

Stewardship Results for 1997 Present Challenge

As this Visitor goes to press, the results of the stewardship campaign for 1997 pledges were 122 pledges for a total of \$139,201. There may still be a handful of pledges

forthcoming. These results compare to recent years on the above chart.

The number of pledges was second only to 1995, when members of Emmaus were responding to a drastic shortfall in 1994. The total amount pledged, however, was down. That means a projected income of \$5,000 to \$10,000 less than 1996, and therefore the



budget process will likely be difficult.

Church Council is hopeful that the congregation will respond to this shortfall, as it has in the past,

meeting the challenge of supporting our ministry together. Please be part of the process as we take a more detailed look at the year ahead; there will be two primary opportunities: the budget hearing during the Adult Forum on January 5 and the annual meeting on January 19, both during the Sunday School hour (9:15 to 10:15 a.m.)

Church Undecorating Includes Chili Feed





Missing Stainless Steel Flatware to Be Replaced

This past summer, while preparing a funeral luncheon, the women working in the kitchen discovered that the Danish stainless steel flatware was missing. It had last been used for a funeral luncheon in May. The 100-place setting flatware ha always been stored in labeled boxes on the top shelves on one of the cupboards.

The police were notified and a claim was filed with the insurance company. An exhaustive search of the church turned up three pieces of the set, which were found to have been inadvertently been placed with the regular flatware; they were taken to be appraised. On the basis of that

appraisal, the insurance company issued a check to Emmaus for \$6,339.44.

A committee is being formed to select the pattern of the new flatware. At this time, Pat Jensen and Cheryl Dexter of the WELCA Hospitality Committee and Kathy Cook and Jan Svendsen of the WELCA Board have agreed to be on the selection committee. Judy Yorgan, owner of Plumb Gold Jewelry Store, has agreed to assist the committee in the acquisition of the flatware.

A decision should be made on the selection of flatware in January. It will take approximately two months to receive the flatware once it has been ordered.


Storage Area Being Vacated




Lutherdale Offers Time Out for Couples

As an ELCA we have a total of 400 personnel serving in 40 countries. Some of them are short-term (2-3 years). Some are long-term (3+ years). The remainder are volunteers serving between 2-24 month calls.

Our ELCA Missionary personnel are involved in teaching, health care, agricultural development, evangelism, pastoral ministry, administration, and other areas of ministry as requested by our partner churches.

A New Multi-culturalism

Pastor's Notes

Dear Disciples of Emmaus,

My dad grew up in northern, rural Wisconsin and was fond of telling us stories about the attending hardships of his childhood as I grew up. We now like to joke about it. A recent birthday

card to him bore the following message: "Happy Birthday! It's another occasion for you to tell the story of how you walked eight miles through the snow to be born."


We have fun accusing him of stretching the truth further with each re-telling, but there is also an important truth behind

his stories: the circumstances of his youth were in fact far removed from those that I was fortunate to enjoy. And even further removed from those of his grandchildren. My dad grew up in a house without central heat, electricity, or indoor plumbing. I can't conceive of making a dash to the outhouse in subzero temperatures, or reading by lamp, or brushing my teeth in the morning out of a bowl of water that first has to be thawed on the stove. My children can't conceive of life without color TV or VCR's. They have no notion of what it means to survive the social trauma of a Great Depression or a World War. On the other hand, they already know more about using computers than their grandfather. Spanning these three generations in our family is a movement from a life marked by reading from candlelight to lives inundated with a myriad of mass media. Do you have

similar stories in your family?

What does this all mean to the social fabric of our life together at the turn of the 21st Century? It means, I think, a new brand of multi-culturalism. We are most accustomed to talking

about multi-culturalism as bridging the gaps between the cultures of the various races and ethnic groups. But I think we are now seeing increasingly pronounced differences between the cultures of the generations. The radically different circumstances between my dad's and my sons' growing up is all too



There are many consequences to this new multi-culturalism. But one of the places where we can most easily note its effects is in Sunday morning worship. Worship has always been greatly affected and shaped by culture. Yet the Christian message purports to be a universal one and so has always needed to contend with numerous brands of multi-culturalism. At the turn of the 20th Century, for instance, the Lutheran church in this country struggled with all the various European cultures whose immigrant groups had started their own churches. Multi-culturalism at Emmaus 75 years ago dealt with whether or not English services should be added to the

Danish ones, a dilemma we obviously overcame. (When was the last time Emmaus had a pastor who could even speak Danish?)

The civil rights movement of the last 40 years has brought about multiculturalism as we've come to think about it: as having to do especially with culture between the races. Emmaus, as have most European background churches, has not done too well with this brand of multi-culturalism. Most of our members are still of European descent.

But now we are even faced with a new challenge, I think, a new multiculturalism that has arisen because of the radical changes from generation to generation. It is one we are forced to deal with as long as there are multiple generations at our church. Sadly, some churches have already begun to become segregated along generational lines. There are older congregations in which almost all of the young people have left. And there are new churches, catering to the younger generations, who have few senior members and little sense of tradition or roots. At Emmaus I think we are fortunate enough to still have the challenge before us of integrating the generations successfully.

This year we have enjoyed a taste of this as some of our youth have brought their music into our worship. Our thanks especially to Adam Pechman and David Rudey for being bold enough to share! And this coming year it is the primary assignment for the Worship & Music Task Force to lead us in contending with this new multiculturalism. They will meet for the first time this month, under the leadership of Gregg & Kylee Albright. We have great

hopes of being able to move forward in offering a variety of worship experiences that will bridge the generations.

One last thought: facing this new brand of multi-culturalism between the generations may inadvertently help us with the more conventional form of multi-culturalism between races and ethnic groups. For part of our younger generation's culture is this latter form of multi-culturalism. They have been raised in it over the last thirty years. Let me give you a quick example. When the Wadewitz Elementary School Choir, under the direction of our own Cathy Meyer, recently sang a Christmas concert for our Senior Center, their repertoire included Jewish, Native American, African American, and Italian carols. Our children are growing up learning the songs of other cultures, such that these other songs become part of their culture. Perhaps our children can teach us to be more welcoming of the cultures of the other races as we all learn together to be multi-cultural among the generations.

As we face a New Year, I am excited by the prospects of Emmaus taking further steps toward this new multi-culturalism in our worship. We will need patience and openness with one another; we will need to listen to one another. Above all, we will need the guidance and promptings of the Holy Spirit, which—ever since that miraculous multi-cultural experience on Pentecost—is always about the business of bringing all people together under the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

May we have a happy and exciting New Year!

Parish Nurse Corner

Don't Be Afraid to Ask Questions

When illness or injury occurs, many patients share feelings of shock, confusion, and regret that they didn't ask all their questions. When one is able to deal directly with a health situation, one feels some measure of control and is able to make better health choices.

Since it's your body and your well-being at stake, any question that is important to you is important enough to ask



your physician (yes, they're busy, but they'll take the time). Don't be afraid to ask questions. If the answer doesn't tell you what you want to know, keep asking until you understand the answer.

Health Notes (1996) suggests that questions usually fall into two categories:

1. Questions dealing directly with the illness or injury...

- What could be causing the problem?
- ♦ What tests or procedures are necessary?
- ♦ What will the tests tell me, or what benefit can I reasonably expect?
- What do the technical terms mean?
- Could there be any other source for the problem?
- What is the typical treatment for the problem, and what is its success rate?

- Are there other treatment options available?
- ♦ What are the advantages or disadvantages of one treatment over another?
- ♦ How much will this cost?
- ♦ What can I do on my own to improve my condition?
- 2. Questions dealing with how your illness or injury will affect you and your family on a day-to-day basis...
- How will my life be changed because of this problem?
- Will the treatment plan affect my lifestyle?
- Will I be able to take care of myself? Will I need family assistance? Assistance from other sources outside the home?
- Can I expect to return to "normal" for someone my age? If not, what is the best quality of life I can expect to achieve?

Remember, you are the leading expert on how you feel, and you have the final say on how you will be treated. You need to share your thoughts, concerns, and questions with your doctor. I am also available to assist you in understanding your problem, your treatment, or to help you cope with the system or your feelings about your situation. Your needs remain in my daily prayers. I can be reached either through your church office or by voice mail at 635-7588 extension 320.



When he placed the telephone call, he had no idea there was an ELCA support network for people like him. On the other end of the line, Dennis Busse, director for disability ministries in the ELCA Division for Church in Society, knew exactly whom to contact.

Jane Brown had also known family mental illness. "She serves as our Southern Ohio Synod contact for the Lutheran Network on Mental Illness," Busse said. "Jane called and carefully walked him through what to expect at the meeting, what to ask for, what to insist upon."


Busse initiated the network after a 1989 Churchwide Assembly memorial asked congregations to be caring places for people with mental illness. Now in 40 synods, its goal is to offer support for ministry with families of mentally ill people.

"Virtually all disability work is connecting people like Jane Brown with people who need their help," said Busse. That includes ELCA networks for deaf ministry, people with developmental disabilities and pastors with disabilities.

Through ministries such as these in the Division for Church in Society, we reach beyond ourselves to be the church at work.

Pastor Mary's Column

The Greatest of These Is Love

During the current Hallmark season of red and pink hearts, carnations and roses and rich chocolates, more often than not the word "Love" becomes trivialized and misunderstood. Often it is a time of trying to recapture the "bells and whistles" of the early stages of "falling in love." There seems to be such a need to wrap ourselves in the warm, fuzzy blanket of sentimentality to feel good—even if for a fleeting moment.

While Hallmark has worked hard (and made millions of dollars in the process) at keeping that notion of "love" before us, how have we as a church been doing? Do we *honestly* believe in the true power and depth of God's extraordinary love for us?

Recently I read,
HATE AND RAGE
ARE FOUR LETTER WORDS.
SO ARE

HOPE AND LOVE.

Do we believe that the *only* way that those four-letter words of hate and rage can be transformed are by hope and love—and not by yet more hate and rage? Do we take to heart that verse we first learned in Sunday School that talks of God's life-giving love for us?

