North Side Food Pantry 2021 - 2022

Report from Steve Oppeneer, Director

Thank you to your team and your congregation for your continued support of the North Side Food Pantry. During 2022, the Pantry served over 1300 adults and 1674 children with an increase of 420 households, 920 adults, and 780 children over 2021. We were able to meet the increased needs with continuing strong government support and our very generous contributions from our community. We will need this continued community support in 2023 as government programs are ending and food costs continue to increase.

Emaus contributed 250 lbs. of food during 2022.

On Tuesday evenings, the Pantry has partnered with St. Vincent de Paul to provide hot meals. We moved the Pantry time to 4:30 to match the meals and provide a later time for working families to stop at the Pantry.

Thanks again for your continued support, and we look forward to new adventures in 2023.

Black History Month has had all reading, discussing, and creating artwork about several important people. Jackie Robinson, #42, was remembered for his courage and positivity as he became the first African American to play major league baseball.



The older groups presented a readers theater that highlighted Robinson's early years in baseball. It was not an easy time for Jackie. He received many taunts and threats from fans.

With President's Day, we talked about Abraham Lincoln and the



impact he had on slavery. (How do you say Emancipation Proclamation?) Lincoln gave a lot of speeches. The kids got a kick out of the fact that he would put his speech notes inside of his stovepipe hat. They also were amazed that he learned to read by himself and liked reading out of

doors lying on the ground with his feet propped up on a tree trunk.






The kids examined the Lincoln penny.

The black population boycotted the buses for over a year. She was known for her role in encouraging racial justice. Her statue is in the US Capital. Notice the approach to learning about Rosa; What I know, What I want to know, and what I leaned. This interactive approach has been a new addition at EASY.

Joshua Glover? We
learned that he was a
fugitive slave who
walked for months from
St. Lous to Racine to find
freedom. Because of the
Fugitive Slave Act, he
was found and arrested
by his owner and thrown
into jail in Milwaukee.
Sherman Booth, an
abolitionist, gathered



thousands of people to protest. They broke down the door to the jail and released him. Joshua used the Underground Railway to make his way back to Racine. He boarded a steamship and sailed to freedom in Canada.



The commemorative marker is in Racine's Monument Square.

What is a mobius strip? The kids got to experiment with paper, pencil and scissors to find out. When you take a strip of paper and draw a line down the middle of it, twist it once, tape it then cut it down the middle, you get a continuous strip of paper. Some cut this strip down the middle and got a longer continuous Mobius strip.



We remember . . . It has been one year since the **Russian invasion of Ukraine**. The kids reflected on what it must be like to live in a country with on again off again power, no water, and the destruction of hospitals and schools. We talked about the thousands of people who have fled to other countries and how hard it is for families to be apart. They saw videos of relocated refugees: kids in a Chicago school and a community in the state of Washington. One elderly grandmother is teaching herself English and with a big smile on her face said to those around her "I love you", "God bless you", and "You are nice!"

In remembrance, all got to take a sunflower, the Ukraine national flower home to their families.
