

# Racine ELCA Celebrates Epiphany

Between the twelve days of Christmas and the forty days of Lent is the church season of Epiphany, starting every year on January 6 and ending on Shrove Tuesday.

The Racine Mission Cluster of the ELCA is sponsoring the second annual Epiphany Festival with the theme "Into The Light" on Sunday, January 10 at the Siena Center, 5635 Erie Street. The Fellowship and Craft Time begin at 1:30 p.m. Last year, participants made luminaries, baptismal candles, and enjoyed the entertainment of area clowns and magicians. Even more craft projects will be available this year.

At 3:00, there will be a worship service in the beautiful Siena Center chapel, featuring musical groups from all over the Racine area, including a children's mass choir, led by Kylee Albright, and an adult mass choir led by Jim Sodke. (Anyone wishing to participate in the adult choir should come to the rehearsal at the Siena Center at 1:00 that afternoon.)

In the ancient church, the day of Epiphany drew together the themes of the birth of Jesus, the coming of the Magi, Jesus' baptism in the Jordan River, and the miracle of the wine at the Cana wedding feast. Epiphany is the holiday of gift giving, rather than Christmas, in Eastern Orthodox tradition. In western culture, Epiphany has come to be associated with the Magi alone, as representatives of the nations who come to worship Jesus; Lutheran churches often use this time to emphasize world missions.

Jesus' baptism, the beginning of His ministry, is celebrated on the first Sunday of Epiphany. Lutherans celebrate The Transfiguration of Our Lord on the last Sunday of Epiphany (February 21 this year), remembering an epiphany which brings the Old Testament into Jesus' time and offers a preview of the glory which is to come. # Esther Jensen Keeps a Happy Outlook

Esther Jensen has been a member of Emmaus since 1964. She worked at Saint Luke's Hospital as a Registered Nurse for thirteen years prior to her retirement. Since then, she has kept active in the Rebecca Circle of the Women of the ELCA, the Senior Fellowship Center, and, more recently, an exercise program at The Atrium.

"It's important to keep yourself and your mind active," says Esther, who notes that three of the regular Atrium exercisers arrive with canes.

Esther made fifteen quilts for the Lutheran Relief Fund this fall. Half of the material she used was had

belonged to Evelyn Binder, who did a lot of sewing; Esther used Evelyn's material for the tops of the quilts, and her own for the under-side. Esther had to stretch the 60' by 80' quilts across the room from her sofa to tie them together.

While Esther has only recently taken up making blankets, she has been

making bibs for the Lincoln Lutheran Centers for several years. A group used to meet every Monday to make these bibs, and Esther says she would like to get a bib-making group started up again.

Esther is the Cheer Chair for her Women's Circle, the Senior Center, and the Atrium, and manages the Sunshine Fund for Emmaus Seniors with Lucille Atkinson. The Sunshine Fund gets cards, preferably samples, from a company in Chicago and sends them to seniors on their birthdays. They also sell the cards at Senior Center for 30¢ apiece.

When asked about her philosophy of life, Esther told about choosing the photo for her driver's license a few days earlier. "They took two pictures: one sober, and one smiling. I told them I chose the smiling one because I think I was born with a smile on my face.

"I thank the Lord for my sunny disposition."

#### From the Pastor

What will happen in 1993?

Sometimes at the inauguration of a New Year, we imagine that it would be good to know how the year will turn out in advance. Then we could be ready for what life brings our way. Right now there are just lots of questions.

We wonder what surprises there will be, what joys, what disappointments, what opportunities, what decisions, and what will continue to give stability and security. But the fact is: we don't know—not entirely. We cannot

live life ahead of time, lodging ourselves on December 31, 1993, and knowing in advance all of what will happen before then.

Soren Kierkegaard, the great Danish philosopher, wrote about the life of faith as a trust walk. He said that human beings often want faith to be something like a student working with mathematical problems from a math book that has the answers in the back of the book and all you have to do is look up the answers if you can't figure out the problem or you need to have your answer confirmed. But, says Kierkegaard, that's not the way life is, and it's not the way faith is.

To have faith—as the Christian Church speaks of faith—is to trust in Christ Jesus who has conquered sin, death and the power of the devil. By his victory, believers are assured that "we are more than conquerors through him who loved us" and that "nothing shall separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord" (Romans 8:37, 39).