For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but have eternal life. *John 3:16*

Love that transforms and brings new life—that's what Christianity is all about. Yet, how often we set aside the great commandment to love our neighbors (and yes, *even* our enemies!) because of hate or rage or mere indifference.

In a sermon preached in 1967, Martin Luther King, Jr. said that he was happy Jesus had not said, "Like your enemies," because there were some people that "I find pretty difficult to like... I can't like anybody who would bomb my home. I can't like anybody who would trample over me with injustices. I can't like them. I can't like anybody who threatens to kill me day in and day out."

But he could love them, he said. He was convinced that love, and not rage and hate, would be the only thing capable of appealing to the heart and conscience of the enemy. And then he added, "Hate is injurious to the hater as well as the hated. Hate is too great a burden to bear."

As we enter this Lenten season, we are aware once again that we have not loved the Lord our God with all our hearts, that we have not loved our neighbors and that we have not love our enemies. We, who claim to be a people of love, have fallen short. And so we gather in worship on February 12 to confess our brokenness. We come together on Ash Wednesday to confess that we have not embodied God's love in all that we do. And, as we begin our Lenten journey, we hear again how God's love breaks into our lives, bringing us the word of hope we are so hungry for.

May God's Spirit of love transform us in new ways during this Lenten season. I hope to see you in church! Let's be a part of this journey together.





ELCA Churches Welcome "Secret Visitors"

How does a first-time visitor really feel at Emmaus? Are we as friendly and helpful and welcoming as we claim to be or would like to be?

Through our participation (along with about a dozen ELCA churches in the "Secret Visitor" program), we hope to learn more about how we are really perceived by those who visit our church for the first time.

The program, organized by Pastor Walter Hermanns of Holy Communion Lutheran Church, is an outgrowth of an idea sparked at last fall's Caring Evangelism classes. In those sessions, members of Emmaus joined participants from several other Lutheran church as to consider how it. is that we best listen to and tell our stories and how the gospel story intersects those individual stories. Role plays were done to show what it's like to include and exclude those who might be strangers in our midst. For example, have you ever been the "outsider" during a coffee hour conversation or as folks enter or leave church? What does that say to you about that particular community of faith? On the other hand, how comfortable are you in greeting someone you don't know?

In the Secret Visitor program, Emmaus will be assessed by at least two trained visitors from another congregation who will come to visit us during a worship service. On March 14, two members of our deacons' committee will also be trained to visit one of the other participating congregations. They will be on the lookout for all those little details that help to make a church one that welcomes strangers. This is truly a cooperative effort where we as Lutheran congregations in Racine are helping each other to see what we might not otherwise be able to discern on our own.

Let's make it a point to reach out to *all* visitors — Who knows? Maybe that stranger may not be a secret visitor after all, but one who is truly seeking a place to belong. Will that place be Emmaus? It's up to *all* of us to help make that happen.

We pray that God's Spirit touch all those who are seeking a church home and that *all* who enter our doors will be welcomed in Christ's name.



At the January 13 meeting of your church council, Amy Larsen reported that thanks to the council's determination to "first fruits" giving in the final two months of 1996, we were nearly able to meet budgeted commitments to benevolence giving. Emmaus was able to catch up from

Council OK's Kitchen Renovation

Plans are underway to begin the renovation of the northwest end of the kitchen and the adjoining storage closet to ready the area for the installation of a commercial dishwasher and garbage

disposal. In a unanimous decision at the February church council meeting, the first major stage of the project was approved. The quote of Tom Ludvigsen of Hearthside totaling Homes, \$23,417.06, was accepted as modified. Designated monies available for the project total approximately \$23,000, and only the work for

which we already have funds will be completed at this time.

Among those items included in this phase of the project are: removal of block wall between kitchen and storage area; removal of existing stack in block wall and rerouting it; plumbing for sink, disposal, dishwasher and drains; lower ceiling and install new lighting in what is now the storage area; wiring for dishwasher, exhaust fans, water heater, along with new circuits; installation of stainless table with built-in sink.

The next phase of the project will include the purchase of the

dishwasher (\$3,517.00), a disposal (\$700 has already been contributed by AAL), and electric water heater, along with any miscellaneous expenses necessary to complete the project.

The existing funds for the project are:

\$17,265.00 Designated memorials and gifts for

kitchen renovation and dishwasher \$2,374.00 Project money designated by

WELCA

\$3,300.00 Approximate surplus of insurance money after flatware has been replaced (approved by council for use on this project)

\$22,939.00 Total

Being postponed for the time being are all ceramic work, the building and installation of kitchen cabinet storage racks and the replacement of the existing kitchen lighting. Those items were included in the original bid of \$31,863.96, but have been subtracted to realize a savings of \$8,446.90.

Should anyone have questions regarding the kitchen project, they may be directed to Cheryl Dexter or Pastor Mary. Additional designated gifts are more than welcome and should be earmarked "Kitchen/Dishwasher."

Ludvigsen hopes to begin Phase I of the renovation in mid-March.


Fat, Cholesterol Contribute to Heart Attack Risk

Cardiovascular disease is the number one cause of death in our

country. Studies show that people who eat foods high in cholesterol and saturated fats have levels cholesterol higher significantly than normal. Most people with high blood cholesterol can reduce their risk of heart attack by following a cholesterol-lowering diet. Informed, healthy choices can reverse the effects of



- 1.) Control your intake of cholesterol-rich foods. Use as many egg whites as you want, but limit yourself to three of four yolks a week (including those used for cooking and baking).
- 2.) Control the amount and type of fat you eat. Eat lean meat, fish, and poultry, limiting yourself to six ounces a day (trim the fat). Substitute vegetable proteins, such as beans and peas, for animal proteins whenever you can. Avoid fried foods whenever possible and use alternative cooking methods such as broiling or roasting. Limit the amount of fatty meats (sausages, luncheon meats) and cheeses you eat. Use liquid vegetable oils and margarine low in saturated fat

instead of butter or other solid cooking fats. Use skim or low-fat milk instead of whole milk. Also watch out for rich

desserts or recipes that are cream or cheese based.

The church season of Lent is a time of reflection on our lives as we seek to lead them in a God-pleasing way. If some of these diet changes seem hard for you, remember the sacrifice our Lord and Savior made for us. May your Lenten walk be blessed as we look forward to the Joys of Easter.





In 1996, agencies we support, like Lutheran World Relief and Lutheran World Federation, were able to use your gifts to give emergency disaster help in places like Liberia, Burundi, India, Chechnya, Sudan, Angola, Rwanda, China, Gaza, Costa

Rica, Zaïre, and many other places.

More important, those same agencies continue to promote self-help programs like agricultural development, safe water supplies, micro enterprises, literacy training, health care (including family planning) and assistance with education and the environment. Peace-making and landmine awareness and removal will continue to be strong emphases in 1997.

WINTER STORMS UPDATE: Severe winter weather affects several areas

Upper Midwestern States

Record snowstorms have affected Minnesota, North Dakota and South Dakota since the middle of November. Extreme cold with very high winds resulting in drifts of up to 14 feet have kept many people (especially the elderly) confined to their homes. Church officials report that isolation has caused depression and increased family abuse. Tens of thousands of cattle have died, causing severe hardships for already economically stressed ranchers and farmers. The difficulty in delivery and higher cost of heating fuels have worked great hardship on low-income people, including those on several Indian reservations. Many fear that spring melting of the massive amount of snow will create widespread flooding of homes and farmland.

Pacific Western States

Record Christmas snows paralyzed the Pacific Northwest followed by massive rains in northern California, Nevada and Idaho. These rains flooded businesses, thousands of homes and tens of thousands of acres of farmland. Mudslides have inundated roads, homes and buildings.

ELCA Responds

Through our network of social ministry organizations, LSS's of Northern California, Washington and Idaho, Minnesota, North Dakota and South Dakota, the ELCA Domestic Disaster Response has granted emergency funds and provided disaster response consultants to help plan local response. Our ability to help depends on the response of our members and friends.

A Faith Worth Sharing

From:

Dear Disciples of Emmaus,

There's an old joke that goes like this:

What do you get when you cross a Lutheran with a Jehovah's Witness? Answer: Someone who knocks on doors and doesn't say anything.

I've gotten more than a few chuckles over the years with this one.

Believe it or not, though, I'd actually like to take it seriously for just a few moments. Why do we so often hesitate to share our faith when the Jehovah's Witnesses don't? Obviously, we've all been turned off by their tactics: knocking on doors and interrupting someone's privacy. And also by their theology: which uses the end-of-the-world

sort of apocalypse to scare people into believing. I think that we are right to be turned off on both accounts.

But there are at least two qualities to their sharing that I think it worth reflecting on. One is their sense of urgency, which is a quality that the early Christians seemed to have, as well. If we read Peter's and Paul's sermons in Acts, for instance, they give a sense of urgency in calling people to repent, without resorting to the end-ofthe-world scare tactics of the Jehovah's Witnesses. Many people at least sense a dark, foreboding quality to the times we now live in. Even if we aren't apocalyptic about it, we have a sense that things need to drastically change in our world. What prevents us from

sharing with a sense of urgency that we have an answer?

That brings me to the second quality of the Jehovah's Witnesses: they are convinced that they have *the* answer to the world's problems. Are we so confident? Or is that why we are reluctant to share our faith with others, namely, that we're not sure our answer is better than anyone else's?

Now, these are dangerous questions. For we are certainly aware of the ways in which confident religious folks have used the answer to browbeat others. We're even more sensitive to the ways in which single-minded Christians of the past have even killed others for not believing in our answer. Such violence

can never be the answer for the violence we currently face in our world.

But have we let those ghosts of the past shame us into being too timid when it comes to sharing our faith? More pointedly: have we let our tolerance of other faiths bring us to the point of lack of confidence in our own? I need to be careful here, because I don't want to backtrack on tolerance and openness to other faiths. I simply want to ask: Have we done so to the point of losing faith in our own?

I know a person who was involved in Buddhist-Christian dialogues, in which two of the Buddhist priests got up and walked out after a

short time. When asked why, they responded, "All you Christians do is apologize for your religion; we'd like to talk to someone who really believes it."

