IN CHRIST'S NAME, WELCOME: The Division for Congregational Life's 1989 Witness/Evangelism program theme, "In Christ's Name, Welcome", emphasized the congregation as a hospitable community.

Concern for welcoming both member and stranger prompted Nativity Church, Minneapolis, to begin with the narthex when they made plans to remodel their building. Believing that a building communicated non-verbally, they decided to create spaces that welcome throughout the building. "The principal questions we asked ourselves were, What's it like to be a stranger here? and What is the feeling one gets?" said Pastor Gerald Hoffman.

"Remodeling the building has stimulated us to put ourselves in others' shoes, to be conscious of all kids of people - including many who visit us and have no previous contact with the church," Pastor Hoffman said. "we want to welcome people and engage them by providing a space in which they will feel comfortable.

John Henzel was chairman of the Building Committee for the renovation of Nativity Lutheran in Minneapolis. John is the son of long-time Emmaus member, Walter Henzel.





I write this New Year's Greeting as we celebrate the first week of Advent, the beginning of the church's new year. This verse from Isaiah was part of the first lesson for the week which announces the hope of the coming Savior and of the time when weapons of war will be retooled into instruments of peace and justice. We have seen some encouraging signs of that in Eastern Europe and in the Summit meeting at Malta.

I was also reminded of the comment once made by Albert Schweitzer.

"We must become good plowmen. Hope is the prerequisite of plowing. What sort of farmer plows the furrow in the autumn but has no hope for the spring? So, too, we accomplish nothing without hope, without a sure inner hope that a new age is about to dawn. Hope is strength."

Hope is often considered subversive by the status quo because it refuses to give up, to believe that things cannot change. The centers of power in the world fear the poet, prophet, and artist because they communicate a new vision and spark the imagination.

How do we keep going when everything seems hopeless? As God's people we must return to the promise of our Baptism, that out of death comes new life. Hope emerges out of the ashes of our dreams and rekindles the flame of love within our hearts.

Such is my wish for you in the New Year!





Dear Emmaus Congregation,

Time is moving on quickly this year again. I do not want to be neglectful in keeping you as a congregation informed on the happenings in our program.

After going into our third year I feel stronger than ever that our program is needed and worthwhile. Statistically there are things one can measure but as an observer there are things we cannot measure which I think are much more important. Let me give you an example of both.

We have serviced approximately 179 mothers and babies to date. 16 have graduated from high school and 10 more are scheduled to graduate this year. Some have gone to technical school or college - some have jobs and a few are married. The racial breakdown is as follows: White - 10, Black - 16, Hispanic - 2. Another goal which is difficult to measure is helping mothers to bond. This cannot be overemphasized. This must happen to every child early in life. If this does not take place the consequences are devastating to the child and eventually the community as well. The cost of trying to repair a child's life who has not bonded is staggering. We see evidence of this daily in the newspaper. Crime and other social discord very possibly are the result of a life gone wrong because a trust relationship did not develop early in life.

Following is an example of where I feel we have been successful in this area. One mother came into the program in '87 and was almost totally indifferent to her child. The child was listless and lethargic. At the end of the year the mother would have tears in her eyes when she had to leave in the morning. It was a complete turn around for the mother and child. It was gratifying for us as a staff to see the dramatic change.

The program will not cure all the problems that go wrong with teen parenting. Negative lifestyles and behavior have been going on for decades, so we are not going to change this overnight — at least not by ourselves — but we are making progress. I feel it is the community's responsibility and involvement to help turn these trends around. It is my belief it will not get better without the input of interest and concern. All the money and legislation will not change our social

degradation until we get involved. We must act now because the babies are here and will probably keep coming. We cannot wait until the ills of the teen parenting are solved to administer to these infants. Bonding must take place immediately after birth to prevent serious consequences later on.

Again - you can be commended as a congregation for the efforts you have made to help deal with this problem in Racine. I hope you all can be rewarded by the productivity of the lives that have been touched by the YWCA Teen Parenting Program.