The beginning of a New Year is a time to have our faith reaffirmed, our trust in Christ Jesus as Guide and Savior be strengthened. For we walk "by faith, not by sight" (2 Corinthians 5:7).

# Stewardship Pledges Total \$160,000!!




# Lenten Stamp Contest Returns



#### Norway Lutheran Celebrates 150 Years

Pioneers living in the Muskego area organized the first Norwegian Lutheran congregation in America on Sept. 13, 1843. The first pastor, Rev. Clausen, was ordained in a barn. There were 250 members.

The first year of the church's existence was not a pleasant one. Seventy people died of cholera, with 17 burials on New Year's Day, 1844.

The old log church was built from the surrounding forests and was dedicated in 1845. The pioneer worshipers endured the rigors of five Wisconsin winters before a heating stove was installed in 1849.



A cream brick "Church on the Hill" was finished in 1870. The new stone church was built in 1964. Several of today's Norway Lutheran Church members are in the 6th generation, descended in an unbroken family line from founding members.

The congregation at Norway Evangelical Lutheran Church, 6321 Heg Park Rd., Wind Lake, is celebrating its

150th anniversary with many events throughout the year, including a Lute-fisk Dinner on Feb. 12. For a complete schedule of events, please call the church office at 414/895-2281.

1993, also attended your congregation's annual meeting. Together you were thinking ahead, planning for the future. That's a vital part of our life.

But don't lose sight of why most of you have joined that church: "It's friendly here. I felt like I belonged. People care about me here...."

The most important questions you can face when you plan for the future are questions about relationships: Are we a welcoming place? Do visitors return? Do we let people in our neighborhood know we care about them? Do we know what our neighbors struggle with, so we can join them in those struggles?

The many activities we fill our lives with are healthy and good, but the most vital time we spend is the time that builds relationships. We aren't created to be islands, but we are woven into the fabric of each others' lives.

"God is love, and those who abide in love abide in God, and God abides in them." This isn't just some psychological advice. As we live our lives caring for others, God comes alive to us in that love. Let this be a year when the presence of God in your life grows stronger as you build loving, caring relationships with others.

Just as our own physical bodies are so intricately and amazingly inter-connected and just as the well-being of one part of the body affects the health of the entire body, so it is with the church.

One of the gifts I got for my birthday in January was a 1993 calendar of "365 Great Quotes from C.S. Lewis." It has one quote from one of his writings for each day of the year. C.S. Lewis was a wonderful British writer who employed all his talents in the From the Christian cause after his conversion in his adult years. He made great use of analogies, metaphors, legends and stories to present the good news of God's love in Christ in intriguing and winsome ways.

I'm writing this page on Feb. 17. The quote from C.S. Lewis for today is from his little yet persuasive book, Mere Christianity:

God designed the human machine to run on Himself. He Himself is the fuel our spirits were designed to burn, or the food our spirits were designed to feed on. There is no other. That is why it is just no good asking God to make us happy in our own way without bothering about religion. God cannot give us a happiness and peace apart from Himself, because it is not there. There is no such thing.

We come to the Lenten Season, 7 weeks of preparation for Easter. This is a time to focus on God revealed in the sufferings and death of Jesus Christ. It is a time for us to let the Holy Spirit call, gather, cleanse and renew us. In the process we will be refueled by God. Our spirits will burn bright and clean by the power, the pure energy, God gives us through the Word and the Sacraments.

"The Seven Last Words of Jesus" can serve as the transmitters for God's power to refuel and renew our Won't you join us in regular worship on Tuesday noon, 12:15 p.m., or Wednesday evening, 7:00 p.m. during Lent?

Consult the letter with the topics and times of services (sent earlier), and come! Remember, as C.S. Lewis wrote, "God cannot give us a happiness and peace apart from Himself, because it is not there."






Sunday School offerings are very important. Everyone should remember to bring their offering in the envelopes that were provided at the beginning of the Sunday School year.



# Pastor Mary's Column: What If?

What if? It's such an easy question to ask, isn't it? We each have a tendency to wonder and to ask from time to time, "What if..."

When I traveled to North Dakota in early March for my Aunt Alma's funeral, I caught myself asking some of those "What if" questions that relate to life and to death. I asked myself, "What if I live almost 100 years as my Aunt Alma did? And if I do, what if my quality of life isn't as good as hers, or what if there isn't money to support me that long?" What if...