Could it be, then, that the average Christian is hesitant to share their faith because we are not sure that our faith provides an answer that's better than the next person's? I often hear people say, "We all worship the same God." There's some truth to this statement, but there is also the age-old Christian claim that the God we come to know in Jesus Christ gives us a unique insight into who God is. This includes a claim to special insight into God's plan of salvation, God's answers to the mess we may find ourselves in. My main purpose here is to simply seriously raise the question: Have we let go of these claims too much? Is the infrequency of sharing our faith due to the fact that we are no longer confident that our Christian faith provides better answers to the world's problems?

I can't pretend to have the answers to these questions. Rather, I'd like to close with an invitation. A friend of mine, Gil Bailie, will be visiting the Siena Center this month, March 20, 7:00 p.m. He will give a "Violence presentation entitled Unveiled: The Gospel at Work in History." As the title indicates, he definitely believes that the Gospel of Iesus Christ can and does make a difference in this world, a difference worth sharing. (Cost is \$10 before March 14 and \$15 after. Registration forms can be obtained at church; ask me.) And I can add a personal invitation: if these questions interest you, I'd love to talk with you further. Give me a call; let's get together.

Emmaus to Modernize 10:30 Worship

The Worship & Music Task Force is recommending that we move toward changing the format of the 10:30 a.m. Sunday weekly worship to have a more contemporary flavor, particularly in its music. The formats for the

Saturday evening and 8:00 a.m. Sunday services would continue as they currently are.

The schedule for the proposed changes is suggested as follows:

- try the new worship style at the 10:30 services in May;
- resume the present pattern of worship in the summer, with cottage meetings held to give the opportunity for your feedback (and continue learning smaller pieces of new liturgies);
- If all seems ready for the change, move permanently to the new format at the 10:30 a.m. worship in the fall.

What kind of changes are we talking about? Primarily, it is one of instrumentation and musical style. In place of the organ as the featured instrument, we would use piano, as well as other instruments such as guitars, flutes, drums, strings, etc. Basically, it would be similar to the Chicago Folk Service, though with greater variety

from week to week. And speaking of the Chicago Folk Service, we would plan on keeping it in its present third Sunday of the month schedule. Another proposed supplement to worship is more regular use of chancel

drama.

The move to a new style of music in worship requires the purchase of a new hymnal. The Evangelical Lutheran Church in America has recently published With One Voice as a hymnal to facilitate precisely these kinds of changes. The Worship & Music

Committee has suggested we purchase 120 copies of WOV (see sponsorship form in this Visitor). The ELCA has also published all their liturgies, including those in our current green hymnal, on CD-ROM computer disk so that elements of the liturg; can easily be printed directly into weekly bulletins. Special donations have enabled Emmaus to purchase these disk versions. This means that we can learn new songs one at a time without getting lost in a shuffle of hymnals, by printing the entire liturgy in the bulletin.

This will be an exciting time for Emmaus, as we seek to keep our traditional substance while also making moves designed to better reach out to our unchurched neighbors. We hope that it will mean growth and increased participation in this ministry we share in Christ's name.

With One Voice offers a broad diversity of musical styles in its hymn and service music collection. From Bach to jazz, folk to global, traditional hymns to spirituals, and chant to gospel, this collection encourages the church to sing—with one voice—the many songs that are gathered from its various histories, cultures, and people. Community Meal Program Marks 16 Years of Service

What is the Community Meal Program? It is a free meal, open to anyone. No one is excluded as long as they want to come and share what is offered. There is no cost, although participants may make a donation. (There is no pressure to do this.)

In January, 1981, Father Don Richards, of St. Patrick's Catholic Church, sent a letter to various Churches in the Community who had expressed an interest in helping with a

Community Meal Program to be served from St. Patrick's Church here. The meal would be served one night a week, on the same night each week.

The menu would consist of a casserole, salad and dessert. All groups could decide on the casserole they wanted to serve and would use the same recipe each month to simplify serving.

Set-up, serving, clean-up, beverage, bread, butter, vegetable would be provided by St. Patrick's and by donations.

The first meals were served at the end of April of 1981 with five churches, including Emmaus, in the program. At the present time there are fourteen churches involved and we serve only every other month on the first Thursday of the month. The numbers of meals served each Thursday of the year has been as high as 500 and as low as 50.

At the end of April this year, the Community Meal Program will have been in operation for sixteen years. It has grown from only Thursday night to seven nights a week at six other

locations besides St. Patrick's. St. Andrew Lutheran and Emmaus provide the casserole, jello and cake on the first Thursday every other month. St. Patrick's still provides the vegetable, bread, butter and beverage every week

in addition to their dedicated crew of volunteers who set up tables and chairs, help serve the meal and do the clean-up.

This program has been a blessing to those who, for whatever

reason, find themselves in need of a good hot meal. It could not have been such a success without the dedication of the church women who prepare the food to be served. We thank all who are willing to share in this program.

Community Meal Recipe

Ingredients:

2 lbs. ground beef Onion (chopped, diced or grated) Salt and pepper 11/2 lbs. french cut green beans (frozen) 2 cans of cream of chicken or cream of mushroom soup 11/2 lbs, tater tots

Brown the beef, onion, salt and pepper and put in the bottom of a 9"x13" pan.

Sprinkle the green beans over the meat. Pour both cans of soup over the beans.

Spread the tater tots over the top of the whole thing.

Bake at 350° for 45 minutes.



Parish Nurse Corner

Take Steps to a Healthy Heart

by Carol Eschmann, RN

Atherosclerosis, or "hardening of the arteries," is a condition that narrows the arteries so less blood flows through the vessels. However, this can be slowed down by the following measures:

- Stop smoking. "Never too late to stop!" Smoking makes the heart beat faster and narrows the blood vessels.
- Control high blood pressure. "The Silent Killer." Your heart
 works harder to pump blood
 through the blood vessels,
 causing stress and strain on your
 arteries.
- Reduce saturated fats and cholesterol in diet. This clogs the arteries. Limit fatty meats, whole milk products, and egg volks.
- Control weight. Being overweight can raise your blood pressure and blood fat levels. It makes your heart work harder.

Aim to lose ½ to 1½ pounds weekly.

- Regular exercise. This helps blood circulate and relieves tension. Pick and exercise you like and can do year-round.
- Regular rest and relaxation. Stress can make your heart beat faster and raise your blood pressure. Do what you enjoy.
- Regular medical check-ups. Find out if you have diabetes, high blood pressure, or problems that may lead to a heart attack.
- Check with your doctor or nurse before starting any weight loss or exercise program!



Respite Care Offers Child Care Program

What is Respite? Respite is short-term, temporary care provided for persons with disabilities in order that their families can be relieved from the daily routine of caregiving. Respite can include day hours as well as night hours or overnight stays for an extended period of time. The Child Care Resource and Referral Services Respite Care Program will serve families who have children with special needs, ages birth to 18 years.

Who needs Respite? Families who have children with special needs are in need of respite services. Children haveing special needs are defined as those children who are physically, mentally, emotionally or behaviorally challenged. Therapists, school, hospital, and agency personnel, clergy, and parents have seen the extreme need for respite child care and the lack of services available in our community.

Parents will work out payment with their respite provider and pay that provider directly. Parents will receive referrals to respite care providers, information about the respite providers, community resource information, and service evaluation forms.

Respite providers will receive initial respite training course, referrals

to families in need, sample cost sheets, information, medical and emergency forms, technical assistance upon request, parent evaluations of the respite care provided, information about continuing education training, links with community resources that will enhance their cares, and follow-up.


Change ... and Constancy

a word from our

This past month I was privileged to attend the funeral service for Martha Kaprelian, mother of Michele Kreimer. At that service her life was celebrated; it was a celebration of her positive attitude and the care and love she consistently showed family and friends, a celebration of her faith in God and a celebration of the new life she now knows on the other side of death.

While I didn't understand the Armenian words which were spoken or

chanted that day, the spoken words in English at the time of the scripture reading and the homily pointed to the cross and the assurance that is ours in Jesus Christ.



What words do we use to express that message? Although Emmaus has long-time Danish roots, we no longer use the Danish language to express the Gospel message in public. I do know, however, that there are some members who still pray in their mother tongue. Since the time of Martin Luther, the Lutheran Church has made an attempt to make worship meaningful to the people in the pews by speaking the language common to the people. That for our church has meant change, sometimes painful during those times of transition, moving to what is more contemporary and understandable. In Martin Luther's time, it meant making the drastic change to German, the language of the people. The roots of my home church are Norwegian, and the early teaching and preaching there took place in the Norwegian language. Now, however, the majority of Norwegian that most of us speak is used to name our favorite foods such as lefse, krumkake and sandbakkels.

Whether our roots are Armenian, Danish, Norwegian, German or ... (you

fill in the blank), the Gospel message remains constant. Whether we use the Lutheran Book of Worship, the United Methodist Hymnal (yes, that's what we generally use on Saturday night!), the Emmaus Book of Worship with the Chicago Folk Service, or the

soon-to-be-introduced With One Voice, the message is the same. Being the Christ-centered church that we are, we have a constancy and a promise that the world is hungry for. While expression of the Gospel message may take on a different style or expression from one generation to the next, the message of hope does not waver. We hear that Easter morning proclamation, "He is risen; He is risen indeed!" and we know that we, like those women on Easter morning, are called to spread that good news - in any and every way possible, that it might be heard throughout the Yes, we are called to be a resurrection people!



Easter Means New Life for Stewardship

We often get the impression that the Easter celebration is largely about God's promise of what happens to you when you die: Jesus' resurrection means that we will also be raised. This is true. Yet Easter is also about much more than that. Namely, it is about the invitation to new life that begins right now! Today! Jesus' resurrection can bring new life to every facet of our lives.

A good witness to this reality is the choice of First Lessons during the Easter season. This is the only season of the church year that we don't read from the Old Testament. Instead, we read from the book of Acts, the history of the church's beginnings. In other words, during the Easter season we focus on the effect that Jesus' resurrection immediately made in the life of the apostles and the church's first members.

