do. It is the light of the Gospel itself to me. During this season of epiphany I offer it again to you, as a possible growing source of light and faith in your life. As we continue our journey of faith together, I welcome your questions and responses.



Register for Early Communion By March 24

Our new communion policy, adopted at the January 21 annual meeting, opens communion to children of all ages. First communion will continue to be preceded by preparation appropriate to the age level of each child; and, in order to approach this preparation in an orderly fashion, the following process has been put in place:

- 1. We will offer the opportunity to take first communion on three Sundays each year: the first Sunday in the months of February, May, and November.
- 2. Those families who would like to prepare their children who are younger than fifth grade for first communion should apply at least six weeks prior to the date by filling out a form through the church office. A response letter will be sent explaining the process for each child.
- 3. The preparation process will depend on the age of the child as follows:
 - Younger than first grade:
 Similar to the process for

baptism, preparation will be primarily with the parents through a visit with one of the pastors. Pre-schoolers and kindergartners will also be involved in the visit, learning some basics.

- b. First through fourth grade: Preparation will involve two things, a visit of the family with a pastor and a one-session class with other children in this age group. A short booklet on holy communion, which can either be purchased or borrowed from the church library, is to be read by the child prior to the class.
- c. Fifth grade and older:
 This age level is not considered "early communion," since we previously communed

children at this age. We will continue to offer a once-per-year communion instruction for fifth graders, usually during Lent, that is a required part of our confirmation program. Instead of the families needing to register their interest, as with the younger children, letters of invitation will continue to be sent to all fifth graders. Those fifth graders who have already made their first communion will be required to participate in these classes, as the instruction is more indepth at this level. Those who have not yet communed may elect to make their first communion on the first Sunday in May, or on any the set First Communion dates thereafter.

The role of parents will be vital at any of these age levels. We ask the parents to participate in all the classes, even at fifth grade. We will be giving booklets to parents to help them support their children throughout the process. The Lord's Supper is the family dinner of our gathered church family, and we hope it is always a special moment for all the families that make up our church family.

The rext scheduled First Communion date is Sunday, May 5, at the 10:30 a.m. vorship service. That means that the deadline for registering interest in early

communion for children younger than fifth grade is Sunday, March 24.

Registration forms can be filled out through the church office. (Baptism registration forms, for example, are often filled out via the phone with our secretary, Paul Berge. With the greater number of registrations anticipated for this first date, however, it would be helpful if interested parents could pick up the forms from the office, fill them out, and return them.)

One-session class for 1st-4th graders has been set for two dates to provide a scheduling choice for families: Saturday, April 13 at 9:30 a.m. or Monday, April 22 at 6:00 p.m. The three-session course for 5th graders will meet at 6:30 on March 5, 19 and 25.

We are amazed and grateful that several months after the fire [which destroyed their church building last February] you remembered us in our need. On behalf of the congregation and the community around Cross Church, I want to express our deep appreciation for contribution.

We are learning in a profound way the miraculous scientific and spiritual truth that fire strengthens. When we sent a specimen of the steel roof girders to a laboratory to see if they were structurally sound, we discovered that the steel is stronger now than when it was installed 64 years ago-thanks to the heat of the fire. We are also discovering that our spiritual life and commitment are stronger than ever-thanks to the impact of the fire and the fire of the Spirit.

We still are not sure of the exact cost of rebuilding, but the current estimate is a little more than \$1,400,000.00, which is almost twice the amount of the insurance reimbursement. So we are working hard to make up the difference and to cut all "frills" from the plans.

God willing, we hope to be able to dedicate the refurbished Cross Church sometime between March and June, 1996.

Keep us in your prayers—that the fire of the Spirit may continue to strengthen us in every way for a lively witness to the Gospel and a faithful ministry with all people.

Pastor Mary's Column

A Message from the Sixth Graders

How do we communicate? The sixth grade confirmation students on retreat at Lutherdale camp had many answers to that question -- from such things as "a smile" or "by being physical" to a long list that included FAX machines, telephone, gestures, conversation, the internet, letters, and much, much more.

We talked about the difference

between a monologue and a d i a l o g u e, stressing the importance of listening - in all communication, including prayer.

Most of the sixth graders admitted that they pray only occasionally and that they do so when they feel like talking, are worried or sad.



or lonely and upset. Only one of the young people stated that s/he prayed when happy.

What's on the minds of these young people? More than one said that their parents should spend more time at home and should work less. There were also comments that they wished their parents would come to church more, would respect their privacy, and would be more understanding. They did think their parents cared about them.

What do these young people want from their leaders? When asked

what they would make a priority if they were president of the U.S., the answers included stopping hunger, stopping wars, cutting taxes, and working on world peace.

With the Lord's Prayer used as a model for the study of prayer, the sixth graders learned the "new version" of that prayer -- replacing the "thou's" and "arts" for "you's" and "are's." And, while the wording of that version may not have provided the comfort of the old and the familiar, it did make us think more about what we were praying. We learned that "forgive us our sins as we forgive those who sin against us" is another way to say "forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us." How does that translate to everyday life? Do we mean what we pray? What does it mean to be a hypocrite? Can we really forgive those who sin against us, or are those just empty words? We asked those questions and others.

Even in spite of miserable weather, little sleep (how can 6th grade girls find so much to giggle about in the middle of the night?) and the misfortune of one person needing to have stitches on his finger, now that I have rested, I can look back and sincerely say, "What an outstanding group of young people!" These kids do have parents who care and surround them with love. The prayers they wrote at the end of our time at Lutherdale reflected that. The kids prayed for the health of their parents, for safe travel home and for their friend who had gotten stitches. They were

also ready to pray prayers of thanks. Some of those thanks were:

"Thank you for me, my family and my friends. Thank you for my food and shelter."

"We have been so lucky and so glad to have you by our sides, and we thank you a lot."

"I would like to thank you for everything you have blessed me with...I love you and your son, Jesus."

"Thank you for the wonderful time at Lutherdale -- for not letting me fall on the ice."

"Thank you for these wonderful two days!"


"Thank you for the great trip and thank you for keeping us safe. God, you are always there, and we love you."

As we stop to reflect on how precious these young people are, let us keep them -- and all of today's youth -- in our prayers. And, as we pray for them, let's do what we can to become even more comfortable praying with them. Everyone is invited to Fellowship Hall at 8:15 Easter morning for a breakfast served by our youth.



Alan Redpath tells this story in his book, The Royal Route to Heaven: A certain Christian once said to a friend, "Our church costs too much. They are always asking for money."

The friend replied, "Some time ago, a little boy was born in our home. He cost us a lot of money from the very beginning: he had a big appetite, he needed clothes, medicine, toys, and even a puppy. Then he went to school, and cost a lot more; later he went to college; then he began dating, and that cost a small fortune!

"But in his senior year at college, he died: and since the funeral, he hasn't cost us a penny. Now which situation do you think we would rather have?"

After a long pause, the friend continued, "As long as this church lives, it will cost. When it dies -- for lack of support -- it won't cost us anything. A living church has the most important message for all the world today. Therefore, I am going support it with my tithes and pray with everything I have to keep our church alive!"





