

WOMEN OF EMMAUS

The Women of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America have a new logo. The symbol is quietly powerful, the water lily pulling strength from the baptismal waters that nourish it and the cross that supports it. The logo belongs to all women of the ELCA and can't be used for commercial purposes. Blue is the suggested color for the logo because blue captures so well the baptismal waters. Whenever it is used by churchwide agencies, it should appear in blue or black with the flowers and waters reverse out of white. It should be used with integrity, not garishly. The logo was commissioned as a one time effort and is designed to last the life-time of the organization.

We are also looking for a new name for our women's group. In the past we've been known as E.L.C.W. which sometimes can be confusing when you are dealing with initials as a name. Any suggestions would be greatly appreciated. We have a white box with the new logo on it in the Sunset room. Please deposit all suggestions in the box. 
"Lent: an unpredictable and unbelievable season."





REPORT ON THE WORSHIP SURVEY

Procedure

In response to the concern raised at the annual meeting about the average Sunday attendance at Emmaus, the deacons committee first developed five questions to gather input from the congregation to better assess our worship needs and interests. Next, we decided to conduct a phone survey because of time limitations (it was requested to have the results in 60 days) and of the more personal contact made by phone rather than mail. The pastors then selected 80 households. This represents about 20% of our membership: 10% is generally considered a large enough sampling for such a survey to gain a sence of a congregation's interests and perceptions.

These are the questions that were asked:

- 1) About how many times do you attend worship at Emmaus? less than once a month about once a month __more than once a month, if so, how many?___ (Comments?)
- 2) Would you attend a Thursday 7:00 p.m. if it were offered in for summer worship?
- 3) What are some things you most like about worship at Emmaus?
- 4) Are there any areas of our worship that may need improvement?
- 5) Are there any other aspects about the church you would like to comment on?

And here are the results:

1) Attendance: less than--14 about once--13 more than--53 Total

Observations:				

- 1) Attendance was perceived as being fairly "regular" by a 2/3's majority.
- 2) Reaction to the Thursday evening service seemed to be favorable to have in addition to the two Sunday services (8 & 9:30 a.m.) for the summer.
- 3) The overall atmosphere of the congregation is very positive with the people's friendliness being mentioned first and most often. There were also many more positive comments than negative.
- 4) Because the traditional services are the norm, the variety of the other kinds of services, especially the Chicago Folk, were mentioned as the second greatest "like" of worship at Emmaus.
- 5) Areas of improvement tended to center around the changes in worship which have been largely because of the current introduction of the third setting. This is an important reminder of the need for continuity within the midst of meaningful changes.
- 6) At the same time, there were many individual comments concerning changes that can be made, such as: giving attention to having more familiar hymns, getting the hearing aids to work better, avoiding lengthy announcements, and having better service planning.

Summary

In conclusion, this survey has been a good and useful exercise. Worship is one of the most important indicators of a congregation's overall well-being. As was reported in an earlier <u>Visitor</u>, Emmaus has been above average in Sunday attendance as compared with the other churches of similar size here in Racine. A good sign is that our average attendance for the first twelve Sunday's of 1988 is up to 263 from 249 for those same Sunday's in 1987.



MILWAUKEE SYNOD OF THE ELCA

Over 500 people from many congregations throughout southeastern Wisconsin joined together on Feb. 27 to formally launch the Milwaukee Synod of the ELCA and to celebrate the installation of Peter Rogness as the first bishop of the New Synod.

The common tread throughout the day was one of sharing ideas and working together to address our common problems and opportunities. The preliminary work done by congregations and clusters on the six themes for our Synod was discussed in small groups. The process of sharing and working together in new structures was a marvelous beginning and an example of how the Synod can function if it so chooses.

The installation service, with over 1,000 people attending, was truly an inspirational celebration. It was clearly planned to celebrate the opportunity of the ELCA first and, secondarily, to honor/install Bishop Rogness. The sermon by the presiding Bishop of the ELCA, Herbert Chilstrom, spoke to that mission in terms clearly spelled out where he saw the need and opportunity of the ELCA.

