



CONFIRMATION FEATURES 4TH, 6TH AND 7TH GRADERS

The process of confirmation which seeks to help the baptized child to identify with the church and participate in the church's mission focuses on the 4th, 6th and 7th graders in the month of January. The 4th graders and the parents will be initiated into the confirmation process by Pastor Rossing through a home visit which outlines the whole program through 10th grade and offers some guidelines for having home devotions. Parents are the primary teachers of the faith and the encouraging of home devotions is an important way that they can follow through on their vows when their child was baptized to raise their child in the Christian faith. Contracts of commitment for the confirmation process will be brought to church and presented personally by the 4th graders at the services on Sunday, February 10.

The 6th graders will be on an overnight retreat at Lutherdale Bible Camp, Friday, Jan. 11 to Saturday, Jan. 12. Pastor Rossing will lead them in a study of The Lord's Prayer.

The 7th graders will have completed their four sessions on the Sacrament of Baptism with Pastor Rossing on Wednesday, Jan. 9. They will renew their baptismal covenant at services on Sunday, Jan. 13, The Baptism of our Lord Sunday.

The next phase of confirmation for 8th and 9th graders are the Wednesday evenings services during Lent that begin with Ash Wednesday on Feb. 13. These confirmands will be taking sermon notes during the Lenten season, through March 29. (Easter Sunday is March 31.) They will have spring classes with Pastor Rossing on Wednesday evenings, April 10 - May 15.

I am in the second year of a two-year term as the clergy representative of Emmaus on the Racine Cluster Council. At our last meeting, Dec. 13, we discussed how we can get more ownership and support of activities sponsored by the Racine Cluster of ELCA churches, such as youth events, evangelism and education workshops, etc. I suggested that those of us on the council all make the effort to be intentional in the reporting of what is happening or being planned in the community by our ELCA churches or by the Cluster Council and involved in the recruiting of people for particular events. The Council agreed. So with this issue of The Visitor we begin the reporting process of Cluster Council news and what ELCA churches are up to in Racine.

Cynthia Petkovich, youth advisor of Holy Communion Lutheran Church, discussed with the Cluster Council the challenges and opportunities for doing some youth ministry together. She asked for and received the names of people who work with youth in our congregations. She said she will contact each of these people and serve as coordinator for developing plans for some cooperative youth events.

We approved a grant of \$500 for the Respite Ministry program. This ministry began at Holy Communion, a few years ago. Volunteers provide a weekly break or as-needed for caregivers of an enfeebled person who live with them and need continual attention.

Finally, the Cluster Council agreed that we should review our Cluster Mission strategy. I pointed out that much of the strategy is already provided in our founding documents under "Functions" but that we may want to refine and/or add to these. The Council will be taking our present "Functions" into consideration in the review.

All of this may serve to remind us, appropriately in the season of Epiphany that follows Christmas and stresses the spread of the gospel and with the ELCA's Mission90 just begun, that the church is continually in mission for and by the power of our Lord. Individual congregations and congregations working together are both important elements of the one mission of the church: to bring God's love in Jesus Christ into the lives of people.



- Voted to write a resolution for the Synod Assembly that would urge the Synod to contract for confidential counseling for church professionals and their families without involving the Bishop.
- will ask congregations to submit names of young people to serve as youth delegates at Synod Assembly with deadline for submission by Feb. 14, and will seek fuller youth participation in the Assembly.
- Will send notice to all congregations about concern over defeat of the three public school referendums and encourage people to be involved in meeting the educational needs of our community.


JOANN CHRISTENSEN WRITES







LENT FEATURES "YESHUA"

Something different is in the works for the Lenten season at Emmaus this year. The five weeks of mid-week services between Ash Wednesday and Holy Week will feature a five part video series entitled, "Yeshua." This is the story of Jesus ("Yeshua" being the ancient name) told by the Rev. Oswald Hoffman, formerly the preaching voice of "The Lutheran Hour." 