Annual Cluster Assembly

Bishop Rogness Lauds Congregations' Support of ELCA

The annual assembly of the Racine Mission Cluster (RMC) was held February 8, 1996 at Lutheran Church of the Redeemer. Greater Milwaukee Synod Bishop Peter Rogness addressed the assembly, reporting that congregational support to the synod exceeded the budgeted amount in 1995, and 70% of synod congregations met or exceeded their 1995 pledges.

Donna Bumpus, coordinator of the cluster's Meal Site at Our Savior's Lutheran Church, reported that the site served 5,500 people in 1995. She thanked Roma Lodge and the participating congregations, two of which are non-ELCA congregations, for their support of the meal site. This meal site continues to be the major expense of the cluster; the suggested annual contribution from member congregations of 35¢ per member should be enough to leave a small surplus after meal site expenses.

Rev. Karl Otto of Bethania reported that 150 persons attended the Epiphany Festival in January. The offering of \$165.35 was donated to the Racine Jail Ministry.

Delegate Elections

Mary Alice Peterson of Bethania was elected as the RMC's delegate to the 1997 Assembly of the ELCA in Philadelphia. Donna Lathrop was elected alternate. Election of a youth delegate to the Synod Assembly at Carthage College this June was left to the Racine Mission Cluster Council, as no nominations were available at the time of the assembly.



The assembly approved a resolution urging the Synod Council to investigate amending the ELCA constitution to credit clergy "on leave and available for call" for time served as interim pastor of a congregation. At present, such a pastor is removed from the Clergy Roster after three years on leave, even if the pastor serves as an interim pastor of a congregation during that time.

The RMC Council met after the assembly to elect new officers. Jan Behrens (Redeemer) was elected lay chair; Rev. Steve Blyth (Zion) was elected vice chair. Rev. Jerry Anderson (Our Savior's) was elected council secretary. Mike Anderson (Gethsemane) was elected council treasurer. The RMC council meets on the second Thursday of each month at 7:00 p.m.

Note: Emmaus' position on the Racine Cluster is currently vacant, and we therefore are not represented. That postition is open to a female lay mamber of the congregation (current term extends through January, 1997). Are you interested or know of someone who might be? If so, please contact the church office or one of the pastors.

Wisconsin Legislature Defies Time

Remember six months ago, when we reported that it was illegal in the

state of Wisconsin not to switch to Daylight Savings Time in the spring? Well, that statute has been removed from the books. Wisconsin citizens are now free to set their watches and clocks to any time they wish whenever they want.

So, if you show up for church on April 7 an hour later than everyone else, there is no need to be embarrassed or in fear of the law. You can now proudly proclaim that you have decided to march to the beat of a different timepiece-to spend your

Daylight Time freely and with abandon.

Just keep in mind that our own plans 'round these parts are to switch over to Daylight Savings Time on April 7,

setting our clocks ahead one hour before we go to bed Saturday night.

Pastor Paul's Column

For Whom Do We Worship?

Dear Disciples of Emmaus,

For whom do we worship? For God? For ourselves? For others? I think we could respond with all three of these answers and say quite a bit about each one. As we begin this month with Holy Week, for example, it is the most important time for each of us to grow in our own faiths. Worship is for ourselves, to continue to

be nurtured and strengthened in our faiths.

And Easter is a day above all other days to praise and worship God for the promise of new life in Jesus Christ. Worship is for praising God. Many places in Scripture give that as

the ultimate purpose of Creation, in the first place: that we come to praise our Creator.

I would like to spend a few moments, however, reflecting on the third of these answers: when we worship, we do so for others. Worship is our act of service to God *and* to one another. Our most common term for it is as a worship "service."

I recently came across a quotation from Martin Luther that helped drive this point home for me. In his introduction to the German mass, he suggested that worship should be designed for the young and for the stranger. Why? Because we should always be concerned about nurturing the faith of those who are most new to it. In most cases, that means young people and the strangers among us who

are visiting, looking for a place among us.

Luther himself worked quite hard at this. The German mass was a change from the Latin one, so that young people and strangers would have an easier time of understanding. Perhaps most important, though, as it is in every age, was the music. Luther took up hymn writing so that he could

bring the Christian faith to people through the popular music of the time. It is hard for us to think of "A Mighty Fortress" as a contemporary song, but that is precisely what it was in the 16th century.

How do we do in shaping our worship for the young and for the stranger? Is this something

we make an effort at? Is it something we think about at all? I must confess that most of the time I am planning worship, I am primarily conscious of trying to do it in the traditional ways for the mature and the faithful Christians, rather than for the young and those still strange to the faith. It is not that this is wrong. We began by saying that worship is very legitimately for each of us to be nurtured in our faiths; and most of us feel best nurtured by the traditions most familiar to us.

But how can we make the new Christians among us a priority, as well? Let's face it, "A Mighty Fortress" is no longer a contemporary song! We had a good taste of it last month when Adam Pechman, David Rudey, and their

friend Dan Salbreiter played a contemporary Christian song for us. Didn't they do a terrific job? How much difference do you think that would make to our young people to have more such music?

I offer these reflections not as a prelude to moving immediately to wholesale changes in our worship at Emmaus, but simply to begin the process of reflection and decision-making that tries to balance all these factors in planning our worship. Thus far, I have found Emmaus to be a welcoming place, open to both the stranger among us and to doing new things. And I want to especially lift up this approach to worship as an act of service to others. Even if we were to move to some worship styles that were

less familiar to us, would we be willing to do so as an act of service to our new brothers and sisters in Christ?

Please keep such questions in mind as the Worship & Music Committee looks at ways of making our worship more welcoming to visitors and to the younger families. We value your input and feeling about such matters so vital to our life together.



Emmaus Experiences Sharp Dip in Offerings After Easter



lunch and snacks for the construction crew.



Which Season Are You?

"Think About the Seasons" was an instruction given recently to those of us participating in the Caring Evangelism class. That wasn't hard to do. Immediately my mind was filled with images of the contrasts and changes found in each season of the year.

But the instructions to the class were then expanded. Next we asked were to consider our relationship with God and our own faith life. Which season would best describe that relationship, why? The room was buzzing as we talked

this question over with our discussion partners.

Think for a moment. How would you answer that question? How would you describe your current faith relationship with God? Winter? Spring? Summer? Fall?

Following our one-on-one discussions in the class, we came together again as a group. How did we describe our faith relationships? One of the older men in the class chose fall as the season best describing where he was — quiet, reflective, introspective. Another talked of winter because it was challenging and invigorating, while yet another person said that everything seemed to be in such full bloom, both with his family and his faith life, that summer was the season that best described him.

While there was a handful of

folks identifying their spiritual seasons as winter, summer and fall, the vast majority of us had answered *spring*.

The young man who was my discussion partner chose spring because it was a season of hope and new growth. But he also pointed out that spring is a

one day is sunny and warm and the next may be chilly, cloudy and rainy. But even then, growth occurs and those days don't last forever.