As my mom and my sister and I were together, one of the thoughts to cross my mind was, what if my own father had lived until this year to celebrate his 50th wedding anniversary, rather than to have died when I was only five years old? How would that have made a difference in our lives? What if...

Do you find yourself asking "What if" questions, too? What if I lose my job? What if my health fails and I can no longer take care of myself? What if I don't find something really worthwhile and satisfying to do with my life? What if our family problems don't get resolved? What if...

During this Lenten season, as we find ourselves weighed down so heavily with "What ifs," there is one "What if" question that need not be asked. That question is "What if I haven't done enough to warrant God's love?" That question is not even an option! There are no "What ifs" when it comes to God's unconditional love for us.

During these final days of Lent, we walk the way of the cross. From palm branches and hosannas the scenario changes. On Thursday of Holy Week, we share the final Passover meal with Jesus and on Friday we stand at the foot of the cross and witness the crucifixion and the burial.

But what if it all ended there? Thankfully, we don't even have to consider that question; there is more! Death has been conquered and the most haunting of all the "What if" questions is now erased with Christ's resurrection. And so each of us can look forward to our own death, trusting the promise as echoed by Paul in his answer to the question "Who shall separate us from the love of



# April Is Child Abuse Awareness Month

Child abuse is a growing concern, both nationally and in Racine County. Here are just a few of the startling statistics:

- \* Nationally, an estimated 2.6 million children are reported as abused or neglected.
- \* In the State of Wisconsin in 1990, 38,842 reports of child abuse or neglect were filed.
- \* 40% of the reports of maltreatment involved children five years old or younger.
- \* In approximately 80% of child abuse cases, the child knows the abuser.
- \* One of every three girls and one of every six boys will be sexually abused at least once by the time they reach age 18.
- \* Over the last two years, an average of three children a day have been reported as victims of mistreatment.

In 1991, 1,214 cases of child abuse were reported in Racine County alone. This means that one out of every forty children was reported to be abused. cases may have gone unnoticed. Stop Child Abuse and Neglect (SCAN), a program of Lutheran Social Services, is working to eliminate this problem. SCAN focuses on child abnuse prevention through educating the public about abuse and neglect and initiating prevention projects. In addition to a Speakers Bureau, newsletters, public service events, parenting classes and community events, SCAN has developed several innovative ways to prevent child abuse.

# Pastor Lyle's Page

I'm writing this piece on the day that many of you received my letter informing you that the congregation of Our Savior's Lutheran Church in Hibbing, Minnesota is voting this Sunday (April 25) to send me the call to be their senior pastor. It's taken a long time — several months — since I was first contacted by the call committee there.

In some ways I've been living in limbo. The only actual call I've had is this one, from Emmaus, and that's been for the last ten and one-half years. For that reason it's been important to continue to carry on my ministry as effectively as possible and to help plan for the future here. In recent months, and increasingly as it became clear that I was "the candidate of choice" for the call to Our Savior's in Hibbing, I had to consider the possibility of a future in northern Minnesota. So you might say I've had to live in two worlds lately.

In meeting parishoners at Our Savior's in Hibbing at an informal, social evening last week, one of the members — mindful of how long and difficult the call process in the church is — said to me, "This is a horrendous process they put you pastors through."

I don't know that it is "horrendous." But it does take time. And it does involve working with others as fully as possible in the present parish even while considering the possibilities in another setting...not so easy sometimes.

I appreciate so much Pastor Mary, Paul Berge (parish secretary) and Joe Nixa (president) — as well as my dear wife, Betty, of course — in whom I've been able to confide, seek consel and find support for deciding about the call to Hibbing. I also am grateful to all of the council members who are providing such fine leadership this year and are mapping exciting plans for the future of Emmaus. I know the work here is in good hands.

May Christ Jesus, the Lord and Guide of us all, continue to lead and equip us for God's service in the church, the body of Christ, and the world.





### Pews to Receive a Facelift

Beginning in mid-June, the pews in our church will mysteriously disappear—five at a time! They will then return, repaired and refinished a week later when the next five will be removed for the same purpose. In the process, several pews will also be shortened to allow for wheelchair accessibility.

All of this, as well as cushions for the pews, is made possible because of two generous gifts to the congregation—one designated for the purpose of cushions for the pews and the other which is a portion of the funds received from the Evelyn Binder estate. The project is scheduled to be completed by the end of August.