And no more evident of this is the summary of church life that we read on the Second Sunday in Easter:

Now the whole group of those who believed were of one heart and soul, and no one claimed private ownership of any possessions, but everything they owned was held in common. With great power the apostles gave their testimony to the resurrection of the Lord Jesus, and great grace was upon them all. There was not a needy person among them, for as many as owned lands or houses sold them and brought the proceeds of what was sold. They laid it at the apostles' feet, and it was distributed to each as any had need. (Acts 4:32-35)

Wow! Isn't that amazing?! Preaching the resurrection with power moved the early Christians to share all their possessions!

Another way to see this passage is that Easter made a dramatic difference in each person's stewardship. They were moved beyond their rivalries to a sharing with one another that went far beyond generosity. In modern times, we have been tempted to call this an instance of Christian "communism." But that is not a fair label, since the modern, atheistic examples of Communism failed so miserably. What is most helpful to me about this passage is to see how the early Christians' experience of Christ's resurrection made such a difference in their everyday living.

That difference is highlighted by recalling the stories of the apostles before Jesus' death and resurrection: they were a cowardly band of folks who fought with each other a lot. There are numerous stories of the disciples arguing about who was the greatest; they seemed like a hive buzzing with constant competition and rivalry. Yet their experience of the risen Jesus changed all that dramatically. It had to have, in order for them to begin sharing all their possessions in common. They had to put away their rivalries and begin living in cooperation with mutual support. The difference between before and after the resurrection could hardly have been more drastic.

So what does that mean for you and me? We live in a modern economic climate that would seem to fit the description: "a hive buzzing with constant competition and rivalry." Don't we? And what does it get us? Frustration? Stress? Dis-ease? Resentment? Fighting? Easter means the offer of new life today. And that includes our stewardship of resources in a way that can help get us out from under all those rivalries. It means a generous sharing of our resources with others. And it means replacing the "fruits" of this world—frustration, stress, dis-ease, resentment, fighting—with the fruits of the Spirit: "love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control (Gal. 5:22-23)." We can begin to live this new life in down-toearth ways, such as the way in which we each support our common life and ministry together at Emmaus.

Subsequent monthly issues of the "Stewardship News" will focus on specific areas of our ministry. Each of the committees will have the opportunity to highlight what's going on with their area of responsibility. With this year-round approach to stewardship, we hope to get away from stewardship seen as solely a 'budget-watch.' It may be useful at times to track how our offerings are keeping up with the budget plan. But that budget is ultimately about supporting the ministry we share together. Thus, these monthly newsletters will seek to help us to keep track of our ministry, not just our budget.

Capital Funds Task Force Meets

The Capital Funds Task Force, recently commissioned by a motion of the Church Council, met for the first time on April 22. The Task Force is being cochaired by John Knuteson and Ken Pechman, with help from Lyle Christensen, Jim Dougall, and Mildred Schroth; Pastor Paul is also sitting in as an *ex officio* member.

The first action of the group was to make clear its mission: namely, to help raise funds to reduce the debt by focusing donations on making *extra* principal payments only. These funds are not to be used for making the regular monthly mortgage payments. With the simple

and direct mission of reducing the interest we pay to our lender—so that we can use our gifts for ministry instead!—the Task Force hopes to complete its pledge drive by the end of this summer. The committee looks forward to working with the congregation toward a fruitful achievement of its goals. Watch for further details.


Emmaus Keeps "First Fruits" Commitment to Benevolences

At its October 14, 1996 meeting, the Emmaus Church Council renewed its 1994 commitment to a "first fruits" approach to paying benevolences. "First fruits" describes a style of giving that places "outreach" giving above all other financial commitments. Our Greater Milwaukee Synod, for example, practices "first fruits" giving by sending 61% of its income immediately on to the ELCA, and paying its other bills and commitments second. Many members of Emmaus practice "first fruits" giving by writing their church offering checks first, even if there is not enough left over to pay all the remaining bills.

We are pleased to report that, in the six months since making that decision, Emmaus has been able to faithfully follow the practice of writing weekly checks for benevolence based on the previous week's income. Thank you for your continuing support that has enabled us to keep all our commitments!

Parish Nurse Corner

Treat Your Body Right When Traveling

Spring is here, and summer will soon follow. For many of us, summertime is vacation time. Sitting for long periods when traveling can cause swollen ankles and calves. This inactivity also increases your risk for the formation of blood clots in the veins of your legs. Signs and symptoms of a clot in your leg may include sudden swelling, possibly accompanied by pain and discoloration.

To prevent a blood clot from developing:

- ▼ Move about Stop every two hours and walk around for a few minutes.
- ▼ Stretch your legs Frequently flex your ankles or press your feet against the seat in front of you. This promotes circulation.
- ▼ Check with your doctor to see if you should be wearing support stockings. If you wear support stockings, be sure you are putting them on properly.
- ▼ Avoid alcohol alcohol promotes dehydration, which can further increase your risk for a blood clot.

If you are traveling with young children, you will need to plan to stop frequently to "get the wiggles out!"

When our children were small, and we were traveling long distances, we planned to stop at a lake or community pool to swim for one hour and eat lunch. It made the trip easier and more enjoyable for everyone. It is also fun to take along a tape of favorite songs and sing with the children. You can also play many car games.

Remember whenever you are in the car, all persons should be in appropriate car seats or safety belts.

When you are traveling over a weekend, remember to worship wherever you are.



SPRING STORMS AND FLOODS DEVASTATE WIDE AREA

Ohio River Causes Record Destruction
The Great Ohio River Flood of 1997
inundated communities from Wheeling,
W. Va., to Cairo, Ill., leaving a wide
path of destruction and a thick layer
of mud. Federal disaster declarations
were made in West Virginia, Ohio,
Kentucky and Indiana.

The flood waters have receded. The media attention has disappeared, but the heard-breakingly slow job of rebuilding homes communities and livelihoods will continue for a long time. Your support of the ELCA Domestic Disaster Response will assure that we will stay with the people in their struggle.

Record Minnesota and Dakota Storms Produce Floods

Heavy April snow, vicious wind-driven rain and ice storms added to the misery of a winter of record snows. Nearly 120 inches of snow fell during the winter in Fargo, N.D. Dozens of communities went without electricity for many days. Residents of Granite Falls and Montevideo, Minn., had to evacuate people from flooded

homes in the midst of a heavy snowstorm. In Ada, Minn., one of many flooded Red River Valley communities, nearly 80 percent of the residents had to be evacuated from their homes.

Your help is needed to assist and encourage people who have fought a long discouraging battle and who fear their communities will never be the same. The agricultural communities are wondering whether they will be able to recover from their losses (especially from the uninsured winter loss of more than 100,000 cattle).

Changing Worship: A Test for Love

Dear Disciples of Emmaus,

I'd like to begin with a joke again this month:

Q: What's the difference between a liturgist and a terrorist?

A: You can negotiate with a terrorist.

This joke pokes fun at the inflexibility of those experts charged with leading us in worship. They have a reputation of sticking with the tradition and not being open to the diversity of culture around them.

But I heard this joke at the Institute of Liturgical Studies at Valparaiso University a couple weeks ago. The liturgists were poking fun at themselves!

They have come to the point that they realize they must change with the times or the church will suffer for it.

One of those liturgists, the professor of worship at our Lutheran Seminary in Chicago, confessed that everything has changed for him in the last ten years. That's how long it has been since he was asked to participate in a study on worship and culture by the Lutheran World Federation. Traveling to many corners of the globe, he has been forced to re-evaluate his own ideas about Christian worship. He confessed that he no longer holds tightly to the notions he previously held. Mostly, these last ten years have taught him to ask good questions and to listen.

That seems like a good strategy here at Emmaus over the coming months, as we seek to make some changes in our worship. It will serve us well to ask good questions of one another and to listen with care.

Part of the difficulty lies in the fact that worship is so closely tied to music, and music involves personal tastes. We can become embroiled in arguments over taste in music. One of our speakers led us in exercises of listening to different kinds of music. At one point, he played a Bach cantata and asked how it made us feel. The responses were all over the map, from joyful and triumphant to put asleep. He pointed out that what we are used to

listening to makes a big difference. A fan of classical music might feel uplifted by Bach, while a regular listener to heavy metal rock might find it terribly bland or too

serene. He thus counseled the same thing to us: listen to one another. Taste in music is not completely relative, but it is dependent on our personal processes of perceiving such things. Each of us comes to hear and perceive such things as music differently. This often brings occasions for disagreement. But there is another possibility: since it involves telling someone how we come to perceive things, we can use discussions about taste in music to get to know one another better, bringing us closer together instead of driving us farther apart.

It all comes down to the message of our epistle lessons during this Easter season. The First Letter of John boils it all down to love:

Beloved, since God loved us so much, we also ought to love one another. No one has ever seen God; if we love one another, God lives in us, and his love is perfected in us. By this we know that we abide in him and he in us, because he has given us of his Spirit. We love because he first loved us. (1 John 4:11-13, 19)

Making adjustments in, or

varying, something we care about a lot, like the music in our worship, can bring the temptation to fight, or for feelings of hurt and resentment. In other words, it can be the occasion for testing that spirit of God's love abiding in us! I am confident in that love among us at Emmaus. I believe this crucial time of varying our worship to reach out to others will bring us closer together.



Parish Nurse Corner

Have Fun in the Sun, But Don't Get Burned

Soon, we hope, our Wisconsin weather will be warm enough for summer outdoor activities. Some of you may participate in outdoor sports, others work in the garden, and still others spend time at the beach. Whatever summer activities you choose, I hope that you will remember to protect your skin from the harsh effects of the sun. Wrinkles, drooping, sagging, brown spots, and skin cancer are all preventable with proper protection.

Some people, however, are at more risk than others. Those with fair skin are at highest risk, especially those with blond or red hair who freckle and who sunburn easily. It is never to late to take extra care in the sun.