The "inclusiveness" thrust of the ELCA was highlighted throughout the day. The cumulative impact was a re-affirmation of our need to think beyond the mere boundaries of our own congregations and immediate areas as we consider our future mission.

Emmaus is now part of the Southeastern Wisconsin Synod and of the Racine Cluster. Members of the task force include one delegate from each congregation and one pastor. Our congregational delegate is Nancy Martinsen.

As a result of the conference I attended at Lutheran General Hospital, on the topic of "Responsible Sexuality: Issues for Ministry" and from the two adult forums I had at church, I was encouraged to write something about what I presented for the whole congregation. That which follows is one of the areas we talked about.

SPIRITUALITY AND SEXUALITY

We are in the midst of the Easter Season. One of the common threads that ties the post-resurrection appearances together is the almost embarrassing emphasis upon the physicalness of Jesus' bodily presence. One example: from Luke 24:36-39 "See my hands and my feet, that it is myself; handle me, and see, for a spirit has not flesh and bones as you see that I have."

One of the first heresies of the early church was that of Greek dualism which divides our human nature into two parts; one is the physical, earthly nature which is evil and bad, and the other is the spiritual, eternal nature, which is good and holy. Therefore, the body and our physical needs and desires had to be denied in order to attain to the "higher" spiritual level. Some even taught that Jesus, in order for him to be perfectly holy, never really existed fully in a bodily form, that he just somehow appeared to be physically present. (As a footnote, the Nicene Creed was developed in part as a response to this errant teaching; "He became incarnate from the Virgin Mary, and was made man.") The early church and the scriptures do, however, affirm the created goodness of the body along with the spirit, and that there is no split between the two, with one being somehow better and more perfect.

The Hebrew understanding of salvation is that God's saving action is for all of God's people, first of all as a community and then for the individual, it is the bringing together of all of one's whole being, spirit, mind and body (including one's sexuality.) In fact, one of the better kept secrets in the Christian life is that far from being opposites, spirituality and sexuality are very closely related. It is important here to understand sexuality and not just the physical act, but as the expression of one's whole personality.

Sexuality as well as Spirituality, presumes an openness on the part of one subject to a relationship with another subject at some level of intimacy that involves the total person. Both are an expression of our human and divine "yearning" for connectedness and companionship. This is not to say that a spiritual relationship will also involve a physical relationship but neither can we pretend to strive for some kind of "spirituality asexuality."

Jesus had a chaste and celibate life but that does not mean he was "sexless." Rather, he lived the most fully human life we know of, being very personally and deeply involved in the lives of all kinds of people. In knowing and accepting himself for who he was as God's chosen one. he was freely able to give and receive (ex: the annointing with oil by the woman), to be intimate and caring for others and for himself.

This is just a very brief introduction to the relationship between spirituality and sexuality. My hope is for us as members of Christ body, we will seek to make more connections between our everyday physical experiences and the activity of God's Spirit in our lives as we move . into the season of Pentecost.





This is the second article in a series on human sexuality that I am writing in response to the conference I attended at Lutheran General Hospital in Park Ridge, Ill., which was sponsored by the Pastoral Psychotherapy Institute at Parkside Center. The following observations were made by James B. Nelson, Ph.D., Professor of Ethics at United Theological Seminary, New Brighton, Mn.

In last month's article on "Spirituality and Sexuality", the emphasis was made upon how closely these two are related, that in fact, the body and the Spirit can not and should not be separated. We are whole beings. Salvation has to do with making all things whole (and holy), a bringing together of all that a person is, and is meant to be. One of the results of sin is brokenness. Sin separates. It makes division, brings disease and destruction.