NEW DAWN NEWS

The following letter was recently received from JoAnn Christensen:

Dear Emmaus family,

Greetings from the Philippines! My teammates and I are all well and are currently in Manila - a city of about ten million people. We have been busy since our arrival in Manila last week visiting churches and schools in the area. New Dawn has spent the last month traveling around the mountainous region of Luzon. We visited several places where the traditional clothing and way of life can still be seen. Many of these people live their lives farming the rice terraces by hand or with the help of a water buffalo. It has been quite a unique & interesting experience to spend a little time with these people living the way they live and worshipping with them.

Despite the poorness of most of the people we encounter, they give their best to us. The Filipinos have shown me a true living meaning of Matthew 25:31-40: "Then the righteous will answer Him, Lord, when did we see thee hungry and feed thee. or thirsty and give thee drink? And when did we see thee a stranger and welcome thee, or naked and clothe thee? And when did we see thee sick or in prison and visit thee? And the Lord will answer them, Truly, I say to you, as you did it to one of the least of these my brethren, you did it to me". These people are incredibly generous and hospitable people willing to serve the Lord in many ways. Despite the serious conflict between to Lutheran church bodies here, the people show a great amount of excitement for the church and our Lord. The youth especially show an enthusiasm and a commitment to God that I have rarely seen!

We will be flying to the second largest island of the Philippines in February - it is called Mindinao. I have heard it is a tropical and beautiful place, and that the people are very musically talented so I'm looking forward to our time there.


Nearly every day I am experiencing new things: people, culture, foods, smells and sites. I believe I am also facing new challenges every day. As a team we are stretched and I'm certain we are growing, but it is not by our own strength. In all of our lives we must rely on the power of God. It is His love that saved us and gives us strength to face challenges and the struggles that we encounter. I know that God wants to use and work through all of us, every part, every aspect, every talent and gift, and every weakness.

There is concern here for our safety, since the outbreak of the war in the Gulf. Many schools and activities have been closed and security tightened due to terrorist threat. We feel safe though, and trust that God and many prayers are with us. I pray that the war will end very soon.

I look forward to returning to Emmaus and sharing with you the many, and sometimes strange, experiences I am having. God's peace be with you all!





RACINE SYMPHONIC CHORUS HONORS MOZART

In 1991, performing artists all over the world are celebrating Mozart's work on the 200th anniversary of his death. And in Racine, the festivities are being taken up by the Racine Symphonic Chorus which will hold its "Celebrate Mozart" at St. Lucy's Catholic Church, 3035 Drexel Ave., on Sunday, March 24 at 3:00 p.m.

The RSC's Mozart Celebration will feature WGTD Fine Arts Director Gregory Berg giving a presentation about Mozart's life. Berg will relate amusing anecdotes about the famed composer's life, illustrating short selections of his work on the piano. Berg will also be the featured bass soloist.

Pastor Rossing, and Pastors Bengston of Bethania and Nycklemoe of Zion, sing with the Racine Symphonic Chorus.

RSC Music Director James Schatzman will lead the chorus and the Racine Symphonic Chorus Chamber Orchestra in Mozart's "Regina Coeli" (Queen of Heaven), for chorus and quartet, "Ave Verum", for chorus, and the "Verperae Solennes de Confessore" (Solemn Vesper Service), for chorus and quartet. "Alleluia", Mozart's best known work for soprano solo, will be performed by Colleen Ferg, a former Racine native who now resides in Denver. Ferg is working on her doctorate in music at the University of Arizona. The tenor soloist will be Park High School Music Director Bill Diekhoff who also conducts the Milwaukee Choristers. Alto soloist will be Marlys Grienke, a favorite with audiences all over Southeastern Wisconsin and on the music staff at Carroll College.

According to James Schatzman, "I feel this concert offers the listener a real variety of ways in which Mozart approached vocal music. "Regina Coeli" is an example of fine sacred music in the classical style of the period; light, lively and upbeat. The "Solemn Vespers Service" tests the bound of the sacred music displaying the fire of his spirit and his passion for drama. "Ave Verum" written in his last months, is a beautiful example of the mature Mozart displaying the culmination of his sensitivity to a reverent text with graceful melody and expressive harmony."