A young woman articulated how seeds have been planted in her life and how God is there in the middle of the process, causing them to grow and

to blossom. Like those springtime buds that we now observe, they burst open and show the wonder of God in new ways.

This spring, as I impatiently waited for the tulips by my front door to poke through the dirt, I wondered what was taking so long. Was anything happening in that cold, dark earth? Then, finally, a bit of green peered out. Each day they have grown taller and the buds are forming, preparing to flower. The presence of God's creative power in that growth process is a mystery and a miracle once again this spring. I have to admit that there have been days in the past weeks that I've thought something like, "Rain, rain, go away. Come again another day. Pastor Mary wants to play!" But then the new life and the

buds appear, and I remember that it's often rain and darkness that precedes new growth and new life. New life emerges out of that cold, damp ground - just as new life emerged out of the darkness of death and the empty tomb that first Easter morning. And that life of the risen Christ conquered death once and for all in the resurrection.

In the resurrection of Jesus, may this season of Easter give us new hope as we trust God to be with us each step of the way in our life and faith journey. I pray that your growing season will be a good one, filling you with resurrection surprises! And, that is also my prayer for the Emmaus community as a whole -- that God will bless us with spiritual growth in ways we never even dreamed possible! May we *all* come alive in new ways in that resurrection hope.




Summer Schedule Begins June 2



They work with the most needy. Yet, in a time when some government officials talk about church agencies carrying more of the burden, many of them,

dependent upon government grants, are on the brink of extinction.

In trying times, our ELCA inner city social ministry agencies continue to work with the poorest of the poor though they are often underfunded and overburdened. "At the core of the issue, it's an urban ministry crisis," notes Sally Camp, regional director for support to ELCA east coast social ministry organizations. "These agencies, so crucial to their communities, have often been dependent on congregations with declining financial resources. Because we continue to be rich in people resources, the challenge is to develop a collaborative vision for urban social ministry partnerships."

With Camp facilitating consultations, synod staff, agency executives and board members in Pennsylvania, New York, New Jersey and Washington, D.C. took up that challenge. New partnerships are being forged — like those in Philadelphia where suburban congregations were recruited to work with inner city agencies, and in metropolitan New York, where Lutheran Social Services collaborates with a large ELCA-related nursing home to provide congregationally based health ministries.

"If one member (of the body) suffers, all suffer," yet in that body, members "have the same care for one another." In our partnership with ELCA social ministries, we reach beyond ourselves to be the church at work.

Reflections on Law and Order

THEREFORE.

THERE IS NOW NO

CONDEMNATION FOR

THOSE WHO ARE IN

CHRIST JESUS.

ROMANS 8:1

Dear Disciples of Emmaus,

On June 4, we have an important election here in Racine. I have watched with interest the campaign rhetoric of both major candidates. And one their major issues has certainly been "law and order."

On the following Sunday, June 9, we begin a summer-long journey

through St. Paul's letter to the Romans, which we will read as our Second Lesson, passage by passage, until September 15. And one of St. Paul's major issues in this great epistle of faith is "law and order." The word "law" appears 77 times in Romans! Chapters 2, 3 and 7 are especially

devoted to Paul's trying to understand the law of his own time, both Jewish and Roman, in relationship to his Christian faith.

Can we make a similar attempt, using Paul's relections on the law to reflect on our own experience of "law and order"? For the average person, both in Paul's day and our own, we see ourselves as "law abiding" and have this sense that, if only everyone could be as law-abiding as we, then there wouldn't be so many problems in the world. Isn't this the feeling from the current political campaign? Both candidates are trying to make positive mileage out of appealing to fellow "law-abiding" citizens for clamping down on those who aren't. The current political rhetoric would seem to be something like, "With stronger 'law and order,'

those of us who abide by the law could truly live in peace."

But we may be shocked to find out in our reading of Romans this summer that St. Paul seems to challenge this way of thinking. The only true peace, according to Paul, will come from the gospel of Jesus Christ, not the law. Basic to his conversion experience

was also a complete turnaround in his experience of the law. As a pharisee, he had lived his whole life for the law, believing it to be the true path to peace. But Jesus knocked him off his horse on the way to bringing "law and order" to Damascus and said, "Saul, Saul, why do you persecute me?"

That was the beginning to Paul's coming to see the gospel of Jesus as the only true way. What he also came to see about the law is that any *relative* peace and order achieved by the law is still based on a forceful disvision between peoples and so cannot achieve ultimate peace.

In fact, Paul saw the law as having caused divisions between Jewish and Gentile Christians in the Roman church, so his letter to them is very negative on the law. In chapter 7, his argument against the law climaxes with: "you have died to the law in the body of Christ." And: "But now we are discharged from the law, dead to that which held us captive, so that we are slaves not under the old written code but in the new life of the Spirit (7:6)."

Pastor Paul's Column Continued

Why is St. Paul so harsh on the law? Because he came to see it as making false distinctions that keep people divided. Here again is that famous passage from Romans 3 (on which Luther based the Reformation):

But now, apart from law, the righteousness of God has been disclosed.... For there is no distinction, since all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God; they are now justified by his grace as a gift, through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus.

God had to show us a righteousness apart from the law, because Jesus was condemned according to the law! What was so scandalous is that Jesus was declared a criminal by the so-called law-abiding citizens. And St. Paul came to see this not just as a historical accident, a grave mistake by one court of law, but rather as a flaw in the law itself. Human law is in the grip of sin and so will continue to divide peoples rather than to unite them ultimately in peace.

So does that mean we simply throw out the law? By no means! First of all, because the gospel does not force itself on people like the law does, it will be a gift that many choose to ignore or neglect. St. Paul believed that someday

the gospel would be victorious in winning everyone's heart. But, in the meantime, he was thankful for the "governing authorities" who keep a relative peace (13:1-7).

But he was also clear that his first responsibility as a Christian is always to proclaim and live the gospel as the ultimate way. And to this end he concluded his letter to the Romans with a positive word about the law, God's law, which was fulfilled in the love of Jesus Christ. And here is where we can end, too:

Owe no one anything, except to love one another; for the one who loves another has fulfilled the law. The commandments, "You shall not commit adultery; You shall not murder; You shall not steal; You shall not covet"; and any other commandment, are summed up in this word, "Love your neighbor as yourself." Love does no wrong to a neighbor; therefore, love is the fulfilling of the law.




Register for Vacation Bible School by July 15





It wasn't enough for Bethphage to serve the physical needs of nearly 1500 mentally retarded and developmentally disabled people. They believed they could fully be in *ministry* only when their staff worked with their clients spiritual well being.

To do that, this century-old ELCA social ministry — with residences and satellite living centers in 28 states,
Latvia and Great Britain — asked the Division

for Church in Society for help. They wanted their management teams to help staff understand what it means to be in ministry on behalf of a church that responds to the spiritual needs of those in their care.