Avoid midday sun, especially between 10 a.m. and 5 p.m., when sunburn risk is greatest. Protect exposed skin by applying a waterproof sunscreen with a sun protection factor (SPF) of 15 or

higher. Choose a product that protects you against both ultraviolet and b radiation. It is best to apply sunscreen about an hour before sun exposure. Don't forget your ears, the tops of your feet, or the part in your hair (however wide it may be).

Wear protective clothing-wide brimmed long-sleeved hats, shirts-and sunglasses to protect the eyes from sun damage that can

contribute to the formation of cataracts.

Avoid tanning parlors. The Food U.S. and Administration says that a half hour under a tanning lamp is as bad as a half hour in the bright sun at high noon.

Check with your physician or pharmacist to see if you need to take extra precautions in the sun because of your medications.

Examine your skin regularly for signs of skin cancer. Lesions most frequently appear on parts of the body not unually protected by clothing. If there are suspicious changes-in color, size, shape or quality-consult your doctor or dermatologist.



The Pastors' Column

What's On Your Mind?

Mary's Column

Do you have a gripe? Do you have an idea? Do you have a concern? Do you have a word of affirmation?

How is that best expressed?

We, your pastors, appreciate hearing all of the above *from you* directly, rather than through the grapevine. It's a sign of health when we can speak openly and share mutual

concerns with one another as loving members of the body of Christ.

While we pray daily for the discernment of the Holy Spirit in all that we say and do as we provide pastoral leadership for Emmaus, we don't always know what is on your hearts and minds.

Sometimes we catch bits and pieces in the narthex before or after a worship service, but there are times when we realize we can't or don't give you all the time you might want and deserve, especially if a worship service is about to begin or if others nearby prevent a private or extended conversation from being possible. If there are times we have seemed preoccupied or in a rush, we apologize.

To facilitate more open, extended conversations with you, we make the following suggestions:

1.) Early/mid morning (8:30-10:30), it is generally easiest to reach both of us at home. That time is spent organizing and planning for the day ahead, taking time for prayer and for study, taking time for correspondence and other writing and connecting with people by phone.

2.) Late morning (10:30-12:30) —

depending upon hospital visitations, scheduled meetings or other appointments, it is *generally* the time when we can be found in the office. While you are always welcome to simply drop in, there are times when it might help in our planning and yours if you give us a call ahead of time. Calling to see if one of us will be available

doesn't necessarily mean that you have something serious or controversial or heavy to discuss — maybe you'd simply like to stop to chat and catch up and have more than a "quick narthex conversation."

We welcome that!

3.) Afternoon or evening appointments in

your home or at the church are also welcomed. Generally, mid to late afternoon works the best for us, as hospital or other visits tend to be earlier in the afternoon. Evening times need to be scheduled around our meeting schedules. (Some Mondays and Tuesdays are the evenings we tend to be most available.)

- 4.) When one pastor has the day off (Pastor Paul is off on Thursday and Pastor Mary is off on Friday), the other pastor is available. Pastor Paul will be on vacation June 19 to July 2; Pastor Mary will be away June 10-16 and July 10-20.
- 5.) If we can't be located immediately, contact both the church office (634-5515 from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m., Monday-Friday) and leave a message on our home answering machines.

6.) In case of an emergency or a crisis, CALL EITHER OF US AT ANY HOUR, ANY DAY OF THE WEEK. (Pastor Paul: 637-0671; Pastor Mary: 633-3059.)

7.) We appreciate knowing about your concerns, including *upcoming medical tests*, *surgeries*, *and treatments*. We are able to include you and your needs in our prayers and to provide pastoral support to you and family members when we are aware of your situation.

We both work hard at keeping a balance between planning our time and being flexible to meet needs that arise unexpectedly, and we realize that one of us often provides "behind the scenes" support for the other who may have been called out for a special pastoral need. That works both ways, and we know we can count on one another to provide that back-up support. Often what we do is of a confidential nature and we might not be at liberty to explain why we have to miss a meeting

or reschedule an appointment. We appreciate your understanding when that does occur.

In summary, we want to be part of a congregation where there is open, honest conversation and where you feel you can trust us and count on us. We hope that this is mutual and that we can continue to work together to communicate in the healthiest ways possible. That requires listening, time, as well as being direct and open. We pledge that to you and ask you for the same in return.

As your pastors, we celebrate who you are as members of this congregation and we covet your prayers and support as we *all* join together, upheld by the guidance, counsel and comfort of the Spirit. May this season of Pentecost be one of life and growth for Emmaus!







Synod Assembly Urges Compromise to "Full Communion" with Protestant Church Bodies

Cathy Knuteson, Lyle Zielke, Pastor Mary and Pastor Paul represented Emmaus at the annual assembly of the Greater Milwaukee Synod of the ELCA at Carthage College May 29-31.

Youth and the emerging generation were the theme of the assembly; keynote speaker Kris Capel is, at age 23, the youngest person ever to deliver the keynote address at a GMS assembly.

The assembly took up the issue of the ELCA's proposal to enter into "full communion" with the Episcopal, and Reformed (Prebyterian, Reformed Church in America, and United Church of Christ) churches, and to approve a Joint Declaration on the Doctrine of Justification with the Roman Catholic Church. The three separate proposals will be voted on by the ELCA churchwide assembly in Philadelphia in August.

The assembly passed a resolution urging the churchwide assembly to "affirm the Episcopal Church, the Reformed Church in America, the

Presbyterian Church (USA), and the United Church of Christ as members with us in the 'one holy catholic and apostolic church," to "declare sacramental hospitality" with these other churches, and to accept as valid ordinations of ministers in these churches. This compromise proposal, offered by Bishop Peter Rogness, ecumenical representative Jim Stein, and several clergy deans stops short of endorsing the "full communion" proposals, but would mean that the named churches would recognize baptisms performed by one of the other churches, and communicants from one church would be welcome to partake of the sacrament of Holy Communion at any of the other churches.

The full communion proposal has been approved at the national level by the other protestant denominations involved.

Council Addresses Members' Concerns

At the June 9 meeting of your church council, the "Secret Visitors" from Lutheran Church of the Resurrection reported on their visit to Emmaus' worship service on June 1. Their report was generally favorable, with our highest ratings given in the warmth with which they were greeted before and after the service. They noted, however, that since Emmaus' services are not advertised in the Saturday Journal Times, they would not have found Emmaus had they not been specifically sent here.

The council discussed apparent communication problems and recommended that during the time the pastors are working at their home offices, the secretary direct calls to their respective home phone numbers.

Stewardship chair Peter Bayer reported that Emmaus will use a different weekly offering envelope in 1998. The envelope will offer a mail-in feature.

Building and Grounds chair Bill Irvine informed the council that the



entire lawn was fertilized in May, and the parsonage back lawn was seeded. Al Svendsen and

Adam Pechman will re-side the utility garage; Adam's volunteer work will be applied toward a Boy Scout merit badge.

Congregational Life chair Ellen Nuechterlein reported that her committee plans to host a congregational picnic to launch the 2001 Faith Odyssey compaign. AAL Night at the Brewers will be August 22, for the 7:00 p.m. game against the Detroit Tigers.

Mission Interpreter Program of the ELCA: ECUMENICAL MINISTRIES are life-changing

n August, our ELCA Churchwide
Assembly will consider three very
important ecumenical proposals: the
Concordat of Agreement with the Episcopal
Church; the Formula of Agreement with the
Presbyterian Church-USA, the Reformed
Church in America, and the United Church
of Christ; and a Joint Declaration on the
Doctrine of Justification with the Roman
Catholic Church.

All three proposals are motivated by our understanding that we are joined together with all Christians to be Christ's mission in the world. When we look at Scripture, we see that in Jesus' high priestly prayer for the unity of the church: "that they may all be one. As you, Father, are in me and I am in you, may they also be in us, so that the world may believe that you have sent me." —John 17:1

The ELCA Constitution states that we seek in faith and life "to manifest the unity given to the people of God by living together in the love of Christ and by joining with other Christians in prayer and action to express and preserve the unity with the Spirit gives." Thus we reach out to discover the unity that is ours in Jesus Christ and attempting to make that unity more visible to the world.

ELCA-Reformed Churches

The Formula for Agreement with the Reformed Churches is the product of nearly 35 years of official discussions. It proposes that we enter into Full Communion on the basis of seven points of action:

 That we recognize each other as churches in which the Gospel is rightly

- preached and the sacraments rightly administered according to the Word of God;
- that we withdraw any historic condemnation by one side or the other as inappropriate for the faith and life of our churches today;
- that we continue to recognize each other's Baptism and authorize and encourage the sharing of the Lord's Supper among our members;
- that we recognize each other's various ministries and make provision for the orderly exchange of ordained ministers of Word and Sacrament:
- that we establish appropriate channels of consultation and decision-making within the existing structures of the churches;
- that we commit ourselves to an ongoing process of theological dialogue in order to clarify further the common understanding of the faith and foster its common expression in evangelism, witness, and service;
- that we pledge ourselves to living together under the Gospel in such a way that the principle of mutual affirmation and admonition becomes the basis of a trusting relationship in which respect and love for the other will have a chance to grow.

ELCA-Episcopal Church

The Concordat of Agreement with the Episcopal Church is the result of dialogues begun in 1969. It asks both churches to recognize in each other the essentials of one catholic and apostolic faith; to

acknowledge that one another's odained ministries are given by God to be instruments of God's grace; that the threefold ministry of bishops, presbyters, and deacons in historic succession will be the future pattern of the one ordained ministry of Word and Sacrament; and that on an invariable basis at least three bishops of each other's churches will be present for the installation/ordination of new bishops of the two churches.

The Concordat asks the Episcopal Church to recognize the full authenticity of the ELCA's currently ordained ministries; to begin a temporary suspension of the 17th Century restriction that "no persons are allowed to exercise the offices of bishop, priest, or deacon in [the Episcopal] church unless they are ordained by Bishops in the Historic Episcopate"; and to endorse the Lutheran affirmation that the historic catholic episcopate under the Word of God must always serve the Gospel, and that the ultimate authoriay under which bishops preach and teach is the Gospel itself.