Ticket to the Racine Symphonic Chorus's "Celebrate Mozart are \$7, \$5 for seniors age 65 and over and free to children 12 and under. Plenty of free parking is available. Advance tickets are available at all Heritage Bank Racine locations.



Emmaus is opening up the Prayer Chain to men! Not that you were ever not welcome, guys. But now the women are making the deliberate effort to say, "Come, join us in weekly prayer."

The Prayer Chain has been functioning at Emmaus for many years. This is the way it works: I receive a call from the leader of the Prayer Chain who now is Christine Bournoville. She calls me Wednesday morning, 9:00 a.m. I relate to her the names of individuals who are now hospitalized and/or who have special needs or concerns for which they desire prayers to be said. I also cite certain happenings in the congregation, community and/or world for which to pray. Christine then calls the first one on her list, who calls the next one, etc. And all of us pray. Other concerns and individuals for which to pray can be added by petitioners at any point along the line.

A Prayer Chain implies continuity and regularity in prayer, with petitioners linked together in relationship with God. Being part of Emmaus' Prayer Chain can help you realize the Apostle's admonition: "Pray continually."

Whether or not you - man or woman - are part of the Prayer Chain, it is good to be in the regular practice of prayer. The hymn-writer calls prayer, "the Christian's vital breath, the Christian's native air." Draw in deeply what the Spirit and the Word speak to you. Exhale your frustrations, disappointments, thanksgivings, joys and sorrows - and your intercessions. (The latter is particularly what the Prayer Chain is about: interceding, praying for others.) God wants to hear them all.

God wants to hear from you. And God wants to speak with you. That's why the Holy Spirit calls you and gathers you with others in worship. That's why the Spirit initiates the process of prayer and sustains you in relationship with God, calling you back, time and again.

God will answer you. God will bless you. God will uphold you.

Welcome to the Prayer Chain, men! That goes for women not yet linked up, too. Let Christine Bournoville know, if you'd like to join.



FROM THE PASTOR

"Do you have a church home?"

"No, but we're looking for one."

"Why not come with us and visit our church?"

That kind of conversation has been the beginning for several people over the years becoming members of Emmaus. They joined our fellowship because, in the beginning, there was someone who cared enough to invite them.

Our Deacons Committee has asked all of us at Emmaus to be inviters of newcomers and welcomers of visitors. Towards that end I want to share with you part of a piece I read in the publication I receive monthly called "Worship '91." This is from an article called "Hospitality" in the April issue:

Christian hospitality is more than a nod and a 'Good Morning' to visitors. Visitors are welcomed warmly and made to feel accepted immediately. People sit with visitors and assist them with the liturgy. People bring visitors to the coffee hour, sit with them and engage them in conversation. During the week following someone's first visit, several members send notes thanking the visitor for gracing our assembly with their presence and choosing to spend time among us, and encouraging the visitor to return.

Those are helpful reminders about what it means to welcome the stranger and newcomer to our midst. You might try inviting first to a church function - such as a circle meeting, potluck dinner or Adult Forum. Some may welcome an invitation to worship later. When visitors come to a service, encourage them to sign the guest book in the narthex so a follow-up card from the pastors can be sent. The Holy Spirit can use all of us to call others to God and the fellowship and work of God's family.

WORSHIP AND MUSIC NEWS

Preparations for the 140th Anniversary Celebration are underway. The 140th committee has designated the month of September for special services. Highlights of those Sunday services are scheduled as follows:

In recognition of the Emmaus choirs, we invite the congregation for cake and coffee between the 8:00 AM and 10:30 AM services on June 2nd. This will give us all a chance to thank the choir members for sharing their time and talent with all of us at Emmaus.