Today, when Bethphage employees interact with residents, they are

conscious about the value of praying and talking about God with them. They also work to help local ELCA congregations welcome to their midst people with needs that are different from most members. One employee said, "I've begun to understand that caring about the spiritual life of our residents helps me see Christ in another outside of church walls."

"That understanding," says Ruth Reko, who worked with Bethphage leadership on behalf of the ELCA, "sets ELCA care institutions apart from non-church agencies. We're there to show God's love." In ministries like these, brought together through the ELCA Division for Church in Society, we reach beyond ourselves to be the church at work.





Who Chooses the Scripture Lessons?

Have you ever wondered how it is decided which Old and New Testament lessons are to be read for any given worship service? Did you know that, in most cases, if you were worshiping at a Roman Catholic Church in Mexico City or an Anglican Church in London or a Lutheran Church in Copenhagen on a given Sunday, the lessons would be the same as those used at Emmaus Lutheran in Racine?

This is possible because a number of mainline denominations take their guidance from what is called a lectionary. The lectionary used is based on a three-year cycle, which is then repeated. Each cyle begins with the first Sunday in Advent (the first Sunday of the church year) and continues through Christ the King Sunday (the last Sunday after Pentecost). Each year of the lectionary is based on one of the first three gospels and related readings. We are currently in "Year A," the year of the Gospel of Matthew. Year B is the Gospel of Mark, and Year C the Gospel of Luke. Readings from the Gospel of John are interspersed each year.

In an effort to have more consistency among demoninations, a common lectionary was developed by an ecumenical group of theologians and scholars in 1983. More recently, the Revised Common Lectionary has been

introduced. Among other things, an option is given for the choice of the Old Testament lessons for the Sundays following Pentecost. They may be


topical, connecting in some way to the New Testament readings each week, or they may be in the form of continuous readings from two or more books of the Old Testament.

In the past, the Lutheran Church has used only the topical lessons. With the New Revised Common Lectionary, the option of the continuous reading is also offered for the season of Pentecost.

Our worship and Music Committee has chosen to use the second option for the remainder of this Pentecost season. That will mean hearing many of the familiar stories from the books of Genesis and Exodus during the coming months.

Will you be out of town and worshiping elsewhere in the weeks ahead? If so, take a second look at their readings. Do they also use the lectionary? Which Old Testament lessons have they chosen to highlight? Is the sermon based on one of the assigned lessons? If you have observations or suggestions for the Worship & Music Committee after having visited elsewhere, let them know. Kathy Christensen (886-2151) and the members of the committee appreciate your ideas and input!





Synod Assembly Reelects Rogness



"Our foundations will shake and we will never be the same again." With those words of challenge from Bishop Peter Rogness, delegates of the Greater Milwaukee Synod (GMS) began their annual assembly at Carthage College May 31-June 2.

The Global Mission emphasis of the assembly was expressed by the keynote address delivered to delegates on Saturday morning by Bishop Medardo Gomez, Bishop of the Lutheran Synod of El Salvador. Bishop Gomez stated that "the Church is the Herald of God to proclaim hope for those who are suffering and in need of Good News." He added, "Hope realizes the miracles of God; it makes the light shine - expecially for those in pain. Those without pain must be in solidarity with those in pain."

The Rev. Peter Rogness was reelected to a six-year term as bishop of the GMS on the first ballot with 85% of the 318 votes cast. This is Rogness' third term, and the last that he is eligible to serve as bishop of the synod.

Eighteen delegates were elected to represent the Mission Clusters of the



Resolutions approved at the assembly called upon

ELCA members to pray for an end to the use of landmines; upon the synod office and Synod Council to explore ways to provide for all interim pastors to be under call; and upon congregations to work with school districts which do not have breakfast programs to initiate such programs.

Emmaus was represented at the Synod Assembly by Kathy Christensen, Chris Olson, and Pastors Mary Janz and Paul Nuechterlein.

Thanks Given for Glenn's Partnership in the Gospel

"I thank my God in all my rememberance of you, always in every prayer of mine...thankful for your partnership in the Gospel from the first day until now. And I am sure that he who began a good work in you will bring it to completion at the day of Jesus Christ." - Philippians 1:3-6

It was at the June 11 meeting of the Senior Center that its director, Glenn Olson, asked the group, "How many times have the seniors met during the past 21 years, assuming 50 meetings per year?" (Answer: 1,050). "And how many spoons have been set at the tables during that time?" (Answer: well over 30,000!)

Glenn was leading up to his announcement that he would be beginning his second "retirement" at the beginning of July. Glenn's first retirement was as a school teacher 21 years ago. From that position he stepped almost immediately into the newly formed position of director of the Emmaus Senior Center, a responsibility which he has so faithfully fulfilled, week in and week out, for these 21 years.

It's not without some tears and a lump in my throat that I think about Glenn's leaving. As I said to Glenn in the staff meeting when I first learned of his decision to step down, "We will miss you; those are some mighty big shoes to fill!"

In a humble response, typical of who Glenn is, he looked down at his feet and said, "Oh, they're only a 6½!"

I have to say that they are the biggest 6½ that I've ever seen!

Glenn has been a true partner in the ministry of Emmaus as he has directed the Senior Center. He has always brought his gifts of teaching, wisdom, caring and hospitality, sharing them in the spirit of a true servant. He faithfully did everything from arranging for guest speakers and programs to stopping weekly at O&H for cinnamon bread for the morning coffee, to keeping track of the library books, to



coordinating lunches with the kitchen crew (kudos go, too, to Pat Jensen and all who continue to assist her in doing such a super job in

the kitchen), to handling the banking and finances, to leading the meetings, to listening to both the joys and the gripes of the seniors, to ... And the list goes on and on and on. And all of that has always been done with considerable thought, discernment, and care – not to mention constant prayer.

Glenn's leadership has also spilled over to a number of areas, including the weekly staff meetings and as a member of the Education Committee. During his tenure as director of the Center, he has brought maturity of faith, wisdom and guidance not only to the seniors, but to many more of us as well. And so we all thank Glenn for his service and generosity among us.

I echo the words of Paul in the first chapter of Philippians; I am so grateful for Glenn's partnership in the

And, although Glenn does not want special accolades or fanfare at this time, it is simply impossible not to celebrate the blessings we have received through his leadership and service in this community of faith. Glenn and Eileen, may God's spirit bless you and keep you!







A celebration of ministry and service will be the focus of the September 29 worship service. How can we share our talents and gifts with the Emmaus community and with


our neighbors at large? What are the gifts of time, matched with your talents and interests, that you are willing to share?

Racine Prepares Peaceful Response to KKK Hatred

Do you recall the murder of a skinhead in Racine in October of 1994? Unfortunately, many of those who share that same orientation of hatred and violence remember, and they are planning a rally on the Racine courthouse steps for October 5. The Racine Clergy Association has been indialogue with community officials for several months in anticipation of this dread event. On August 26, the Clergy Association held a meeting in the city council chambers with Mayor James Smith, the police chief, the sheriff, and other community leaders.