The Council has also approved that renovation plans be drawn up for the kitchen and Fellowship Hall. Those specific plans will be presented at the June Church Council meeting and at that time the Council will decide which of the suggestions for improvement should take priority.

Current considerations include installation of a new dishwasher, removal of a portion of the wall between the kitchen and storage area next to the kitchen, new shelving in the area of the dishwasher, installation of a commercial garbage disposal, the lowering of the ceiling and installation of fluorescent lights in Fellowship Hall. Other suggestions for Fellowship Hall include skimcoating the walls, painting, installation of levelor blinds and replacement of the flooring. While not all of this will be financially possible at this time, there should be a good start on the project this summer.

Another portion of the Binder estate money will be designated for updating office equipment. The two most urgent needs are to update our computer equipment and the purchase of a new copy machine. In addition to that, a special gift has been given for the purchase of a laser printer and for computer furniture for the main church office. A big thanks you to those of you who have so generously contributed to these special projects! We will provide you with an update on final decisions for expenditures and priorities in the next *Visitor*.

The review was valuable to the committee to understand the steps toward ultimately extending a call and that we will have some flexibility in going about the business of making a call for another pastor.

At our June 23 meeting with Al Heggen, Assistant to the Bishop, we discussed the type of survey to conduct. There is most always a sense of loss among the church members when a pastor leaves. I'm sure many of us are struck by that feeling of loss. Bishop Rogness was very reassuring that Emmaus will be able to extend a call, and get acceptance, for another fine pastor to work with Pastor Mary.



The past several weeks have been both sobering and exciting ones at Emmaus.

Why are they exciting? Take a look around! There has been a real flurry and enthusiasm among so many of you as you have volunteered very generously of your time and energy. You have been here helping with everything from hauling air conditioners and refinished pews to coordinating and teaching Vacation Church School to preparing snacks and meals for Daycampers and their

counselors. You have tended the office while Paul was at a conference, and you have assisted with cleaning and yard work—not to mention sitting on committees and making important decisions about next fall's schedule and pastoral needs during the interim period and beyond. Others of you have visited the homebound or have provided rides to those in need. And the list goes on. Your enthusiastic

commitment to the ministry of Emmaus is both energizing and exciting! Thank you for all you are doing.

What, then, could be so sobering in the midst of all this activity and enthusiasm? The answer has to do with dollars and cents. That is an area where we are limping right now, and we need the help of every committee member and friend of Emmaus to pull us out of the tremendous financial slump we are currently experiencing.

In the middle of June, we reluctantly borrowed money from remaining (yet already committed) funds from the Evelyn Binder estate. That internal loan of \$13,600.00 was necessary to do nothing more than to pay past overdue bills for which we did not otherwise have sufficient income. That money now must be repaid in a timely manner so that it can be used for the areas for which it was originally intended.

Perhaps, from time to time, your own household budget has experienced the "borrow from Peter to pay Paul" syndrome. Maybe you have had to dip into education or vacation or retirement funds to cover an immediate need. Sometimes an unexpected lay-off or illness or a broken-down car or appliance requires that temporary juggling. It can and does happen.

Our goal is that this shortfall be as temporary as possible for Emmaus and that we all do what we can to Continued on next page —>

help. Are you able to make your financial pledge current (or maybe even pay ahead a week or two or more)? Is a special gift possible? Maybe you are considering adopting a Sunday sometime in the future to help with the retirement of our debt. If so, do you realize what a boost it would be if you could do that in July or August rather than waiting? If extenuating circumstances prevent you from going "above and beyond" financially at this time, could you consider a gift of time to the church? As we write this, we are far from down or pessimistic. ### A Vision of a United Church



How many leaves are on a tree? Ever counted? 500? 1,000? 10,000? How about on a 5-year old tree? I think one

of the most memorable moments that will come out of the ELCA's Churchwide Assembly later this summer will have nothing to do with resolutions, reports, or elections. I think people will leave talking about the tree.

Each of your congregations has recently received a leaf-a nice-sized green one. Each of you is invited to write your congregational name and location, and some word of encouragement or partnership, indicating your sense of mission and the mission of the whole church with whom you are partners.

You're also invited to receive and send on a thankoffering gift for this mission work we share as well. You'll send the leaves (and offerings, if you do that) to our synod office. We'll have a "branch," to which we'll attach every one of our 143 leaves.

At the Assembly worship service on Sunday, Aug. 29, the 65 branches

from our synods-loaded with over 11,000 leaves—will be brought forward and joined to the one trunk that makes us one church.