The national Danish Immigrant Museum, now beyond the planning stages at Elk Horn, Iowa, will be a "living museum" preserving the Danish-American experience. The well-known Victor Borge has written, "An overwhelming majority of Danish immigrants have fulfilled their expectations. Through this museum they will share with their children their gratitude for what they achieved, and for the opportunities that still ignite their imagination."

At this time, the donated site has been leveled and contoured, with thousands of yards of earth moved. Capital fund drives are being conducted across the United States to complete the core Museum building.

The national Danish Immigrant Museum will tell the story of the Danish-American experience and is organized to collect, preserve, study and interpret artifacts and traditions which express the experience of Danes in North America. The Danish Immigrant Museum is the only museum that is nationally organized to preserve uniformly our Danish immigrant heritage in North America.

- Well over 8,000 Museum artifacts have already been accessioned and are in storage in Elk Horn, Iowa, site of the Museum.
- The Museum is a 501 (C) (3) tax exempt non-profit organization.
- 360,000 Danish immigrants came to the United States between 1829 and 1980. They founded our Lutheran Churches of the former AELC and UELC.

A Statement of Faith By John McNulty Sunday Evening Club, December 17, 1989

In late 1988 I began to speak to various groups around the Midwest about AIDS. Since then I have given talks to dozens of organizations.

As people we tend to turn our backs on the outcasts of society. But as Christians can we do any less than what our Lord commanded? In Matthew, in response to the Pharisees question of why he ate with tax collectors, and other sinners, Jesus said, "Those who are well have no need for a physician but those who are sick do. I came not to heal the righteous but the sinners." And later, in his parable of the lepers, Jesus also talks of the unclean of society and questions all Christians as to whose needs for help and forgiveness are the greatest. "Truly, I say to you, as you did it to one of the least of these by brethren you did it to me."

There are two reasons why I continue to talk about AIDS. First, there is no cure — no one has been cured. Even if there were a cure today, because of the long incubation period, many thousands will still perish. AIDS is an equal opportunity killer; it respects no race, no sex, no age, no religion. If there were a thermonuclear war, our military experts predict that up to 2.8 million Americans would die. However, our most pessimistic prediction is that three million Americans currently are infected with the AIDS virus. Until a cure is found we can only stop the dying through education.

The second reason for my "crusade" goes back to San Francisco and AIDS 101 training. ... I spent time with five PWA's, (Persons with AIDS), recognizing that I was talking with people whose death was only a question of time. I asked them how I could best repay them for their generosity in educating me. They told me to talk to everyone I could about AIDS — that if I could prevent just one person from getting AIDS, they would consider my debt paid. I speak to you tonight as I continue to pay off that debt.

This month I want to share with you a concern that is on the minds of many ELCA members and the church's response to it.

The issue is a concern that was voiced at Emmaus' annual meeting in January: "What is the ELCA doing about the high administrative costs of this new church body?" An answer is to be found in the Feb. 14th issue of THE LUTHERAN, in the article titled, "Helping the Church Be the Church." The article states:

"Financial shortfalls resulted in cutting 39 jobs in the ELCA's churchwide staff in 1989. Some staff members picked up extra responsibilities to cover the cuts. The financial shortfall also made it necessary to freeze the salaries of all executive staff for 1990. Support (secretarial) staff can receive up to a 3% raise."

The article goes on to talk about the morale problem this situation poses - more work for less pay - and the underlying issue for the whole church, namely mission. "A staff with low morale is less effective in carrying out the church's mission," writes David Miller, the author of the article.

The personnel office in the ELCA is working to find solutions. But finally, the answers lie beyond this office, beyond all the administration of the ELCA, with the members of this church body. Yes, the presiding bishops and all the administrative officers have clear responsibilities to function in an efficient and responsible way as possible. But we also have a calling to provide the material support and cooperative spirit that will enable the leadership of the ELCA to work in healthy and effective ways.