The difficult aspect of responding to such a gathering of hate-mongers is to avoid getting drawn into their game of hatred and violence. Law enforcement officials have done their homework in researching such events and are aware of such practices as their hiring professional hecklers whose sole job is to incite a reaction from onlookers and especially from counter-demonstrators. The main goal of such KKK gatherings seems to be to incite hatred and violence in reaction to them and thereby to gain notoriety.

Thus, the best response on the part of a community would seem to be what might be called actively ignoring them: Don't counter demonstrate; don't show up at all. Because that's what they want. Let them meet without anyone looking on, and it becomes a "non-event" for them.

But isn't there something else we can do to stand up to such a message of hatred and violence? Yes, we can rededicate ourselves to our message of love and peace. We can be proud of our community for coming together in such a way. Here are some of the

efforts being planned:

- "Violence No More!", an ecumenical peace rally/worship service on Sunday, September 15, 5:00 p.m. (See "Elsewhere in Our Area")."
- Racine Unified School District has declared the theme of this 1996-97 school year to be "Peace in Our Place." Large banners are going up in many of the schools, and special activities and learning opportunities are being planned throughout the year, especially for the week leading up to the Klan rally, Sept. 30-Oct. 4.
- being planned for the morning of October 5. These are not counter-demonstrations but special opportunities to do what we are always called to do: pray for peace in our world. (More details in coming weeks.)

health kits, blankets and quilts, sewing kits and men's and children's clothing.

Millions of people overseas continue to have need for aid and assistance. Boxes for donated items are located in our narthex. \$5.00 will purchase a blanket and can be donated through the church office.

School Kits

For children whose lives have been disrupted by war or other disasters, receiving a school kit is a sign that someone far away cares. Adults in literacy classes appreciate the supplies needed to learn to read and write. Each school kit it to contain the following items:

- Pads or notebooks of 100-150 sheets of ruled paper approximately 8½"x11".
- One blunt scissors. The "safety" scissors with imbedded steel blades are an excellent choice.

- One 30-cm (12") metric ruler.
- One pencil sharpener.
- Six new pencils with erasers.
- ▶ One eraser approx. 2½" long.
- 12 sheets of construction paper in assorted colors.
- One box of 8, 16 or 24 crayons.
- One cloth bag approx. 12"x14" with cloth handles.

Pack all the items in the bag, fold the handles over, and secure with two large rubber bands if you wish.

Health Kits

Clean hands, good grooming, bright and shining smiles -- you can help bring them about through the gift of health kits. Each kit should contain:

- One hand towel.
- One washcloth.
- One bath-size bar of any brand of soap.
- One toothbrush.
- One tube of toothpaste (5-7 oz.).
- One comb.
- One metal nail file, or nail clippers with file attached.
- Six band-aids, preferably 1/2"-3/4".

Wrap all the smaller items in the towel or pack in a zip-lock plastic bag. Tie securely with ribbons or yarn.

In addition, we are seeking a director (or co-directors) to lead the center on a permanent basis.

Emmaus Lags Behind in Its Benevolence Commitments

The financial figures on page 2 show both that our income is struggling to keep up with our expenditures and that our expenditures are significantly short of our budget. For the most part, we are continuing to pay our regular bills, though that has become more of a struggle in the waning weeks of summer.

What has taken the biggest hit is our benevolence commitment of payments, only \$2,591 toward a \$13,000 pledge (only 19.93% of it!). Church Council truly regrets this benevolence shortfall. We have let it happen through the summer months not because benevolence is of secondary importance—quite the contrary!—but



because of the reality that our synod is more forgiving of time lags in meeting commitments than our bill-creditors.

We are confident and hopeful that members of Emmaus will do everything they

can to keep up with their pledges so that Emmaus can keep its pledge to the synod in these final months of the year. As always, Church Council welcomes your suggestions and comments.



- Every summer in recent years, it has been our pleasure to




thank Al Beck and Joy Kousek for planting and maintaining flower beds on the church grounds.

- Pray that the Holy Spirit will make miracles possible in Sunday School classes and that teachers will freely seek God's guidance and praise Him for His love of all children and adults everywhere.
- We lift up our Sunday School teachers that they will be filled with the Holy Spirit as they begin teaching our children this year and that God will use these people in powerful ways to help their students know God's love for them.

"Peace in Our Place"

Dear Disciples of Emmaus,

"We interrupt this pastor's column for a late breaking story..." Actually, this will not be so much an interruption than a way of focusing my originally intended topic. The story I am referring to is the Racine Clergy Association conference with city officials that I attended this week (see related Visitor articles) regarding the planned KKK rally October 5. And my intended topic for this column is to welcome everyone back to worship after our various summer breaks. I especially wanted to talk about welcoming children and their families to Sunday morning worship.

"How are these two things related?" you ask. One of the focuses of our community's response to this dread visit from hate-mongers is the susceptibility of children to the effects of such people. Children are both more naive, and therefore vulnerable to their message, and more frequent victims of the violence they help to spawn. The September 15 ecumenical rally entitled "No More Violence!" features a flyer (which we will include in upcoming bulletins) that outlines the effects of racial hatred and violence that our children face every day at school. The statistics are staggering and frightening.

Our Racine Unified School District has also responded by proclaiming the theme for this 1996-97 school year to be "Peace in Our Place." They are hanging large banners in schools and preparing a host of activities to lift up this theme.

Brothers and sisters in Christ, let me suggest to you that having "peace in our places"—whether at home or school, in our workplaces or in our neighborhoods-all true peace ultimately flows from the Prince of Peace whom we encounter in a special way in our place of worship. God's peace flows from the one who forgave those who heaped hatred and violence upon him on the cross. It is that amazing grace and love which forgives each of us and thereby grants us new possibilities to have peace in all the places that we inhabit.

I encourage you, for the sake of our children, to take part in our community's many activities for peace in the coming weeks. But I also encourage you to center all that activity through worship of our Prince of Peace who comes to us in water and word, in bread and wine. We have such a unique resource for peace through our worship life together at Emmaus!

Having said all this, I'd be remiss if I didn't also acknowledge that there are special challenges in bringing children to worship. Worship is for the sake of our children's peace, precisely because it gives us adults in their lives a greater source of peace. Our peace is their peace. But worship isn't designed specifically as an event for children.

Nevertheless, there are things we can do to include children in meaningful ways. A recent ELCA publication carried some worship ideas for children that I'd like to pass on to you:

Pack a "Sunday Only Bag" of soft, quiet toys that aren't used the rest of the week. Emmaus supplements your efforts with special worship bags with books

and coloring materials, as well as weekly children's activity pages based on the day's theme and scripture readings.

Help your children participate in the service by helping them to follow along in service books.

 Use the Lord's Prayer and creed at home so that they learn to recite them with everyone else.

After the service, talk with your child about what he or she saw, heard or did during the worship. (This is actually the main purpose of those "Sermon Reports" we require for confirmation: to get families talking about their worship together.)

This is obviously not an exhaustive list.