For us to be fully human means to affirm and grow into all that makes up our human identity, namely, that which is generally defined in terms of "masculinity" and "femininity". Every person is on a continuum (a continuous scale of change) between male and female characteristics. How one acts is influenced by both one's genetic make-up and one's socialization (the process of adopting to the expectations and demands of society.) Usually the first question asked after the birth of a child is, "Is it a boy or a girl?" Why? Because we are not sure how to treat this child otherwise. Then, without even thinking about it, the process starts. Baby girls are talked to more softly and more often, they are held more gently and again more often. On the other hand, baby boys are held less and talked to less often and generally given more freedom to roam or play by themselves. Girls are encouraged to be passive caregivers; and boys, to be active, emotionless individuals.

One's male or female identity is also a reflection of one's physical design. Male identity tends to be localized and externalized just as the male sexual organs are in one area outside the body. That means that the male identity is usually found more in the place of work, the institution outside the home. It tends to be very directional, "hard driving", always striving for that which is "bigger and better". There is a denial of feelings, and the need to be in control.

On the other hand, feminine identity tends to be generalized and internalized, just as the female body is made. It is more circular and community oriented, in touch with one's emotions and the changes in one's life and body. Femininity emphasizes open receptiveness and warm nurturing.

Both assets are essential and each by themselves are lacking in what it means to be fully human. The "male" need is to be more community and nurturing oriented. And the "female" need is to take more initiative and gain a sense of autonomy. It is in the acknowledgment of these strengths and needs that we grow individually as persons and corporately as the body of Christ.

NEXT TIME: What the Church needs to do to promote responsible sexuality.



Responsible Sexuality: What the Church needs to do

This is the third and final article in a series on human sexuality that I am writing in response to the conference I attended last spring at Lutheran General Hospital. After talking about the relationship of spirituality and sexuality, and about human identity, now we need to ask the question, "What do we do with this information?"

Christine E. Gudorf, Ph.D., who is an Associate Professor of Ethics at Xavier University in Cincinnati, Ohio, addressed this question by first of all saying that the church needs to admit the mistakes of the past. Because of the church's generally male dominated leadership throughout most of history Biblical interpretation has been mainly male oriented and the role of women largely ignored. Clearly the subordination of women has no place in the church today. The stories of Genesis 1 & 2 emphasize the created equality of the sexes. The result of "fall" is not what God intended for humanity. Jesus affirmed the place of women throughout his ministry, especially as seen in Mary who was commended for giving attention to his teaching.

Secondly, the church needs broaden the meanings of love and sin. Traditionally, sin has been defined as "excessive pride" and love as "self sacrifice". These meanings, however, come from a mainly male point of view. Because masculinity tends to be much more individual oriented, "looking out for number one" and self serving actions are generally the sin of the "macho" man. And so, love needs to be self-giving. However, since femininity already tends to be community oriented and other-serving, the "female" sin is that of shame.and.self-doubt, of not having an adequate sense of self-worth and not living out the fullness of one's potential. Therefore, love also needs to be seen as proper self-care.

Jesus summarizes all of the commandments with these words, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind...(and)...You shall love your neighbor as yourself. On these two commandments depend all the law and the prophets." (Matt 22:37-40) Without a true and good love of ourselves, we cannot fully love one another. We must love and care for ourselves so that we can love and care for each other. In the new Lutheran Women Today magazine, one of the regular departments is on Selfcare, which identifies various helpful ways to affirm one's giftedness from God.

From time to time, whether we are male of female, we all need to acknowledge our own pride or shame and to give love as well as receive it.

A third area that I will mention, (and there were many other things that were discussed) is the need for the church to be more intentionally involved in teaching and talking about sexuality. The schools are able to only teach the "mechanics" of sexuality, but not the ethics and attitudes that are ultimately so important along with the bare information. We need to show the natural integration of one's whole being as the means of serving God. So I am going to be looking for possible ways to make this a part of our Christian Education Program at church.

I feel that this was an excellent opportunity for growth and understanding for me and I hope that some of this has proved to be insightful for some of you. I have cassette tapes of all of the presentations and discussions and they are available to be loaned out.