CONSULTANT STEWARDSHIP PROGRAM UNDERWAY

The Consultant Stewardship Program is a pilot project developed by the Greater Milwaukee Synod's Mission Interpretation/Stewardship Committee to enable KLCA members to develop faith-response giving based on biblical foundations and utilizing the skill of a dedicated Christian consultant to help participating congregations realize their stewardship goals. The cost of \$2500, approved by the Emmaus congregation with the passing of the budget at the annual meeting in January, will be reduced by a grant of \$500 provided by the Siebert Foundation. So the total cost to Emmaus will be \$2000 instead.

The program for Emmaus and four other ELCA congregations in the Racine area began with a meeting of pastors of the five churches and the consultant to these congregations, David Brunkow, of Gronlund, Sayther and Associates. This consulting firm has been the advisor and trainer for several other churches and church agencies, such as Lutherdale Bible Camp. According to David Brunkow, their campaigns have never yielded less than a 15% increase in pledges.

Mr. Brunkow met with Pastor Rossing and the other clergy from participating congregations in an all-day session on April 17. The consultant presented the overall plan and philosophy of this pilot project in the synod, helped the pastors identify needs and the "case" for each congregation, explored potential themes for the fall programs and established the schedule of activities leading up to the fall stewardship campaign in each congregation. The schedule calls for the next (second) meeting to be the consultant with the pastor and key lay stewardship members in their own congregation. He will be at Emmaus on Thursday, May 30, 10:00 a.m. - 12:30 p.m. to meet with Pastor Rossing, Gregg Albright (stewardship chair) and other members of the committee who can attend.

ELCA response to Kurdish Refugee crisis

We've received many inquiries about ELCA response to the Kurdish refugee crisis. Already the ELCA has provided \$200,000 in World Hunger Funds. plus 28,000 quilts and 13,000 blankets to aid the refugees fleeing northern Iraq. This is in addition to the 15,000 quilts and \$150,000 in cash grants sent earlier for relief and aid in the Gulf crisis.

Additional funds can be sent to the ELCA 's World Hunger Appeal. Lutheran World Relief efforts are not noticed through paid advertizing. since nearly 100% of all gifts go straight for aid. (Refer to the December, 1990, synod newsletter describing Money Magazine's high rating of LWR.)

The red box with the slit on top is for free-will offerings that members of Emmaus may wish to give to help support the Teen-Parenting Program housed downstairs. According to Charlene Gerressen, director, funds for the program are scarce. Emmaus' 140th Anniversary Program Committee recommends this program as the cause for the second quarter (April-June) for congregation members to support among the helping agencies in town. The idea is to focus on at least four helping agencies in the Racine community during this anniversary year of Emmaus as a way of celebrating God's blessings and passing them on to others. During the first quarter this year the Women's Resource Center was the designated recepient of extra offerings. Close to \$150 was realized for the Center from these offerings. The red box for Teen-Parenting offerings is located in the narthex by the main entry to the santuary.

CLUSTER COUNCIL STRIVES TO HELP CHURCHES SERVE

Members of the ELCA Racine Cluster Council have hired the Rev. Robert Tobias, retired professor of Ecumenics at the Lutheran School of Theology at Chicago and local Racine resident, to help them think through and develop a strategy for mission and witness of the church in the Racine area. The plan is to begin with a reading program for the pastors of ELCA churches that will emphasize the changed nature of our society and how churches can work together and in partnership with other agencies to address the needs of the community. A mission statement will be developed and laity involved to specify goals and objectives that might realistically be met.

During the next two years the schedule of representation among ELCA churches calls for Emmaus to be represented on the council by a lay male. This person has not yet been selected.




REMEMBER THE FOOD PANTRY





NEW SOUND SYSTEM COMING

A new sound system that promises to provide clearer, easier to hear amplification will be installed in Emmaus on July 18 and 19. The sound engineer and his helper from Metrosound located in Brookfield, will be working at Emmaus those days to have the new sound system up and running by the following Sunday, July 21. The accepted proposal calls for:

- --- a new central loudspeaker system, with one main speaker on the large beam over the chancel steps. (The side wall speakers will be disconnected and obsolete.)
- ---a new equalization, tuning system
- ---six new speakers to replace the old ones in the narthex, balcony, fireside room and nursery.
- ---a new wireless microphone system.
- ---a new microphone for the pulpit, with the pulpit mike being used in the balcony and a new cable and jack in the balcomy for that microphone.
- ---new or repaired ear phones, cords and volume controls in the central pews.