We, the worship leaders and planners of Emmaus, also need to do our part in helping children feel welcome. In addition to what was noted above, we have in the last couple years made the children's time, "Good

News 101," a regular feature of noncommunion services; and we've opened the age for first communion for younger children. For those times when our little ones are still unsettled or distracting to fellow worshipers, we have renovated our nursery this summer.


Are there further ways for us to include children in our worship? We have talked recently of including children in such things as being greeters. We welcome young musicians who offer their talents for special music or accompaniment. We also welcome your suggestions.

Most of all, we welcome you to worship with us this fall, as the Prince of Peace comes to help us make peace in all the places of our lives.

CROP Walk to Aid Hungry in Racine and Around the World




Lutheran World Relief Calls for School & Health Kits

Millions of people overseas continue to have need for aidand assistance. Boxes for donated items are located in the narthex. \$5.00 will purchase a blanket and can be donated through the church office.

School kits should contain:

- Pads or notebooks of 100-150 of ruled paper approximately 81/2"x11".
- One blunt scissors.
- One 30 cm (12") metric ruler.
- One pencil sharpener.
- Six new pencils with erasers.
- One eraser approx. 21/2" long.
- 12 sheets of construction paper in assorted colors.
- One box of 8, 16, or 24 crayons.
- One cloth bag approx. 12"x14" with cloth handles illustration for suggested design). Place all the items in the bag and fold the handles over.

School Kit Bag - 30" x 45" cloth



Sew slim panels into tubes. Cut into 3 pieces for 6 panels

Health kits should contain:

- One hand towel
- One washcloth.
- One bath-size bar of any brand of soap.
- One toothbrush.
- One tube of toothpaste (5-7 oz.)
- One comb.
- One metal nail file, or nail clippers with file attached.
- Six band-aids, preferably 1/2" to

Wrap all the smaller items in the towel or pack them in a zip-lock plastic bag. Tie securely with ribbons or yarn.

Food for the Hungry

"I'm starving to death!"

How often is that complaint followed by resorting to fast food or junk food to fill the void? Rather than healthy, regularly planned meals and snacks, it's often tempting to grab something quickly to tide us over. Is what we eat even fit for consumption?

What are we hungry for? The answer to that will often depend on the respondent. If you're a college student, pizza and Coke or Mountain Dew for breakfast might be common fare. Or if you're a die-hard Norwegian, lutefisk might be a treat for a special dinner. (I, for one, already have Feb. 14 marked on my calendar for the outstanding lutefisk supper at Norway Lutheran Church!) Last week, I watched cases of soup and other items from Project Emergency be unpacked by our REST shelter volunteers. Those hot meals served to the guests at our homeless shelter on Friday nights will undoubtedly be very welcome indeed.

As I recently talked with Cecilia Cervantes, an educator from Brazil visiting Racine under the auspices of the Presbyterian church, I learned about what the poor in her country face. Many people exist on what they find as they scavenge through the garbage of those who are wealthier. There is even an attempt to teach those people how to incorporate egg shells (high in calcium!) and banana peels (an ingredient in a kind of jelly) into their meager diets to provide more nutrition. It's only when I hear accounts such as that I can even begin to comprehend our abundance in comparison.

Many of you recognize that abundance and have been more than

generous as you've shared what you have to help those who might literally starve to death otherwise.

Thank you for your pledges to the CROP Walk on October 13, for your willingness to walk (a number of our youth will be earning confirmation service points on the Walk), for your contributions of food and money to the Northside Food Pantry, the REST program, and the ELCA World Hunger Appeal. Your contributions to help fight hunger affect people throughout the world.

And, in the meantime, let us remember that we also need care and nurturing, both physically and spiritually. As we come to worship and to be fed by the Word and by the Body and Blood of Christ, we are strengthened and nourished in new and exciting ways. Our deep hunger and thirst can only be satisfied fully by Jesus Christ as he comes to us in bread and wine offering us forgiveness and new life.

If you have been away for a while, the One who is the Bread of Life invites you with open arms to come again and be fed. If you are confined to your home and would like audio tapes of our Sunday services, copies of a daily devotional book, or Holy Communion, please contact the church office or one of us pastors. We as a church reach out that all might be fed in Christ's name—both physically and spiritually. We hope you join us in the foretaste of the feast that is to come!





In May, she graduated from Luther Northwestern Seminary in St. Paul with a Doctorate degree in ministry. She is married to Rev. Dr. Paul Raj, who has also spoken at Emmaus. He directs over 20 parishes with several ordained pastors and other specially trained Christian workers.

Dr. Katakshamma is well known in Christian circles around the world and is in the states for a conference on the east coast. She has a lovely musical voice and a loving message from her Savior. It is always a great pleasure to have her visit us. Welcome, Katakshamma!





Christmas Gifts to Cross Lutheran Count Double

Dear Friends of Cross Church,

"The rebuilt church drove home to me that you refused to give up." Ernestine Walker, a woman who lives down the block from Cross and who had worshipped with us many times over the years, explained recently what led her to affirm her baptism and officially become a member of the Body of Christ at Cross this summer. "Stepping into that beautiful rebuilt church reminded me of all that you have done for the community over the years. I realized then I needed to be more fully a part of all the good that Cross is doing."

I am writing to all of you who have contributed to the rebuilding of Cross Church to thank you again for helping us witness to the community. Many people have been empowered to take significant steps in their spiritual journey, like Ernestine Walker, because of the powerful witness of the people of God who rebuilt the "walls of Zion."

Now, as we approach Christmas, we are overwhelmed by the grace of God in our lives. The rebuilt church is seldom empty. The after school tutoring program hums with a record number of youth; the Adult Program and food ministries continue to grow

and to benefit from the expanded services of our health care ministry.

But even as we celebrate, we need to keep in mind that the fund raising part of our rise from the ashes is not yet done. We will be negotiating with AAL for a mortgage to cover the remaining rebuilding costs due in December. It looks like that mortgage will be close to \$200,000 -- a heavy responsibility for a congregation the size and income of Cross. But we remain determined not to sacrifice a single aspect of our ministry for the sake of bricks and mortar.

If you are considering a gift to Cross as part of your Christmas giving, now is a time when your contribution can "count double" by reducing the amount we need to borrow. (The smaller the mortgage, the less we pay in interest.) We will be happy to acknowledge any gifts in honor or remembrance of others.

God's people at Cross wish you an empowering Christmas and a bright New Year filled with joyful surprises! Please keep our ministries in your prayers during the Advent and Christmas seasons.

Peer Ministry at UW-Milwaukee

"Four guys! Wow! That's pretty interesting." So goes the typical response when I tell people that I have four male students in our Peer min-

istry Program this year. One of last year's Peer Ministers (a female remarked about the Corner House, "Oh man, I don't want to see what this place looks like next year." (Kurt, John, Solomon, and Ryan took no offense). So much for gender stereotypes - men are not interested in religion and are definitely sloppier than women.

The truth is that the 2nd and 3rd floors of the Corner House, our Campus Ministry Center are remarkably clean. And men are definitely interested in faith issues: the first two Sunday Dinner and Discussions consisted entirely of men. Last week we finally broke the gender barrier when four women showed up - Hallelujah!