The Concordat asks the ELCA:

- to agree that all bishops will be understood to be installed/ordained for life service of the Gospel, even though their tenure in office may be terminated by retirement, resignation, or conclusion of elected term:
- to revise our rite for Installation of a Bishop to incorporate the participation of Lutheran and Episcopal bishops in prayer and the laying on of hands;
- to make constitutional and liturgical provision that only bishops shall ordain clergy;
- and to begin a process so that ordained ministers of the Episcopal Church not be required for ordination to subscribe

to the Augsburg Confession and the other Confessional writings of the *Book of Concord* so that there might be full interchangeability and reciprocity of bishops, pastors, and deacons between the churches.

The Concordat also calls for joint planning for mission, a joined ecumenical /doctrinal/liturgical commission, and ongoing consultation with one another.


ELCA-Roman Catholic Church

The Joint Declaration on the Doctrine of Justification is a proposed international statement developed jointly by Lutherans and Roman Catholics over the course of many years. The subject has its roots in the 16th Century Lutheran Reformation, when Lutherans and Roman Catholics issued condemnations toward each other on the teaching of justification.

The Lutheran World Federation has asked that its member churches consider this proposal. If a positive Lutheran consensus is found through the responses of the 122 member churches, and if the Vatican formally affirms the statement, both parties could acknowledge that the condemnations of the 16th Century no longer apply. This would represent a major ecumenical step on the eve of a new millenium!

In the words of the statement, gratitude to God can be expressed "for this decisive step forward on the way to overcoming" past divisions and for seeking to reflect more visible unity.





School kits are a way to tell




children whose lives have been disrupted by war natural disaster that far someone away cares about them. Adults in literacy classes also appreciate

the supplies needed to learn reading and writing.

Each school kit should contain:

- Pads or notebooks of 100-150 sheets of ruled paper approximately 81/2"x11".
- One blunt scissors. The "safety" scissors with imbedded steel blades are an excellent choice.
- One 30-cm (12") metric ruler (very few countries measure in inches).
- One pencil sharpener.
- Six new pencils with erasers.



- One eraser about 21/2" long.
- 12 sheets of construction paper in assorted colors.
- One box of 8, 16, or 24 crayons.
- One cloth bag about 12"x14" with cloth handles. Pack all the items in the bag, fold the handles over, and secure

with two large rubber bands if you wish.

Health Kits

Clean hands, good grooming, bright and shining smiles—you can help bring them about through the gift of health kits. Each kit should contain:

- One hand towel.
- One washcloth.
- One bath-size bar of any brand of soap.
- One toothbrush
- One 5-7 oz. tube of toothpaste.
- One comb.
- One metal nail file, or nail clippers with file attached.
- Six bandages, preferably 1/2-3/4".

Wrap all the smaller items in the towel, or pack in a zip-lock plastic bag. Tie securely with ribbons or varn.

High Blood Pressure Can Be Too Much of a Good Thing

Many of you have asked what the numbers in your blood pressure

mean. Your blood pressure reading is an important indication of your health. Everyone has blood pressure. Without it, the blood couldn't circulate in our bodies. In all human beings, blood pressure varies from day to day and from moment to moment.

Blood pressure is the force that the blood exerts on the walls of the blood vessels. The heart,

acting as a pump, forces blood through the body's blood vessels and causes blood pressure. When the heart beats, the blood goes into the arteries under pressure.

There is an "upper" and a "lower" blood pressure. The "upper" blood pressure is called the systolic blood pressure. The "lower" blood pressure is called the diastolic blood pressure. The top number (the systolic blood pressure) is the pressure of the blood in the arteries when the heart beats. Normal systolic blood pressures range from 120 to 140. The bottom number (the diastolic blood pressure) is the pressure of the blood in the arteries when the heart is at rest between beats. Normal diastolic blood pressures range from 60 to 90. The more difficult it is for the blood to flow through your arteries, the higher the numbers.

High blood pressure is also called hypertension. Hypertension cannot be cured, but it can be controlled. Uncontrolled high blood pressure adds

> to the workload of the heart and arteries. The heart, forced to work harder than normal over a long period, has a hard time keeping up with the body's demands.

There are several factors that may contribute to high blood pressure. Some risk factors cannot

be changed. These are age, race, family history and sex. Risk factors that *can* be changed include smoking, obesity, alcohol use, and stress.

There are some things you can do to control high blood pressure. Management of risk factors that can be changed include quitting smoking, moderation of alcohol use and management of stress. Often a person with mild elevations of blood pressure can benefit by weight reduction and increase in exercise. Medications may also be prescribed by your doctor. If a person has high blood pressure, they should follow doctor's advice and stay on their medication and/or diet.

ELCA Assembly Approves Full Communion with Reformed Churches

The biennial national assembly of the ELCA approved entering into

"full communion" with the Presbyterian Church (USA), United Church of Christ, and the Reformed Church in America, known collectively as the Reformed Churches, by a vote of 839 to 193. A parallel resolution to enter into full communion with the

Episcopal Church failed by six votes to attain the two-thirds majority required for adoption.

The Reformed Churches and Episcopal Church had approved entering into full communion with each other and with the ELCA at their annual conventions earlier this year, although the regional Presbyterian church bodies must still approve it.

In reports to the assembly from the various seminaries of the ELCA, some concern had been expressed concerning full communion with the Episcopal Church on the grounds that the more hierarchical structure of the

Episcopalian Church would "drive a wedge between bishops and pastors and between clergy and laity" (Trinity Lutheran Seminary), yet no seminary opposed the proposal. The proposal was supported by most regional ELCA assemblies, save in Wisconsin, Minnesota, the

Dakotas, and parts of Washington and Idaho.

The national assembly met in Philadelphia August 17-20.



Emmaus Addresses Financial Shortfall

Since June, there has been a shortfall in weekly offerings and receipts to meet expenses, making it necessary for the council to approve withdrawal of \$1,805.62 undesignated monies in savings to cover pension and insurance payments for the pastors. In addition, at the September council meeting, the council approved using \$1,875.75 of capital improvement designated funds to pay existing bills for elevator repair work on the boiler system and replacement of an office air conditioner.

As a temporary measure to cover other immediate obligations, "Adopt-a-Bill" was posted in the narthex, providing members an opportunity to adopt one or more bills with their special gifts. The response was generous, with a total of \$938.81 being adopted!

In addition, a special gift of \$500.00 was received, and the decision was made that profits from the

September 20 rummage sale (after the women take a designated amount to be used for mission) be used to address the shortfall.

The longer term situation is also being discussed with the congregation. Everyone is encouraged to attend an informational forum at 9:15 a.m. on October 5. Invitations are also being extended to cottage meetings, where not only the financial situation, but also our dreams and visions for the mission of Emmaus will be discussed. The council has expressed their commitment to keep all lines of communication open throughout the entire process.

It is the prayer of the council and the pastors that a positive energy emerge throughout this time of conversation, discernment and commitment. As we reflect on our many blessings during this important time in the history of Emmaus, may the Spirit guide and lead us in all that we do and say!

ELCA Assembly Approves Statement on Sacraments

1,044 voting members of the ELCA met at the Churchwide Assembly of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America in Philadelphia on August 14-20. In addition to the votes on "full communion" with Reformed and Episcopal Churches reported in the September *Visitor*, the assembly also approved "The Use of the Means of Grace: A Statement on the Practice of Word and Sacrament."

The new statement provides for "the communion of the baptized," superseding an earlier ELCA guideline precluding the communing of infants. The communion policy adopted by Emmaus at our 1996 annual meeting is modeled after this newly approved ELCA statement.

Voting members elected Dr. Addie J. Butler of Philadelphia vice president of the ELCA. Dr. Butler is the first African American to hold this post, the highest office for a lay person in our church. As vice president, she will chair the Church Council, the church's highest legislative body between assemblies. She is an assistant dean at the Community College of Philadelphia and a member of the board of trustees of Lutheran Theological Seminary at Philadelphia.

The assembly established the Fund for Leaders in Mission to help students in seminaries of the ELCA pay for theological education; established that the 1999 assembly in Denver will hear a status report of conversations about church policy and practice on the ordination, consecration, or commissioning of non-celibate gay and lesbian individuals in the ELCA; and adopted a new American Indian and Alaska Native Strategic Plan that articulates the

relationship native peoples envision with the ELCA over the next five years.

What Will It Take to Make W-2 Work?

It will take a united community effort to guarantee the success of Wisconsin Works ("W-2"), the welfare reform rules in effect since September 1. You can be a part of this effort by being a Volunteer Mentor.

The Center for Community initiated has Concerns MAP-Mentoring, Advocating, and Partnering-program to build mutual relationships between mentors and young mothers. You can share your expertise with a young mother while she helps you understand her experiences with W-2. You seek solutions to the weak parts of welfare reform and applaud that which is good. Finally, together you improve the quality of life for the whole Racine community.

MAP will take a pro-active stance toward W-2. The MAP program seeks to help W-2 participants not only to meet the requirements of the legislation, but to exceed them. The MAP program will build upon the assets and strengths of W-2 participants.

A Crossroads in the Journey

Dear Disciples of Emmaus,

This month brings us to a crossroads on the odyssey of faith we share at Emmaus. We inherit 146 years of that faith odyssey already behind us and look ahead to 150 years and beyond.

What should the shape of our

ministry be? How do we effectively minister amidst not only the people of Racine, but also to the larger community as we approach the Third Millennium? How can we continue to be effective disciples of Jesus here in this time and place?

We raise these critical questions at the moment of a financial crisis for our congregation. We take very seriously the financial

situation, as we do the need to be open and honest in communication. It is our hope as your pastors that we can approach this current challenge as the spark we need to bring to light a common vision for ministry. While the cottage meetings this month could simply be a time to lament over our money woes, they can be so much more. They provide an opportunity for the kind of frank and open communication it takes to fashion a common vision for the ministry we want to support.

We your pastors firmly believe that a vision for mission that enlivens us will find the resources it needs to carry it out. In other words, if enough of us are excited about the ministry we can carry out together, then the financial support will follow. The first thing this will require is enough people to be part of the process. A handful of us getting excited about this ministry will not likely be enough. We need as many of you as possible to participate in these cottage meetings.