As I say, I have a hunch that may be the most impressive memory to come from the gathering. And each of you will be a part of it.

Then on that August 29 worship hour, as we are joining these leaves and branches together, each of the 11,000+ congregations in the ELCA will join in using the same litany that the Assembly delegates will pray.

And a final thought: as impressive as this visible symbol is, use a wideangle lens and get an even broader view. Remember that our ELCA, with over 5 million members, is only one part of an 80 million member family of Lutheran Christians around the world, and that we Lutherans are only part of the whole body of Christians that number up towards billions.

By chance a treadle sewing machine was located in Ohio the day the truck arrived in Milwaukee, but could not be transported in time to reach the truck. Janet Brunner, Lincoln Park Lutheran Church, Milwaukee, will bring the sewing machine to El Salvador when she travels to Comunidad Rutilio Grande with a synod delegation in March, 1994.

The Synod staff, after listening to the needs of Emmaus, recommended a very fine candidate to serve our congregation during this interim period. Sandy Chrostowski (a Polish name from Cudahy!) was interviewed by the Executive Committee of the Church Council, which is the committee that also serves as the Personnel Committee of the church. At their June 24 meeting, they unanimously decided to offer Sandy the half-time interim position beginning July 1.

Sandy, a June graduate of the Lutheran School of Theology in Chicago, has been assigned to the Greater Milwaukee Synod and is currently awaiting call for a full-time permanent position as a pastor in this synod. Because that process will take several months, she is available to serve the needs of Emmaus in the meantime. In the covenant agreement between Emmaus and Sandy, it was agreed that Sandy would not be considered among the candidates presented for the permanent call to Emmaus. Therefore, at the time a second pastor accepts a call, Sandy's work with us will have been completed.

Prior to Sandy's theological studies at LSTC, she worked in Florida as an Occupational Therapist. Her husband, Jay, teaches at the Medical College in Milwaukee and also works as a clinical psychologist. Sandy and Jay currently live in Gurnee with Rachel, their  $3\frac{1}{2}$  year old daughter.

Sandy's warm, out-going personality is contagious, and you will want to meet her just as soon as possible. When asked what is her greatest passion and focal point for ministry, she answers without hesitation, "Worship." That is where she so strongly senses God's presence and hears the promise of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. Committed to serving the whole people of God, Sandy appreciates the entire spectrum of age levels and backgrounds of people and is eager to be a partner in continued on back page ->

# Fall Clothing Drive Announced



#### **Family Offers Mealtime Gifts**

Several years ago, David and Linda Napieralski, members of Mount Hope Lutheran Church, West Allis, began teaching their two children a lesson in stewardship. For a period of six months, each member of

the family would place a dime in a jar before the evening meal. When the jar was full, they would donate it to Mt. Hope or another local project.

But after the six-month "lesson" was over, the children asked to continue. Since then the family has col-



lected more than \$500, and the dimes have grown to quarters.

"The jar is filled again, and this time the family decided that it should go to the synod," said Dave as he handed Bishop Peter Rog-

ness a check for \$125, representing 5 months' worth of quarters.

"I think that the family mealtime donation is a wonderful teaching and training tool, regularly lifting up the pattern of giving towards the needs of others," the bishop said.

#### **Church Collects Coats**

Over the past five years, Christ Our Savior Lutheran Church, Sussex, has become a major collector of coats. Working in conjunction with the WITI-TV 6 "Coats for Kids" coat drive, the church collects coats of all sizes and donates them to families in need of warm winter clothing.

From July to October, parishioners and people throughout the community clean their closets and bring unwanted or outgrown coats to the church. Christ Our Savior is the single largest donator to the drive, collecting three truckloads of coats each year.

"What started five years ago like a tiny mustard seed has blossomed into an inspiring outreach to others," said Nancy Bloedorn, parish secretary and coordinator of the drive. The feeling was captured by one of the younger members of Christ Our Savior when she said, "It's like my old coat is giving someone a warm hug!"

#### It's Not Our Work-It's God's



Back in the midst of summer, about the time committees and pastors were beginning to feel anxiety rise about

whether they had their act together for fall activities in the parish, there appeared a verse in the Old Testament lesson that's always been one of my favorites. Speaking through Isaiah, God claims ownership of the sending of the rain that waters the earth, then says:

So shall my word be that goes forth from my mouth; it shall not return to me empty, but it shall accomplish that which I purpose, and prosper in the thing for which I sent it.