The total cost proposed is \$2,965, all of it extrabudgetary and funded by interested members of the congregation.

Thanks to Aage Jensen for initiating this project and providing two/thirds of the funding and to Carl Dalgaard, Cecelia Jensen and Roma Martin for their contributions.

The installing company, Metrosound, has done work in several churches in Southeastern WI. They put in a new sound system in the gym of the middle school for First Lutheran (Missouri Synod) on Grand Ave. in Racine, and have proposed projects, just accepted by St. Michael's Episcopal Church on Erie St. and the largest Methodist Church in WI. located in Kenosha. All reference checks reported high commendation for their work.







What is God's Word for our lives today? How do the experiences of major figures in Bible stories connect with our own experiences? How can we convey our personal faith stories to others? A new Bible study that begins at Emmaus on Thursday, October 3, 7:00 p.m. will help adults and older youth to find answers to these and other personal questions of faith, whether they are new or long-time students of the Scriptures.

The Bible study is called "Witnesses to the Word." As part of the GROW theme in our ELCA's Mission90 emphasis the study will enable participants to:

- become more familiar with the content of the Bible;

There will be 20 sessions in all. The first 8 are in October and November. The next 12 will be in January, February and March. The Education Committee encourages members and friends of Emmaus to participate in all sessions. If schedule does not permit this, interested persons are welcome to join in any segment or sessions they can attend.

MARY'S MUSINGS...

Roots and wings. As I look to the month of September this year, those are the two words that come to mind. I think of the 140th anniversary celebration of Emmaus and all that that means, and I sense a real thrust forward in the theme, "Forward in Faith." It's an invitation to fly! I am reminded of the often quoted saying, "There are two lasting things we can give our children--one is roots and the other is wings."

Are there times when we are so deeply rooted in the familiar that we dare not fly? Or, can we, being firmly grounded in our baptisms, let go and move without fear and trepidation into the future that is offered to us by God? Can we soar over new territory, knowing that God is always with us? Are we willing to be re-energized by the fresh air on our faces and to offer the message of the Gospel in fresh new ways to our children and to all of those around us?

There is so much possibility for the future ministry of Emmaus. As we, perhaps sometimes gingerly, move toward the edge of the unknown, I think of the poet's words that go something like this:

"Come to the edge," God said.
They said: "We are afraid."
"Come to the edge," God said.
They came.
God pushed them...and they flew.

That's God's promise to each of us-that we can fly and we can soar and we can trust that we will be sustained throughout the journey. And, that's what letting go and moving "Forward in Faith" is all about-losing our fear, trusting God, knowing that we have been given wings. So, strongly rooted in our baptisms and remembering whose we are, let us move forward to the new decade and beyond!







Greetings:

We are happy to be able to continue with the Teen Parenting Program here at Emmaus. Since the very beginning I felt the Churchs surroundings had a positive influence on the atmosphere in the day care and the attitudes of the parents.

We now have 24 parents and babies in the 3 centers, but will have 31 by the end of Sept. We still only receive funding for that number. The bulk of our funding comes from the State Dept. of Social Services and our local Human Services. The rest has to be made up by grants and private donations. Our budget is conservative in comparison to other similar programs. Our staff starts with minimum wage. This is the first year they will receive any benefits - 3 paid holidays, 1 sick day a month and vacation days taken over Christmas. We try to keep the cost down by volunteers rather than hire subs. Ronald McDonald's has give us a nice Grant for equipment.

We are looking forward to another productive year - helping babies to get a better start in life and re-directing parents to be more goal orientated.