Secondly, we need open and frank conversation. Sometimes this

will be easy. It's easy, for example, to count our blessings together, which is something we will want to do at these meetings that will build a foundation for visioning the future as we continue to build together.

But the process of sharing a common vision can also be difficult. At such times, each of us brings different

viewpoints and passions for ministry. Each of us may have slightly different priorities. And each of us may have different ideas about how to best meet these priorities. So the task of building a common vision takes a lot of good communication. It takes speaking the truth in love. Even more importantly, it takes compassionate listening.

Good communication needs to begin with us, your called leaders. This is one of the reasons we have made the decision to be present at this year's cottage meetings, different from those in 1994 and 1995. In those previous meetings, we were still in the earlier stages of relationship building between this pastoral team and the congregation, and the decision was made that we not attend.

This year we feel that we are at the point of needing to seriously attend to the matter of shared vision for ministry, and we your pastors need to be part of that process. Not to control or dictate the process, but to be a vital part of it. We know that if the two of us try to control or dictate the process, there will be no "shared" ministry. And so we plan on doing some listening. We want to know what you think and feel. If you feel like you need to "speak the truth in love" to one or both of us, we will listen.


We also hope that you will let us lead. You have called us here to do that, and we take that responsibility seriously. Most importantly, we as pastors are called to always lift up our discipleship to Jesus, to help us all to

listen to our Lord. At whatever crossroads in our faith odyssey that we reach together, we are called to have our ministry be cross-shaped. Our Crucified and Risen Lord is here to guide us and empower us. As your pastors, we have the humbling privilege of being a living assurance that that ministry of Word and Sacrament will continue to bring a message of hope and healing to us and to this troubled world.

We hope to see you at a cottage meeting in the weeks ahead, as we reach this crossroads together and carry on this ministry into the next millennium, trusting that our Lord walks with us.

SCRIP Gift Certificates Help Emmaus

Have you heard about SCRIP? SCRIP is our latest fund-raiser for Emmaus. In involves purchasing gift certificates (for ourselves or others) from various area retailers. These retailers then donate a certain percentage of the gift certificate amount back to the church (school, scouts, or other organizations) that sold the gift certificate. Each retailer sets its own amount of donation.

For example: On Sunday, Nov. 2, Pastor Paul orders a \$10 gift certificate from Super Saver. He pays \$10.00. On Sunday, Nov. 9, Pastor Paul picks up his \$10 gift certificate from Super Saver. Emmaus gets 40¢. (SCRIP donation is 4%.)

Or: On Sunday, Nov. 2, Pastor Mary orders a \$10 gift certificate from the Olive Garden. She pays \$10.00. On Sunday, Nov. 9, Pastor Mary picks up her \$10 gift certificate from the Olive Garden. Emmaus gets \$1.30 (13%).

See how easy this is? We have a large list of area retailers to use each with varying percentages to donate to us, and varying amounts of the gift

certificates.

We will be selling SCRIP every other Sunday, with pick-up the following Sunday. A table will be available in the narthex following first service and before second service for purchase and pick-up.

Our dates through the end of the year are as follows:

Sales dates: November 2, 16, 30; December 14.

Pick-up dates: November 9 & 30; December 7 & 21.

No SCRIP: December 28.

Whether you use these certificates for yourself or for gifts (Christmas is coming!), the donations can really add up quickly. The proceeds will be used for general needs and special programs of Emmaus. We will have a special table downstairs near the Æbleskiver brunch. Stop by and see what it's all about.

Holiday Feasting Requires Exercising (Restraint)

Winter holidays are coming soon. Many of us will be indulging in rich foods, cookies, candy and other treats that come with holiday celebrations. Unless you prepare for healthful celebrations, you may enter the New Year with extra pounds. To help you plan, the Mayo Clinic Health letter offers these suggestions:

- Be realistic—the holiday season isn't the time to try to lose weight. Food is a key ingredient of the holidays, and big meals are a centerpiece of many celebrations. A reasonable goal is to maintain your current weight. You can indulge occasionally—just not all the time.
- Exercise—this is a busy time, but if you're healthy, make sure you plan for time to exercise. Exercise doesn't have to be fancy. Just taking a walk each day can burn calories and keep you fit.
- Watch your portion—at parties or big meals, it's tempting to fill your plate to overflowing. Try moderate portions instead, such as a small spoonful of potatoes or one cookie instead of three.
- Keep healthful foods on hand—fresh vegetables and fruits are healthful snacks and meal additions. They can also prevent you from

filling up on high-calorie foods. Give fat the heave ho-ho-ho—use skim milk instead of whole milk, and remove congealed fat from the top of gravies and soups. Switch to a nonfat margarine or salad dressing and eat nonfat yogurt as a snack. Or you can try reduced fat versions of your favorite recipes.

Remember, it only takes an extra 500 calories a day to gain a pound a week. By starting now, you can keep weight from creeping up on you. God has made our bodies his temple, so each of us should take good care of His gift. Some families choose to pare down their celebrations and offer time or money to those less fortunate. As each of us gives thanks for our many blessings, please remember the REST program and our local food drives.

As I count my blessings, I remember the Emmaus family as a place where faith is nurtured and hope abounds. I pray for a blessed and happy Thanksgiving for each of you.

We Are Connected: NEW DOMESTIC MISSION STARTS are life-changing

Dew Creation Church is the newest mission start in the Greater Milwaukee Synod. Pastor Sue Schubert was installed as Pastor/ Developer in mid-1994, and worship began at a local grade school in April, 1995. Pastor Jim Schubert joined Sue in 1996.

This church is an intentional outreach to those who have not been involved in a Christian community for years, if ever. Therefore, the service is fairly simple so that a person who is not used to a more formal liturgical worship style will not find that a barrier.

Casual dress is encouraged. Music is provided by Joyful Noise Band, consisting of drums, guitars, vocalists, and an electric keyboard. Music sung is Christian praise music, and the lyrics are projected on a screen in front of the worship area. The language used in the service is intentionally informal and sermons are designed to be down-to-earth, practical ways of applying Biblical truths to life.

In a two-year period, the community has slowly grown; 45 to 60 people now attend each week. During the two years New Creation has been worshiping, the demographics of Waukesha began to shift to more growth of new neighborhoods on the west and north sides. Therefore, in an effort to increase the worship and Sunday School space, as well as be invitational to the section of the community of greatest growth, in September, New Creation moved to Waukesha North High School. This fall will be an important time to determine the long-term viability of this

mission church.

New Creation has been supported by a wide prayer network, as well as financially, by many generous congregations and individuals. Also, the church has developed positions in "domestic missions" where a person or family from another congregation commits to New Creation for a year as a volunteer in a particular ministry and will then return to their home congregation with new skills and outreach experience. New Creation currently has eight people in such positions and another group of people who work with specific events.

New Creation is a church which attempts to meet people where people are living. The central focus is on basic Christianity and discipleship. All events, decisions, and gatherings are saturated with prayer.

Congregations seem to develop an identity in the community, and New Creation's identity thus far has focused on servanthood, as seen in community involvement and the caring that has been necessary for one another in the church itself. Many members are single parents living each day with much stress in their lives. Many are not financially secure, or experience themselves out on the edge of society for other reasons. For them, New Creation has been a place of acceptance, as well as a place to develop positive relationships with other people and to begin building a relationship with Jesus Christ.

A Danishborn immigrant to Racine, he started O & H Bakery in 1949; the bakery remains in the family to this day. His funeral was November 18 at Second Presbyterian Church.

Stewardship Drive Shows Some Promise

The pledges from our 1997 stewardship drive are now calculated and tallied, and although we did not reach our goal of 147 pledges (we fell short by only eleven), pledges for 1998 are approximately \$18,000 higher than a year ago. This represents an increase of 13% over 1997, or an average increase of 64¢ per envelope per week, and puts us much closer to our overall goal.

To continue with two full-time pastors and our full complement of programming, however, would require an additional \$20,000 to \$25,000 beyond the amount pledged so far. A staffing task force is being formed to put together our available resources and the opinions expressed at this fall's cottage meetings to determine where our priorities lie.

At a majority of the cottage meetings, members expressed that youth and family ministry is a priority. The pastors also see the need to "jump start" youth and family ministry rather than to "tighten our belts." To highlight and emphasize the importance of youth, hiring a youth music director and providing for other expenditures for our young people may be necessary.

1998 Income Projections

But if there isn't sufficient money for everything, what is cut? There has been discussion that each of the pastors might cut back to 75% or 80% time, making themselves available one to one and a half days each per week for other work of the ELCA churches in Racine.

At the recommendation of the pastors, church council president Cathy Knuteson is assembling a staffing task force to consider this and other possibilities. Pastor Sue Ruehle of the synod staff will be available to work with the task force. The task force will meet December 3 at 4:00 p.m.

New Mailable Offering Envelopes Issued for 1998

Sometime this month, you should receive in the mail a booklet (not box!) of offering envelopes for January-April of 1998. There will be two subsequent booklets mailed to you at the proper times later in 1998.

In addition to having the envelopes mailed to you, the other significantly new feature of your 1998 envelopes is that each one is mailable to church. Each week (or once a month, or whatever your giving habits) you will have the option of placing your offering in the plate at worship or dropping it in the mail. Or, if you forget to bring it Sunday, simply drop it in the mail on Monday!

The envelopes themselves are laid out very similarly to the last several years, but with a new space for recording 2001 Fund gifts. What is different is that the flap to close the envelope will cover over your name and

the amount(s) of your offering, leaving instead a place for a return address and a stamp. Left exposed on the bottom half of the envelope is the church's address. Cost of the envelopes to the church for these added conveniences is expected to be no more than last year's boxed envelopes.

One word of caution: as with anything going through the mail, cash should not be used when mailing your offering to Emmaus.

Are You Looking for That Perfect Gift?

