The Most Important Letter You Will Ever Receive...

Have you ever received a love letter? I mean a real, honest-to-goodness "I love you so much it hurts" kind of love letter...

Letter-writing was a popular pastime in history, particularly in the 18th century, when many wrote love letters to those who were far away at war.

Just a few weeks ago, more than 100 letters addressed to French sailors aboard the Galatée warship in 1758 were released. The sailors were captured by the British that same year during the Seven Years War and the letters were never delivered. For 265 years, the letters sat sealed in Britain's National Archives, unopened and unexamined until a history professor stumbled upon them. He found, to his delight, a treasure trove bearing intimate details about romance and daily life in mid-18th-century France.

In some letters, wives pine for their husbands, wishing they could be reunited or waiting to hear whether their loved ones were safe. Some are from fiancées, desperate for any sign of remembrance and affection from their beloved. Some are from mothers to their sons, speaking of childhoods long gone and the sacrifices they would be willing to make in order to see their sons again.

All speak of longing and the wish for reunification. And all speak of love.

They are amazing, but they pale in comparison to what Timothy Dalrymple calls, "the opening lines of God's love letter to the world." He is referring to the Christmas story.

We often speak of the work of Christ as though God were compelled, by some celestial mechanics of salvation, to do precisely this in order to save us. But God was not compelled to do any of this.

God might have annihilated humankind and started over. God might have changed the rules so that no sacrifice and no ransom were necessary. But God chose a different manner of self-expression.

Perhaps a better way to think of all of God's work, from creation to incarnation to redemption is this: it is an extended act of divine self-expression, an unfolding of God's character. And what is the character of God made manifest in this story?

Love. Like the creation and restoration of all things, the birth, life, and death of Jesus Christ are expressions of a most extravagant divine love. A love that never fails. A love that seeks beyond every river and mountain until the

lost sheep is found. A love that will suffer and sacrifice all things on behalf of the beloved, that lays down its life for its friend. The same love that brought us into being in the first place enters, in the village of Bethlehem in the person of Jesus Christ, into a new and more intimate relationship with us. God so loved the world that He sent his only begotten son, so that every person who puts faith in him will be reconciled to God and brought to live with Him forever.

We celebrate in Christmas that God became a *person* in order to enter into a *personal* relationship with us...passionate and intimate, characterized not only by worship and reverence but also by tender mercy and forgiveness, love and mutual understanding. With Jesus, we can know God and be known by God through and through. With Jesus, we have footsteps in which to walk. With Jesus, we have the presence and power of God with us even in our most human and most painful moments.

Jesus is a love letter written just to *you*...pining just to be reunited with *you*, desperate for any sign of remembrance and affection from *you*, willing to make any sacrifice just for *you*.

Jesus is the most important letter you will ever receive.

Don't let that letter go unopened...

EASY Newsletter



TEXT MESSAGE SCAM

Never discuss account numbers, PINs, passwords, or other personal information with anyone who contacts you. Legitimate companies don't ask for information like your account numbers or passwords by email, phone or text.

Don't call phone numbers sent in texts, emails or voicemails, as it will connect you with the scammers.

Don't trust caller ID. Just because your caller ID displays a phone number or name of a legitimate company you might recognize, it doesn't guarantee the call is really coming from that number or company.

Forward fraudulent texts to your wireless service provider at 7726 or "SPAM

Don't click on links provided in text messages from numbers you don't recognize. Links can install malware and take you to fake websites that look real but whose purpose is to steal your information.