That's where our benevolence dollars and our prayers, (not to neglect those) come into play. Let's do what we can to make our goal for benevolence support this year, \$17,445.00, and let's remember our church leaders in our prayers. Both mean a lot, for them and for our mission together as the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America.

NORTHSIDE FOOD PANTRY FACES SHORTAGES

Mildred Schroth, who volunteers some of her time to work at the Northside Food Pantry at distribution times, and Pastor Rossing attended a specially called meeting with representatives from the other eight northside churches to discuss the problems caused by the federal governments cut-off of Project Emergency for Racine. Since Racine is technically below the 5% unemployment rate, (barely at 4.9%) the government has determined that Racine no longer qualifies for the foodstuffs of Project Emergency. This is hitting food pantries in town hard, as there still are great numbers of people who often have to choose between paying doctor bills or a water bill and having enough food or the right kind of food for their family. In 1989 2,289 people were fed, the largest number of any year in the 9 years of the Northside Food Pantry.

Churches and other volunteer organizations are challenged to make up the difference in food supplies lost from the cut-off of Project Emergency. Below is a report from the Northside Food Pantry, housed at Trinity United Methodist Church, 3825 Erie St.

Thank God for "Wow!" that boisterous exclamation point when there's nothing more to say.

"Wow!" is the word for this day. Today, as I write this, the storm has past, the rain and cold are gone, and the sun is brightly shining with its warm rays bringing new life to all. AAL & MISSION90

Three Aid Association for Lutherans (AAL) grants totaling \$306,000 are being used by the ELCA to conduct "Mission90" events. "Mission90" is a synod-wide emphasis on evangelism and outreach. District sessions are being presented to pastors, associates, congregational leaders and stewardship committee members of ELCA congregations. Already, 10,064 people have attended 112 events across the country.

According to the Rev. Morris Sorenson, assistant to ELCA Bishop Herbert Chilstrom, "This special initiative has been undertaken because of declining membership in many Lutheran churches. 'Mission90,' led by Bishop Chilstrom, involves a series of conferences for pastors, bishops, and congregational leaders designed to inspire and equip them for this major outreach emphasis."

LIVE REPORT FROM EL SALVADOR

Members of the El Salvador committee were privileged to hear from Santiago Avilar, a Salvadoran, who came to Milwaukee two weeks ago, from his home in Los Ranchos, El Salvador. Senior Avilar came to learn how to care for his 10 year old son, who has undergone surgeries in Milwaukee, to repair damage done by a land mine that impaired him.

At their home in El Salvador, the community lives in an atmosphere of repression at the hands of the Salvadoran army. The army has been involved in bombing the area, destroying crops, killing cattle and arresting people, which has resulted in tremendous fear among the residents. People are fearful of going to the fields to care for crops because they may be caught in a cross-fire or captured by the army. The children are especially affected in that they are not safe in their homes because the bombings have caused ceilings to fall down and other damage to the houses and are not safe when they go outside to play either. Teachers find it so very difficult to get children to relax in school and be able to learn because every time there is loud noise, the children are sure that it is a bomb.

The people have so very little and must share everything with each other in Senior Avilar's words, "to save their own lives." Some international aid does get through to Los Ranchos, but often it is held up by the authorities for months. When asked what was needed by the people in Los Ranchos, Senior Avilar answered, "everything!" He specifically noted the need for building supplies. Medical care is not readily available as medical personnel come from outside Los Ranchos and do not get there very often.

On Feb. 11th, a neighboring community, Corral de Pietro, was bombed, killing 5 people. This incident reinforces this atmosphere of fear that all share in Los Ranchos, but that especially affects the children. Senior Avilar concluded that, "things must change!" He believes that support from abroad for the army of El Salvador must be cut in order for the lives of the people to be improved. Let us keep the people of El Salvador in our prayers.



Spring is here! Can you believe it?