The Peer ministry program at UWM has a 20 year history of ups and downs, conflict and joy, failure and commitment - kind of like the rest of the Church. After all is said and done the Peer Ministry Program has offered first and foremost opportunity. Peer Ministers have the chance to grow, to think, to challenge, and to be challenged, to express care, to serve others.

Recently we have been talking about "What does it mean to 'think like a minister?" One aspect of this training is to practice hospitality in a very intentional

way which includes inviting other students to be a part of our events, as well as being hospitable on campus where life can get hectic, impersonal, and highly competitive. Peer Ministers are expected to be intentionally caring persons in a huge fast-paced institution. That task is not easy.

With all the intentionality and all the caring and listening required of them, it is good that the Peer Ministers have each other. It is good that they live together in a community that forms a place of companionship and Christian friendship. It is one of our goals that they learn not only how to minister to others, but that they learn interdependence and what Luther called "the mutual consolation of the brethren." In our Mission Statement we aspire to "building a Christian community based upon the light of the Gospel." I invite your prayers for our Peer Ministers: John Stieber, Kurt Craanen, Solomon Mebratu, and Ryan Thomas. Please keep us all in your thoughts as we aspire to be missionaries on campus.

Local Language Literacy is a Pillar of Development

In Senegal, West Africa, three out of four people have not been taught to read and write. Many of the non-literate are women. Many of those who are literate know only the colonial language, French. Among local officials, 70% cannot read the laws they are elected to apply.

Yet with the help of Lutheran World Relief, a different picture of Senegal is now emerging. 60,000 adults are

taking part in 320 local literacy programs. They are learning to read and write in record time, thanks to a method that begins with stories and dialogue rather than with letters

and words.

To instruct teachers and satisfy new readers, an LWR partner agency, Associates in Research & Education for Development (ARED), produces up to 2,000 books each month. In the next five years, ARED expects to print 90,000 books. With each copy reaching between five and ten readers, over a half million people will be served!

Women comprise many of the new students. As adults, they can choose to be educated, a choice not made for them as children.

When they learn to read, they are able to do things which were difficult to do before -- like vote on issues important to them.

New readers gain access to new information and even to their own world. Novels are the best sellers, but books on law, religion, the environment and literacy are also popular. Why the enthusiasm? The books are in their mother tongues—in languages like Pulaar and Wolof, lan-

guages in which few such

books exist. The most famous vernacular author in Senegal works for ARED. He writes in Pulaar, the language of nomadic herders throughout West Africa. His campaigns for literacy, the environ-

ment, and for herders' rights have moved the nation. The popularity of his novels gives people even more reason to learn to read in their own language.

Literacy also spurs community development. Becoming literate in one's own language give people a sense of pride in themselves and in their own culture. Given the opportunity to express themselves, LWR and partners are finding that communities begin to revitalize from within.



God's Coins



Dear Disciples of Emmaus,

There was such a warm response to the stewardship sermon on October 20 that I thought I'd share some of the main points with you again.

The story told to us in Matthew 22:15-22 has a touch of irony. For a story that seems so directly and literally about money, it really is about so much more. The Pharisees send scribes to try to trap Jesus on a subject we still dread to this day: taxes. "Is it lawful for a Jew to pay taxes to Caesar?"

Jesus responds by asking them to get out one of those Roman coins and to see whose image is on it. "Caesar's," they reply. And Jesus' response to them is one of the most well-known sayings from him: "Give unto Caesar the things that are Caesar's and unto God the things that are God's."

It is tempting, at the time of the year when we pledge our financial support to church, to make this story all about money. Something like, "Give some of your money to Caesar, yes, but don't forget about God. Give some of your money to God, too."

But I think that Jesus is asking so much more of us! He asks his followers to notice the image on the coin. That word "image" has a much deeper implication. It comes from faith's view of creation. The story in Genesis 1 tells us that we are made in the *image* of God. So Jesus is telling us, in effect, "This coin may bear Caesar's image, but you bear God's image! You are God's coins! Give, therefore, unto Caesar what is Caesar's and unto God what is God's." In short, God wants you and me to give our whole self.

Now, we might want to ask: is this

Good News? At financial pledge time, it might seem like good news in this way: "giving means more than just money, so it's OK if I don't give much money but give of my time and talent instead." But I'm not sure that's where the Good News lies. Jesus is asking us to give ourselves! Giving a bit of our time and talent might be no better substitute than giving just a bit of our money, when what is asked for is our whole self. For many people, in fact, giving a few dollars is easier.

So, again, how are these words from Jesus' Good News? Whenever Jesus speaks in terms of giving our whole self (which is almost always), I find it helpful to think of that in terms of: which power do I live my life by?

Here's what I mean. Since that first man and woman in the garden (Gen. 2-3), we have had the choice to live by two different powers, the Creator's power of life, or the creature's power of death. Adam and Eve had it made; they had every opportunity to live under God's power of life. They were made in God's image and so could live a life of imitating God's care for creation. They could cooperate with God in caring for one another and for the earth. And they were perfectly free do so, with only one rule: don't eat from the tree in the middle of the garden.

But the voice of the creature, that crafty snake, convinced them that that wasn't good enough. Eating of that tree could make them as wise as God, in charge of their own lives! That would really be freedom, right? The man and woman listened to the creature over the Creator, and the rest, as they say, is

history. We have all become caught up in imitating each other instead of imitating God, and those endless rivalries literally kill us.

Let me share the same example I did on October 20. Who is it in my life that I imitate? Who are my models? It's most often the case people who are close to us. For me, that means probably my own family. My brother and sister, I think, are important models for me. We were fortunate in our family to go to college and have the opportunity to get on the middle-class professional track.

That game of imitation I get caught up in playing, then, has to do with keeping up with them. I wonder if my house or cars are as nice. I compare what kind of trips we can afford to make, the outings we can go on. I look at what toys or gifts I can make to my kids and wife. I think that with just a bit more money I can be more free in being able to afford all those nice things. But there's just one thing: pastors don't make as much as other professionals. And so resentment can build, increasing stress and eating away at me. And I wonder about the connection of such stress to physical disease. Can such resentment literally kill you or me?

I take some risk in sharing my particular way of getting caught up in the games of comparison and rivalry. The truth is probably that my brother and sister are models for me precisely because they happen to be ahead of me in financial means. If I made more than them, I would probably choose someone just ahead of me as my model: a neighbor, a co-worker, even a celebrity. That's the game we've been playing since the first man and woman: even if the other person is God, we are tempted to think that we can compete rather than


cooperate! We are seduced into thinking that freedom means being in charge of ourselves.

So Jesus came to truly show us another way. Freedom is not being in charge of ourselves. True freedom comes from accepting God's charge for us to share in caring for the Creation. Jesus came to show us a life truly in imitation of God, serving one another and serving the earth. We are made in God's image, not Caesar's; so we should be imitating God, not Caesar. Live by God's power of life and freedom, not the creature's power to rival each other and to kill one another. That is the choice. Give unto Caesar that which is Caesar's and unto God what is God's. In short, give your whole life over to God's power of life, or end up serving the powers of death.