As we scramble to try again to make good things happen in the parish, it's not uncommon to encounter disappointment, hopes not quite realized, and frustration at the little things that don't go right.

We lay an awful lot of responsibility on ourselves. We forget this promise from Isaiah, and others like it, that make it very clear it's not our work at all that we're doing, it's not our clubhouse we're taking care of, it's not our message we're proclaiming—it's God's!

And God has always worked through the faithfulness of imperfect people, and the Word has been brought to people through the centuries. It's a reassuring and encouraging word that we need to hear, because we're often too close to things to remember it.

It's like the summer project my wife and I took on. We stripped and restained the woodwork in our kitchen, put on new wallpaper, paint, etc. When we walk into it, our eyes move like lasers straight to the blemishes. Others walk in and say how nice it is. We like hearing the observations of others, because while we know it's a good job, the blemishes take on huge proportions!

Similarly, it's often others who see best what we're about in our parish life. Churches that are energetic in outreach are reminded again and again of the nature of their ministry by those who are new to it.

Congregations that are content to exist only for themselves lose both that new vision and new life, and remove themselves from the lifegiving activity of the God who is constantly sending the Word out to bear new fruit.

Know that God is faithful to the promise that the Word doesn't return empty, but accomplishes its purpose!

#### Water Walker Wins for Spirit

The latest evangelism effort of First United Lutheran Church, Sheboygan, was a great deal of fun and received a wonderful response, according to pastor Audrey Lukasak.

The church entered a float into Sheboygan's eighth annual Great Cardboard Boat Regatta and Fourth of July Parade.

Over 5,000 people watched the parade, during which members of First United, dressed as disciples, passed out 3,000 crackers as a symbol of Jesus' feeding the multitudes.

The boat, fashioned in the shape of two feet, was christened "Water Walker" at a church blessing. The 9' x 6' boat was made of 16 layers of cardboard fastened with five gallons of glue. Would it stay afloat in the windy waters of Sheboygan Harbor?

If the boat sank, it would be like

Peter doubting and falling into the water; therefore one side of the cutout figure standing in the middle of the boat was Peter with white knuckles. If the boat floated, then it was Jesus walking on water; hence Jesus was represented on the other side of the cut-out wearing a halo.

"Yes, Jesus did walk on water and our boat stayed afloat," said Lukasak, the boat's skipper and coordinator of the project. In fact, the church won the prize for having the "best spirit."

Lukasak credits faith, and not a miracle, with the boat's success. "Many people spent hours creating, laughing, painting, gluing, and discussing the theology of Jesus walking on water, Peter's faith, and the feeding of the multitudes," she said. "We feel God blessed us and reminded us of the spirit of play."

- Sunday, October 31 is Confirmation Sunday as well as Reformation Sunday.


In addition, there will be regularly scheduled New Member classes and Adult Forums beginning Sunday, September 19.

#### Glenn Olson Starts 19th Year as Center Director

This September, Glenn Olson began his nineteenth year as the director of the Senior Fellowship Center at Emmaus. The center had run for one year before that under the directorship of Sue Erhart.

The Senior Center first met on October 22, 1974, under the direction of Lincoln Lutheran Home Extension Services. The program that morning featured Al Streiff and his slides of Denmark.

Glenn retired as a teacher with Unified in June of 1975 and spent the next three months attending the Senior Center to see how it was run. Under Glenn's guidance, the center has been a important and vital part of the ministry of Emmaus, providing fellowship for upwards of thirty people every Tuesday.

In these 18 years, it is estimated that the Senior Fellowship Center has gone through 1,800 loaves of cinnamon bread, 2,250 pots of tea, and 54,000 cups of coffee. But what is really important, Glenn notes, is the number of contacts in a church setting for the people who attend the center.


# LWR Fall Clothing Drive Gets Underway







# LSS Services Reach Over 90,000

The services of Lutheran Social Services will be highlighted at the October 3 Adult Forum. Lee Carroll, Vice President of the Southeast Region of LSS will speak.

The special offering October 3 is designated for LSS; Lutheran Brotherhood matching funds have been applied for through Lutheran Brotherhood branch 8013.

Lutheran Social Services was at work at more than 150 sites in 85 communities in Wisconsin and Upper Michigan in 1992.