With this season come two contrasting moods. Some people find energy and hope, and rhapsodize with words like those found in the Song of Solomon (2:10b,12):

Arise, my love, my fair one, and come away...

The flowers appear on the earth,
the time of singing has come,
and the voice of the turtledove is heard in our land.

Others experience a melancholy mood, a loss of drive and a gathering gloom. They feel like those whom the writer of Ecclesiastics describes as experiencing "evil days" and they say, "I have no pleasure in them." These are days when "the grasshopper drags itself along and desire fails" (Ecclesiastics 12:1b, 5b).

Just a couple of pages in the Bible separate these two descriptions of what people experience and feel about life. But how far apart the moods are from each other.

Our ELCA magazine, <u>The Lutheran</u>, has carried a four-part series over the last several issues on the relationship of faith and feeling. One of the main points made in these articles is that what we feel is not the same as our faith, or lack of it.

We may feel down but that doesn't mean that we don't or can't believe in God. We may feel up but that doesn't mean that God is more present to us or available than when we're down.

Faith does not depend on our feelings but on the promises of God in Christ Jesus. So faith attaches itself to the Word of God, particularly the Word who is "in the flesh" for us and our world. That's the One to hold on to, not our feelings of the moment or the season.

Soon summer will be here bringing its own set of triumphs and trials. God keep you in the grace of Christ Jesus, in every season of the year and mood of the heart.



Sorat Chan Ly's parents died when he was nine years old. He fled war-torn Cambodia and went to live for a time with relatives in Viet Nam. After

years of living on his own and moving from place to place, Sorat entered a refugee camp and decided to emigrate to the United States.

In the U.S., he was placed with a foster family. One night, his foster parents asked if he was hungry. Not understanding English, he said no. When the family ate without him, he felt rejected, lonely and isolated, just as he had in Southeast Asia. The family soon realized what had happened and resolved the situation. But, Sorat never felt as if he "fit in."

At age 18, Sorat met a man who changed his life. Joachim "Joe" Nickerson is director of the unaccompanied minors program at Lutheran Child and Family Services (LCFS) of Massachusetts, in Watertown, Mass.

"Joe opened the door and let me in," Sorat said. "I never trusted anyone before. But Joe stuck with me and gave me a chance to grow. Now, I can do a good job. I'm working hard and doing my best."



Today, Sorat works at LCFS, helping refugee young people who struggle to learn English, find homes and jobs and establish citizenship. "I'm glad we can help through a program like this," he said.



CONSIDER LEAVING A GIFT TO THE CHURCH. Many people would like to leave a sum of money or property to the Church upon their death but don't know how this can be accomplished. A simple provision in your Will is all that is needed to assure that this occurs.

Here is a suggested provision which can be used. "I give devise and bequeath to Emmaus Lutheran Church of Racine, Wisconsin (the sum of \$____), (____ percent of my estate), the balance in account #____ located at ____ [Bank], (___shares of stock of ____), (real estate located at ____ and described as ____), (personal property described as ____)."

Such a provision would allow the church to use the gift as it best sees fit. If you wish to control its use or application, you can specify that it is to be used for such things as: building fund, missionary, capital improvements, education, youth, choir, or any special project or use.

An attorney can advise you how to prepare a Will or amend an existing Will to include such a provision, should you wish to leave a gift to the Church.

People come to Lutheran Social Services because something is out of balance in their lives, and they are searching for help to put things right again. At LSS we believe one way to do this is by getting in touch with the part of a person that is spiritual. Spirituality gives purpose and meaning to life, provides a basis for moral decisions, and bonds people together. Counseling with a spiritual dimension is one of the things that is distrinctive about LSS.

This weekend is also the famous Norwegian Nordic Festival in Decorah, to which thousands of people come for some mid-summer fun.



STEWARDSHIP 1990

This year's Stewardship Theme is "Let Your Light So Shine." God has chosen us to be his "Light" so that we may shine brightly and enlighten others through the Gospel. What does it mean to be God's Light and how does this relate to stewardship?