ELCA COMES TOGETHER IN ORLANDO

ORLANDO, Fla. (ELCA) -- "This was a great coming together time for this church," said Bishop Herbert W. Chilstrom of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America at the conclusion of the ELCA Churchwide Assembly here.

Voting members "came with a commitment to become the ELCA, and they did," he said. "The key now is to carry that back to the rest of the church."

This was the second Churchwide Assembly for the ELCA, which was started in 1988 with the merger of the American Lutheran Church, the Lutheran Church in America and the Association of Evangelical Lutheran Churches. Voting members registered for the assembly totaled 1,041.

During the assembly, held Aug.

28-Sept.4 in Orlando, delegates approved social statements on abortion and the death penalty, a statement on ecumenism, budgets for 1991 and 1992, and a proposal to restructure the churchwide offices.

They also elected a bishop, vice president and secretary, the editor of *The Lutheran* magazine and 108 members of churchwide boards and committees. They also dealt with more than 200 resolutions (called memorials) from synods and recommendations from the assembly floor.

Any one of the major items "would have been enough for any assembly," Chilstrom said, but delegates "came prepared and ready to go." That plus the use of electronic voting made it possible for the assembly to complete its work.

WORSHIP

More than 2,000 took part in an opening worship service Aug.28. In his sermon, Chilstrom told the worshipers that more important than their role as representatives of the church body's 5.2 million members, their gender or ethnic origins, is that "we are the children of God."

The Rev. James Nestingen of Luther Northwestern Theological Seminary in St. Paul led the assembly in daily reflections on the Lord's Prayer "with wonderful insight and humor," according to Bishop Peter Rogness.

ECUMENISM

A statement on ecumenism, intended to set policy for the ELCA as it develops relationships with other churches, was adopted. It includes a firm commitment to ecumenism. "Ecumenism must permeate, inform and vitalize every aspect of this church's faith and life, because it is bound to the Gospel and mission in our world," it asserts.

Delegates also adopted recommendations that will delay discussion of a proposal for full communion with the Episcopal Church. A variety of ecumenical guests greeted the assembly.

SOCIAL STATEMENTS

After six hours of debate and more than 70 votes on amendments and procedures, delegates adopted an abortion statement that calls abortion an "option only of last resort" but recognizes that difficult ethical choices sometimes need to be made in which preserving the life in the womb is not the only value at stake. More than 90 percent of the voting members expressed support for the document.

Delegates also adopted a social statement urging abolition of the death penalty and supporting "alternative and appropriate punishment for capital crime, including the possibility of life sentence without parole."

RESTRUCTURE AND FINANCE

Delegates adopted a proposal to restructure churchwide units. In presenting the proposal, Vice President Christine Grumm cited "streamlining" of governance and redirecting funding "from administration to programming" as the major motivators in the restructuring process.

Proposed budgets of \$93,308,000 for 1992 and \$94,900,000 for 1993 were adopted. The ELCA has had three years of income shortfalls of more the \$20 million. The ELCA's 1991 budget was \$95.5 million, but revised income projections resulted in an expenditure authorization of 93.5 percent of that amount.

The assembly called for review the current ELCA medical and dental plan and exploration of ways to reduce the cost of health care for members.

GREATER MILWAUKEE SYNOD MEMORIALS

The Greater Milwaukee Synod sent three memorials to the ELCA Churchwide Assembly.

After an extensive debate, the action from our synod and one other calling for the ELCA's church council to be composed of one member from each synod lost by one of the closest votes of the assembly-454 to 400.

Several synods, including the Greater Milwaukee Synod, had sent

the assembly memorials about the Columbus quincentenary. The assembly called for 1992 to be a year of "remembrance, repentance and renewal."

The Greater Milwaukee Synod memorial regarding the study of homosexual issues was combined with several other related resolutions and deferred until the ELCA's statement on human sexuality is completed in 1993.

OTHER RESOLUTIONS

In response to other memorials, delegates called for congregations to observe an annual AIDS Awareness Sunday and to welcome and work for justice for persons with AIDS.