In the retail world, preparations for Christmas began in October as store

workers stocked their shelves with their holiday wares. Some of us have finished shopping. but some of us have not yet begun. As we make our



selections, we search diligently for that "perfect" gift for friends and relatives.

I would like to share a few healthrelated gift ideas.

- Helmets, knee pads and elbow protectors may be good choices for those active on bicycles or roller blades.
- Bath safety appliances include grab bars, tub handles, and seats that may be used in the shower or the tub.
- Faucets in the kitchen or bath can be replaced with lever controls that may be easier to operate than the traditional turn handles.
- Larger light switches for lamps are available in hardware stores. These make turning on lights much easier for those who lack strength or dexterity in their fingers.
- Velcro closures may be easily added to clothing so that persons with limited motion or strength can dress more easily. some catalogs also carry indoor and outdoor clothing with Velcro closures.
- A good stocking stuffer might be

a coupon good for time spent with someone you love. Perhaps a weekly shopping trip, or a trip to the library. consider offering someone a regular ride to church as a Christmas gift for that person who has everything else.

- Lifeline is a service offered by All Saints Saint Mary's that allows people to contact assistance in the event they are unable to use the phone. The newest units allow verbal communication between the user and the hospital monitor so that the best kind of assistance can be sent. The person monitoring the Lifeline system can notify identified family helpers or emergency services. At \$25.00 per month, this service offers peace of mind to both the person using it and to family members or friends who want to help.
- Spiritual and mental health may be nurtured with one of the many devotional books or Bibles available. Your local bookstore or Christian catalog offers many selections.

These Christmas seasons put aside all anxious thoughts of outward preparations and focus of the "perfect" gift of love, Jesus, our Savior, given to us by our loving God.

Americans Tell Poll They Worship As Much As They Shop

MINNEAPOLIS— 'Tis the season for commercialism. While almost all Americans (89%) say the December holidays are too commercial, people actually spend the same amount of time worshipping as they do shopping during the holiday season, according to a Lutheran Brotherhood nationwide survey conducted among 1,027 adults by Yankelovich Partners.

Americans say they devote an average of 16 hours worshipping during the holidays and average an equal amount of time shopping. "Despite a barrage of consumer-oriented messages to spend, taking time to worship is still important to people," says Leslee Nestingen, Lutheran Brotherhood's training manager for charitable programs. "It seems that many people haven't allowed commercialism to overshadow the spiritual basis of the holidays."

Looking at responses by age, Generation X'ers (18-34 year olds) spend the most time shopping (18 hours) and the most time worshipping (19 hours). Seniors (age 65 and older) shop the least during the holidays, averaging 9 hours, and worship an average of 15 hours.

The survey also found that women are busier with holiday endeavors than men. Women shop an average of 19 hours while men shop an average of 13 hours for the holidays. Women worship an average of 19 hours during the holidays while men average 14 hours of worship.

People with lower incomes worship almost twice as much as people with higher incomes. Americans who live in rural areas spend twice as much time worshipping during the holidays than those living in urban locations.

Handmade gifts are overwhelmingly preferred over store-bought gifts according to the survey. Overall, 71% of Americans prefer a handmade gift, compared to 12% who would rather receive a store-bought gift for the holidays. More women than men prefer handmade gifts (80% to 65%).

Gifts of Appreciated Assets Can Help at Tax Time

Appreciated assets, such as stocks, bonds, mutual funds or real estate can be an excellent alternative to giving cash or writing out a check to Emmaus.

Another possibility that allows you to keep income for your lifetime, (or two lifetimes or a period of years) at a percentage of the full fair market value, is to give the asset to a charitable remainder trust. You can fulfill your commitment or desire to give just the same but there are other financial benefits.

In most cases, when you have owned an asset for at least one year and give it to your church or other qualified charity, the full fair market value of your property is tax deductible. Since you are donating and not selling the property, you also avoid having to pay capital gains tax. And if one of your goals is also to reduce the value of your estate to minimize estate taxes at the time of your death, donating appreciated assets can be a very effective way to achieve that as well.

Companion Synod Suffers Drought in Tanzania

This is the season when many of you are taking offerings for World Hunger. The week of October 22, the Synod council affirmed making this special appeal to you. Lutheran churches in our area recently received a "Disaster-Gram" from the Lutheran Disaster Response network that alerted us to severe and worsening drought in Korea and East Africa. Our companion synod, the Meru Diocese in Tanzania, is in the midst of that drought. I quote from two recent letters:

From Elias Kitoi Nasari, the Assistant Bishop of the Meru Diocese, who was in our Synod often while studying at Wartburg Seminary: "It has already been a tough year and it is going to be worse as we approach December. The farmers' yield is very small if not anything to be seen. There are about 34,000 people in our area who will starve or are uncertain of what they are going to eat just for one day's meal from September '97...the Church, and in this case our Diocese, is looked up to as a savior."

From Belletech Deressa, ELCA

Global Mission staff, with whom I and other Bishops related to companion synods in Tanzania met, and who just returned from overseas with the Lutheran World Federation (LWF): "The areas severely affected by drought [include the] Arusha region [in which the Meru Diocese is located]. The ELCA sent \$50,000 from the International Disaster response Fund this week through Lutheran World Federation in addition to the \$20,000 that was sent in August for this drought. The people in Tanzania need seeds now in order to avoid another disaster for the coming years. If members of congregations raise funds for this drought, the Division for Global Mission will forward this to our partners, LWF, as an additional grant. The ELCA/DGM partner, Lutheran World Federation, have well equipped and efficient staff in Tanzania who are ready to help in such emergencies."

If you wish an offering to be designated for the Meru Diocese, please note clearly that it is for this relief.

Rev. Rogness is the Bishop of the Greater Milwaukee Synod of the ELCA.

The Truth for Our Times

Dear Disciples of Emmaus,

I would like to invite you to a Bible Study tentatively titled "The Truth for Our Times." It will begin after the first of the year on a day and time to be determined (more on this at the end of this column).

What will be at stake in this study? The truth from God that Jesus came to live out among us. Jesus stood before Pilate on that Good Friday almost 2000 years ago and said, "For this I was born, and for this I came into the world, to testify to the truth everyone who belongs to the truth listens to my voice."

Amidst the din of voices in today's media-filled world, how well do we hear that voice of Jesus? How well do we know that truth? Does it guide us in our everyday living? When you are confronted with baffling, frightening news stories of violence, when your children seem overwhelmed by it, can you hear Jesus' voice helping you to sort things out with the truth?

These are the kind of questions that will be at stake in this Bible Study. I believe that Jesus came to live a truth among us that can help us to sort through the often-times bewildering mess of the world we find ourselves living in.

Moreover, I believe that the tireless work of the Holy Spirit has put this truth of Jesus in a form today that, in many respects, puts us in a better position to understand these things than the first apostles. How so? A shocking claim? Come to this Bible Study and see if we can back it up. But let me

briefly explain and give you a glimpse of what we'll be discussing.

In John's gospel, Jesus gives us a good clue to the truth when he describes its opposite: "You are from your father the devil, and you choose to do your father's desires. He was a murderer from the beginning and does not stand in the truth, because there is no truth in him." (8:44)

These are not among our favorite words from Jesus, but both Luke and Matthew record similar words. Here is Luke's version: "Therefore also the Wisdom of God said, 'I will send them prophets and apostles, some of whom they will kill and persecute,' so that this generation may be charged with the blood of all the prophets shed since the foundation of the world, from the blood of Abel to the blood of Zechariah...." (11:49-51)

These are not among our favorite words from Iesus because he is basically saying that murder and violence are at the root of our human communities "since the foundation of the world," all the way back to Cain's murder of Abel. Why was all of this charged against "this generation"? Because they were about to work the same violence against the Son of God, whose being raised from the dead would expose the lie for all future generations to see-should they choose to see it. It is the truth that was about to be exposed on the cross, as Jesus tells Pilate.

How are we now in a better position to see this truth? Two reasons:

(1) the Holy Spirit of Truth has ▶

continued to work at revealing this truth over 2000 years now; and we will try, in our Bible study, to show this work of the Spirit in our world, even where most people have not recognized it as such.

(2) We live in a "global village" today, where we are in a better position to see that truth of Jesus applied to all places and times; in other words, to see how it is that all communities have been founded in murder since the beginning of the world. Otherwise, one of the temptations has been to lay all the blame solely on the people who killed Jesus in that particular time and place. Tragically, this has given many Christian communities the excuse to found their communities on killing Jews (the Nazis being only the most horrific of many such communities through the ages). But all they are doing is giving another terrible example of Jesus' truth.

With all the data we can collect these days about other cultures and societies, both present and past, we are better able to test if Jesus' truth applies to all times and places. (Basically, I will be suggesting that we can take this truth from Jesus about human communities as a scientific hypothesis to be tested with the data!) Can it help us to understand the violence we face today? It has given me a whole new way to look at the world we live in that I would like to share with you. Our class time can get as down-to-earth as bringing in newspaper stories to discuss and to try making sense of.

Can this truth give us a clue as to how best to respond to the violence of our times? This will be the aspect of Jesus' truth that reveals God to us. Because I think we need to, as Christians, follow in the same response to violence that God made through Christ Jesus. God has responded to our violence with loving forgiveness, and has called us to spread the Good News. For me, this goes to the heart of the traditional Lutheran emphasis on faith in being justified by grace. We all participate in human communities based on murder, but God continues to forgive us and to offer us another way to found our communities. This is about Re-Formation at the most basic level.

If much of this still sounds crazy or confusing to you, that's why I want to have a study where we can take things one step at a time and discuss them along the way.

But I firmly believe that, if you can make room for this study in your busy schedule, you will find the truth of Jesus more relevant to understanding this world we live in, in an eye-opening fashion.

The task this month will be to see how we might best fit this study into our schedules. First of all, I'm thinking in terms of meeting only twice a month (for example, the first and third Saturdays). There will be a sign-up sheet in the narthex, or talk to me directly to indicate your interest. The two possible times I am suggesting are Saturday morning (9:00-10:15?) or Wednesday evening. When you sign up, indicate if either time works best for you, or indicate another possible time.