Stewardship involves many things, giving of ourselves and our possessions. But that is not the only way we can be stewards of the Lord. This year, we'd like to emphasize three kinds of stewardship.

Global stewardship takes into consideration what God has created for us... the earth and all its beauty. Remember the story of the creation. How wonderful it would be to sit back and look at the creation of the earth, new lives created. Our life created. How can we be stewards of the earth and of God. Our responsibility is properly tending to God's creation. Is this merely the new "environmentalism" speaking? NO. We have always had a responsibility to care for what God has given us; but we seem more and more to take it for granted. Secondly, personal stewardship deals with our personal relationship with the Lord. How does this relationship make our light shine? Our faith grows, our values become more clear, our duty toward others becomes evident because Christ has given us a gift. A very personal gift, the ability to serve Him in whatever we do in a very special way. Ask yourself, "What is my personal gift from God and how can I find it?" You can find it by opening up your relationship with Christ and letting THAT light shine to those around you.

Thirdly is how we reflect Christ's light toward others... relational stewardship. How can we make our lives a total giving experience? How can we live our lives so that the light of Christ pours out from us? Merely by letting our light shine we can be stewards of Christ and His Word.

FOR CHURCHWIDE WORK

our gift, a response to God's love, first goes in the offering plate. The congregation sends a portion on to the synod. Of that amount a percentage goes to the churchwide expression of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America for ministry and mission programs throughout the United States and around the world.

According to Bishop Herbert W. Chilstrom, "We are in this together." At the end of our first fiscal year, the churchwide organization faced a \$15.8 million shortfall in revenue. In response Bishop Chilstrom stated: "We must look thoughtfully and prayerfully at how we will share our resources for ministry, what shall we do, and what shall we leave undone? In the end, that's always the question. We need God's guidance to answer it."

The 1989 Churchwide Assembly approved a 1990 budget of \$102 million for churchwide ministries that we do together. However, the Church Council, in considering the financial situation, has set the 1990 churchwide spending authorization at 88%, or \$90 million. Should the 1989 income fall below projected levels, the 1990 expenditure authorization will be lowered further.

The 1991 budget is being developed as a balanced budget, based on receipt of gifts in 1988 and 1989. Through the funding that is available, people will be touched by a wide variety of domestic and international ministries.

"The Lord bless your going out and your coming in," even as the psalmist says.



WHAT IS MISSION90?

Mission90 is more than another program.

Mission 90 is a vision of what we can be as a church, the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America. It's a commitment to Christ that will shape our church in the first decade of the ELCA's existence.

The commitment is threefold:

- * SEE. See Jesus, live in Christ, through worship, prayer and Bible study.
- * GROW. Grow in Jesus, live in the Emmaus congregation so that together we witness, give and reach out.
- * SERVE. Serve Jesus, live in the world caring for creation and build partnerships with others in the causes of peace and justice.

Mission 90 is being launched in ELCA congregations this fall. The theme of "See, Grow, Serve" will be introduced in services at Emmaus on Rally Sunday, September 9.

The first element of Mission90 will be the video adult series called, "What Does It Mean to Be a Christian?" This six-session series will begin on Sunday morning, Sept. 23. Check the Adult Forum schedule for times of the remaining sessions. See the separate article describing the whole series.



WHAT'S NEW ABOUT MISSION90?

Many of the things that Mission90 encourages we at Emmaus, and members of other ELCA congregations, are doing already — and have been doing for years and years. We've all been studying the Bible, witnessing, giving, ministering in everyday life, caring for the church around the world and promoting peace and justice in God's world.

So what then is new about Mission90? A good answer is provided in the Mission90 Planning Guide:

We find the freshness in the concept of the vision and the time of the vision ... in the light of the birth of a new, unified church. It can give us identity, chart our direction, focus our witness, and help generate the commitment in God's people that mission today demands.

THE MISSION90 VIDEO SERIES: "WHAT DOES IT MEAN TO BE A CHRISTIAN?"