Delegates asked the ELCA to commit itself to advocacy "with corporations and businesses to protect the rights of workers, support the collective bargaining process and protect the right to strike."

Expressing concern about the human suffering among civilian populations from the Persian Gulf conflict, delegates asked that letters be sent to the U.S. president to reaffirm a continuing role for the United Nations, to support the pursuit of non-violent resolution of conflicts in the Middle East, and to

relate U.S. foreign assistance to the willingness of those nations to negotiate in good faith. They also opposed further housing loan guarantees to Israel if expansion continues in the Occupied Territories.

The assembly asked for prayers for those in El Salvador, especially during the the period of negotiations for peace.

Delegates also adopted a call to action against poverty, especially as it affects women and children. They also approved an evangelism strategy and voted to embark on an intentional effort to become a multicultural church, more reflective of the society of which it is a part, by adopting a multicultural mission strategy.

ELECTIONS

Chilstrom was re-elected to a four-year term as bishop by more than 80% of the votes on the second ballot after narrowly missing election on the first ballot. The Rev. Lowell Almen was re-elected secretary on the first ballot.

Kathleen J. Magnus, assistant to the bishop of the ELCA Rocky Mountain Synod, Denver, was elected vice president to succeed Christine Grumm, who has announced that she is taking a position with the Lutheran World Federation in Geneva, Switzerland. The Rev. Edgar R. Trexler was re-elected editor of *The Lutheran* magazine with an almost 70% "yes" vote.

Elected from the Greater Milwaukee Synod to serve six-year terms on churchwide committees were the Rev. Richard G. Deines, assistant to the bishop--ELCA Church Council; the Rev. Robert E. Duea, director, Lutheran Social Services--Division for Church in Society; and the Rev. Mary Ann Moller-Gunderson, assistant to the bishop--Committee on Discipline.

SYNOD DELEGATES WERE DILIGENT

Bishop Peter Rogness congratulated the Greater Milwaukee Synod delegates to the churchwide assembly for their diligence and commitment. "Our delegates were impressively attentive," he said. "They were present for every session and rarely took a stretch break, despite the arduous schedule."

We have begun our exciting stewardship program "Forward In Faith...Emmaus On The Road To The Future." During the next few weeks we will be considering God's callfor us to be faithful in our ministry and growth as God's people. As we learn and share together we will have the opportunity to consider some challenging vision/mission possibilities for our congregation in 1992.

The following are some important growth areas for our congregation and listed with them are the new financial resources which will be needed to

meetthese needs in 1992:

Benevolences \$5,000 increase over 1991 budgeted amount of \$18,000. We have budgeted approximately\$15,000 for benevolences by the time you are reading this, yet we've given only \$5,000. The ELCA needs our benevolencemonies to carry out the work of the church.

Debt Retirement \$10,000 for 1992. Reducing the amount of principalon the mortgage will allow us in the future to use what was money for the mortgage for other projects, for Emmaus, our

community, and the ELCA.

Remodel sanctuary, Sunset Room & kitchen: \$20,000. Along with debt retirement, you've indicated that this is a high priority for most of you. The pews in the sanctuary desperately need refinishing and the sanctuary and the new additionneed air conditioning. The kitchenis also becoming outdated.

Adult Education and Community Outreach \$5,000 for 1991. A focus on adult education will help us grow individually and as a congregation. Our Social Concerns Committee will be allocated a budget for 1992 to increase our

involvement in community stewardship.

This is indeed a most challenging goal, \$40,000 of new gifts in 1992, for our congregation. But if these can be met through our stewardship efforts this fall, an exciting year will follow in 1992!

During the next few weeks we will be discussing these new challenges in worship and in special events. Please plan to be with us as we consider our ministry for 1992.

BEQUEST TO EMMAUS ANNOUNCED

President Joe Nixa announced to the council at its last regular monthly meeting, Oct. 8, two gifts from the estate of the late Evelyn (Mrs. Oscar) Binder. She was a resident of the Lincoln Lutheran Atrium and became a member of Emmaus about 3 years ago through her friendship with Esther Jensen. She fell in love with the church and Emmaus people. Evelyn died on July 4, 1991 after suffering a severe stroke two weeks earlier.