So the matter does go much deeper than money. But money is also at the heart of the problem. Jesus had them look at a coin. This is Caesar's game: to get us all caught up in the money game. Have you had similar experiences as mine? Getting caught up in those money games only loads us down with resentment and anger. And so the solution also has money at the heart of it: we need to learn to use our money, along with our time and talents, as a means to care for one another and for the earth.

This is no simple task! We can only learn it in imitation of Christ, and by coming together in Christ's name to imitate one another. This is the ministry we share together which can truly make us free! God's peace and blessings to you as we pledge another year of commitment to that ministry.





Gifts of Appreciated Assets Can Help at Tax Time

Appreciated assets, such as stocks, bonds, mutual funds or real estate can be an excellent alternative to giving cash or writing out a check to Emmaus.

Another possibility that allows you to keep income for your lifetime, (or two lifetimes or a period of years) at a percentage of the full fair market value, is to give the asset to a charitable remainder trust. You can fulfill your commitment or desire to give just the same but there are other financial benefits.

In most cases, when you have owned an asset for at least one year and give it to your church or other qualified charity, the full fair market value of your property is tax deductible. Since you are donating and not selling the



property, you also avoid having to pay capital gains tax. And if one of your goals is also to reduce the value of your estate to minimize estate taxes at the time of your death, donating appreciated assets can be a very effective way to achieve that as well.

Bishop Rogness Gives Progress Report on Outreach Fund

from From Twelve Twelve

The 1995 Synod Assembly approved the formation of the Outreach Fund, a program to provide financial support to congregational Word and Sacrament ministries among the poor in the Greater Milwaukee Synod. The following is an interview with GMS Bishop Peter Rogness about the progress of the Outreach Fund.

1212: What has the Outreach Steering Committee done?

Rogness: A pilot group of pastors gathered to first develop a statement explaining the need; then, with a small group invitation strategy, acquainted persons thought to have interest in supporting similar causes. The response has been good; individuals have indicated interest and a number of gifts have been received.

1212: How much money has been raised so far?

Three PR: Over \$240,000! fourths of that amount came from the Fox Point/Peace Lutheran partnership venture.

1212: How has the money been allocated?

Recommendations for allocation are made by the Synod's Outreach Strategy Team, based on congregational outreach needs identified by local strategy processes. provided seed money for the new ministry initiative at Peace Lutheran Church on Milwaukee's north side. Other ministry needs will be funded as the Fund receives money.

1212: Won't this conflict with congregational giving to the Synod?

PR: Absolutely not. One thing we have made clear from the beginning is that this ministry is not an effort to divert members' giving to their congregations, nor is it an attempt to



have this Fund put on congregational budgets. Rather, it's recognition that most of our members do significant

giving to other charities outside their congregation, and many would be very open to giving directly to support congregational ministry among the poor.

1212: Why have we heard so little about the Outreach Fund until now?

PR: It has been intentional to avoid broad publicity, which would make this one more of the countless appeals for funds that overwhelm us. Rather, it has sought to quietly seek out individuals believed to be inclined to support the church's ministry among the poor. Certainly, the Fund is receptive to anyone interested in support, but the thrust of the approach is person-to-person.

ELCA RESPONDS TO ZAIREAN/ RWANDAN REFUGEES

DISASTER-GRAM (November 6, 1996)

1.5 Million Seek Safety.

An estimated 1.5 million Rwandan refugees and Zairean civilians are fleeing from a battle between rebel fighters and the Zairean army. The conflict, related to the Rwandan Hutu-Tutsi conflict, could lead to a regional conflagration which spreads to other countries. The vulnerable - the elderly, the infirm, the pregnant women and small childrenhave not been able to run to the safety of new refugee camps and are congregating here and there. They are caught in zones of armed conflict, possible epidemics and meager food supplies.

The rebel army seems to have gained control of eastern Zaire and have declared a temporary cease-fire so refugees may be helped.

Our Lutheran agencies are engaged with other church agencies in relief efforts coordinated through ACT (Action of Churches Together).


ACT/Lutheran World Federation is pre-positioning food and emergency supplies in Uganda, Rwanda, and Tanzania. The ELCA has sent \$100,000 in international disaster response funds for this effort.

Lutheran World Relief is calling for the return of Rwandan refugees to Rwanda while allocating \$50,000 to prepare emergency supplies and transportation for returnees.

Pray that the refugees will be able to return to their homes in safety.

Holy (and Unholy) Interruptions

It seems that the older I get the more I appreciate routine in my life. In fact, when there isn't a certain amount of it, I feel "out of control" and "in chaos." I get especially cranky when a telemarketer calls and interrupts that

routine. No, I don't want to change phone companies! No, I don't want to donate money to another charitable organization! No, I don't need another Visa card.

Interruptions...how do we handle them? Life can be interrupted in so may ways-by news that a loved one is dying, by chronic illness, by a job that by Pastor's Notes prematurely ends, divorce, by a move, by a

new relationship in one's life, by the birth of a child, by the news of an unexpected inheritance. Whatever the interruption, it can often throw us off center, cause us to reflect again on true priorities and force us to make decisions...ready or not!

How can those disruptions and interruptions become opportunities for holy and sacred times? Will we try to handle everything on our own, or will we take the opportunity to invite God and supportive Christian friends into the process? As circumstances change in our lives, that is a time when it may be necessary to do some "re-framing." New adjustments are made. And, it is when those adjustments are made in partnership with God and with our sisters and brothers in Christ-when they are made in community-that new growth and possibilities arise. As we share the interruptions, there is a sense

of God's spirit among us.

What must it have been for Mary when she experienced the biggest interruption of her life? Can you imagine that young teenage girl being interrupted by the angel as she was told

> that she would bear God's That interruption son? would turn everything upside-down, not only for Mary, but for the entire world!

> And what interruption that news must have been for Joseph! We read in the gospel of Luke that after Mary was interrupted by God's angel Gabriel with the news of the upcoming birth, she quickly

left to spend some time with Elizabeth.

I wonder if nine months later. Mary questioned God's sense of timing. Do you suppose she understood why that census in Bethlehem had to be right at the time she was full term? I wonder if she asked, "Why now, God? Why now when I have to take this 85mile trip on rough roads riding a donkey?" Those would have been logical questions. In the midst of discomfort and uncertainty, it's sometimes difficult to imagine that there might even be a bigger picture. But, Mary and Joseph weren't alone-God even arranged for a hospitality committee of angels and shepherds and wise men to remind them that this was indeed a time of holy interruption.

the coming weeks? Perhaps it will be memories, maybe it will be illness, or maybe a calendar filled with far too many obligations and expectations. In the midst of all of that, we pray that God move through all of the confusion and chaos, as only God can, and interrupt us yet one more time with the joy and the awe of the Christ child. May our hearts be open to that holy interruption of a God who comes to us in love as a tiny, fragile baby. And may that holy interruption mean that our lives will never be the same again!
