### Neighborhood Camp

- Neighborhood Camp 2022 is now history. Forty-six campers were led by a staff of seven; including high school and college students. Our camp staff was encouraged by experienced teachers and a social worker.
- Our theme of Be Kind To Ourselves, Our Neighbors and Our World kept the campers busy and creative. Butterflies, bees, and blooms: They learned the



importance of bees and butterflies as pollinators of the food we eat. They stenciled a butterfly - Thank you Rebecca Bissi for leading this activity! The Emaus sewers helped the campers make banners encouraging all to Save Our World.

They designed life sized self-portraits of

themselves. Taking care of ourselves involved some time spent with a Yoga instructor.

• STOP, LOOK & LISTEN! This mantra has been emphasized to get the campers to tune into nature. They have spent time feeding the birds and

checking under rocks for insects. They watched as painted lady caterpillars matured into butterflies that they released into the garden. The Racine Zoo paid a visit and



brought animals native to Wisconsin.







- The campers enjoyed visits from people in our community. The Racine Police shared what they do to keep peace and explained the equipment they use. Nancy Carlson, a local naturalist, kept the kids engaged with hands-on activities including water testing, and close up views of crayfish with special magnifying containers. A member of the Racine Library staff led story time for our younger ones.
- Save Our World: Plastic: The campers collected plastic all summer and dumped it into our indoor "ocean." The "ocean" was moved to the field with the message that we are hurting our oceans and lakes especially endangering the animals that live there.



Reading continues to be encouraged.
All campers spent at least 20 minutes



per day engaged in books. For every eight books a camper read, they received a free book. Some campers received upwards to eight books!

• Something new was added this year. Find the Light, a writing workshop, led by Genie Webb, engaged 10 of our campers in a 4-week session in which they wrote about overcoming an incident in their lives. Upon graduation they each received a certificate. Their stories will be published by the end of the year. • Check out Nancy Smith's Facebook page for pictorial reports of camp.

### Social Justice Report

RIC is spending most of its energy from now to November "Turning Up the Vote." As in the past, we adhere strictly to our non-partisan guidelines and calling. We want to be sure every eligible voter in Racine knows how to vote and what they are voting for. Here are some examples of the kinds of work we have been doing:

- We have written up and distributed descriptions of which offices are on the ballot, and what it is they all do.
- We have printed and distributed voter registration information to encourage new voters to register and participate.
- We have organized a candidate forum for US Senate candidates to answer questions about mass incarceration and immigration reform. It will be held at Mt Zion Missionary Baptist Church at 8:15 on July 21. The address is 2207 North 2nd Street, in Milwaukee. The event will also be live-streamed on WISDOM's Facebook page, in case you can't make it in person.
- We have asked Senate candidates polling above a certain percentage to fill out a questionnaire about their positions on specific questions relating to immigration reform and enforcement. We are taking their answers and distributing them to voters.

We are especially interested in helping lower income citizens residing in the City of Racine understand how to exercise their right to vote. We pay special attention to three neighborhoods where, during the last election, we managed to raise voter turnout to over 80%. We have a work around for this and we are working with Spectrum, our internet provider. Last week they installed an amplifier, but we are still having issues.