The result is service to over 90,025 people in 1992 alone. Major LSS programs include counseling, residential care, alcohol and drug abuse treatment, chaplaincy, education and prevention, and specialized services for people who are developmentally disabled, chronically mentally ill, or elderly.

The agency served 14 percent more people in 1992 than 1991, according to the Rev. Robert E. Duea, LSS President.

Counseling services reached 41,930 people in 1992, a 15% increase over 1991. 89 residential programs were in operation; there were only 34 in 1985.

Services for the elderly, including day care, chore services, meals on wheels, and home health care, increased by nearly one

third between 1991 and 1992.

Family life and professional education programs more than doubled in 1992, mostly as a result of child abuse prevention programs that touched the lives of some 8,500 children, parents, and teachers.

Financially, LSS ended 1992 with a \$102,000 gain on an operating budget of \$33.5 million. Budget revenue included \$1.3 million from congregations of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America.

Representing the LSS board of directors from the Greater Milwaukee Synod are Edward Gums of Greendale, Rev. Frank Janzow of Waukesha, Donna Lathrop of Racine, and Cloria Wheeler and Bishop Peter Rogness of Milwaukee.

It is with concern for the North Side Food Pantry that I am writing you. As of August 31st, 1,656 people have received food from the Food Pantry since the first of January, 1993. In 1992, we served a total of 1,739 in the entire year. Because of the tremendous demand on the resources of the North Side Food Pantry this year, funds are drastically depleted and we have cut back on what we have to offer to those who come to us in need. Fall and winter are the times of the year when there is usually an increase in the need for emergency food supplies.

With our current funds, if no financial assistance is received from the sponsoring churches, I doubt that the North Side Food Pantry will be able to remain open through the end of December. I ask that you put this before your congregation as a plea for monetary donations so that the North Side Food Pantry can continue to help the needy in our community.

# ELCA Assembly Codifies Lay Ministry

Aug. 25-Sep. 1, the 1,037 voting members of the 1993 Churchwide Assembly of the ELCA met in Kansas City, Missouri, to act on crucial issues before this church. The theme of the assembly was "Rooted in the Gospel...for Witness and Service."



Among actions taken at the assembly were the establishment of the lay roster categories of Associates in Ministry (AIMs) and Diaconal Ministers. The latter is a new category of ministers who are certified but not necessarily ordained; they would serve "under call" in any of a variety of positions. The assembly also voted to authorize bishops to license non-ordained persons to administer the sacraments in extraordinary circumstances.

Bishops' terms were increased to six years. Individual synods may vote to limit the number of consecutive terms a bishop may serve.

The assembly passed resolutions pledging opposition to anti-semitism and to harassment of persons because of their sexual orientation. Delegates expressed support for the sister church in Yugoslavia, the establishment of a Lutheran seminary in Russia, and tighter gun control legislation in the United States.

The next Churchwide Assembly of the ELCA will be in Minneapolis in August, 1995.

#### REST Program Starts Operations

Racine Emergency Shelter Taskforce (REST), the local program addressing needs for emergency shelter during the cold months of the year, opened its doors at Emmaus on

Friday, October 22. That first night was almost a "dry run," as there were only two guests who used our facilities. As the weather gets colder, it is anticipated that those needs will escalate considerably.



As of this writing, five churches are participating in the REST program as host sites. In addition to Emmaus, they are Our Savior's Lutheran, Holy Communion Lutheran, St. Edward's Roman Catholic, and Taylor Avenue Church of the Nazarene. Each church opens its doors one night per week; Emmaus is open every Friday night from 7:00 p.m. to 7:00 a.m.

A number of congregations are contributing to the REST program in other ways. The Friday night shelter at Emmaus is staffed by volunteers not only from Emmaus, but also from Christian Community Church (whose members currently worship at Park High School).

Members of Emmaus have generously donated needed sheets, blankets, pillows, toiletries and other items for the shelter. The cost of each mat is \$31.00. Monetary donations of any amount are welcome.

Volunteers are needed to work any of three shifts, 7:00-11:00 p.m., 11:00 p.m.-3:00 a.m., and 3:00-7:00 a.m. As you might expect, it is the late night shifts which are hardest to find volunteers for. Over the course of a night, we have 14 shifts to fill.

The shelters will continue in operation until April.

If your car starts one out of three or four times. do you consider it faithful?


■ If the paper carrier skips your Monday and Thursday editions, would you miss them?