The first gift for Emmaus in her will is the sum of \$5,000 to establish the Oscar and Evelyn Binder Memorial Fund to be used to promote Christian growth for youth and young adults through the activities and programs of Emmaus. The second gift is 15% of the remaining estate for Emmaus Lutheran Church and is unrestricted. The will is still being processed and it may be several months before everything is finalized. But eventually the two gifts will give a significant boost to Emmaus.

FROM THE PASTOR ...MARY'S MUSINGS

"Take up your cross and follow me..." Mark 8:34

What does "taking up your cross" mean? Is it simply bearing the burdens of life--the illnesses, the hardships and the life-long struggles? Or, is it something more? Isn't it a challenge to "act" rather than to just "put up with"? Isn't it a challenge to take a stand, to make a commitment?

Too often our goal is to be neutral persons. How often have you heard, "Don't step on his toes. Don't offend her. Don't rock the boat?" How often do we avoid bringing up controversial issues for fear of disagreement, of being torn down, of being discounted, or of discouraging "peace" among the ranks? In fact, in the church, how often do we judge the success of a congregational meeting or a committee meeting by lack of discussion of truly challenging or controversial topics? How often do we "walk on eggshells?"

Dorothee Soelle, German theologian, in her book, <u>Choosing Life</u>, challenges what she calls middle class neutrality. She says:

Neutrality is impossible. The person who doesn't make up his/her mind has made it up already. ...I know with certainty that the gospel can endure no neutrality, no opting out. ...there is no doubt at all on which side Jesus stood: on the side of the poor, the people who were religiously uneducated and therefore despised--women, for instance--the outcasts, like the whores and tax collectors. He recruited friends from fishermen, who were rural proletariat. The aim of his struggle--the kingdom of God--meant overcoming a class society and turning it into one where brotherhood and sisterhood are possible. The call to take up the cross is the call to join the struggle. Take sides, break with your neutrality, put yourself on the side of the damned of the world. (p.53)

Are we status quo, neutral persons? Or, as persons journeying Foward in Faith and willing to take up the cross, do we break the silences, resist the waffling and stand up to the challenges of the day? Are we willing to dialogue with boldness? Do you dare take a stand? Do I? Are we able to echo the words of Martin Luther, "Here I stand!"





We appreciate all your help in helping us help someone else.


MEMORY WORK- has been mailed to all Sunday

ADVENT TO BE HIGHLIGHTED IN DECEMBER WORSHIP SERVICES



Emmaus, alternating with other Lutheran churches on the north side, will be leading worship services for the residents of Villa St. Anne on a monthly basis. We will be responsible for two to three services per year. On December 4, Pastor Mary will lead the worship service.

RESULTS OF CHURCH MISSION SURVEY ANNOUNCED

This fall all members of Emmaus were given an opportunity to prioritize mission categories for 1992 and beyond. Many of these categories are not included as line items in the ongoing annual budget of Emmaus and would therefore need to be recipients of extra gifts or increased pledges to make them a reality.

As part of the 140th anniversary special appeal, the #1 priority is being addressed: debt retirement. Other areas have already received some generous gifts from members who have earmarked the monies and have given them above and beyond their regular weekly giving. Two examples of this are: 1) a special gift of \$2,000 to start a fund for the refinishing and adding cushions to the pews and 2) a commitment of up to \$2,000 to purchase special church-related computer software, allowing for all church records and financial reports to be computerized. The ability to meet the other needs will depend upon the final tally of the current Stewardship drive as well as special gifts made throughout the year.

There were 60 responses to the survey, and the top eight priorities (in order of preference from a total of 12 choices) were the following:

- 1. Debt retirement
- 2. Adult education

- 4. Remodel Sanctuary & Sunset Room
- 5. Pay raises for staff
- 6. Administrative time
- 7. More parking/move parsonage
- 8. Remodel kitchen