The Ten Commandments are the framework for the six-session video series, "What Does It Mean to Be a Christian?" ELCA Bishop Herbert W. Chilstrom uses the Ten Commandments to explore fundamentals of the Christian faith that undergird and direct us in our daily life. The series takes participants through the following subjects:

- 1. Grace
- 2. Faith and Sin
- 3. Word, Worship and Sacrament
- 4. Life in Family and Community
- 5. Personal Stewardship
- 6. Creation

The format for each session is to view the 20-25 minute video and then discuss the implications and applications.

The series will begin on Sunday Sept. 23 at the Adult Forum. Check the Adult forum schedule for topics of remaining sessions.

It is my prayer and hope that all of us at Emmaus will "Let Our Light So Shine" and become better stewards of what God has bestowed upon us.










Children's & Youth choir practice will start on Aug. 29 at 6:00 p.m. for a fun get together. There will be some singing, some munching, and all around fun! Then

In this Visitor you have already read much and you will probably be hearing more about Mission90. As I have thought about preparing for this new venture I am aware of the need for **receptivity**, of letting go and making room for fresh opportunities. I am reminded of an old story:

A man once went to seek the council of a well known teacher. He was invited in and the teacher asked what he could do for the man. "I would like guidance for my life," he said. "Very well, come in and have a cup of tea with me first."

When the tea was steeped, they sat down at a simple table setting and the wise old sage began to pour the man's cup full. Then he just kept on pouring until the tea flowed over into the saucer, onto the table so that finally the man yelled, "STOP, STOP! What are you doing?"

(2:5-8)







If you already have a busy schedule and some added burdens suddenly descend on you, life can become stressful in an unhealthy way. I'm convinced that our faith has a good word to speak to us, if we are open to hearing it and applying it in our lives. I believe this word is like a beacon that pierces the night and gives us direction and hope. This good word portrays what God has to do with us and how we let God be God for us.

I remember a morning dove who had a nest in a big pine tree just off the back door of the old house we rented during my first pastorate in North Dakota. What a faithful and confident mother-to-be she was. Nothing moved her from her nest. When I poked my threatening nose up by the branch holding her nest, she stayed put.

One day the storm clouds gathered, it grew very dark and the wind rose. Soon the rain was descending in a torrent and the wind was so fierce that the branches of the tree were blowing in all directions. I looked out the back window of the house and there was mother dove, still on her nest, hunkered down and riding out the storm.

Martin Luther, reflecting on Matthew 6:26, says that the birds are "our theologians." They teach us not to be anxious but to rely on our Heavenly Father at all times. In the midst of heavier schedule, anxious thoughts or stormy conditions, I remember that mother dove and her portrayal of peace. The good word of Isaiah 26:3 tells us:

> Thou dost keep the one in perfect peace, whose mind is stayed on thee. because this one trusts in thee.

And now, "the peace of God which passes all understanding keep our hearts and minds through Christ Jesus our Lord."



Y.W.C.A. TEEN PARENTING PROGRAM

We are starting our fourth year with the Teen Parenting Program. To date we have served approximately 200 parents and babies for a short or longer period of time. 23 mothers have graduated from high school. We are working hard this year on a follow-up program to find out how the mothers and their children are doing.

This past year 9 mothers graduated, most are working or have started further schooling. Already we have had some come back and said they wished they still had our service.

This year we will have one more center. It will be housed with Unified's Keith Mack Achievement Center. There still will be funding for only 31 infants. The numbers of babies will be divided between the 3 centers. This is an opportunity for us to take advantage of an on-site day care for students. However we do not receive any funding from Unified. Funding still comes from the State, Human Services and private donations.

The parents are still required to put in an hour a day at the center - 2 hrs. a week meeting with the city health department nurse 2 hrs. a week doing activities with their child. Friday is cleaning day for the parents. The word "parents" really does apply this year. We have 2 or 3 fathers who are actively involved at Emmaus.