I want to use this month to report briefly on my week of continuing education at Mt. Carmel Bible Camp, Alexandria, Minn., July 29 - Aug. 4. It was an enlightening and refreshing week. Betty was able to go with me this time and we met new friends and got re-acquainted with Rev. Johan and Sonja Hinderlie, director of Mt. Carmel who performed at Emmaus last April as Martin and Katie Luther. We heard an outstanding lecture on alcohol and drug abuse - Rev. John Keller of Lutheran General Park Ridge Hospital in Chicago. I discovered in table conversation with him that he spent 1949-54 in St. John's Lutheran in Sioux Falls, S.D. I told him Rev. Erling Rossing, director and chaplain of Luther Manor Nursing Home, was my Dad. He said "Of course, I knew your father."

Betty and I brought Keller's book, LET GO, LET GOD. It's a most helpful resource - not just for alcoholics but for those with addictions and dependencies that keep us from functioning in ways that are wholesome and healthful. We all can learn from recovering addicts how to come to grips with ourselves, admit our weaknesses, affirm our humanity, let go of our pretenses. latch onto the gospel of God's grace in Christ Jesus, and live our lives one day at a time in the compelling presence of God's love.

I highly recommend Keller's book to you. You'll find it a resource to come back to, time and again.

The other emphasis of the week at Mt. Carmel was creativity - creative thinking, writing, artistry - all in the context of God's own creativity that God shares with us in the gift and the gifts of the Holy Spirit. I wrote a brief poem that I share with you elsewhere in this issue.

May God bless our worship and work together as we let God pick us up and energize us for creative and faithful service in the Spirit. "Come, Share the Spirit!"



Come to worship and treat yourself to something great!





RACIAL AND CULTURAL CONCERNS REFLECTION

When I was a senior seminarian, one day a group of us were talking about the subject of race. One woman in the group said almost indignantly "Why must we always talk in terms of Black and White? People are people!"

I have thought of that phrase often, have wished for the truth of it, and painfully aware that because of this nation's fascination with color, its fear of blackness that the burden we have suffered throughout these years has been that we have seen ourselves as less than, less than people, less than white.

In the city where I minister I see daily young children who have an inferiority complex because of the evil of racism and that more than anything else, saddens my spirit

On Sunday morning this Christian community that I am a part of, that we are a part of, confesses with great conviction "I believe in God the Father Almighty, Creator of Heaven and Earth." It is in that confession where I find my dignity, self worth, as well as the dignity and self worth of every human being. It is in that confession that I find a reason to struggle with words, and with my life to challenge every structure and stricture that keeps people from being people. It is because of that confession that you and I must work to be peacemakers instead of warmongers.

May God be with us in the struggle.

"GETTING READY"

"In those days a decree went out from Caesar Augustus that all the world should be enrolled." (Luke 2:1)

So begins the familiar passage of the Christmas gospel. It serves as a reminder to me to be "getting ready" for that rapidly approaching event from which the entire drama of the Christmas story will unfold. That is the purpose of Advent. It is a season which calls us to adopt a fresh and new perspective in the midst of windy and cold days that are often filled with all too much to do.

In Henri Nouwen's little book, Making All Things New, he talks about how our lives are so often very busy saying

"Our lives often seem like overpaid suitcases bursting at the seams. In fact, we are almost always aware of being behind schedule. There is a nagging sense that there are unfinished tasks, unfilled promises, unrealized proposals. There is always something else that we should have remembered, done or said. There are always people we just did not speak to, write to, or visit. Thus, although we are very busy, we also have a lingering feeling of never really fulfilling our obligations. (pp. 23-24)

As important as all of these things may be, this season beckens us to look back again to a simple birthplace in Bethlehem, to the roots of our faith. Here we glimpse our God expressed in fragility and risk. Yet at the same time, in that same child, the whole story - the powerful presence in teaching and healing, the compassion and truth, the road to Jerusalem, to Golgotha, and to Emmaus - all lies before us, waiting to unfold.

May these days help us to prepare to meet the one who has come, who continues to meet us and who promises to return again.