There are programs designed to help curb teen pregnancy. I wish I could say that we are successful at that. Our emphasis is primarily to help the parent to graduate from high school, teach bonding, parenting skills, nurturing, good nutrition, prevent second pregnancies & to beself sufficient and not welfare dependant. Teenage pregnancy still is the result of so many things going wrong in our society. It will take more than our program to curb these ills. If we can be successful in directing the parents we now have on a better course in life our program will be a success. For the parents who stay with the program and accept the commitment - there have been few repeat pregnancies.

Sometimes if we want people to pull themselves up by the boot straps we have to first provide the boots.

The babies are generally very healthy which indicates they are getting good parental care. Often the information comes through Welcome Sittig (Unified's Teen Coordinator) who teaches clases to many of these mothers on prenatal care. The healthier the baby also means less of a drain on society.

This year we have a nice group of parents and are looking forward to a successful year. We may not see benefits and rewards from a program such as this until many hears later. Meanwhile we continue with the idea that efforts made now will reap positive results in the future.

In troubled Ethiopia, the church responds



Francis Stephanos (left), president of the Ethiopian Evangelical (Lutheran) Church Mekane Yesus, writes to us:

"Each day hundreds of people are dying in the war. Pray that a cease-fire is affected soon and negotiation reached in order to bring about lasting peace among the people."

Ethiopia is in crisis. Nearly 5 million people face starvation. During the last growing season, northern Ethiopia received only six days of rain. The effects of this drought are worsened by an intense civil war.

"I report with joy that the churches are able to bring food to northern Wollo. Please thank the Lord for making this possible."

The warring parties consider the churches the only credible channel through which food may be delivered. The Mekane Yesus (Lutheran), Ethiopian Orthodox and Roman Catholic churches (through the Joint Relief Partnership) transport and distribute food to more than 1 million Ethiopians.



The people of Sudan suffer, too

During the last 10 years, neighboring Sudan, Africa's largest country, has suffered a worsening economic crisis, a foreign debt totalling \$13 billion, famine, drought and floods.

And after eight years, a costly war between the government and rebels in southern Sudan shows no sign of abating. Peace talks have floundered.



DEACONS CHART PROGRESS ON NEW MEMBERS



Another article in this issue shows the dramatic difference it makes among those who join a church when they have been invited by an acquaintance. Most people who end up joining are drawn to a particular congregation by someone they already know and by whom they have been personally invited.

A survey taken in a suburban area of Houston told the following story as to what motivated people to choose a particular congregation for their membership:

- 20% were influenced by people in the congregation whom they respected;
- 12% joined because of prior denominational affiliation;
- 8% liked the architectural beauty of the building;
- 3% joined because they liked the
 person in the pulpit;
- 18% joined because of convenience of location;


PROGRESS ON PLEDGES FOR 1991



More than 400 adults serve as ELCA missionaries in 40 countries; about 180 ELCA children/youth under 18 live in missionary families overseas. ELCA cooperates with about 73 Lutheran churches, 23 other churches and 90 ecumenical institutions and agencies in placing missionaries and supporting mission programs. ELCA members can volunteer their vocational skills (such as teaching, administration, finance, medicine, construction) serving in partner churches at their own expense for 2-24 months. Almost 1800 ELCA congregations are involved in a personal relationship with missionaries through the Missionary Sponsorship Program. 3,000-4,000 people participate in three ELCA Global Mission Events each July. ELCA's annual budget for global mission is approximately \$26 million; 1/3 of this funding is ELCA Hunger Appeal monies designated for overseas relief and development work.









The commercial observation of Christmas begins before Thanksgiving nowadays. The ads for gift-buying come out early. The biggest shopping day of the year, retailers say, is the day after Thanksgiving. It's easy to lose sight of the point of Christmas, "the reason for the season."

I am so glad each Christmas Eve! His praises then I sing; He opens now for ev'ry child The palace of the king.
